

Mission of the Church of the Nativity

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

The Way of Peace and Life

Holy Week invites us to know peace and life as we journey in the way of the Cross together over the eight days from Palm Sunday to Easter Day. We begin our week with this prayer: Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace.

Jesus confronted the societal powers of his day that quelled God's purposes in people's lives and in the world. Jesus scholars John Dominic Crossan and Marcus J. Borg in their important work *The Last Week*, remind us that Jesus deliberately staged his Palm Sunday procession from the Mt. of Olives East of Jerusalem, in direct opposition of the worldly powers of the Roman Empire that came processing into Jerusalem from the West. Jesus rode into Jerusalem humbly on a young colt of a donkey, while the Roman military leaders marched with all the pomp and circumstance of the political, economic and military might of the empire.

Jesus meets the powers that deny and compromise God's life and peace head-on, giving up his own life to protest power without justice and mercy; challenging those who lack concern for the poor and the marginalized by showing them another way. At the end of the week, Jesus marches up Calvary's hill, offering himself as a model for us in our own day and time as we confront the powers denying God's life and peace.

In the drama of Holy Week, Jesus engages us, and invites us to follow him. And so, the Church asks us to walk in the way of the Cross next week to discover anew God's abiding justice, love and mercy, even as Jesus discovered and knew it. We walk with Jesus, not only to remember what he has done for us 2000 years ago, but what God through our active faith is doing and will do again and again. We do not know God's life and peace without going the way of the Cross. We cannot know the joy of Easter without Holy Week; the entire week from Palm Sunday through Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and finally the cold stone tomb of Holy Saturday.

My prayer is that you will remember and experience anew God's magnanimous love this week in the powerful moments of worship we share at Nativity. This journey will help you know God's grace throughout your life, with all of its *Holy Week, Good Friday,* and yes, *Easter* moments. Look to God and God's purposes, and look for grace, even as Jesus looked to God.

Christ calls you to stage your own deliberate confrontation with the powers that deny God's love, justice, and mercy in your own life and in the world. What will you do? What will your procession announcing God's life and peace look like? Begin walking by with Jesus in Holy Week. Come to Eucharist every day. Walk the Stations of the Cross on Wednesday. Wash your neighbor's feet on Maundy Thursday. Watch at the foot of the cross on Good Friday. Wait on Holy Saturday. Celebrate Christ's victory on Easter!

Our Nativity community provides guidance, help, and strength to do this. Life and peace spring forth from Nativity. We are about naming and claiming God's life and peace, not only for ourselves, but for the world God calls us to serve in Christ's name. Won't you join us on this journey not only in Holy Week, but in every day and week of your life? And then, do what God calls you to do. You will find it none other than the way of life and peace.

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION TIP

For the remaining days of Lent, and in preparation for Holy Week, a reminder:

Lent is a time of repentance and fasting, of turning away from all that is counter to God's will and purposes for his world and all who live in it. This year, you have been invited to focus your Lenten 'acts of love and sacrifice' (of which our Ash Wednesday speaks) on your contribution to climate change, and those most impacted by it.

Often we give something up for Lent, such as chocolate or alcohol. This year, you have been given suggestions for focusing your giving up (or making changes to your lifestyle), to reduce your 'carbon footprint' – your total impact of environmentally damaging greenhouse gas emissions, usually measured in carbon dioxide equivalent, hence the name, "carbon footprint."

A traditional Lenten observance is 'Fish on Fridays'. Why not also have a 'Meat-free Monday' – or some other day, if on Mondays you usually eat Sunday's leftovers? Did you know that 'a kilogram of steak could be responsible for as many greenhouse gases as driving a car for three hours while leaving all the lights on at home'?

We all need to 'reduce, reuse, recycle'. The past two Steeple articles have given suggestions taking you from Ash Wednesday to Palm Sunday. Each week focused on a different part of our carbon fast, encouraging us to live more simply, conserve water, cut down on use of electricity, and reduce our use of gasoline. Some of the suggestions given were:

- 1. When grocery shopping, buy simple foods, purchase things with the least amount of packaging possible, and purchase some things to give away to those in need. Take advantage of "buy 1, get 1 free" items to donate to food banks supported by Nativity.
- 2. Say no to bottled water. Buy a reusable water bottle that is BPA-free. Many types of plastic bottles cause pollution in both the production phase and disposal phase, and can cause exposure to harmful chemicals that are hormone mimickers and endocrine disrupters. Play it safe with the health of your family avoid bottled water.
- 3. Reduce your water consumption, for example during hand washing and teeth brushing. When washing hands, wet your hands, then turn off the water while lathering up and washing, then turn back on to rinse. For teeth brushing, just turn the water on to rinse after brushing. These are simple habits, and you can feel good that you will be reducing your water usage every single time you do either of these.
- 4. Say goodbye to standby power consumption. Put power strips with on-off switches in convenient places so you can turn them off when electrical equipment is not in use. And remember that many chargers use electricity even when not charging.
- 5. Reduce gasoline consumption and exhaust emissions: <u>don't idle</u>, especially if you'll be waiting in one spot for more than a minute. *Idling for 10 seconds uses about as much fuel as it takes to restart the vehicle, so it is more efficient to turn off the engine while you wait, and you won't be sending out toxic emissions all that time.*

Let us 'return to the Lord with all our heart; leave the past in ashes and turn to God with tears and fasting, for he is slow to anger and ready to forgive.'

(APB, p.164)

May God grant us all a blessed and holy Lent, and may the practices that support our time of inner reflection bring us to continue our "turning away from all that is counter to God's will and purposes for his world and all who live in it." Perhaps you will want to select some or all of the daily suggestions, to carry into everyday practice in gratitude for God's great gift to us all.
