

Praying with the President

Each Sunday we pray for Barack our President along with the leaders of the nations. We beseech thee also to rule the hearts of those who bear the authority of government in this and every land, especially Barack our President, that they may be led to wise decisions and right actions for the welfare and peace of the world. This prayer took on new meaning this past Sunday when Barack our President was ten feet away from where I was praying!

Tippy and I were in the nation's capital visiting our son Case. We decided to worship at St. John's Lafayette Square, the Episcopal Church that is across the street from the White House. St. John's is known as the "President's Church" because every president since 1815 has worshipped there while in office. Approaching the church, police cars were blocking the streets. Policemen were questioning pedestrians and sending some in other directions. We conveyed that we were going to St. John's and directed us toward a muscular young man wearing Ray Bans who was posted at the front doors. This was the first time I have been frisked going into church services!

We made it to our pew and Case directed our attention to the right, and there, just across the aisle, was the President, Mrs. Obama and their daughter Sasha heartily singing the procession hymn! Watching him, I saw that he knew our Prayer Book responses and our "Episcopal" hymns. Kneeling for the Prayers of the People along with him, I found myself wondering about the President's prayers. Was he praying for the economy... for the direction to take in the Middle East that will lead to peace among the nations?...for the welfare of dignity of all persons (as one of our prayers for the President in Rite Two conveys)?...for the members of Congress and how they work together?...for his political opponents?...how to distribute adequate health care and to create jobs?...maybe just for his daughters growing up in this crazy world?

And I realized that it did my heart good just to know that he was on his knees saying his prayers. I was glad to see him receiving the bread and wine of Communion, the body and blood of Christ—that he was making an offering of himself, just as we all do, that Christ would be known through his life, through his actions as President. Praying with the President, not simply for him, is a powerful thing.

I certainly hope that all of the leaders of our nation and all those who seek political office are saying their prayers. The political discourse of our nation is as divisive as it has ever been. This political tension is fueled not so much by differing approaches to solving our nation's problems as by rancorous language that denigrates the dignity of one's political opponents. No matter whether you agree with the President or other political leaders, praying for them, and even with them, takes the discourse to a higher plane. That is one reason Christ asks us to pray for our enemies, and why we do that every Sunday at Nativity.

E Pluribus Unum, out of many, one, reminds us that it takes all of us working together, sifting through ideas and potential solutions, to get to where we need to be. It takes compromise and it takes respect as we work towards sustainable ways to promote the dignity and welfare of all persons in this nation and in the world. Can we listen to each other with respect, even disagree with others passionately, but know we are one?

For us Episcopalians, this is the way it is. At Nativity, we are Republicans and Democrats at prayer together. We are progressive and conservatives over many issues, yet kneeling together at the altar rail, each one of us receiving God's presence in Christ, fueling the offering that Christ would be known in our actions and through our lives, makes us one. It is a powerful thing to pray with each other...to know that we are one in Christ.

Stewardship of Creation Tip

Here's a tip from the Sierra Club's Mr. Green:
Mr. Green, Can You Compost Shredded Paper?
I shred *credit-card statements* and other papers containing personal financial information. I usually have a disproportionate amount of green material for my compost, so I'd love to add this shredded paper to the pile. Is such paper safe for composting? What about shredded newsprint?

Except for colored and glossy paper, which might contain some toxic heavy metals, (added note: and cash register and credit card receipts printed on thermal paper – see note below), newsprint and other paper is safe to use as mulch or in compost. In fact, one study revealed that paper had less toxic material than straw or grass!

The only problem with paper is that if you put too much of it in your heap, you could get an unfavorable carbon-to-nitrogen ratio, since paper is high in carbon (one reason it burns). But unless your finances are of a Bernie Madoffian level of complexity, your financial documents will probably not disturb the ratio! The ideal ratio is 25 carbon to 1 nitrogen. Too much carbon slows down the process. If that happens, you can always add high-nitrogen material such as grass clippings, alfalfa, or manure.

As you no doubt have already discovered, well-chopped material and frequent turning is the key to healthy, happy compost.

NOTE: It probably would be best <u>not</u> to include cash register and credit card receipts in your compost. BPA Is used in Thermal Printing of Cash Register and Credit Card Receipts

A source of high contamination with BPA may be thermal printing paper. BPA is coated on paper that produces colored markings when heated. The amount of BPA on some cash register and credit card receipts is staggering. In some cases a receipt from a cash register can contain 100 milligrams of free BPA.

Handle Receipts with Care

The uproar over nanograms and micrograms of BPA leaching from water bottles took place while millions of people casually handled receipts with thousands of times higher concentrations of BPA. Parents shudder over the prospect of a baby picking up a used cigarette butt, while a receipt on the floor may pose a more dangerous health threat.
