Alleluia! Alleluia! Christ is Risen! An Easter Message From Our Bishops

The resurrection joy is the gift to the world of new life, life conquers death and that the love of God is freely gifted to us in a spirit of renewed hope and optimism. Easter comes after the forty day Lenten observance and Holy Week which mark a period of fasting, contrition and penance; the witness to despair, injustice, abuse of power, travesty of justice and the condemnation of an innocent man, God's incarnate son Jesus Christ. The profound message to the world and its people is that out of darkness comes light and out of death emerges life abundantly.

The message of Easter is that Jesus identifies with suffering of every kind experienced and by embracing them is able to transform our life of poverty and pain into the triumph of glorious resurrection. Out of suffering emerge new hope, life, joy and deeper levels of maturity. Easter calls for a change of heart, a turning to God which concomitantly demands a change in ways of thinking and behaviour toward each other. Redemption is all about the birthing of transformation, reformation and conversion; of learning to live in love even with those we vehemently disagree with in matters of life and faith. It is a call that is still being made to us even today.

We are also reminded that fear and uncertainty of death should not overwhelm us; Jesus wins the victory over the grave. Easter is a visible reminder that when we allow the Spirit the opportunity to breathe through the cracks of our broken lives how much we can enjoy healing, restoration, reconciliation and new reasons to live again and prosper both as individuals and community of faith.

Additionally, the message of Easter to Christians and indeed the entire human race is that our faith makes demands. Ours isn't an easy option as we reach out to society more directly and immediately and to individuals who we may not ordinarily chose to engage. Despite the evidence of secularisation and materialism, it is absolutely clear that there remains in the heart of each individual a space which the risen Lord and Saviour can fill. Easter, once again, calls to mind this obvious truth as revealed in Scripture.

Each one is precious in the sight of the loving Father; each has a dignity and a destiny from God which can never be denied or ignored. We have to respect this inner worth and absolute value and do so by helping to reform the structures which perpetuate any form of injustice and vice that inhibits positive human development. The light of Easter should be felt in every corner where any semblance of darkness is found.

Also, let each of us rise with Christ this Easter in doing so release ourselves from the stone that is rolled in front of the tomb, the tomb of our heart creating that space which only God in Christ can truly fill.

Happy Easter to the Episcopal family of the Diocese of Alabama and everyone else!!!!



5 SESSION STUDY COURSE CONTINUES THROUGH WEDNESDAY, MAY 13, 6:00pm. IN RIDLEY HALL

The Rector and Wardens will also conduct a parish forum on same-gender relationship blessings on Sunday, April 19, at 10:00am in Ridley Hall

The Episcopal Church's resource exploring how the church has discerned missionally, theologically, and scripturally to move forward with same-gender, faith rooted, life-long, monogamous commitments, I Will Bless You And You Will Be A Blessing, has been available on our website for a few months now. These materials contain a Five (5) session study guide to help individuals and parishes understand why the church and our Bishop Kee Sloan believe we should offer these blessings. Bishop Sloan's policy on offering blessings asks that vestries explore the materials first, and that they be available to the parish membership at large, preferably offering the 5 sessions in a class. The Nativity Vestry has been studying the materials and we are making them available to anyone in the parish who would like to engage the materials in an interactive class.

Beginning Wednesday, April 8, at 6:00pm in Ridley Hall, we will offer the study sessions over 5 Wednesday evenings. The schedule follows:

April 8: History: Reviewing the history of The Episcopal Church's decisions regarding same-sex relationships and reflecting on the current context

April 15: Theology and the Bible: *Examining our* understanding of God's blessing through the lens of theology and scripture

April 22: Liturgy: Discussing liturgy and the liturgical resources developed for the blessing of same-gender relationships

April 29: Study Session does not meet this week.



Stewardship of Creation - The Basics Easy Tips for Living with Less Plastic

There are numerous things that anyone anywhere – including you – can do that will drastically reduce your plastic footprint on the environment and help live a healthier life! All it takes is a little awareness and initiative.

Avoid the worst common plastics

There is no need to be eating or drinking toxic plastic residues. As often as possible, purchase food items in glass containers. When glass is not an option, be an informed consumer, learn to identify the type of plastic a product is packaged in by looking at the recycling symbol molded on the item. The recycling symbol is a number from 1 to 7 surrounded by three chasing arrows forming a triangle. The three following plastics are very common, and are significantly harmful to living beings and the environment:



Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC #3): An extremely toxic plastic often containing multiple unsafe additives, including lead and phthalates. Still used for some toys, clear food and non-food packaging (e.g., cling wrap), some squeeze bottles, cooking oil and peanut butter jars.



Polystyrene (PS #6): Contains styrene, which is toxic to the brain, nervous system, and various organs. Used in Styrofoam containers, foam egg cartons, disposable cups and bowls, take-out food containers, plastic cutlery.



Polycarbonate (Other #7): Contains bisphenol A (BPA), which has been linked to numerous health problems. Used in some baby bottles (though increasingly banned in baby bottles by countries around the world), clear plastic "sippy" cups, sports water bottles, juice and ketchup containers, and in large water storage containers, and most metal food can liners. Please note that #7 is a catch-all category including any plastic resin that does not come within the first six categories.

Refuse plastic bags and bring your own reusable bags wherever you go – heck, while you're at it, make every effort to REFUSE all single-use disposable plastics

Plastic bags are often used for minutes only, before being discarded. And most plastic bags are not recycled, thus

ending up in landfills – where they take hundreds of years to break down – or in the environment as toxic pollution.

There are now all kinds of reusable bags out there. Choose what works for you, and carry it with you in your pocket, coat, purse or car.

Avoid bottled water and bring your own reusable water bottle or mug with you when you go out

The realities of bottled water:

- It is less regulated than tap water; usually it is simply filtered tap water; it is very expensive; and requires enormous resources to collect, bottle and ship it.
- And, of course, it generally comes in a plastic bottle usually polyethylene terephthalate (PET #4) which contains the toxic metal antimony. Some argue that the amount of antimony in this plastic and the potential leaching from such bottles is negligible and harmless, but a precautionary approach is preferable.

Such bottles are intended for single use, so if they are reused or exposed to heat or cold, they will break down faster and leach more plastic residue.

Get a reusable stainless steel bottle or a glass bottle.

Use non-plastic containers for food – lunches, leftovers, freezing, storage, take-out, travelling...

There are now a variety of options to help you avoid using plastic for storing food...and avoid the polluting and leaching disposable take-out containers:

- Stainless steel and glass containers airtight and non-airtight with stainless steel lids;
- Layered tiffins for carrying various items at once in separate layers (e.g., nuts, fruit, chips, humus, whatever you like)
- Insulated stainless steel thermal containers for hot meals on the go
- Ton't underestimate the easy utility of the ubiquitous mason jar or other glass jars /containers.

Here is a plug for using glass. It is generally completely inert (i.e., non-reactive and non-leaching) and is impermeable to liquids and gases and 100% recyclable. It is elegant and can be shaped and colored as desired in a non-toxic way. It does not absorb smells or flavors, is easy to clean, and can be produced inexpensively as the raw materials are plentiful and largely naturally-occurring.

One of the key reasons to love glass is because it is so safe.

Recycling Rate: Glass is generally 100% recyclable and

can be recycled endlessly without losing its properties (quality, strength, functionality). Recycled glass is almost always an ingredient (even up to 90%) in new glass containers.


