# Climate change: Why should churches care?

Workshop to explore how congregations can take steps to protect God's creation

Climate Change: Why the Faith Community Should Care" is the title of a workshop to take place from 9 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 12 at Holy Nativity Episcopal Church, presented by California Interfaith Power & Light and endorsed by Bishop Diocesan J. Jon Bruno.

According to CIPL, a new UCLA study predicts that by 2050, temperatures in the L.A. region will rise an average of 4.6 degrees Fahrenheit if greenhouse gas emissions continue to increase at current levels. Meanwhile, California is preparing to implement new environmental regulations as certain provisions of AB 32, the California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006, take effect Jan. 1

This workshop will explore what congre-




gations can do to take action to protect God's creation.

# Local authors publish books on Advent, interfaith peacemaking

A professor and a student at Bloy House (The Episcopal Theological School at Clareont) have recently released books; one on Advent meditations, one on interfaith peacemaking.



Francisco Garcia, a seminarian at Bloy House is the author of *Cheer Our Spirits: Make Safe the Way — Meditations for Advent and Christmas*, a book of daily meditations based on hymns and songs of the season season, published by Forward

Movement. The book is available in English and Spanish, in print, and on the Kindle and Nook electronic readers. "These are personal theological reflections but cover issues of social justice and the spiritual journey, Latin religious traditions and experiences, themes related to migration and journey, work, family, and soul care," says Garcia, who recently became director of peace and justice ministries at All Saints Church, Pasadena.



The Rev. Dr. Sheryl Kujawa-Holbrook, faculty member at Bloy House and the Claremont School of Theology, is a co-author of *Interfaith Curriculum for Peacemaking*. This book draws upon the resources within

the Abrahamic tradition — Judaism, Christianity, and Islam — to offer a peacemaking curriculum that can be used in any of these traditions or in interfaith dialog. Included are activities and discussion guides based on the texts and traditions of each of these faith traditions. The three authors, Kujawa-Holbrook, Rabbi Olga Bluman, and Aziza Hasan, each has extensive interfaith experience and bring their expertise to this source-book for mosques, churches, synagogues, and schools. †



live and serve in community, nurturing one another and growing as followers of Jesus.

For example, this spirit of ministry is reflected in community garden initiatives around this diocese. From the Abundant Table program to Camp Stevens to the parish/mission center gardens in Westchester, Riverside, San Bernardino, and beyond, these practical programs engage participants in providing for people in need while also caring environmentally for God's creation. Please consider exploring new ways in which your local congregation can share in such outreach.

Other examples of serving together in the



vineyards of this diocese include our stewardship and interfaith work.
