

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

Advent: We Begin Anew

Advent signals new beginnings. Our new year as pilgrims on the spiritual journey to knowing God begins now, not on January 1st. On the beginning of the temporal new year many resolve to live differently....usually making resolutions having to do with eating less, exercising more (the gym is always crazy crowed in January), and paying more attention to our spouses or children or friends or siblings. We might even think about our work and making changes with our life's direction. These are all great things to consider.

Advent is the season when we resolve to grow closer to God. We resolve to pay better attention to God's presence in the world, in our lives, and in the lives of those we share this life: those at home, at work, at school, and in our communities. We commit to a deeper love of God and a stronger love of the neighbors God calls us to serve.

Advent points to Christmas, which in the great symmetry of the rhythm of the faith calendar, occurs before our temporal new year. Celebrating Christmas, we realize God's great love for us and the world by choosing to come among us in the birth of Jesus. Thus, God intersects temporal time, sharing our lives in all of their joys and sorrows, even sharing death, but defeating death through Christ's resurrection.

Advent means "coming." Our season of Advent calls us to pay attention to Christ's coming, to wait expectantly and hopefully for God to act in our lives and the world in our new year of our spiritual journeys. This is a wise way to begin our new year of faith so that we can get onto the right road for the journey.

In Advent we focus on the three ways Christ comes. We prepare to celebrate Christ's first coming in history as the Babe of Bethlehem who grew up to be the savior and redeemer of the world. But before we think about that initial coming we observe during the 12 Days of Christmas, Advent compels us to think about Christ's final coming at the fulfillment of time, victoriously and as our judge. In Advent, we are sharply reminded to get on with the work Jesus has asked us to do before he returns in glory.

Between these two times of his coming, his first and his last, Advent is also about Christ's continual coming to us in faith each day. He comes to you today wherever you are in life. He comes in word and deed; in sacrament and in prayer. We meet him in each other. He will come to others through your sharing what you receive from him in blessing.

He comes when you allow his love, his forgiveness, his grace, to reach from your life to others, giving of yourself as God generously gives. He comes when you visit someone who is lonely or sick or hurting, and when you give a winter coat to someone who has none. He comes when your family shops for those who have nothing and you take a little less for yourself.

He comes when a teenager says, "No, I will not do that because God has shown me a better way of living." He comes when business people make decisions that might not seem the smartest by the world's standards, but they know are right by God's ethic. He comes when his irresistible way of living becomes the way you live every day.

As God's people in Christ, every day we discover anew God's grace for the journey. Advent not only establishes the pattern for our year, but for our daily living when we wake up each morning and proclaim, Blest be the God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ. By his great mercies we are born anew this day to a new hope through Christ's resurrection. (from 1st Peter)

In Advent and every day we live we can begin anew because Christ comes. What a great hope! The Welsh poet R. S. Thomas writes, "...and there is everything to look forward to."

EYC Church of the Nativity

First Ever Great S.P.A.M. Hunt a Success!



"My youth group at church is trying to help two families by collecting the foods listed on the accompanying sheet. We made it into a game to improve participation with some younger children, but it truly is to help these families as much as we can, since they can't provide for themselves this Thanksgiving. If you could help at all, it would be greatly appreciated, by both my youth group and the families that we are helping." - Excerpt from a letter a youth left on her neighbors' porches



On a recent brisk November afternoon, 33 Nativity youth led by 11 adult volunteers set out on Nativity's first ever Great S.P.A.M. (Serving People A Meal) Hunt. With boys and girls competing against each other, the youth split themselves up among 6 cars and proceeded to canvass over 30 houses across Huntsville to pick up generous donations of food by Nativity parishioners.

After about 90 minutes of collecting food, the teams returned to Ridley Hall to begin counting and sorting food items and tallying points. With a score of 1830 to 1305, the boys won this year's Great S.P.A.M. Hunt and received the Golden S.P.A.M. Award.

But after the trophy was awarded, we remembered the real reason for this activity when we filled 4 cars with the collected donations and dropped them off at the Huntsville Assistance Program, filling their conference room and intake room with food.

Based on an idea developed by some of the youth ministry volunteers at our church, the Great S.P.A.M. Hunt is a great example of sustainable, thriving youth ministry: volunteer-driven, intergenerational, service-oriented, and fun! Many thanks to everyone who participated, drove, and donated food!





Stewardship of Creation Tip


In a recent "Clergy Column" newspaper article printed in the Huntsville Times, The Rev. W. Bry Shields reminds us that during this holiday season, Christians are called, not to disdain the material goods of this world, but to exercise stewardship of God's gifts. "We are to receive the time, talent and treasure bestowed on us by a gracious God, and look upon them as gifts to be used for the Kingdom of God. By putting God first in our use of created goods, and employing them for the satisfaction of needs and the service of our neighbors, we honor God and come close to God. ...To be stewards of shopping, we must first bear in mind the primacy of persons over things. We are to use things and love people, not the other way around."

And here are some specific ways to put these ideas into practice:

Buy Fair Trade goods.

What is Fair Trade? Fair Trade goods are just that. Fair. From far-away farms to your shopping ristmas Gifts cart, products that bear the Fair Trade logo come from farmers and workers who are justly compensated. Farmers in developing countries are helped to build sustainable businesses that positively influence their communities. Fair Trade USA is a nonprofit, but doesn't do charity. Instead, people in disadvantaged communities are taught how to use the free market to their advantage. With Fair Trade USA, the money you spend on day-to-day goods can improve an entire community's day-today lives.

Buy greeting cards from St. Jude's Ranch for Children, Recycled Card Program. And send your old cards to them to be recycled. St. Jude's is an organization that for years has cared for children who have been abused, neglected or abandoned. Send them your old greeting cards, either ones you've received from friends, or ones received as "gifts" in solicitations from charities. They recycle greeting cards of all types: birthday, thank you, holiday-themes, and all occasion. Cards are accepted all year. All types are accepted, as listed above. Only the front of the card is used. Please make sure there is no writing on the backside. 5" x 7" or smaller is best to send. No Disney, Hallmark or American Greetings can be accepted. To order cards, call (877) 977-7572.



An indirect kind of "shopping" we do every day is the use of energy in our homes and businesses. When we pay the utility bill each month, we all have the opportunity to add a little extra to be donated to "Project Share". Project Share is the utilities assistance program, administered by the Salvation Army, with funds collected through Huntsville Utilities, which is available for utility customers 62 years of age or older, or customers who are certified as disabled or handicapped, who need help paying their utility bill during the winter months. Participants must be on a low or fixed income which does not exceed the Alabama Dept. of Human Resources household income eligibility guidelines. A wonderful "gift" we can give very easily is to add something for Project Share when we pay the utility bill. And to be especially good Stewards of resources, lower the thermostat and reduce your energy consumption, then donate the difference in your utility bill to this good cause. (Note: utility assistance is not currently given in the summer months because there are not enough funds.)


