

NATIVITY OUTREACH

In Memory of Joe Franklin

Within the Nativity parish office, there is a wonderful lady who makes all things financial run a little bit smoother for all of us. Beverly Franklin is our parish Business Manager. She juggles contributions, payroll, insurance, memorials, reimbursements and our precious Outreach disbursements to those in need around us. A little more than a year ago, Beverly lost her beloved husband, Joe. At that time, Joe was a client of the Huntsville Dialysis Center. In memory of Joe, and in honor of our sweet Beverly, the Outreach Committee and YOU, our parish, will be sending assistance to help with the cost of Handi Ride transportation for one indigent patient to and from their life saving treatments.

The average dialysis patient requires 3 treatments a week, at Handi Ride cost of \$2 each way, the cost of transportation quickly rises to near \$50 per month, or \$600 a year. For the client who is struggling financially and who lacks other transportation support, this can become daunting quickly.

Stewardship of Creation tip

We all want to eat the foods that will give us the best chance for good health and well being, and we want to feed our families and friends the healthiest foods. Here is information to help us do this:

2014 Dirty Dozen Plus

Nonorganic apples topped The Environmental Working Group's Shopper's Guide to Pesticides in Produce. Kale, collard greens, and hot peppers were frequently contaminated with insecticides that are particularly toxic to human health.

PESTICIDES IN OUR FOODS...

The Environmental Working Group each year provides a list of the most pesticide-laden produce. This doesn't mean you should stop eating produce in exchange for processed foods, but it does suggest that eating organic as often as possible is a very good way to keep pesticides out of your body and the bodies of your children and others you feed!

This list will also help you find conventional fruits and vegetables with low concentrations of pesticide residues. If a particular item is likely to be high in pesticides, you will have the information to know when to go for organic.

Other Important Findings:

Every sample of imported nectarine samples tested and 99 percent of apple samples tested positive for at least one pesticide residue.

The average potato had more pesticides by weight than any other food.

A single grape tested positive for 15 pesticides.

Single samples of celery, cherry tomatoes, imported snap peas, and strawberries tested positive for 13 different pesticides apiece.

Good News:

Only 1 percent of avocado samples showed any detectable pesticides.

89 percent of pineapples, 82 percent of kiwi, 80 percent of papayas, 88 percent of mango, and 61 percent of cantaloupe had no residues.





Stewardship Thoughts – What exactly does OUTREACH do?

We just completed a great Inreach Ministry Fair and now we turn our attention to OUTREACH. All ministries that help build God's kingdom are important, but it is through outreach that we live out many of Jesus' commands as well as the promises we made (or were made for us) at our Baptism.

In Matthew 25:35-36, Jesus lays it on the line regarding how we must treat our neighbors: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Jesus wraps us this lesson by telling those gathered that "...just as you did it to the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

In our Baptismal Covenant, we make a series of promises: to proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ, to seek and serve Christ in all persons, to love our neighbors as ourselves, to strive for justice and peace, and to respect the dignity of every human being. To each of these questions, we answer a hearty "I will!"

Nativity's strong outreach program gives us many opportunities to carry out Jesus' commands to serve as well as to live out our Baptismal Covenant. Here's a quick look at some of the wonderful works accomplished through our outreach ministries:

Haiti mission trip – hundreds of people receive medical evaluation, medical treatment and medications (including vitamins and supplements), toothbrushes, and medical education

Habitat for Humanity - builds houses for low-income families with monetary and labor support from our parish

KAIROS – this prison ministry receives monetary support from our parish as well as numerous members serving on KAIROS staff; toiletries are donated to indigent prisoners who would otherwise have none of these items

Meals of Wheels – Nativity provides monetary support to this program as well as numerous volunteers who deliver meals

Huntsville Assistance Program (HAP) – Nativity parishioners provide food monthly; several parishioners donate their time each month, helping with food, rent, utility bills, and prescription assistance

Hands of Francis and Oscar Mason programs - provides after-school snacks every day for kids who come to the library for homework assistance, and during summer reading programs; additionally 15 families receive food assistance every last Thursday of the month during the school year

Sawyerville Day Camp – Nativity provides a monetary donation as well as cleaning supplies to this program; additionally, Nativity parishioners often provides towels, bathing suites, and other needed supplies for campers

Russell Erskine – residents of Russel Erskine Hotel receive fruit and vegetables from the Greene Street Market during the summer; additionally, they receive holiday treats throughout the year.

These are just a few of the ways that Nativity cares for the hurting and broken world around us. We hope that you will find an outreach ministry that is right for you and get involved! It is what Jesus asks to do and what we promised to do at our Baptism!
