



Effective May 23, Linda Wheeler, the Ministry Assistant for Membership and Communications and Assistant to the Rector, resigned to pursue another job opportunity. We wish her well in her new endeavors. Connie Gadomski has graciously agreed to handle the Newsletter and Room Reservations/ Calendar for the interim period while the Rector and Vestry consider our administrative needs and the opportunities Linda's departure presents. Linda's leaving without any notice has meant that several of her responsibilities will either not be covered, or will be handled by volunteers during the interim period. Fortunately the summer schedule helps with its slower pace. However, the Rector's Office and the Music Ministry Department will have limited administrative assistance during this period. We are grateful for our office volunteers and others who have stepped up to offer invaluable assistance during this time. We are especially grateful for Connie Gadomski and Beverly Franklin who will see that the office is covered. For the past two years, Father Anderson has been asking the Vestry to consider the possibility of funding a part-time director of communications who could bring new media skills to our parish's mission and ministry along with effective communications experience to keep the Steeple and other communication vehicles telling our story and reaching out to include our members and others in our vibrant ministries. This would be in addition to the administrative assistance needed for the Rector's Office (including Vestry support) and Membership records. Of course, this means finding additional funding. Please keep these matters in your prayers.

Security Locks on Entry Door!

Please note that a keypad has been placed at the double entry doors (entry from back circle drive-parking lot.) What you need to know:

- The doors will be UNLOCKED during all church services and special events (concerts, receptions, etc.) NO CODE NEEDED!
- The keypad will be enabled all other times and you will use the keypad CODE for entry. The code is the same as the keypad entries to Joffrion Hall and the Church Office.
- As an extra measure of security please be reminder to close the doors after you enter the building. DO NOT prop them open. If your group is in a classroom and the doors are left unattended this causes a potential problem of persons entering the premises without anyone's knowledge.

If you have questions they may be directed to Brad Hall, Junior Warden or John Cline, Building and Grounds Chair. If you are uncertain how to use the keypad you may call the church office for instructions.

Stewardship of Creation tip: Now is a great time to get into Birding!

Birds have a unique ability to inspire and delight us. They connect us with nature, with the passage of the seasons, and with each other. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, 48 million Americans identify themselves as birdwatchers. How about you? There's a wonderful world just waiting to be explored.

Birds of every kind - songbirds, raptors and shorebirds – fly from their winter homes in the south to their summer breeding grounds in places as far north as the Arctic in the spring, and then back south in the fall. Along the way they encounter many perils, including bright lights and tall buildings, cats and toxic lawns.

Fortunately, people can help ensure a safer journey. With a few simple steps your yard can become a bird-friendly rest stop. Here are some tips to help:

- Reduce or eliminate pesticides and herbicide use. By using fewer chemicals in and around your home, you will help keep birds, pets and your family healthy.
- Plant native plants. Native flora provides birds with food in the form of fruits and seeds, and can be home to tasty bites in the form of bugs and spiders.
- ldentify the non-native invasive plants in your region, and work to remove them from your yard. And don't bring any new invasives into your backyard habitat! Invasives don't provide as much good food or habitat as natives do, and can threaten healthy ecosystems.
- Attract hummingbirds with sugar water. Here is the recipe for hummingbird juice: four parts boiled water to one part cane sugar. Never use honey, artificial sweeteners or food coloring. Clean hummingbird feeders with a solution of one part white vinegar to four parts water. Rinse three times before re-filling. Don't use soap or bleach on hummingbird feeders.
- Make your windows visible to birds to prevent crashes. Put up screens, close drapes and blinds when you leave the house or stick multiple decals on the glass. Decals need to be spaced closely together to be effective no more then two to four inches apart!
- Help birds stay on course. Close your blinds at night and turn off lights you aren't using. Some birds use constellations to guide them on their annual migrations, and bright lights can disrupt them.
- Provide a source of water, such as a well-maintained birdbath or small pond. A water source will attract birds and beneficial insects such as butterflies. Shallow edges allow birds to bathe and drink without getting too wet.
- Along with having bird feeders filled in the fall and winter, it is okay to keep feeding birds in the spring and summer as well. During spring migration and fall migration which begins in late July bird feeders can be very welcome sources of food for exhausted migrants. At the Cornell Lab of Ornithology's Treman Bird Feeding Garden, the feeders are filled year-round for the benefit of the birds and the pleasure of the visitors and staff.
- Summer feeding does entail a few extra precautions because many diseases can grow more rapidly as temperatures rise. To ensure a safe bird-feeding environment, change hummingbird nectar every three days in hot weather, and more often in extreme heat. Rake up and dispose of wet or moldy birdseed regularly. Change water in birdbaths two to three times per week when mosquitoes are breeding, and daily in very hot weather.

Birding is an easy, fun activity. All you really need to begin your bird watching hobby is a pair of good binoculars.

Bird watching is a great excuse to spend time outdoors. Too many of us spend the year either closeted inside our homes or in a job cubicle. We've forgotten what it's like to breath fresh air and commune with nature. We've forgotten that we're not the only creatures blessed to live on this planet. We've forgotten that it's natural to be outdoors.

Bird watching can be very convenient. What's more convenient than watching birds in your very own back yard? You can go down to your local garden center, purchase a bird house and/or a feeder and some feed, and have a bird sanctuary in your back yard in one afternoon. If you've done your homework correctly, your newfound bird friends will love you. If you're industrious enough and handy with a hammer and saw, you can even build a custom bird house.

Birding provides you with your own private animal reality show. You'll quickly find yourself involved in the bird family pecking order. Who's dominant? Who's selfish? Who's nurturing? Who's a bully? You'll start to recognize distinct personalities.

An important aspect of bird watching is that it is a very relaxing activity. No matter how stressed out your day has been, once you sit down with your binoculars and aim it towards your bird friends, you'll notice a sense of calm and tranquility coming over you.

And remember, you'll be helping nature by helping the species to survive. In many parts of the country, the natural habitats of the native creatures, including birds, have been destroyed. In modern society, new industrial or housing development trumps nature every time. With your bird watching hobby, you can help restore some of the habitat balance by providing nesting places, shelter from predators, and food for the birds that you enjoy.

New Tables for 305 8th Street!



305 8th street, is a non-profit home for mentally challenged individuals who score high enough on IQ tests to receive no government aid, but are not able to take care of themselves without assistance. This home houses 19 residents. It is totally debt free, and depends solely on donations for its existence. Outreach, supplies some food, primarily from the efforts of Ginny McDonald and others. After a visit to the home, it was apparent they were in great need of replacing two old wooden picnic tables. The Nativity Outreach

Committee, with the approval of the Vestry, were able to replace the old wooden tables with concrete tables! These tables will not need repair or replacement any time soon! This is just
