

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

### Yes, but....Easter Hope prevails

We continue to celebrate Easter for the 50 days from Easter Sunday through Pentecost on May 19. Easter calls us to claim hope for ourselves and for this life. God is bringing new life in the midst of this sometimes broken and difficult world, raising us to know joy and peace. Even though this Easter was the coldest I've ever remembered it, we have finally gotten that burst of spring flowers and warmer temperatures, giving us the message from the Book of Creation that God indeed brings new life from the wintry landscape of life. But this weekend, I hear the weather is making a reversal and we will have some colder, non-spring like weather again.

And on Monday, when the dogwoods were perhaps at their springtime peak, we received the shocking news of terrorism at the finish line of the Boston Marathon. Three innocent lives were taken and almost 200 wounded and maimed, some still fighting for life. So, how do we hold on to Easter when we keep getting news of Good Friday?

In the midst of the world's darkness, we are called to be people of light. This means that we can neither ignore the darkness, nor run away from it, but claim God's presence with us, through it and in it. We claim God's love holds us always, and then we go and hold others in the name of that love when tragedy strikes. We hold on to the hope and message of Easter, even when it seems like Good Friday.

It was powerful hearing the stories of those who courageously helped the wounded on Monday, not knowing if other bombs might go off while unselfishly giving themselves to others. It was hopeful hearing people say that this event would not define them or their lives. Easter compels us to consider that we cannot be people of fear, or cynicism or despair. Easter celebrates Christ's overcoming despair, brokenness, fear—even our fear of death—taking us by the hand and raising us with him to life that eternally springs forth.

The great preacher and theologian William Sloane Coffin wrote that Easter gives a "yes, but" kind of message. "Yes, fear and self-righteousness, violence and indifference kill; but love never dies, not with God and not even with us. Easter says that all the tenderness and love which on Good Friday we saw scourged and nailed to a cross, all that goodness and beauty, are alive and always with us—no faded memory, but an undying presence in the life of everyone."

As Christians, we deplore these horrific acts in Boston and we pray for God's strength and wisdom as we build a society that is free from violence and terror. We take great heart in our Easter faith that God will bring forth healing and hope from the worst of suffering and loss. Our prayers go out those who have suffered loss in Boston and in other places where violence and oppression diminish lives.

And we pledge ourselves to the holy work of creating a society free of the violence that haunts our species. May God's Spirit of healing and new life sustain us. As God's people in Christ at Nativity, may we pledge ourselves anew to building God's vision for humanity, a vision that is defined by mutual blessing and peace and love; a vision of life that is defined by Easter, not Good Friday. Love and hope prevail. Alleluia! Christ is risen. The Lord is risen indeed. Alleluia!

#### I Was Glad!

The sun is rising here on the west coast of Florida; bursts of warm pink and purple clouds accent the palm trees against the shifting colors in the sky. Being a morning person and still living on central time, I am awake before these curtains to the day have been pulled back, and thinking about last Sunday -- a very beautiful and wonderful Easter celebration (thanks to a marvelous and dedicated choir --- as well as great clergy -- flower guild -- everyone).

A confession --starting this adventure took a couple more days past April fools day . . . There was the finalization of (each selection) of music for worship at Nativity between now & June 30, as well as a few other things -- taxes and making my home acceptable for its new temporary occupants (the kitty staff) and accordingly, stocking up on the basics that would be needed while away. (that's a lot of litter . . . )

There is a great cathartic feeling when driving away on an extended trip. With most all of the home details set; the various checks in the mail, and library books returned - the road ahead felt clear and new. Better than a move (due to the unknowns), this kind of adventure feels invigorating and exciting!

Operating a new vehicle requires working the Cd player. A standby Cd is always available, (J. Scott/ Westm Abbey Choir) and it has started each day of the trip now with the famous (title) anthem of C.H.H. Parry. (link below) What a glorious and perfect way to start each day! This work is then followed by an exquisite setting of Psalm 23 in Anglican Chant; once these two selections fill the air, the day feels right.

My neighbor's were missing out on the opening of their daughter's Fashion Truck in Birmingham, so my first adventure was to drop in to Homewood and check it out. As food trucks are already a source of delight (try the one at Straight to Ale in Hsv), I was eager and thrilled to oblige. Something about the creativity required to make great fashion available on a converted delivery truck is both admirable and enticing. . .I hope they come to Huntsville -- they will even set up at farmer's markets!!

Further on in Alabama, the churches of Ascension and St. John's, Montgomery, were beckoning. (yes, I hear some of you saying . . this is NOT a work trip Suzanne. . . . ) Oh well -- my first time to the lovely capitol of my new home state. It was beautiful; azaleas and wisteria are in bloom. Both Ascension and St. John's had <a href="impeccable">impeccable</a> grounds and architecture. I was fortunate to meet the rector at St. John's (can't do justice to his name here); he was very cordial and welcoming (this the week after Easter no less!) They were in the throes of an Easter egg hunt -- a great idea to have one the week after Easter day, yet while we are still in Eastertide. . I had a full tour of the church and took a few notes . . . choir be forewarned -- we will sing in St. John's!!

In Dothan, I wanted to visit our sister church -- the Church of the Nativity, and was not disappointed there either. Such a beautiful setting and architecture. Plus -- the choir room is on the ground level! With windows, and easy access to the front sidewalk for processions!!

The dogwood in this surrounding neighborhood were just opening; the beautiful labyrinth in the courtyard allowed for some wonderful minutes of prayer and thought on a very quiet and peaceful afternoon....

Sarasota & its famous museum (& organ) will be on tap today; with quiet moments at a park or refuge to take in the natural wonders of Florida.

### The Two Renovations: Youth Ministry @ Nativity

With a renewed focus on youth ministry at Nativity, it is important to understand the two major forms of renovation the youth ministry is currently undergoing. The renovation that is, perhaps, easiest to observe is



the **physical renovation** of the second floor of Ridley Hall, where the 5th-8th graders meet. This space has long been neglected, and is overdue for a major overhaul. This involves moving walls, building cabinets, updating doors, lighting and electrical to make classroom space more functional for both Club 5/6 and Jr. High. This physical renovation should be near completion by May 12th (Youth Sunday) and there will be an open house reception for parents, grandparents, and other parishioners to see the new space. While the vestry has committed \$65,000 for these major capital improvements, there will still be a need to furnish this new space with couches, tables, TV's and other items listed on the wish list to

make this a welcoming, fun space for our youth.

The second - and arguably more important - renovation is the **programmatic renovation**. This is the essential renovation that began last September when Youth Ministry Architects hosted listing sessions throughout the parish and provided us with a thorough assessment of our youth ministries, as well as

recommendations and a timeline to institute critical renovations to our organization/program/infrastructure. This work is being carried on by a committed group called the **Youth Ministry Renovation Team** (Lewie Bates, Mem Bryant, Steve Creech, Holly Ellis, and Lori Webber - along with Fr. Brad and William Blackerby.) The specific tasks of the Youth Ministry Renovation Team are outlined in the assessment given to us by Youth Ministry Architects and distributed to the church. We are working a proven method of communication, recruitment, and planning that we are very excited about. The members of this team are committed to



working a proven process to achieve a sustainable and successful youth ministry here at Nativity. Please don't hesitate to contact any of the members of this renovation team, Fr. Brad, or William Blackerby to learn more about this important renovation of our youth ministry.
