

A Letter from Bishop Sloan

June 27, 2012

Dear Friends in Christ,

I write this letter with great appreciation and affection, and with some difficulty. As I visit around the Diocese, I believe I see you for who you really are: kind, decent, loving and faithful servants of Jesus Christ. We don't all hold the same opinions or sing the same songs, but what's most important - our faith in almighty God through our Lord Jesus Christ - is what is most important to us all. The many things that hold us together are much stronger than the few things that threaten to tear us apart.

The 2012 General Convention will be July 5 – 12. The deputation from the Diocese of Alabama are four lay people (Earnest Edgar from Holy Trinity in Auburn, Virginia Hillhouse from St. Stephen's in Birmingham, Barbara Meyer from St. Thomas in Huntsville, and Marc Smith from St. Mark's in Birmingham) and four clergy (John Mark Ford from St. Catherine's in Chelsea, John Fritschner from Holy Trinity in Auburn, Evan Garner from St. John's in Decatur, and Susan Sloan from St. Stephen's in Huntsville) along with Bishop Parsley and myself. We will be posting videos and thoughts from our deputation on the Diocesan website (www.diaola.org) which will also provide links to the General Convention website.

There will be hundreds of resolutions considered, argues and voted on at the Convention. Some will be important but not interesting, others will interesting but not important, some will be neither, and a few will be both. The most controversial issue will be about the blessing of same-gender relationships. This will likely be the subject of a number of editorials, headlines and opinion pieces, and what your friends are most likely to be asking about.

It might be helpful for me to tell you all where I am with this difficult issue. Some of you may know that I appointed to be on the Standing Commission on Liturgy and Music, which is the Commission that the previous General Convention assigned "to collect and develop theological and liturgical resources" for the blessing of same-gender relationships. The resolution to General Convention 2012 is the result of all that collecting and developing, and invites the General Convention to authorize for study and use materials gathered in a book called <u>Liturgical Resources I: I Will Bless You and You Will Be a Blessing</u>. In that book, there will be liturgy to bless the committed relationships of same-gender couples, a theological document considering how this could be God's will for our Church, a variety of educational materials, and some work on the canons of our church.

I will no doubt be an involved and animated discussion at Convention, with people on all sides and extremes presenting their points of view, while doing their best to refuse to admit that other people also have points of view that are worth considering. There will be committee meetings, open hearings, and discussions in the house of Deputies and the House of Bishops. Eventually it will come to a vote, and among the bishops it will surely be a roll call vote, so that each bishop will vote for or against after his or her name is called. And five minutes after that vote, it will be on the internet, so the whole world can know how each bishop voted. The Convention is a deliberative process, and I committed to listening with an open mind and heart; I honestly do not know how I going to vote - I have a lot of listening to do first. No matter how I vote, I am assuming that his resolution will be amended, and may very well pass.

One of the provisions in the resolution is that the liturgy for blessing same-gender unions is to be "under the direction of a bishop exercising ecclesiastical authority." This means that for a priest to perform such a service in Alabama, he or she will need to get my permission.

This is a very complicated subject, with several different levels and layers. It is a theological issues, a question of Biblical interpretation, a matter of human rights, and a multitude of pastoral concerns. Those people with positions more liberal than mine are good, faithful, intelligent children of God for whom Jesus died as well. I think we have a lot of work to do, a lot of listening to do, before we come to one mind about this in the Episcopal Church.

When we get back from Indianapolis, I imagine I'll have a stack of letters and emails congratulating me on however I voted, from people that agree with me. I'll have another stack from people telling me that I've abandoned the faith and lost the Gospel, because they disagree. And there will be requests to offer the liturgy to bless same-gender unions, not as issues or discussions, but for Steve and George who love each, or Connie and Louise who've been together for 26 years.

We are not of one mind about different parts of this complicated issue, but I know for sure that it is wrong to further splinter or break apart the Church. I told the clergy at Clergy Conference that if this resolution passes, I will not give permission to bless same-gender unions at this time. It may be that this is right for some parts of the Church in some places and contexts, but I do not think it is the right thing for the Episcopal Church in Alabama to do now. I could be wrong, in how I vote, or in my intention to withhold permission, but I don't think I am. In all of this, I am seeking to be faithful to God and to do what is best for our Lord's Church and for all of God's children.

In the coming months, we will begin a process of listening and discerning, learning from each other and teaching each other. There is so much we need to study and discuss. We need to be willing to listen respectfully to people who offer a different point of view, without condemning or patronizing. I hope and pray that God will answer our prayer and "grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love." (BCP 833)

In the height of the civil rights movement, when the Episcopal Church was beginning our long process of considering the ordination of women and revising the Book of Common Prayer, Bishop Carpenter was asked if we would survive. It was after all, a tumultuous moment for our society and for our church, even more that the current moment. I'll close with his inspired answer for that time and this: "If it is God's will that there be an Episcopal Church in Alabama, then by God there will be!"

I am convinced that Almighty God is not done with us, and that we have not abandoned God. The work of the Church is still before us - to proclaim the Good News of the love of God in Jesus Christ, to reconcile God's children to each other and our Father in Heaven. We need to be about God's work.

In this, and in all the work of God's holy Church, I invite your prayers: for the bishops and the deputies at General Convention, for the Dioceses of Alabama, and for all the parishes and clergy.

<u>Jonathan Daniels Annual Pilgrimage, Saturday, August 11, 11:00 a.m.</u> in Hayneville at the Lowndes County Courthouse Square (Lafayette and Washington St.)

Mark your calendars now to attend and be ready to travel. Look for information in July 18th newsletter from Nativity's Reconciliation Ministry regarding transportation from Huntsville.

This year's homilist will be Carolyn Maull McKinstry, author of While the World Watched: A Birmingham Bombing Survivor Comes of Age During the Civil Rights Movement. A survivor of the civil rights struggle and eyewitness to the Sixteenth Street Baptist Church bombing, Carolyn Maull McKinstry, marched under Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and bravely faced Bull Connor's German shepherds and stinging fire hoses during the battle for equal rights. Now, one year before the fifth anniversary of the bombing, Carolyn will share her experience and insights during the pilgrimage that is sponsored by The Commission on Race Relations and the Diocese of Alabama.

Jonathan Daniels was an Episcopal seminarian who answered the call of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. to help register African-American voters in Alabama. He was shot and killed on Aug. 20 1965, while shielding then 16-year-old Ruby Sales from a shotgun blast as she attempted to enter a store to buy something to drink. Daniels was added to the Episcopal Church Calendar of Saints and Martyrs in 1994 to be remembered each Aug. 14.

The pilgrimage begins at 11:00 a.m., on Saturday, Aug. 11, 2012 at the Courthouse Square in Hayneville. The procession will go to the old county jail where Daniels and Sales were among those detained for a week and then will move to the old Cash Grocery Store where Daniels was killed. The pilgrimage will end at the Courthouse where a service of Holy Communion will take place in the courtroom and McKinstry will speak.

A Nativity Jonathan Daniels Pilgrimage Youth Lock-in will take place on Friday, August 10 in or near Hayneville. On Saturday, they will go to the Courthouse Square for the Pilgrimage. Contact Liz Williams (256-533-2455 lwilliams@nativity-hsv.org) for registration information.
