God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

Transformation in Lent through Almsgiving:

Making a 3-5 Year Pledge to Bethany Village this Lent

Lent is the season when we open ourselves to all the things that keep us from trusting God so that we can be transformed to be the people of blessing God created us to be. Lent gives the opportunity to trust God even more by special acts of devotion during this special time of transformation. Today's Ash Wednesday Gospel talks about the three major ways we allow God to enter our lives anew: through praying, fasting, and, yes, almsgiving.

Face it, my friends, the biggest obstacle most of us have to trusting God is with our money. The Gospel passage concludes: ***Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven... For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.***

You want to get your heart right with God this Lent? You are invited to observe a Holy Lent of transformation by examining where your treasure is. And then, after praying and fasting from worldly goods and anxieties, giving alms over and above your regular church pledge.

Bishop Kee Sloan challenges Nativity to give alms and pledges to Bethany Village at Camp McDowell this Lent.

Have you heard about our Diocese's Bethany Village mission? Have you heard about the plan to share the magic of Camp McDowell with thousands of people who don't yet have the opportunity? How about a *permanent* place for Folk school? What about jobs available for people with physical and mental disabilities? Bethany Village will be fully handicapped accessible, environmentally friendly and self-sustaining with its own farm!

Bethany Village is a bold dream to expand Camp McDowell with the addition of 6 Miller Commons-type lodges, 10 cabins, a blacksmith shop, chicken houses, a teaching kitchen, barns for livestock and farming, and a handicapped accessible playground. However, this dream does not come without a cost, and in this case it's \$9 million dollars. The Diocese has raised over half of this amount in pledges from parishes and individuals across Alabama, but now, God needs *YOU*.

We hope to raise \$400,000 from Nativity's family to build a lodge! In the coming weeks, every household at Nativity will be contacted, and we hope that every one of us will take part in the campaign so that a Nativity lodge will be a gift from all of us. I am grateful for Mel Ford, Betty Hornsby, and Chris Whitney who are chairing Nativity's campaign. Look for their letter!

The cost is significant, but the benefits to our parish, to the Diocese, and to people from all over is far deeper and richer than the dollar amount. Yes, it may require us to sacrifice something in order to complete this pledge, but, in so doing, Nativity will be a part of something truly important. We will help build a place where Jesus' friends live, and that is something to celebrate! This would be somewhere that we, as a parish, could be proud of... somewhere we could lay our heads at upcoming Parish Weekends...somewhere concrete that we could look at and know we really made an impact in the lives of many, *many* people. **Be transformed this Lent and make a pledge to Bethany Village!**

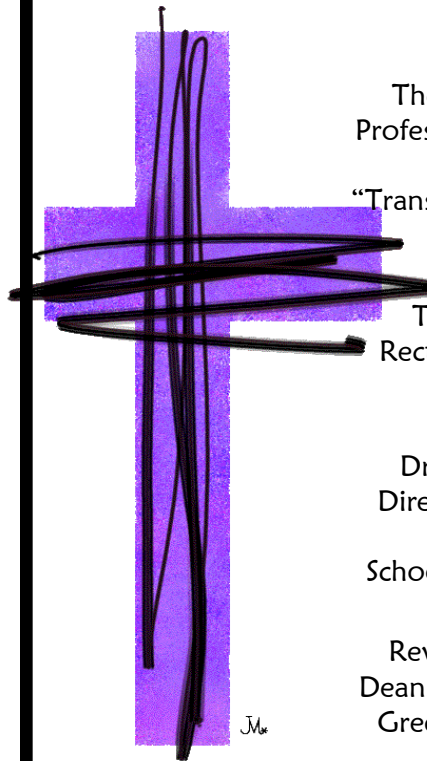

Nativity Shows Promise in Inaugural Tennessee Valley Episcopal Cup



After two hard fought contests against two very skilled teams, Nativity's

"Boys in Green" finished third in the first ever Tennessee Valley Episcopal Soccer Cup. The day looked grim despite beautiful weather as the side from St. Thomas got out to an early 4-0 lead in the first match, but Nativity avoided the shut-out with a late second half goal before time was called with a 5-1 score line. Following a brief rest, the downtown squad took to the pitch for the fight for second place against the St. John's Saints of Decatur, who fell 4-0 to cup winners St. Thomas. Nativity's front 3 Van Dodgen, Cole Greco, and Huston Moring matched the Saints goal for goal early in the first half, but at halftime the River City squad led 4-2. Having heard several rousing speeches by the team captains (all of us — we were a team of 7 boys after all), Nativity's defensive line of Alec Bonner, David DiFranco, and William Blackerby fought hard in the second half, while goalkeeper Park Ellis made several spectacular saves. Striker Noah, on loan from St. Thomas (and Huntsville United) lofted a late goal into the back of the net for Nativity to make the score 4-3, but the whistle blew before Nativity could score the equalizer. Following the tournament, several players from the Nativity side were heard saying "can we stop for something to eat?" to which manager Blackerby replied "No, I told your parents we'd be back at 5:30." Stewardship of Creation Tip...more about the importance of trees:

The Value of Trees to a Community

Trees provide more than beauty. They give us a sense of history and well-being, make our communities more livable, help connect us to nature, provide habitat for wildlife, and shade our homes, helping us save money on utility bills. Make plans now to plant a tree.

A single tree will absorb nearly a ton of carbon dioxide over its lifetime. By shading your home, they help with energy efficiency. Trees also filter air, decreasing health risks caused by pollution.

The following are some statistics on just how important trees are in a community setting.

"The net cooling effect of a young, healthy tree is equivalent to ten room-size air conditioners operating 20 hours a day." —USDA

"One acre of forest absorbs six tons of carbon dioxide and puts out four tons of oxygen. This is enough to meet the annual needs of 18 people." —U.S. Department of Agriculture

"There are about 60 to 200-million spaces along city streets where trees could be planted. This translates to the potential to absorb 33 million more tons of CO₂ every year, saving \$4 billion in energy costs." —National Wildlife Federation

"Trees properly placed around buildings can reduce air conditioning needs by 30 percent and can save 20–50 percent in energy used for heating." —USDA Forest Service

"Trees can be a stimulus to economic development, attracting new business and tourism. Commercial retail areas are more attractive to shoppers, apartments rent more quickly, tenants stay longer, and space in a wooded setting is more valuable to sell or rent." —The Arbor Day Foundation

"Healthy, mature trees add an average of 10 percent to a property's value." —USDA Forest Service

"A mature tree can often have an appraised value of between \$1,000 and \$10,000." —Council of Tree and Landscape Appraisers

"The planting of trees means improved water quality, resulting in less runoff and erosion. This allows more recharging of the ground water supply. Wooded areas help prevent the transport of sediment and chemicals into streams." —USDA Forest Service

"In laboratory research, visual exposure to settings with trees has produced significant recovery from stress within five minutes, as indicated by changes in blood pressure and muscle tension." —Dr. Roger S. Ulrich Texas A & M University

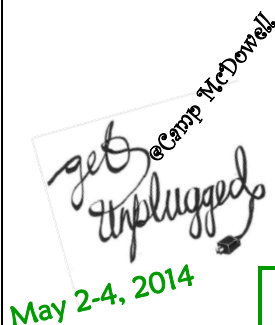
