

The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

181st Diocese of Alabama Convention in Huntsville February 17-18

Episcopalians from around the state will converge upon Huntsville this Friday and Saturday for our annual Diocesan Convention. Our diocese is a community of 92 congregations with over 30,000 members stretching from south of Montgomery to the northern border of the state (lower Alabama down to the gulf is included in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast and not a part of our diocese). We are expecting almost 500 clergy and lay delegates from around the diocese and another 100 or so other diocesan representatives and guests.

The Convention, hosted by the six greater Huntsville parishes (The Church of the Nativity, Holy Cross-St. Christopher's, St. Columba's in the Cove, St. Matthew's, St. Stephen's, St. Thomas'), will be held at the Von Braun Center. Nativity's lay delegates are Lou Durnya, Holly Ellis, Elizabeth Dotts Fleming, Pat Goodson, Lee Hicklen, Loch Neely, Rusty Stephenson, and Bland Warren. Our clergy, Andy Anderson, Brad Landry, and Jeannie Robison also attend.

On Saturday morning, Nativity will welcome all of the clergy, lay delegates and alternates and other guests for the Festival Diocesan Eucharist. Nativity's choir directed by Suzanne Purtee and the Flint River Brass will lead the music. Unfortunately, there is only room at the service for registered delegates, alternates, and other diocesan guests and officials. But with about 125 vested clergy and our Bishop, along with our acolytes and colorful banners, there will be quite a procession! The Garden Guild, Flower Guild, Altar Guild, the Vestry, and parish staff have all been working to get everything looking its best for our guests. We also have a committee offering hospitality before the service early Saturday morning. Please keep our Bishop and our Diocese in your prayers during this time of renewal for the mission and ministry of the church.

What a privilege we have to share our beautifully restored National Historic Landmark church and incredibly tended grounds (special thanks to the Garden Guild!) with our brothers and sisters from around the diocese.

NATIVITY'S YOUNG ADULTS TRAVEL TO HAITI



Members of Nativity's Young Adult Group will be going on a trip February 25 through March 2 to Thomazeua, Haiti to build a sustainable garden inside the walls of a church there. The group has been working on raising money and planning for this mission for over a year. It was started to help one family in Haiti rebuild after the earthquake and has transformed into building a garden that will help feed an entire village.

St. Mary's on the Highlands in Birmingham has successfully done this

in a near-by village. The Young Adult Group has been working closely with the team from St Mary's to ensure that we are successful. We have been working with Pierre Henry Fritz Valdema (Pere Val) and met with him for lunch while he was here in November to plan our next steps. He has enlisted several local people from the village to clear and prepare the land before we arrive. While we are on-site plans are to install irrigation and plant the garden. In the future, there are plans for another group of young adults to help harvest, replant, and assist in maintaining the garden.

REPORT FROM THE 2012 HAITI MISSION TRIP

The Nativity Haiti mission team returned to Huntsville February 11 after a productive week. Team members included Deacon Mary Groff, Debbie Collette, Margaret Devenish, Diane Pratt, Brenda Smith from St. Thomas and Bob Serio. We treated over 470 patients during 4 days of medical clinics and dispensed toothbrushes, eyeglasses, and vitamins donated by the parish. The last clinic was in Crouchu which is in the mountains of Haiti and an harrowing hour ride from our base at St. Simeon parish in Port au Prince. The people of Crouchu have no electricity and must carry water up a steep hill for their cooking and cleaning. Our hosts, Pere (Father) Val and his wife, Carmel run a nutrition clinic there and with the assistance of the Krik-Krak program of the Diocese feed over 300 children. During our visit we were able to see the progress that has been made in the recovery efforts from the earthquake. Life has returned to a more normal level and many of the tent cities have been dismantled. We saw new housing being built in the outskirts of city. There still remains much to be done.

On Sunday we were able to participate in the feast of St. Simeon (the namesake of the parish) with a wonderful service of celebration (including a one hour sermon in French) followed by a parish picnic.

Everyday, the Haitian doctors and nurses would thank us for supply of medications we were able to bring thanks to the generosity of the people of Nativity. In addition, there were enough funds left from this and previous missions that we were able to buy an autoclave (sterilizer) for the main clinic at Lespwa Timon (which means Hope for the Children.) The Mission team wants to thank everyone for the tremendous support you gave us.

Stewardship of Creation Tip for February 14, 2012

Easy Solar Energy Tips

There are many ways to tap the sun's energy besides rooftop panels. Passive solar design—so named because it doesn't require mechanical or electrical devices to transfer the sun's energy—can reduce your energy consumption, save you money, and make your home more comfortable.

Let There Be (Natural) Light

Lighting accounts for approximately 6 percent of the average home's electricity bill. Swapping light bulbs for sunlight can reduce these costs up to 80 percent.

- Keep window coverings open during the day. In the summer, let light in but keep heat out with lightcolored, loose-weave mesh shades. In hotter climates, you can also apply reflective (also called lowemissivity, or "low-e") coatings on the outside of windows.
- Install skylights and daylighting tubes (which allow sunlight to pass through the attic into rooms below).

Keep Winter Out

About 45 percent of the total energy used in U.S. homes each year goes toward heating. Taking advantage of the sun's warmth can reduce this consumption by more than half.

- During the day, open coverings on windows that face south or within 30 degrees of true south to let in sunlight, then close them at night to retain heat and minimize drafts. For even more heat retention, use insulated window coverings.
- In colder climates, install low-emissivity (or "low-E") coatings on the inside of windows to reflect heat back inside.

Beat the Summer Heat

AS N Luther

Air conditioning accounts for about 9 percent of average home energy use. Shading interior spaces can reduce cooling costs by 40 percent.

- Install low-E coatings on the outside of south- and west-facing windows and skylights to reflect sunlight. Or, install awnings over these windows to block the summer sun (sunlight can still enter in the winter because of the sun's lower angle in the sky). Keep these windows' coverings closed during the day.
- In the evening, open windows to let warm air escape, and consider installing an attic fan to enhance the process.
- Plant deciduous trees and shrubs on your home's south and west sides to provide summer shade; warming sunlight returns in time for winter after their leaves fall. Well-positioned trees can cut annual energy costs by 25 percent.
