Nominees for Diocesan Offices

Trustees & Council Nominees

Trustees and Council manages the temporal affairs of the Diocese subject to the Canons of the Diocese of Kentucky and the Episcopal Church and the budgets and resolutions adopted by the Diocesan Convention. A nominee for the council should be a person who has at least some familiarity with the organization, structure and resources of the diocese and an interest in business affairs. Nominees should be willing to take responsibility for the work of the council in implementing decisions of the Diocesan Convention, formulating long-range plans and making immediate decisions about the life and work of the diocese. Each nominee, if elected, should be prepared to vote upon matters which will support the mission and ministry of the diocese. Each lay nominee must be an active, adult, confirmed communicant of a congregation in good standing, and should be a faithful believer in the Lord, who is committed to the well-being of the diocese and the larger church. Each clerical nominee must be canonically resident in the Diocese of Kentucky, either parochial or non-parochial. Trustees and Council meets five to six times a year, including one overnight retreat at All Saints' Center. A trustee may be elected for two (2) successive terms of three (3) years each, after which at least one (1) year shall elapse before a trustee may be re-elected. Partial terms shall not be considered in determining whether a trustee has served two (2) consecutive terms.

Continuing members are the Rev. Matthew Bradley (2012), the Rev. Alice S. Nichols (2012), Stephen Cherry (2012), the Rev. Amy Real Coultas (2013), the Rev. Ben Maas (2013), the Rev. Rose Bogal-Allbritten (deacon 2013), Angela Koshewa (2013), Nancy Gary (2013) and Bill Nichol (2013). Two presbyters and two laypersons will be elected for three-year terms to replace the Rev. Paul Collins, the Rev. Elizabeth Wade, Sam Dorr and Callie Hausman. One layperson will be elected for a one-year term to complete the term of P'Tricia Egbert.

The following presbyters have been nominated for two three-year positions:



The Rev. Suzanne Barrow

The Rev. Suzanne H. Barrow, vicar of St. Andrew's, Glasgow, for eight years and a part of the diocese for 61 years. Barrow also serves as the stated supply pastor of Munfordville Presbyterian Church. In the diocese, she serves as a member of the Department of Mission and Evangelism. She has served as the president of the Standing Committee and as a member of the All Saints board, the Ecclesiastical Court, Cursillo Secretariat, the Department of Christian Formation and as the diocesan representative to the Kentucky Council of Churches. In the community, she serves on the corporate board of the Boys and Girls Club of Warren and Barren Counties, and on the board of Sustainable Glasgow.



The Rev. Mitchell Bojarski

The Rev. Mitchell Bojarski, vicar of St. Thomas, Campbellsville, for one-and-a-half years and a part of the diocese for three years. Prior to serving at St. Thomas, he was the associate rector at Christ Church, Bowling Green. In the diocese, he serves as a member of the committee on Canons and the Disciplinary Board for Ecclesiastical Discipline. In the community, serves as a board member of Green River Ministries.



The Rev. Emily S. Crouch

The Rev. Emily S. Crouch, assistant rector of St. Matthew's, Louisville, for two years and a part of the diocese for three years. In the diocese, she serves on the nominating committee and as chaplain to All Saints camp and youth gathering. In the community, she serves on the pastoral care advisory committee at Baptist Hospital East and in the Louisville Master Chorale.



The Rev. Jonathan M. Erdman

The Rev. Jonathan M. Erdman, rector of Calvary Church, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for sixteen months. Prior to serving at Calvary Church, he served as curate and youth minister at St. Thomas' Church. In the diocese, he serves on the Commission on Ministry. In the community, he serves on the board of HELP Ministries of Central Louisville.



The Rev. Karl Lusk

The Rev. Karl Lusk, rector of Church of the Ascension, Bardstown, for two years and a part of the diocese for 18 years. In the diocese, he serves as chair of the Department of Mission and Evangelism, as Diocesan Disaster Preparedness Coordinator and as co-chair of the Budget Committee. In the community, he serves as chaplain of Flaget Memorial Hospital, as chaplain of the New Haven/Rolling Fork fire department, on the Nelson County chaplains' response team, as a board member of the Nelson County Free Clinic, a member of the Bardstown/Nelson county ministerial association and as treasurer of the Kentucky Railway Museum.

The following laypersons have been nominated for two three-year positions and one one-year position:



Mike Berry

Mike Berry, a communicant of St. Luke's, Anchorage, and a part of the diocese for 25 years. At St. Luke's, Berry serves as senior warden and a deputy to diocesan convention and has served as vestry clerk. He is the president and chief executive officer of the Kentucky Derby Festival. In the community, he serves as chair of the board of the International Festival and Events Association Foundation and Stage One Children's Theatre, as a member of the board of the Louisville Theatrical Association, as a member of the advisory board of WDRB/FOX41, as a trustee of the general grand chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star and as a member of the Major's Give-A-Day volunteer project.

Mary Jones Carter

Mary Jones Carter, a communicant of St. George's, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for 47 years. At St. George's, Carter serves as senior warden. She is a case manager with the childhood lead poisoning prevention program of the Louisville Metro Department of Public Health and Wellness. In the community, she serves on the board of St. George's Community Center and on the early childhood and health services advisory committee of JCPS.



Rick Coltharp

Rick Coltharp, a communicant of Grace Church, Paducah, for 38 years and a part of the diocese for 60 years. At Grace, Coltharp serves as chair of the organ replacement committee and as a member of the choir, and has served on the finance committee. In the diocese, he is a member of the architecture committee, and he has served on the Bishop search committee. He is an architect and general contractor with Ray Black and Sons, Inc. In the community, he serves on the board of Easter Seals of West Kentucky.

Sam Dorr



Sam Dorr, a communicant of the Church of the Advent, Louisville, for two-and-a-half years and a part of the diocese for 67 years. At Advent, Dorr serves as junior warden, Eucharistic Minister, lector and as chair of the property and plant committee and has served as the chair of the stewardship committee, and the Fall Feast, and as a member of the development committee. In the diocese, he serves on Trustees and Council and the Department of Mission and Evangelism, and as first alternate to General Convention, and has served as lay deputy to General Convention and as a member of the Standing Committee. He is retired. In the community, he serves on the board of the National Episcopal AIDS coalition, AIDS Interfaith Ministries, the YMCA downtown branch and Pandora Productions and as a committee member of the Standing Committee on Mission and Evangelism of the Episcopal Church.



Dade Lockett

Dade Lockett, a communicant of Calvary, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for 66 years. At Calvary, Lockett serves as an acolyte, Eucharistic minister, and altar guild member. He is principal architect at Lockett and Associates, Architects and Engineers. In the community, he serves as a member of the restoration committee of St. James Roman Catholic Church.



Hamp Moore

Hamp Moore, a communicant of Christ Church, Bowling Green, and a part of the diocese for 58 years. At Christ Church, Moore serves as senior warden, lector, Eucharistic Minister and as a member of the finance committee. In the diocese, he serves as Vice-Chancellor and as deputy to General Convention, and has served on Trustees and Council and as member of the Bishop search committee. He is an attorney with Cole and Moore, P.S.C. In the community, he is a member of the board of Western Kentucky University's student life foundation, Kentucky Legal Aid and the Kentucky Bar Foundation.



Keith L. Williams

Keith L. Williams, a communicant of St. Francis in the Fields, Harrods Creek, and a part of the diocese for 60 years. At St. Francis, Williams serves as senior warden and has served as junior warden, chair of the every member canvas, usher, and as member of the welcoming committee. He is in real estate sales with the Semonin Co. In the community, he serves on the 21st century parks fundraising committee.

Standing Committee

The Standing Committee serves as a council of advice to the bishop and, when there is no bishop authorized to act, serves as the ecclesiastical authority of the diocese. The committee consists of three (3) presbyters, three (3) lay persons and (1) deacon who serve for terms of three (3) years each. The routine work of the committee consists of deciding whether or not to approve candidates for the ministry and proposed ordinations in the diocese, and whether or not to consent, on behalf of the diocese, to the ordination of bishops elected in other dioceses. Upon resignation of the bishop, the Standing Committee is responsible for the process leading to the nomination and consecration of a new bishop.

Nominees for the Standing Committee should be persons who are interested in the ordination process and

the life of ordained ministry and can respond to questions relating to approvals sought by other dioceses and concerning our own diocesan structure. Nominees, if elected, must be willing to understand and work within the canons of both the diocese and the larger church. Each lay nominee must be an active, adult, confirmed communicant in good standing in his/her own congregation and should be a faithful believer who is committed to the Lord and familiar with the life and work of the diocese.

Each clerical nominee must be canonically resident in the diocese, either parochial or non-parochial, should have been in the diocese long enough to know the workings of the diocese and its individuals, conditions and situations, and should be one who has been supportive of the work of the church and who does so in his/her present position, even though the nominee may disagree with some decisions. The Standing Committee meets about ten times a year for two to three hours each. No member of the Standing Committee who has served any part of the term for which such member was elected by the Diocesan Convention shall be eligible for re-election to the Standing Committee until an interval of one (1) year has elapsed.

Continuing members are the Rev. Candyce Loescher (2012), Cheryl Stone (2012), the Rev. Charles Hawkins (2013), the Rev. Eva Roberts Markham (deacon 2013) and Judy Donahue (2013). One presbyter and one lay-person will be elected to replace the Rev. Jim Trimble and Phillip R. Patton.

The Rev. Jerry Cappel

The Rev. Jerry Cappel, priest associate at St. Matthew's, Louisville, for two years and a part of the diocese for ten years. Prior to serving at St. Matthew's, Cappel was rector of Resurrection Church, Louisville, for four years. In the diocese, he has served as vice-chair of the Department of Christian Formation and as a member of Trustees and Council and the Ecclesiastical Court. In the community, he serves as president of the Kentuckiana Interfaith Community, as president of Kentucky Interfaith Power and Light and as Province IV Environmental Coordinator.

The Rev. Dr. Joe Smith

The Rev. Dr. Joe Smith, rector of St. Luke's, Anchorage, for nine years and a part of the diocese for 28 years. In the diocese, Smith serves as the convenor of the Eastern Jefferson County/Shelby County Deanery and as a member of the committee on Canons, and has served as a member of the Department of Mission and Evangelism, the committee on Canons, the companion diocese committee and the Cursillo Secretariat. In the community, he serves at Franciscan Shelter House and as chaplain of the Anchorage Fire and EMS.



The Rev. Anne Vouga

The Rev. Anne Vouga, rector of St. Thomas, Louisville, for six months and a part of the diocese for 18 years. Prior to serving at St. Thomas, Vouga was assistant rector at St. Mark's, Louisville. In the diocese, she serves on the Commission on Ministry, the nominating committee and the Sister Emily Cooper committee and has served on the Ecclesiastical Court.

The following laypersons have been nominated for one three-year term:



Bill Allbritten

Bill Allbritten, a communicant of St. John's, Murray, and a part of the diocese for 36 years. At St. John's, Allbritten serves as a lector, offering counter, coffee hour host member of the pastoral care (transportation) ministry, and is a member of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew. In the diocese, he serves as a trustee of the Bishop Dudley Memorial Trust and as a member of the mission funding committee, and has served on Trustees and Council and as budget chair. He is the director of the Counseling and Testing Center at Murray State University. In the community, he serves on the Rotary Club's international service committee.



Rhoden Streeter

Rhoden Streeter, a communicant of St. Matthew's, Louisville, for six years and a part of the diocese for 36 years. At St. Matthew's, Streeter serves as a member of the stewardship committee, the creation relations committee, the adult education committee, cooks and bottle washers committee, and with the Evening Prayer ministry and has served on the vestry, Horizon readers, the Living the Spirit campaign and as co-chair of the Green team. In the diocese, he is a member of the peace and justice division of the Department of Justice and Jubilee and has served on the communications committee and as co-facilitator of the Just Faith program. He is the owner and operator of Human-Kind LLC, a communication service for non-profit enterprises. In the community, he is vice president of the board of Interfaith

Paths to Peace, a mentor for PeaceCasters, a member of Louisville Religious Communicators and a member of the Leadership Louisville class of 2009.

Trustees, the Bishop Dudley Memorial

The Board of Trustees of the Bishop Dudley Memorial is a semi-independent, non-profit corporation which has charge of all money, funds and property of every kind and description, now held or which may hereafter be contributed, for the support of the episcopate in the diocese, including when entrusted to its care the Episcopal residence or residences. The board of directors of the corporation consists of nine (9) trustees who are elected for terms of three (3) years each. The trustees are responsible for the investment of endowment and other funds and for the expenditure of income thereof for the support of the episcopate according to the requirements of the canons of the diocese and the charter of the corporation as amended. Each nominee should have substantial understanding of and experience with financial and investment matters and be willing to attend quarterly meetings with the other trustees and with representatives of the Louisville-based financial institution which the trustees select to manage the funds of the trust. No member who has served for any part of an elected term shall be eligible for re-election until an interval of at least one (1) year has elapsed.

Continuing members are Bill Allbritten (2012), Nancy D. Northrop (2012), Llewellyn P. Spears, III (2012), H. Alexander Campbell (2013), William F. Chandler Jr. (2013), and H. Gibbs Reese (2013). Three laypersons will be elected for three-year terms to replace David Brooks, Donald F. Kohler and Kellie Mysinger.

The following laypersons have been nominated for three three-year positions:

Charlie Hawkins

Charlie Hawkins, a communicant of St. Luke's, Anchorage, and a part of the diocese for 25 years. At St. Luke's, Hawkins has served as senior warden, finance committee member, capital campaign co-chair, capital campaign design committee member and deputy to diocesan convention. He is a financial consultant with Hilliard Lyons.



Jamie Hendon

Jamie Hendon, a communicant of Calvary Church, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for 59 years. At Calvary, Hendon serves as a lector, Eucharistic minister and member of the vestry and has served as senior warden, junior warden, co-chair of the search committee and as a member of the long range planning committee. He is a financial consultant with Hilliard Lyons. In the community, he is the treasurer of the board of the Episcopal Church Home.



Bosworth Todd

Bosworth Todd, a communicant of St. Matthew's, Louisville, for ten years and a part of the diocese for 50 years. He is the chairman emeritus of Todd-Veredus Asset Management LLC. In the community, he serves on the board of directors of St. Francis School, the National Alliance for Research on Schizophrenia and Depression, and the Kentucky Historical Society Foundation.



Jim Turner

Jim Turner, a communicant of Resurrection Church, Louisville, for five years and a part of the diocese for 14 years. At Resurrection, Turner serves as assistant to the minister of music and has served on the vestry. In the diocese, he serves as assistant to the diocesan event photographer. He is the senior vice president of Hilliard Lyons. In the community, he is a member of the Louisville Bar Association (Law Day in school), the Estate Planning Council of Louisville, and the Donors Forum of Louisville.

Trustee, the University of the South

Pursuant to the Charter of the University of the South, the diocese is entitled to one (1) clerical and two (2) lay positions on the board of the university. The persons elected to this position will be part of the ultimate policy-making body of the University of the South, which includes the college, St. Luke's Seminary and St. Andrew's-Sewanee. Each person nominated as a trustee should be willing to learn about the university, to represent it faithfully to the church in Kentucky and be willing to support its programs. Trustees are expected to attend one midweek meeting at the university in the fall of the year; they are not reimbursed for travel or lodging expenses. Additionally, each trustee is expected to make an annual, personal financial contribution to the university.

The continuing members are Mac Jefferson (2012) and the Very Rev. Mark Bourlakas (2013). One layperson will be elected for a three-year term to replace Leslie Newman.

The following laypersons have been nominated for one three-year term:



Leslie M. Newman

Leslie M. Newman, a communicant of St. Paul's, Henderson, and a part of the diocese for 41 years. At St. Paul's, Newman serves as youth director, lay reader, Eucharistic Minister, choir member, deputy to diocesan convention, and search committee member and has served as a member of the capital campaign committee. In the diocese, she serves as a trustee to the University of the South, chair of its community relations committee and delegate to the steering committee for the master campus plan. She is an attorney in private practice with King, Deep and Branaman. In the community, she serves as a board member of the American Lung Association, the Henderson Music Preservation Society, the Henderson Parks and Recreation board, Henderson County ASAP, vice president of the Friends of John

James Audubon State Park, member of the Henderson County Youth Ministers Association, key communicator for the Henderson County schools and grievance officer for the Matthew 25 AIDS service.

Jess Wheat

Jess Wheat, a communicant of Ascension, Bardstown, and a part of the diocese for 15 years. At Ascension, Wheat serves as a lector, Eucharistic minister and greeter and has served on the vestry, as senior warden and stewardship chair. He is a case manager with Boys and Girls Haven. In the community, he serves on the Bardstown Board of Adjustments, the Bardstown/Nelson County Air Board, the Nelson County Humane Society and as an official for KHSAA cross country and field and track.

Disciplinary Board for Ecclesiastical Discipline

The process and procedure for ecclesiastical discipline in the Diocese is prescribed in Title IV of the Canons of the General Convention and Diocesan Canon 29. Title IV as revised by General Convention 2009 creates a hybrid mediation and hearing model whose stated purposes include efforts to “resolve conflicts by promoting healing, repentance, forgiveness, restitution, amendment of life and reconciliation among all involved or affected by” alleged Clergy misconduct. Diocesan Canon 29 creates a Disciplinary Board of seven members, four Clergy and three lay, which functions through panels to mediate, and if necessary, try alleged violations of clerical standards of conduct which are prescribed in the Canons of the General Convention. All members elected to serve on the Disciplinary Board should be emotionally mature and intelligent individuals who are capable of understanding and evaluating evidence and can be expected to be fair-minded and objective when considering alleged violations and can appreciate the needs of the Church, the vulnerabilities of the victim or complainant and the defenses presented by respondent Clergy. Because our Diocese and the Diocese of Lexington have elected to share resources if needed, members of the Disciplinary Board in our Diocese may be called upon to serve in a similar capacity during a Title IV proceeding in the Diocese of Lexington. Existing members of the Disciplinary Board may be reelected for up to three successive terms of three years each after which such a member shall not be eligible for further election for at least one year after the end of his or her third consecutive term; members of the Standing Committee are not canonically disqualified from serving on the Board.

Continuing members are the Rev. Mitch Bojarski (2012), Barbara Mather Cobb (2012), Mike D. Risley (2012), and the Rev. Richard Paxton (2013). One member of the clergy (presbyter or deacon) and one layperson will be elected for three-year terms and one member of the clergy (presbyter or deacon) will be elected for a two-year term to replace the Rev. Matthew Bradley, the Rev. Anne Vouga and Dan Songer.

The following clergypersons have been nominated for one three-year position and one two-year position:



The Rev. G. Patterson Connell

The Rev. G. Patterson Connell, rector of Trinity Church, Owensboro, and a part of the diocese for 14 years. In the diocese, Connell serves as chair of the Commission on Ministry and has served as a deputy to General Convention. In the community, he serves on the board of the St. Benedict’s homeless shelter, on the Review Board for Sexual Misconduct of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Owensboro, and as an officer of the Owensboro Ministerial Association.



The Rev. Gary England

The Rev. Gary England, newly appointed deacon at St. Mark’s, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for seven years. In the diocese, England serves on the Church Pension Fund committee and on the peace and justice committee in the Department of Justice and Jubilee. He is the general counsel at Hilliard Lyons. In the community, he serves on the board of the Walden Theatre.



The Rev. Meghan Holland

The Rev. Meghan Holland, assistant rector at Grace Church, Paducah, for three months and a part of the diocese for 13 years. In the diocese, Holland serves as program developer at All Saints Conference Center. In the community, she serves on the “Fresh Start” advisory board of Paducah Cooperative Ministries.

Molly A. Isaacs-McLeod

Molly A. Isaacs-McLeod, a communicant of Calvary Church, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for ten years. At Calvary, Isaacs-McLeod serves as chair of the legal advisory committee and as a member of the discernment committee, the every member canvas and the endowment committee governing board, and has served as junior warden, senior warden and as a Christian formation teacher. She is an attorney in private practice, offering mediation services for issues surrounding family law and educational accommodation. In the community, she serves as the co-founder and director of the Parents of Gifted Students.



Donald Vish

Donald Vish, a communicant of Church of the Advent, Louisville, and a part of the diocese for 11 years. At Advent, Vish serves as church photographer. In the diocese, he serves on the communications committee and as a volunteer photographer and has served on the Bishop transition committee. He is a lawyer with Middleton Reutlinger and teaches at the Brandeis School of Law at the University of Louisville. In the community, he serves on the board of the Kentucky Coalition to Abolish the Death Penalty, the Kentucky School of Art, the Donors Forum of Louisville, as president of the Center for Non-Profit Excellence and as a member of Interfaith Paths to Peace.



Richard Rush Wheeler

Richard Rush Wheeler, a communicant of St. Luke's, Anchorage, for four years and a part of the diocese for 21 years. At St. Luke's, Wheeler serves as chancellor and has served on the vestry and the finance committee. He has recently retired as a wealth management banker with PNC Bank, N.A.

Cathedral Chapter Representative

The articles of incorporation of Christ Church Cathedral authorize the Convention of the Diocese of Kentucky to elect three (3) diocesan representatives to serve as voting members of the Cathedral's Chapter (vestry) for terms of three (3) years of each. Nominees must be either a presbyter or deacon canonically resident in the diocese, or an adult, confirmed communicant in good standing of a congregation other than the congregation of Christ Church Cathedral, in union with the Convention of the Diocese. Nominees who are elected are expected to attend meetings and functions of the chapter and offer perspectives of the diocese at large during the chapter's deliberations. Elected representatives are not eligible to serve as senior warden, junior warden, treasurer or secretary of the chapter.

Continuing members are Debi Wind (2012) and Laurie Joyce (2013). One person (lay or clergy) will be elected for a three-year term to replace Bill Gaunt.

The Rev. Moray Peoples

The Rev. Moray Peoples, vicar of Holy Trinity, Brandenburg, for four months and a part of the diocese for 27 years. Prior to serving at Holy Trinity, Peoples was interim associate at St. Matthew's, Louisville. In the diocese, he serves on the All Saints board and as an Education for Ministry mentor and has served as a supply priest. In the community, he is a volunteer with Actors Theatre of Louisville.



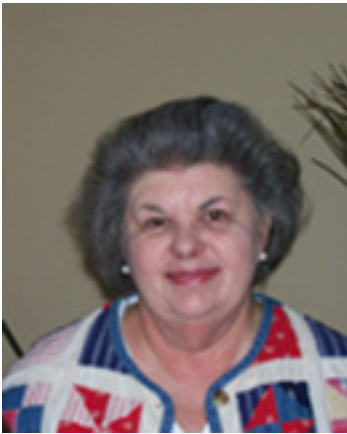
Eleanor Ruth Robins

Secretary of the Diocese

A Secretary is elected immediately upon the opening of a convention for a term that begins at the end of that meeting and ends with the next "stated meeting of Convention." The Secretary is expected to attend the Convention, as well as all meetings of Trustees and Council and its Executive Committee. The Secretary is expected to verify the minutes of these meetings and verify certain official documents. Further assistance will be provided by the Diocesan Office for the publication and distribution of the Annual Journal as required under Canon 9, Canons of the Diocese of Kentucky. This work is done in close cooperation with the Secretary, who verifies the accuracy of The Journal.
