

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

The Feast of Pentecost:

The Holy Spirit Renewing Your Life for the World

Easter culminates this Sunday with the Feast of Pentecost when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit with us. Pentecost is called "the birthday of the church" because people's lives fueled by the power of the Holy Spirit formed the church 2000 years ago in Jerusalem. Through men, women and children on fire with the Holy Spirit God renews the face of the earth. And through the power of the Holy Spirit in people's lives today, God continues to call the Church together to be transformed and to transform others by Christ's love.

This Sunday we will witness the Holy Spirit's transformative power when Bishop Kee Sloan makes his annual Episcopal Visit to Nativity and prays for the Spirit's work to increase through the lives of 19 youth to be confirmed, 21 adults making renewed Baptismal Covenant commitments, and one child to be baptized. Nativity is on fire with God's love that is growing and spreading from our life together into the world. Wear red this Sunday to affirm your participation in that holy and life-giving flame!

Resurrection finds its meaning as we allow God's Spirit to renew us so that we can share the power of Easter life and love with others: with relationships as close as our families and colleagues, but especially when we share in the church's ministry of renewing and transforming people's lives in the world. God just didn't defeat death on that first Easter morning so we could join Jesus in heaven one day. God defeated death so we can share in the power of resurrection in our lives and in our world today.

Our Christian Feast of Pentecost gives the ancient Jewish Feast of Pentecost new meaning through the community of the Church. The Jewish Feast of Pentecost celebrates God's giving the Law to the people of Israel on Mt. Sinai 50 days after their deliverance from slavery in Egypt in the Passover event. God just didn't want the children of Israel freed from slavery. God wanted them alive to God's holy purposes as they formed a nation of people committed to living God's ways in the world.

This Sunday gives us all the opportunity to allow the Holy Spirit to renew us and create more life and love in the world through our participation in the mission and ministry of the Church of the Nativity. We all renew our own Baptismal Covenant along with the 40 people making commitments this Sunday. Bishop Sloan will inspire us to invite others to join in what we know at Nativity so that their lives, too, can be connected here and transformed.

On the brink of summer, we have the opportunity to allow God to renew us and through us the world. What relationships need renewing? Where is the Holy Spirit leading you in ministry so that you can share the power of Easter Resurrection Life with others? Summer schedules create space in our lives. We all know that fires need some space to burn brightly. This summer let your live be ablaze with the Holy Spirit's love and power. And may the world around you be transformed as you commit anew to God's purposes in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit!

The Nativity Choir In Concert Saturday May 18, 5:00 p.m.

You will not want to miss The Nativity Choir Spring Concert on Saturday, May 18 at 5:00 p.m. in the church Nave. Closing out The Nativity Music Series this year, the concert features The Nativity Choir and Friends singing Louis Vierne's Mass in C# Minor with Nicholas Bergin, organist. Dr. Stephen G. Schaeffer, interim Organist/Choirmaster, will conduct. Bergin, organist at First Presbyterian Church, Nashville, will also perform solo organ works by Vierne and Tournemire to frame the choral offering.

The blind French organist Louis Vierne (1870-1937) was organist at Notre Dame from 1900 until his death at the end of his 1750th concert at the console of this famous Parisian church. Vierne composed the *Messe Solennelle (Solemn Mass)* in 1899. Scored for two organs, this majestic and ingratiating choral piece will be sung on May 18th from the new edition for one organ and choir.

Stewardship of Creation tip for May 15, 2013

ABOUT LIGHT BULBS: Just what is this "light bulb" law?



Why are the new light bulbs mandatory? What are our options?

The Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 (the "Energy Bill"), signed by President George W. Bush on December 18, 2007 is an energy policy intended to make better use of our resources and help the United States become energy independent. The law provides important benefits to consumers, industry, our country and our environment. One aspect of the law relates to light bulbs.

What does the law require about light bulbs?

Under the new law, screw-based light bulbs will use fewer watts for a similar lumen output. The standards are technology neutral, which means any type of bulb can be sold as long as it meets the efficiency requirements. Common household light bulbs that traditionally use between 40 and 100 watts will use at least 27% less energy by 2014. The law applies to the manufacturer date and it began affecting 100-watt bulbs in January 2012 and will continue with the manufacture of 40-watt bulbs in January 2014.

The second part of the law requires that most light bulbs be 60-70% more efficient than the standard incandescent today; this will go into effect in 2020. Many compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) and many Light Emitting Diodes (LEDs) can meet this requirement today, shaving energy usage compared to standard incandescents by 75%.

Despite what you may have heard, the law regulating light bulbs **does not ban incandescent bulbs**. It merely sets performance standards, much the same way that the gas mileage of cars is regulated. It says, for instance, that the amount of light that an old 75 watt bulb emits must now be provided using no more than 53 watts. And there are updated incandescents (sometimes called halogens) that meet that standard.

The replacements - First, it's often easy to confuse the two types of light bulbs that are replacements for the old incandescent bulbs. Compact fluorescent bulbs (the twisty ones, better known as CFLs) have been around for 20 years or so. And in just the last few years, LEDs (Light Emitting Diodes) have come on the market. Though they may look like incandescent bulbs and may make similar light, LEDs are very different creatures. One way to think of LEDs is to make a comparison: old pre-transistor radios and stereos that had tubes in them compared to solid state circuitry. Incandescent light bulbs would be analogous to the radios with tubes; LEDs are analogous to, and are sometimes called, solid state lighting.

Cost - First, expense. When you've been used to paying less than a dollar for a bulb, a CFL that costs a few dollars – let alone an LED that's \$20 or more – **can seem like a raw deal**. But that's looking at just what's called the upfront cost and **doesn't take into account the cost of the electricity to power the bulb.** When you add up the electrical costs and the bulb costs:

CFLs come out to be cheaper than incandescents, and

LEDs will often (but not always) come out less expensive still.

Make light not toast! Incandescent bulbs (the old syle) are very inefficient at making light from electricity. The way they work is essentially the **same as the filament in your toaster**: the filament heats up and glows when electricity runs through it. 90% of the electricity used to operate an incandescent light bulb becomes heat; and only 10% becomes light.

VERY IMPORTANT: We're all been used to referring to bulbs by their wattage. But **wattage is not brightness**; <u>it's a measure of how much electricity is being used</u>. So while we're acclimating to all these new types of bulbs, we also need to **switch to thinking in terms of lumens, not watts**.

A 60 watt incandescent bulb, for instance, emits about 800 lumens.

A CFL will emit the same amount of light while using only a quarter of the wattage (13 – 18 watts).

An LED might use only 6 – 8 watts.

Another factor in that cost equation is that incandescent bulbs don't last very long – usually around 1000 hours – while CFLs last around 8000 hours and LEDs perhaps 30,000 hours. Remember, that the 1000 hour life is an <u>average</u>, just as the CFL and LED lives are. Plus there have been some less than high quality CFLs out there, which have burned out prematurely and haven't helped their reputation. Like with most things, you get what you pay for!

Brightness - What about brightness? As you've noticed, some CFLs take a minute or so to reach full brightness. Again, this can vary with the manufacturer.

CFLs are likely an interim technology, better than incandescents but not ideal.

LEDs, the new kids on the block, **solve a couple of problems with CFLs**. Like incandescent bulbs, they turn on instantly at full brightness. And they do not contain mercury. They last 30 times as long so we'll be throwing out far fewer of them. And let's not forget that the increased energy efficiency of these bulbs also means generating less electricity, which in turn means **less pollution and other environmental hazards**.

It's all a tad complicated and new, but it's worth learning about. Hope this has helped you!
