

After 34 years of ordained ministry and in her 5th year at the Church of the Nativity, The Rev'd Mary Anne Akin, Associate Rector for Pastoral Care and Outreach will begin a 12-week sabbatical beginning January 23, 2012. Pastoral Care needs will be assisted by Deacon Jeannie Robison; and The Rev'd Rusty McCown will be assisting with preaching and teaching needs during her time away time. Please wish Mary Anne well and keep her and her husband Joe in your prayers during this time of renewal, rest, refreshment, and study.

The following is the text of the Presiding Bishop's message:

#### Christmas Message 2011

See, your salvation comes - Isaiah 62:11

The great prophets before Jesus proclaimed a vision of a nation and a people redeemed. We continue to share that yearning – as the Christmas hymn puts it, "the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight." We've seen abundant hopes spring up in the past year across the Arab world and Eastern Europe, and in the global Occupy movement. Those voices seek a world of greater justice, communities in which decisions and the gifts of creation are more available to all. Our understanding of salvation is most profoundly about justice in community, and as Christians we believe that help and healing for all are grounded in the incarnate presence of God – among us and within us.

We look for salvation to the one who came among us in the most humble way, a helpless child born in a scandalous way to a poor peasant couple. The Incarnation, God with us, changed the world in ways that we insist are leading to the ultimate healing of all creation. "See, your salvation comes," says the prophet in every age, yet it is not yet fully come upon us. We live in hope for its fullness. May hope be nourished within us, in each and every human being and community, for the journey toward God's healed and holy future.

That proclamation of coming salvation is a part of Isaiah (Isa 62:6-12) that will be read in some congregations at Christmas, but if you don't hear it, go and read the whole of it. Its centerpiece speaks of what that salvation looks like: The Lord has sworn...I will not again give your grain to be food for your enemies, and foreigners shall not drink the wine for which you have labored; but those who garner it shall eat it and praise the Lord, and those who gather it shall drink it in my holy courts. Isaiah 62:8-9

That is not a vision of pristine isolation, but a vision of comfort and healing to a people frequently at war, occupied, or exploited by superior forces. The fear of powerful others taking and using for themselves the produce of the poor is healed and transformed into a society in which the gifts God provides will be shared by all. For when salvation comes, that society will be called, 'the Holy People, The Redeemed of the Lord'; and you shall be called, 'Sought Out, A City Not Forsaken.' Isaiah 62:12

Jesus comes among us to remind us of a world living together in peace, to reclaim and make real that vision of creation for all humanity and all God's creatures. That world is put right as relationships between God and humanity are set right. The relationship between God and human being cannot be set right without equal healing of relationships between us mortals. See, your salvation comes! Will we welcome that healing?

The author/poet/theologian Jan Richardson resides nearby and has agreed to meet with me for discussion and guidance. Another priest friend will serve as mentor and consultant. Thoughts of long-awaited reading moments and time for contemplation are the most important elements in these days for me. As the Book of Common Prayer Book offers us in its prayers on page 825, "… give us times of refreshment and peace; and grant that we may so use our leisure to rebuild our bodies and renew our minds, that our spirits may be opened to the goodness of your creation".

### Reducing Air Pollution - Stewardship of Creation Tip for January 4, 2012

What we do inside our homes, regardless of where we live, can be polluting the air both inside and out.

If most people were asked to do a quick word association about air pollution, chances are strong words like "city" and "traffic" would be among the first to come to mind. However, while large cities with heavy traffic are certainly susceptible to air pollution, city dwellers and drivers aren't the lone culprits when it comes to causing air pollution.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, what we do inside our homes, regardless of where we live, can be polluting the air both indoors and out. To do your part, consider the following tips for reducing air pollution:

**RECYCLE.** One of the easiest ways to help reduce air pollution is to participate in your community's recycling program. Recycling helps reduce air pollution by reducing production emissions. Plus, recycling helps to conserve valuable and expensive energy.

INSPECT YOUR APPLIANCES REGULARLY. Inspecting heating and cooling systems (filters in particular) and keeping them properly maintained can help reduce the emissions of harmful gases into the air both inside and outside your home. Have a professional check your home comfort system in the spring and in the fall. If your system isn't operating efficiently, it could be costing

you significant amounts of energy dollars and negatively affecting air quality.

PROPER STORAGE AND DISPOSAL OF COMMON HOUSEHOLD ITEMS. Many items around the house can be very harmful to the environment if not disposed of properly. One easy thing you can do to help the environment is to make sure your paints, pesticides and solvents are stored in airtight containers. Also, be sure to safely dispose of all of the following

Also, be sure to safely dispose of <u>all</u> of the following products: old cleaners, waxes, paint, garden poisons, solvents, automotive fluids, old TV's, computers, or other hazardous chemicals. These items can be hazardous to the environment, animals and our families when they are stockpiled, abandoned or disposed of improperly.

You can drop off household hazardous waste on the first Saturday of each month from 8:00 a.m. to Noon at the Handle with Care Collection Center at the Huntsville Landfill, 4100 Leeman Ferry Road.

For special assistance, call 256-880-6054. The program is free of charge to all residents of Madison County, the City of Huntsville, and the City of Madison.

LOOK AT THINGS IN TERMS OF YOUR AND YOUR FAMILY'S HEALTH. Exposure to air pollution can aggravate asthma, lead to potential lung damage, cause coughing or shortness of breath and could result in premature death for people with existing heart or lung diseases. Since these issues affect over 50 million Americans, chances are air pollution is affecting someone you know and care about.
