

General Convention, Jesus, John the Baptist and Herod

Excerpts from Andy Anderson's Homily on July 15

The legislative process at The Episcopal Church's triennial General Convention could be viewed as part family reunion and part ant farm! Every day, moving through the convention center and hotels for worship and meetings, with thousands of Episcopalians scurrying around, it seems that every ant in the Episcopal colony there was doing something important.

Some were writing new resolutions and perfecting pre-filed ones, others were hanging out in the exhibit space that includes every organization known to Episcopalians and then some. Many, like me, were renewing friendships and making new ones, some testifying at open committee hearings, some wandering around lost, some campaigning for elected positions; others catching up with a much needed nap; Episcopal Churchwomen from the far reaches of the church were there for their concurrent Triennial meeting, and thankfully, many were praying. In the midst of all the work, we are family. Faithfulness prevails.

I realize that some of our understandings of what it means to be faithful are in disagreement. I realize that some of our tasks seem at cross-purposes. But I do not believe that such disagreements are stronger than the Holy Spirit at work among us in the church. Remaining focused and faithful, even if that puts us in occasional disagreement for a time, God is at work.

I was awed by the rich diversity in the church that splits open my limited particularity of experience. It is wonderful to see old friends from all over the country at Convention. But it is so powerful to see the breadth of our church, meeting and praying with people from the wide expanse of who we are.

The Holy Spirit hovered above the chaos, bringing the work we had assembled to do before us. Working through our doubts and struggles to direct us toward the fulfilling of God's purposes. One of the important things accomplished is to begin a process to restructure the church so that we can be more focused on mission. We dealt with denominational health care insurance and worked on the church's calendar of saints. We even authorized some St. Francis inspired liturgies for our beloved pets! We made statements on matters of peace and justice in this country and around the world.

Although we did not adopt the Anglican Communion Covenant, we agreed to remain in dialog with the Covenant process because there is much we do agree on. All was accomplished through discourse showing Christ-like love for one another. We were able to disagree with each other without demonizing those with differing opinions. You probably didn't hear much about any of this in the press.

Of course, what you probably did hear about was the passage of Resolution A049, which allows the provisional use of liturgies for the blessing of same-sex unions. The resolution was debated with a spirit of respect and forbearance, and passed by a 3/quarters majority in all orders. For these blessing liturgies to be used in the church, it will first require the Diocesan Bishop's consent. And then, after prayerful conversations in parishes, if rectors and vestries affirm their usage, these blessings might be offered.

I hope you have read Bishop Sloan's letter and seen his subsequent videos on the Diocesan Web site that address this move by the church towards a pastoral response to our members who would find such a blessing a strength to their life-long monogamous commitments.

Bishop Sloan voted for the passage of this resolution, although he has stated that he will not authorize the use of these liturgies in the Diocese of Alabama at this time. He believes that humility, patience, and continued prayerful reflection are needed by Episcopalians in Alabama. In the coming months, we will study and pray and talk about these blessing liturgies on both the diocesan level and on the parish level. I look forward to the conversations with you.

With these matters on our hearts, it is ironic that today's Gospel is the story of King Herod's acquiring the head of John the Baptist on a platter. Depending on how you feel about A049, you may want to have someone's head on a platter. That goes for those who support its immediate implementation, and for those who are struggling with this direction in the church.

King Herod was both fascinated and afraid of John the Baptist, especially the influence he was having over the people of Israel. He respects John's powerful teaching, preaching and his vast following despite John's open opposition to Herod's actions. But Herod clings to his power and influence, afraid of John's. Ultimately, he has no other option than either to change, or to quell John's influence. So he throws John in prison and he ultimately consents to his execution.

Mark's Gospel also tells us that King Herod is fascinated by Jesus's words and actions. The Gospel today compels us to consider how John the Baptist's story intersects with Jesus'. Like John the Baptist before Jesus, Herod is not willing to allow Jesus' words and teachings change his heart. It is easy to be fascinated by Jesus. But it is not so easy to allow his words and the things he does...things he asks for us to do likewise, to change our hearts and the way we live and act in this world.

Today's gospel asks the hard question: How do we kill the voice of the prophet around and even within us? For God is surely speaking deeply within each of us. How do we silence the voices calling us to take a stand for God's life; for Christ's wide mercy and goodness for all?

Whose heads do we want on a platter today? And it may have nothing to do with General Convention. How do we treat those who disagree with us at home, at school, at work, politically? Do we decide to cut ourselves off from them? Do we cut their knees out from underneath them if given the chance?

We are not meant to be like Herod, but like John the Baptist when it comes to Jesus. John said that I must decrease and Jesus must increase. In Paul's letter to the Ephesians we heard earlier, we are reminded that God chose us to come into a relationship with Jesus in order that we live a holy life of blessing.

We who set our hope on Christ, then, are to live for God's praise and glory. In Christ, all things will be gathered together to show forth God's glory and praise. Setting our hope on Christ, God's purposes will be accomplished. Setting our hope on Christ, you and I bind ourselves to the life and ministry of Jesus; to his teaching, and to the Holy Spirit guiding us. We enter into an abiding friendship with him, and remain in this community, the church, which is his body, with him. Studying his life, praying together, and receiving his life in the Eucharist, we see how his life can be reflected in our own lives, so that he may live in us and we may live in him.

Setting our hope on Christ, may we start seeing those who differ from us, not with their heads on a platter, but face to face as our brothers and sisters in Christ, fellow adopted children who are all blessed, each one, with every spiritual blessing. As we have conversations with each other about difficult matters, may we have patience, and respect and listen carefully to one another, not fearing but having faith that God is working through our struggles. Someone told me through the challenges of the 70's, the church is an anvil that has broken many a hammer. The fruits of the spirit will reveal God's purposes among us. And so there is no reason to fear, but plenty of reasons to love each other and this world for whom Christ died for all. And then, as the Psalmist implores, *mercy and truth shall meet together; righteousness and peace will kiss each other.*

<u>Jonathan Daniels Annual Pilgrimage, Saturday, August 11, 11:00 a.m.</u> in Hayneville at the Lowndes County Courthouse Square (Lafayette and Washington St.)

Mark your calendars now to attend and be ready to travel. Look for information in July 18th newsletter from Nativity's Reconciliation Ministry regarding transportation from Huntsville.

This year's homilist will be Carolyn Maull McKinstry, author of While the World Watched: A Birmingham Bombing Survivor Comes of Age During the Civil Rights Movement. Carolyn will share her experience and insights during the pilgrimage that is sponsored by The Commission on Race Relations and the Diocese of Alabama.

Jonathan Daniels was an Episcopal seminarian who answered the call of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. to help register African-American voters in Alabama. He was shot and killed on Aug. 20 1965, while shielding then 16-year-old Ruby Sales from a shotgun blast as she attempted to enter a store to buy something to drink. Daniels was added to the Episcopal Church Calendar of Saints and Martyrs in 1994 to be remembered each Aug. 14.

The pilgrimage begins at 11:00 a.m., on Saturday, Aug. 11, 2012 at the Courthouse Square in Hayneville. The procession will go to the old county jail where Daniels and Sales were among those detained for a week and then will move to the old Cash Grocery Store where Daniels was killed. The pilgrimage will end at the Courthouse where a service of Holy Communion will take place in the courtroom and McKinstry will speak.

NEW TRANSOM STAINED GLASS WINDOWS FOR AMBULATORY

Nativity parishioner and stained glass artist Ron Hogan has created two new stained glass windows for the transom lights in the hallways leading into the Ambulatory (area behind the church where the Acolytes and LEMs vest). These windows reflect the design of the windows in the nave of the church on the side aisles. The window in the transom off of the Bannister Room hallway was given by Ron Hogan to the glory of God and in loving memory of Dean and Joe Laycock. This window replicates the chalice symbol found on the lancet window on the nave's east aisle that is hidden by the organ chamber. The chalice reminds us of our "sharing in the cup of Christ's blessing" offered in the Eucharist. This gift enables us to be inspired by this symbol that we do not get to see because of its location. The Bibb Hallway transom window is given to God's glory and in loving memory of Gilda and Ellery May and Janis and Robert Langley. Both of these windows "light" our way to Christ's love.
