

The mission of the Episcopal Church of the Nativity, as part of the family of God, is to proclaim and spread the word and work of God through Jesus Christ our Lord, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, by Eucharistic worship and by ministry to the world.

The Light Shines in the Darkness

We stake our hopes on the belief that the light shines in the darkness. Advent's hope and Christmas' promise is just that: The People who walked in darkness have seen a great light...For a child has been born for us, a son given to us, authority rests upon his shoulders, and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. His authority shall grow continually, and there shall be endless peace....writes the Prophet Isaiah.

And so when the world around is darkest, we put up lights on our houses and on our Christmas trees inside. It is probably true that more than a few family feuds have begun over the process of putting up Christmas lights. It's not always something I enjoy doing. It takes time and effort and planning. However, there is so much joy in arriving home on a dark December night and seeing the lights of Christmas ablaze on my house and on others along the way.

The lights we put on our houses and inside on Christmas trees are signs of hope and joy, reminding us that we belong to a community of light—the church proclaiming the light of God's love in Christ Jesus. We celebrate this light ever increasing in Advent, for on Christmas, we know the Word became flesh and dwelt among us. Our Christmas hope that we live each and every day is that this light, this love, is the life and light of all people. This light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it.

Bearing God's light and love in this dark world is not always easy. It takes time and effort and our most thoughtful planning. Paying attention to the Advent readings focusing on the lives of John the Baptist, Elizabeth, and Mary, we are reminded that God is calling each one of us to take the time and the effort and the thoughtful planning to help the world know God's love and purposes. John the Baptist says that each one of us is called to action to do what we can do to be agents of God's purposes for this world. Change your ways, John says, and do something! Elizabeth, John the Baptist's mother, encourages her young cousin Mary in her doubts about what God is calling her to do. And Mary has a baby, Jesus!

A world in which innocent children are mown down and in which random killings happen more and more, seems dark indeed. We who subscribe to the authority of the Prince of Peace above all other authority have much to offer; much that this broken and dark world needs. Our Christian story and hope and light are needed desperately in this world today in which so many people are disconnected from each other and disconnected from God's purposes.

So what will you do? How will you proclaim Christ's authority of love and peace? How might you encourage God's purposes to be realized in this dark world? You and I are called to put up the lights of God's love and peace on the houses of our lives, so that others will no longer walk in darkness. It takes work. It is not always fun. It may be challenging. It may involve our being a part of difficult conversations that Christ's love alone will diffuse before we feud.

But I tell you what: Seeing the light of God's love piercing the darkness of this world through the spiritual house of your own life and through others who are punching holes in the dark will give you joy and peace like you have never known. This is why we will sing joyfully on Christmas Eve in spite of the darkness of the world around. There is no joy and peace like you and I can know in the light and love of God we receive in Emmanuel, God with us, the Christ Child born for us. For behold, I bring you tidings of great joy for all people: for unto you is born this day a Savior, who is Christ the Lord.

A LETTER FROM THE REV'D MARY ANNE AKIN, December 16, 2012

Dear People of Nativity,

In the last several weeks, I have entered a different world of ministry from Church of the Nativity. In the setting of St. Martin's Retirement Center we are intentionally focused on the specific needs of daily life as they emerge before us. Morning Staff Meeting entails a quick, though detailed review of census, hospitalizations, medical and behavior concerns, and plans for each situation. Many assignments are made!

This past week we were involved in one of those "rare moments" for a facility: We moved elders from the old nursing home to a brand new Cottage for community living. It was no small task! I was charged with packing, moving and unpacking several persons. I found myself deeply moved to be "handling the treasures" of another. As I asked permission to open chests, remove and pack items, wrap pictures and assess boxes for lamps, books, plants and clothing, I spoke to each Elder about their stories. The sharing unfolded with one bed-ridden, and me in the middle of a small room with packing paper and tape strewn about. It was the messiness of moving on! It was Life with its joys, sorrow, wonder and humility. And with each set of stories there were now challenges: What will life be like for me in the new place? Who will I meet? Who will care for me, and who will be my neighbor? Will I be okay there? Will I like it? What will I do and who will I be? How will I find my way? Even though a beautiful living space awaited them, there were fears, unknowns and tears.

A move holds all these precious elements. My move to Birmingham does not entail the fears my Elders face, but it holds an unfolding of new ways, uncertainty, different ministry terrain, a huge staff to befriend, and the ordinary turns that come with another neighborhood. So many of you helped me make the physical move during the trying days of my husband's recent hospitalization. You brought food, ran errands, packed boxes and helped organize! For this, I am deeply grateful! And ALL of you prepared me for the move with the stories of your lives that live in my heart. I carry these with me forever! Your generous purse assisted me with moving expenses, set-up in our home and even a bit left over for a storm door to ward off winter's cold. I thank you for a gracious departure gift, but more so I appreciate the goodness and care of you as a Parish. Continue your faithfulness as a people, and know that you will be remembered in my prayers.

Blessings upon each of you in this holy season and the new year.

Mental Health First Aid Class offering at Nativity

If there is enough interest, a class will take place at Nativity on 4 consecutive Monday evenings from 5:30-8:30 pm, starting January 21, continuing on January 28, February 2, and concluding February 9th. This is open to members of Nativity, and the public at large. There is a \$25 fee for the course materials. Please call the church office to reserve your seat and once the minimum number is reached you will be contacted about the meeting room and confirmation of the class. Please send or drop off your check by January 8th, 2013.

Mental health problems are much more common than most people realize. Surveys suggest that in America today more than one in five adults will experience a mental disorder in any given year. Recovery is possible with early intervention; however, only 41% of those with a mental illness will seek help in any given year, and 50% will delay getting help for an average of 10 years. People delay getting help largely due to stigma associated with mental health problems.

In order to reduce stigma and the resulting pain that families and friends go through as they suffer from not knowing how to cope with mental health issues, a class will be offered at Nativity this winter titled "Mental Health First Aid." (MHFA)

MHFA has been proven to improve understanding and to decrease stigma related to mental illness and substance use. The goal is for MHFA training to become as readily recognized in a few years as CPR and First Aid trainings are today.

Rita Limbaugh, Community Education Director of the Mental Health Center, is certified in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) and offering MHFA training to groups of 8 - 25 who desire to gain skills to help someone who is developing a mental health problem or experiencing a mental health crisis. The 12-hour course presents an overview of mental illnesses and substance use disorders in the U.S. and introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact on individuals, families and communities, and overviews common treatments and resources. Participants learn a 5-Step Action Plan that includes skills, resources, and knowledge needed to help an individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional, peer, family, social, and self-help care.
