

Mission of the Church of the Nativity

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

Strive to Tithe!

During stewardship response time we are called to deal with that word many find one of the most intimidating words of the Christian life: tithing. There is no question that tithing is a profound challenge. The simple definition of tithing is giving 10% of your income to God's work and mission. So is that pre-tax, gross, or net income? What about the gifts to my schools and to other charitable organizations? Tithing is confusing because we can get caught up in the legalities of it. Corky Carlisle, well-known stewardship consultant in the church asks, "Well, are you doing any of that?"

We discover that God does not have as many rules as we have. The journey to tithing is a part of our spiritual journey and the point is to be on the journey, knowing where you are and where you want to go. For God's people who have received all that we have from God, the source of life and grace in Christ Jesus, the goal is to tithe. But in order to get there, you have to know where you are. So the first step is to take an honest look at your giving to God's work as a percentage of your income.

Reports show that the average American gives between 1% and 2% of their income. For most, the call to give 10% could represent a significant shift in lifestyle and priorities. Tithing might mean looking at reducing spending on things that you believe are important, if not essential. But you will discover what Jesus said is true: Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Tithing isn't simply church code for "give more to our church family than to some other non-profit." The idea that we are to tithe to God's mission comes directly from Holy Scripture, from the book that is at the center of lives together, the Bible. Through reading and studying scripture, we discover that God is concerned about how we order our lives and what we do with what God gives us. The Ten Commandments are a prime example. In Godly Play with our children, we call the Ten Commandments the "ten best ways." They are the best ways because God knows that they ultimately lead to our thriving.

Tithing, like all of God's commandments, promises a deeper freedom and leads to our thriving. Anne Pollard put it beautifully in her Stewardship reflection: the more you give, the more you get... and she's not talking about monetary "getting." You give more and you get more life, you realize more love, more grace, more peace, and a deep sense of purpose that you are joining something incredible that is making a difference. The church transforms lives. Through our giving we share in God's remarkable work!

My journey to tithing began when I was a young banker. I knew that my parents always tithed, because they were audited every year because the IRS didn't believe my family with six children actually could give that much money to the church! I was not there yet, so I pledged \$50 a month. That stayed roughly the same until 7 years later I found myself Vice President of the bank and on the Vestry of our parish. I decided that \$100 a month was a "nice" gift. But the next year, one of the matriarchs of the parish talked to the vestry about tithing. Miss Lila Patton asked us, "Where is your heart men and women? Some of your hearts are at the Golf Club instead of with God's work. Take a look at what your golf dues are in relation to your church pledge." I was caught! My heart was elsewhere because I was spending twice as much on other things than I was pledging to God's work in the church.

So I began the process of striving to tithe. The Alabama Plan of moving 1% a year towards tithing is a good way to do that (I think we started at ½% a year move!). It took time, but we are finally there. I have discovered that tithing has made a difference in three essential relationships: money, the church, and God. I am no longer anxious about money and see it as something God has blessed me with to bless others. I have confidence that God is indeed working through the church and will enable us to do all God needs us to do. And finally, I am able to trust God's love and grace more and more. My heart is more God's and God's heart is mine when my treasure is with God above all else. Strive to tithe so your heart and God's will be one. You will know more love and peace and forgiveness and share more love and peace and forgiveness. For where your treasure is, there your heart shall be also...with God' heart!

Ellen Davis to Lecture at The School of Theology

Ellen F. Davis, the Amos Ragan Kearns Distinguished Professor of Bible and Practical Theology at Duke Divinity School, is this year's DuBose guest lecturer at The School of Theology. She will give two lectures in Guerry Auditorium on the campus of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tenn., on Oct. 31 at 9:30 a.m. and at 2:30 p.m.

Davis' lectures will highlight prophetic voices in both Testaments that provide theological perspectives essential for faithful Christian living and the work of ministry. These lectures are made possible by the DuBose Lecture Fund and are offered free of charge to the general public. No reservations are required.

Davis' interest is in theological interpretation of the Old Testament, with particular concern for how the Bible is used to address urgent public issues. Her current work focuses on developing an exegetically based response to the ecological crisis.

A lay Episcopalian, she has been involved in interfaith dialogue for 40 years. Her previous teaching appointments were at Union Theological Seminary (New York City), Yale Divinity School and the Virginia Theological Seminary.

Stewardship of Creation Tip

"When is 'organically-grown' important?"



While grocery shopping, the question arises: "When is it important to buy organically-grown items?" Some pesticides are known neurotoxins that can negatively impact the health of our

families and future generations. Though the Environmental Protection Agency has been restricting the uses of the most toxic pesticides, they are still detected on some foods today. Tests in 2008 found that some domestically-grown summer squash – zucchini and yellow crookneck squash — contained residues of harmful pesticides that were phased out of agriculture in the 1970s and 1980s but still linger on some farm fields.

Whether you are on a budget and need to prioritize your organic purchases, or you would simply like to know which type of produce has the highest pesticide residues, the following guide will help:

Apples Celery Cherry tomatoes
Cucumbers Grapes Hot peppers
Nectarines—imported Peaches Potatoes
Spinach Strawberries Sweet bell peppers
Kale/Collard greens* Summer squash*

There are two additional items highlighted this year – domestically-grown summer squash and leafy greens, specifically kale and collards. These crops did not meet traditional Dirty Dozen™ criteria but were commonly contaminated with pesticides exceptionally toxic to the nervous system.

Important note: If you buy from local farmers, you can have a conversation with the actual grower of your food about how the food you are buying is grown and what chemicals are used. Buying organic produce is important, but eating conventionally-grown produce is far better than not eating fruits and vegetables at all.
