

### Faith and Politics: An Invitation to Christian Discourse

The elections are over...a new year has begun...there is still much divisiveness in Washington... many national problems need bipartisan solutions...Where do we go from here? How can we think in a new way to promote the common good? How can we Episcopalians live together in Communion when we disagree on political solutions?

Nativity's Spiritual Formation Ministry invites you to a timely Winter Wisdom event, an evening with Robert Parham on the role of religion and politics next Wednesday, January 23<sup>rd</sup> in the Parish Hall at 5:15 p.m. (dinner served, children's program, nursery childcare available by reservation). Nashvillian Robert Parham is Executive Director of <a href="www.EthicsDaily.com">www.EthicsDaily.com</a> a website challenging people of faith to advance the common good. Parham writes regularly for the *New York Post* and has appeared on CNN, ABC, NPR, Fox News, and MSNBC.

People of faith and goodwill are needed more than ever to participate in, and even shape, the political discourse of our divided nation over matters of justice, love and compassion that the Gospel compels us to address. A careful reading of scripture from the Old Testament through the Gospels and the New Testament shows that God is concerned about the political decisions we make. Jesus wants every bit of your heart and mind and life. Jesus wants to shape your political, economic and social decisions by the Good News of God's Kingdom. In fact, Jesus' message and ministry were directed to a political environment that had co-opted the religious system and set up a divisive society in his own day and time.

Here's an old joke: What separates Republicans and Democrats in the Episcopal Church? Answer: The altar rail! This is certainly not true for us at Nativity. We are a faithful expression of diversity, even political diversity of Democrats and Republicans at prayer and work together, as we kneel together in the service of one God and Father of all, one Lord Jesus Christ, and the one Spirit making us one. Our diversity is an expression of our Trinitarian God.

So, how will we live together in Communion, in our beloved Nativity community, when we disagree? How can we talk with each other with respect? The end of all we do is summarized by Jesus' Great Commandment: *Love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind. And love your neighbor as yourself.* Our faith is not a private, individualistic matter, but a matter of the community and for the wider common good. Through our faith, every action and decision we make will either show our love of God and neighbor, or deny that love.

As we seek to be politically informed, we should seek those positive sources that promote love of God and love of neighbor. We should seek, as we have promised in the Baptismal Covenant, to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ. And as the Covenant continues, seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as our self. We commit to strive for justice and peace among all people, respecting the dignity of every human being.

The Episcopal Church does not shy away from political matters of Gospel justice, mercy and compassion. In matters of great national consequence, they are brought to our attention through our gatherings like we will have on the 23<sup>rd</sup> and in other ways. The Episcopal Church has an office of Government Relations and sponsors the Episcopal Public Policy Network, EPPN at <a href="https://www.episcopalchurch.org/eppn.htm">www.episcopalchurch.org/eppn.htm</a>, helping to put our faith into action. Perhaps you might want to visit this site, and Robert Parham's site before next Wednesday. The world needs our Christ-centered perspective and voice more than ever. Hope to see you Wednesday!

## NATIVITY MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID CLASS TO BEGIN JANUARY 21 COST FOR MATERIALS \$25 PAYABLE TO NATIVITY

This class will take place at Nativity on four consecutive Monday evenings from 5:30-8:30 pm, starting January 21, continuing on January 28, February 2, and concluding February 9<sup>th</sup>. This is open to members of Nativity, and the public at large. Please call the church office to reserve your seat and once the minimum number is reached you will be contacted about the meeting room and confirmation of the class.

Rita Limbaugh, Community Education Director of the Mental Health Center, is certified in Mental Health First Aid (MHFA.) The 12-hour course presents an overview of mental illnesses and substance use disorders in the U.S. and introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact on individuals, families and communities, and overviews common treatments and resources. Participants learn a 5-Step Action Plan that includes skills, resources, and knowledge needed to help an individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional, peer, family, social, and self-help care.

### 7 Easy, Green New Year's Resolutions

It's easy to think about all the big changes you're going to make in the New Year as the old year comes to an end—but by the second week of January, most of us are already finding reasons to skip the gym or break the spending freeze. That's why these green New Year's resolutions are offered, all of them so easy you'll have no excuse not to keep them— and they will help you to be good stewards of God's creation AND save money, cut your carbon footprint, decrease your home's waste stream, and improve the quality of the Earth.

#1 Attend Harvey Cotten's new Care of Creation Class, beginning February 10, 2013March 17. This resource seeks to make us aware of the abundant beauty and goodness of the part of God's creation we call Alabama. The more we know about the earth and the environment, the more we will love and care for them. This course material is for both adults and youth, to provide an opportunity to learn of the wonders of the Diocese of Alabama's unique biodiversity and our role in Care of God's Creation with our home rivers, lakes, streams, creeks, and water resources. This is a follow-up for Harvey's very well-received classes of 2009 and 2010 with new resources and updated information.

#2 Never buy bottled water again Trade your bottled water habit for an at-home filtering pitcher and you can help make a dent in the 1.5 million barrels of oil used to make plastic water bottles each year; pair it with a reusable bottle (like one made of glass, aluminum, or recycled plastic), and you'll always be prepared to tackle your thirst. Bonus: With bottled water no longer on your shopping list, you could save lots of money this year.

#3 Brew your own Fair Trade coffee Carrying your own coffee in an insulated travel mug helps you reduce waste from cardboard cups and carrying sleeves — which are thrown away at a staggering rate of 58 billion each year. For greener at-home brewing, choose a Fair Trade blend that supports farmers and add organic milk instead of artificial creamers.

#4 Remember your reusable bags With more than 1 million plastic bags ending up in the trash every minute, taking reusable bags to the store is one of the easiest and

most effective ways to reduce your carbon footprint. And don't just take them into the grocery store – they can also be used for your other shopping errands also.

#5 Cut back on paper towels
If you're grabbing a paper towel for everything from wiping up spills and cleaning your counter to scrubbing the bathroom and keeping your hands clean at dinner, it's time to make a change. Instead, invest in a few cotton cloths and some fabric napkins; then drop them in the wash when you run a load of laundry. Using the cloth alternatives is just as easy as using the paper versions, and you only need to buy them once — plus you can help eliminate the tons of paper towels that end up in landfills every day.

#7 Become a weekend vegetarian Cutting meat out of your diet just two days a week can decrease your carbon footprint and coming up with meat-free meals for Saturday and Sunday isn't as hard as it sounds. Try pancakes and fruit for breakfast; fresh salads or roasted vegetable sandwiches for lunch; and veggie pizza, bean soups, and creamy risottos for dinner. And since doubling a recipe rarely adds any time to your prep work, you can make extras to eat throughout the week (and trim your carbon footprint even more).

#7 Replace your lightbulbs Replacing your lightbulbs with compact fluorescent lights may be the ultimate change for the eco-slacker. Despite all the jokes, it takes only one person to change a lightbulb — and since CFLs last longer than traditional bulbs, you'll be saving time for years down the road while cutting your energy use by as much as 80 percent.
