

The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

Advent Preparations

As the world around us rushes ahead to Christmas, it is clear that many folks in North Alabama don't observe Advent. But sometimes we Episcopalians confronted by the busy world around can confuse Advent's purposes.

- Advent is a time of waiting----and so we wait in long lines in the stores, we wait in traffic, we wait in line to get our children's pictures taken with Santa.
- Advent is a time of watching---and so we watch a plethora of seasonal specials, spectaculars, and heart-warming, smarmy movies. And we can almost watch non-stop ball games and other sports.
- Advent is a time of hoping----and so we hope that we will buy the perfect present for those on our shopping list. We hope that we will get at least one item on our own Christmas list that we really want.

We wait, we watch, we hope for the perfect Christmas----just like the ones we used to know. But what are you really waiting for? What are you really hoping for? Are you watching for Christ's coming? What is your deepest hope as we begin a new Church year this Advent?

Advent means "coming." Our season of Advent is about Christ's coming, but not simply his first coming as the "Babe of Bethlehem. Advent is about three different ways we know Christ comes. And so our waiting and watching and hoping require special time and effort.

Of course, we prepare in Advent to celebrate Christ's first coming in history. God came to us in the darkness of the world to get us back on the course God had intended us to be on all along, until we chose to abandon God's desires and hopes for us. But before we think about that initial coming we will celebrate during the 12 Days of Christmas, Advent compels us to think about his final coming when Christ the King will come at the fulfillment of time, victoriously and as our judge. We cannot predict that time—it is God's timing alone. Advent compels us to get on with the work Jesus has asked you to do before he returns in glory and you stand before him.


Between these two times of his coming, his first and his last, Advent is also about his continual coming to us in faith every day. He comes as the suffering God who died on the Cross and is raised, calling us to share in Resurrection Life. He comes to us continually in faith in order to assure us and prepare us for his coming at the end of time.

He comes to you today: right now, wherever you are in your life. He comes in word and deed; in sacrament and in prayer. We meet him in each other. He will come to others through your sharing what you receive from him in blessing. Christ comes to us in faith each and every day. He comes to us each day as we are alert to his incarnate presence raising us and others to the new life that God says one day will be all we know.

He comes when you allow his love, his forgiveness, his grace, to reach from your life to others, giving of yourself as he has given. He comes when you visit someone who is lonely, or sick or hurting. He comes when you bring a winter coat to share with someone who has none. He comes when your family shops for a family that has nothing, and you take a little less for yourself. He comes when a teenager tells a friend, "No, I will not do that because God has shown me a better way of living." He comes when a business man or woman makes a decision that might not seem to be the smartest by the world's standards, but you know is right by Christ's ethic. He comes when his irresistible way of living becomes the way you live.

So wait, watch, hope. Be about the work you have been given to do prior to his final advent And then, being aware and available to his <u>daily</u> advent, your celebration of his coming in his Christmas advent this year will be like none you've known before! A blessed Advent to all.



Outreach Nativity Blend Coffee Sales for Krik? Krak! will continue through December 16

You can purchase 1/2 pound bags of coffee for gift giving in Ridley Hall between services. Proceeds will go to Krik? Krak! which provides the village children with one nutritious hot lunch per week.

Krik? Krak! A Lunch Program for School Children in Crochu, Haiti

Spouses of clergy in the Diocese of Alabama started a project through which school lunches are provided one day per week to children and teachers in Crochu, Haiti. Crochu is one of six villages with which our diocese is linked in a companion relationship. The school and church in that remote mountain village are under the care of Father Fritz Valdema and his wife, Carmel. Children there, in particular, are victims of poverty and hunger, being far from larger villages, food supplies and medical help. Their nearest water supply is a 30 minute walk.

As night falls in Haitian homes, or around the fire, one will frequently hear a loud "Krik?" from one of the elders ready to tell a story, and soon a responding "Krak!" from children eager to hear it.

The RSCM is a Christian educational charity committed to enabling the best use of music in worship, church life and the wider community. Here at Nativity we offer the RSCM Voice for Life music education program for all youth who are interested. As the student musicians achieve a new level of skill they are awarded a medal. Nativity Choristers have achieved the Light and Dark Blue medals and a few are working on their third, the Red. There are four levels; highest level requires a standard of knowledge that many music majors have not achieved when entering college! Music (especially singing) is one area of study where children and adults are on an even playing field.

Mental Health First Aid Class offering at Nativity

Mental health problems are much more common than most people realize. Surveys suggest that in America today more than one in five adults will experience a mental disorder in any given year. Recovery is possible with early intervention; however, only 41% of those with a mental illness will seek help in any given year, and 50% will delay getting help for an average of 10 years. People delay getting help largely due to stigma associated with mental health problems.

In order to reduce stigma and the resulting pain that families and friends go through as they suffer from not knowing how to cope with mental health issues, a class will be offered at Nativity this winter titled "Mental Health First Aid." (MHFA)

MHFA has been proven to improve understanding and to decrease stigma related to mental illness and substance use. The goal is for MHFA training to become as readily recognized in a few years as CPR and First Aid trainings are today.

Rita Limbaugh, Community Education Director of the Mental Health Center, is certified in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) and offering MHFA training to groups of 8 - 25 who desire to gain skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. The 12-hour course presents an overview of mental illnesses and substance use disorders in the U.S. and introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact on individuals, families and communities, and overviews common treatments and resources. Participants learn a 5-Step Action Plan that includes skills, resources, and knowledge needed to help an individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional, peer, family, social, and self-help care.

If there is enough interest, a class will take place at Nativity on 4 consecutive Monday evenings from 5:30-8:30 pm, starting January 21, continuing on January 28, February 2, and concluding February 9th. This is open to members of Nativity, and the public at large. There is a \$25 fee for the course materials. Please call the church office to reserve your seat and once the minimum number is reached you will be contacted about the meeting room and confirmation of the class. Please send or drop off your check by January 8th, 2013.
