Easter's Promise and Demand

Not, I'll not, carrion comfort, Despair, feast on thee; Not untwist—slack they may be—these last strands of man in me 'or, most weary, cry **I can no more.** I can, can something, hope, wish day come, not choose not to be. From "Carrion Comfort" by Gerard Manly Hopkins

Easter assures us that we cannot choose "not to be." Christ overcomes death and loss, despair and fear—especially our fear of death—taking us by the hand and raising us with him to life that eternally springs forth hope. We are set free from sins' limitations and reconciled with God so we can in turn be reconciled with each other. Resurrection power is unleashed for our own lives, and for the whole world, too.

After our glorious Easter celebrations, when the crowds have dissipated, all the chocolate candy reduced to a few foil wrappings in the drawer, and the lilies limp, Hopkins powerful words keep me standing and shouting Easter alleluias. For even though I know *Christ is risen from the dead*, the world can sometimes look more like Good Friday than Easter. Good Friday is so poignant because it is so devastatingly true. The world still chooses darkness over light. Terrorism, nuclear build-ups, genocide, economic disparities, and other selfish choices of people against people make the world seem dark indeed.

And in our own lives, pain and suffering and loss continue to be our companions in a world created in freedom, but that does not always unfold the way God has purposed. And so sometimes, our lives seem stuck on Good Friday.

The light of Easter, piercing the thick darkness that covers our world, is sending a message of hope. The great preacher William Sloane Coffin wrote that Easter is a "Yes, but" kind of message. "Yes, fear and self-righteousness, indifference and sin kill; **but** love never dies, not with God and not even with us." Easter says that all the tenderness and love which on Good Friday we saw scourged and nailed to a cross, all that goodness and beauty, are alive and always with us—no faded memory, but an undying presence in the life of everyone. Christ's resurrection assures us of our own resurrection. "Christ is risen to convert us, not from life to something more than life, but from something less than life to the possibility of full life itself."

Easter is our conversion from loveless power to selfless love. Coffin went on to write, "Easter represents a demand as well as a promise. A demand that we pledge our loyalty to the risen one. Our loyalties and our hope are found in the God who defeats the power of crucifixion and raises us to life lived in the promise that God's love prevails. Our Lenten journey is not so much a preparation for the joy of Easter Day, as it is a preparation for the hope and joy of living as Easter people, 365 days a year (366 days this year!).

Nativity is a community of Easter hope; a community that is being converted to deeper levels of living into the promise and demand of Easter. I see this in people's lives and in our corporate life in the ministry we offer to the world. In countless ways, we are saying "I can, can something, hope, wish day come, not choose not to be." And choosing Resurrection life, we give each other and the world the message that we don't have to remain stuck on Good Friday.

Easter Day has come and gone. But Easter's promise is always with us. Alleluia. Christ is risen. Alleluia. We are risen with him!

Fairtrade is an alternative approach to conventional trade and is based on a partnership between producers and consumers. **Fairtrade** offers producers a better deal and improved terms of trade. This allows them the opportunity to improve their lives and plan for their future. **Fairtrade** offers consumers a powerful way to reduce poverty through their every day shopping.



When a product carries the <u>FAIRTRADE Mark</u> it means the producers and traders have met Fairtrade Standards. The <u>Standards</u> are designed to address the imbalance of power in trading relationships, unstable markets and the injustices of conventional trade.

Fairtrade Encourages Organic Farming Principles

Organic food is generally produced using ecologically integrated practices without use of synthetic chemicals, genetically engineered materials, sewage sludge or irradiation. Chemically dependent agriculture harms the environment and puts human health at risk.

WORSHIP NOTES FOR THE GREAT 50 DAYS OF EASTER

During Eastertide, from Easter Day through Pentecost, our worship takes on an even more joyful resonance than other Sundays during the Liturgical Year. More alleluias are said and sung; the hymns continue to reflect the Easter themes, and people are encouraged to stand for the prayers instead of kneeling (entirely optional).

We use Eucharistic Prayer B that expresses our Easter conviction that "In him (the Risen Christ) God has delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before God. In Christ, God has brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life." Living into the reality of resurrection life won for us at Easter, we do not say the confession of sin in our corporate worship. This does not mean that we are sinless and should not confess our sins privately (or to a priest when necessary). Easter is a reversal of the penitence and focus on the cross during Lent. Symbolically, just as Lent is more penitential, Easter is markedly more joyful! Alleluia. Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed! Alleluia!
