Vestry Moves Nativity Forward with RenewalWorks Spiritual Growth Initiatives

Nativity is blessed with strong leadership on the vestry. Our vestry members realize that the important thing about Church, as the great mystic Evelyn Underhill told Archbishop of Canterbury Lang, is God! At our Vestry retreat in 2014, the Vestry endorsed Nativity's engaging the RenewalWorks process for discerning how Nativity inspires and supports us in our spiritual journeys by fostering spiritual growth and our lives in God.

This past fall we entered that process with several hundred Nativity members taking the RenewalWorks Spiritual Life Survey. A RenewalWorks team of 20 lay leaders and the clergy met in four 3-hour workshops studying and reflecting upon the survey results and on what the best practices for spiritual growth would look like for us at Nativity. This capable team of parishioners was led by facilitator Christine Starnes whose skills in guiding the group are nothing short of extraordinary! Christine, along with RenewalWorks team members Virginia Caruso and Ches Chesney compiled a report on the process and the action items for spiritual growth recommended that they presented to the Vestry on our recent retreat.

The vestry unanimously received this excellent report and endorses the action items coming forth from our RenewalWorks team process. The report will soon be available on the Nativity web site. We will also be hosting several meetings to share the results with the parish.

Three major "action item" initiatives from RenewalWorks will move Nativity forward by challenging us to grow spiritually through parish-wide engagement with Bible reading and study, offering spiritual growth short courses called Discipleship 101, and by entering Holy Conversations in a one on one or small group format to keep the questions about spiritual growth before us.

The vestry also endorses a RenewalWorks Forward Team to help with implementation and accountability, and to continue the conversation. The Vestry Liaison for Adult Christian Formation and Spiritual Development will be the Vestry's ongoing connection to this work. This is exciting news for Nativity's future. The Body of Christ at Nativity will only be as strong as our individual members of the body are being rooted, strengthened and grounded in Christ; growing in love and service and in our relationship with God.

Brian Taylor writing about Spiritual Growth asks the question, What is spirituality? Our spirituality is how we are in relationship with God, other people, creation and ourselves. With grace, with faithfulness, these relationships bear fruit. Our tradition tells us that over time, extending into eternity, all these relationships will be redeemed, that they will fulfill God's intentions: love, forgiveness and reconciliation; compassion, justice and peace; environmental harmony; and for you and me, that we will be filled with the light of God. All of this redemption is the fruit of our spirituality; it is the result of faithful relationships.


What's Happening?





STEWARDHIP OF CREATION

10 Climate Change Effects – Are they anthropogenic or effects of a naturally-occurring cycle? In anticipation of Harvey Cotten's Church School class, here are some things to think about...





- 3. National Security Threatened: The impacts of climate change are expected to act as a "threat multiplier" in many of the world's most unstable regions, exacerbating droughts and other natural disasters as well as leading to food, water and other resource shortages that may spur mass migrations.
- 4. Sea Levels Rising: Warmer temperatures are causing glaciers and polar ice sheets to melt, increasing the amount of water in the world's seas and oceans.
- 5. Allergies Worsen: Allergy sufferers beware; climate change could cause pollen counts to double in the next 30 years. The warming temperatures cause advancing weed growth, a bane for allergy sufferers.
- 6. Beetles Destroy Iconic Western Forests: Climate change has sent tree-killing beetles called "mountain pine beetles" into overdrive. Under normal conditions, these beetles reproduce just once annually, but the warming climate has allowed them to churn out an extra generation of new bugs each year.
- 7. Canada: The New America: "Lusher" vegetation growth typically associated with the United States is now becoming more common in Canada, scientists reported in a 2012 Nature Climate Change study.
- 8. Economic Consequences: The costs associated with climate change rise along with the temperatures. Severe storms and floods combined with agricultural losses cause billions of dollars in damages, and money is needed to treat and control the spread of disease.
- 9. Infectious Diseases Thrive: The World Health Organization reports that outbreaks of new or resurgent diseases are on the rise and in more disparate countries than ever before, including tropical illnesses in once cold climates.
- 10. Shrinking glaciers: In 2013, an iceberg larger than the city of Chicago broke off the Pine Island Glacier, the most important glacier of the West Antarctic Ice Sheet. And at Montana's Glacier National Park, glaciers have gone from 150 to just 35 over the past century.

Many scientists and concerned lay people believe we are at a critical juncture, resulting from the influence of human beings on nature. Others believe that the changes happening now are part of a natural, cyclical pattern.

Come join us as we explore, 'How Christians are Cultivating a Middle Ground on Climate Change'. Each week we will try to separate fact from fiction and quiet the intense noise surrounding this issue. Over the six week course we will look at the causes and effects, the doubts and choices, while studying "What is Going on Today and Where We Can Go from here"

Nativity 101: New Class for ANYONE New to Nativity

February 8, 2015, 10:00am, Ridley Hall

Nativity 101 is a new 5-week offering on Sunday mornings at 10:00 a.m. in the Parish Hall for anyone new to Nativity, including Episcopalians who have transferred in or in the process of transferring their letter. It is the foundation for our Seekers / Catechumenate Class process that continues February 15 for anyone seeking to be Confirmed or Received into our Episcopal Church Communion or for existing Episcopalians who desire to renew their Baptismal Covenants.

February 8 Nativity 101: How can YOU get involved?

The Catechumenate: Episcopal Faith Seekers' Class

The class begins with a 5 week series, Nativity 101. Nativity 101 leads into The Catechumenate, the Seekers' Class on February 15. Sundays, 10:00am, Ridley Hall

A class is for Adults seeking to be Confirmed and Baptized Episcopalians from most other traditions (or no tradition) or Received into the Episcopal Church from the Roman Catholic, Orthodox and Lutheran (ELCA) traditions. This class is also for Confirmed Episcopalians seeking to deepen and renew their faith and Baptismal Vows

The church's catechumenal process, an ancient pattern for initiating Christians into the full life of the community of the faithful is at the heart of our Seekers' Class for people new to the Episcopal Church and for other Episcopalians who want to renew and deepen their faith. This process enables participants to reflect upon the traditions and practices of Christianity as the Episcopal Church has received them. Each Seeker or *Catechumenate* (the historical name for people seeking church membership) will be assigned a sponsor to walk the journey with them. Sponsors are already members of Nativity who will encourage you and be available for questions and discussions about the faith we share as Episcopalians. The ancient development of the Catechumenate was for converts to the faith in Baptism. Most of our Catechumens at Nativity will not be preparing for Baptism, but will be people who are already baptized. This class is specifically geared toward:

- People who have not been baptized
- People baptized as infants who want to make a mature public affirmation of their faith
- People seeking out this church community for marriage or for baptism of a child
- People baptized in other traditions but have not shared in the Episcopal Church's understanding of Confirmation by a Bishop in the historic, apostolic tradition
- Newcomers to the Episcopal Church from other traditions
- Former Roman Catholic or Orthodox Christians who will be received into this Communion

- Evangelical Lutheran Church in America members who have not been confirmed
- Returnees (for a variety of reasons)
- Active members seeking to deepen and renew their commitment
- Nominal members seeking basic formation
- Lapsed members willing to reconsider Christian Commitment
- Christians seeking deeper faith understanding in a time of crisis

The class goes through Sunday, May 10. On May 17 the Bishop of Alabama will be present with us to celebrate these commitments made in Confirmation, Reception, and Renewal of Baptismal Vows. Adults seeking Baptism will baptized at the Great Vigil of Easter on Easter Eve at 7:30pm on April 4, 2015.

The class convenes in the Parish Hall with a presentation by one of the clergy or by a lay leader in the congregation. This presentation is followed by small group table discussions, and then the whole group reconvenes. The class will be dismissed around 11:30 a.m. Child care is available. Participants are asked to attend the 8:45 a.m. worship service. Those who desire may go to lunch afterwards.

Parents are top influence in teens remaining active in religion as young adults

Mothers and fathers who practice what they preach and preach what they practice are far and away the biggest influence related to adolescents keeping the faith into their twenties, according to new findings from a landmark study of youth and religion.

Just 1 percent of teens age 15 to 17 raised by parents who attached little importance to religion were highly religious in their mid to late twenties.

In contrast, 82 percent of children raised by parents who talked about faith at home, attached great importance to their beliefs, and were active in their congregations were religiously active as young adults, according to data from the latest wave of the National Study of Youth and Religion.

The connection is "nearly deterministic," said Christian Smith, lead researcher for the study and a sociologist at the University of Notre Dame in Indiana.

Other factors such as youth ministry, clergy or service projects, or religious schools pale in comparison.

Nothing else "comes remotely close to matching the influence of parents on the religious faith and practices of youth," Smith said in a recent talk about the findings at Yale Divinity School. "Parents just dominate."

Several studies have shown that the religious behaviors and attitudes of parents are related to those of their children.

In research using data from the National Longitudinal Study of Adolescent Health, sociologists Christopher Bader and Scott Desmond found that children of parents who believe that religion is very important and display their commitment by attending services are most likely to transmit religiosity to their children.

This is the fourth wave of the NSYR, a comprehensive national study first conducted in 2002–2003 among teens age 13 to 17 and their parents. These early findings add powerful evidence of the importance of mothers and fathers as the study traces the path of young respondents, who are now age 24 to 29.

One of the strongest factors associated with older teens keeping their faith as young adults was having parents who talked about religion and spirituality at home, Smith said.

Other key factors included having parents for whom personal faith is important and who demonstrate that faith through attending services. Teens whose parents attended worship with them were especially likely to be religiously active as young adults.

Among related findings, parents from religious traditions that in general promote greater commitment and encourage discussing faith outside the sanctuary also were more likely to have children who remained active in their faith as young adults.

For example, two-thirds of teens raised by black Protestant parents and half of adolescents with conservative Protestant parents had high or moderate levels of religiousness as young adults. On the other end, 70 percent of teens raised by mainline Protestant parents had minimal or lower levels of religiousness as young adults.

In interviews, many mainline Protestant parents said they "feel guilty if they think they are doing anything to direct their children toward their religion as opposed to any other possibility," Smith said. They question if they should tell their child "what I believe is right."

Yet if parents and faith communities are not able to communicate their beliefs, Smith said later, "the game's over, already."

The role of parents is even more critical today as trust in institutions declines and many children with more demanding schedules are spending less time in congregations, Smith noted.

Yet, he said, there are some powerful "cultural scripts" that discourage parents from taking an active role in the spiritual lives of their teens.

Cultural messages encourage parents to turn their children over to "experts," and many parents consider faith formation to be the responsibility of clergy, Sunday schools, and youth groups, Smith said.

"Parents, for better or worse, are actually the most influential pastors . . . of their children," Smith said. "Parents set a kind of glass ceiling of religious commitment, above which their children rarely rise." —theARDA.com
