### Al Ford Announces Retirement Approaching 23 Years of Faithful Service

In 1992, in Nativity's 150th year of service, Al Ford began almost 23 years of service to our Lord's Church as the Sexton of the Church of the Nativity. Serving alongside 2 Rectors, 2 Interim Rectors, 11 Associate Rectors, 2 Deacons and almost 40 lay staff, Al has seen the church grow and change during his tenure.



Father Andy Anderson says that 23 years of service is remarkable in today's world. Al's presence is something we have grown to know and depend upon. His work of caring for and cleaning our buildings, although often behind the scenes, is no less important than anyone's participation in our life together. The rooms have always been set up exactly as we need them to be, sometimes with 2 or 3 changes to a space in a given day! Al's work reminds me of Martha's service to our Lord, in the background, cleaning the dishes after a meal, making certain every-

thing is set up just right for what needs to happen in our prayers and serving and growing and giving together.

Director of Adult Christian Formation Lane Tutt was the Director of our Children's Ministries

when Al began and she has worked with Al for most of his 23 years. Lane shares her thoughts, "Al was always willing!" He was always willing to do almost anything he was asked to do (he had carried many a load from and to parishioner's cars!), but when we asked him to help with a children's program on "The Wedding Of Cana" Al and his wife Lois, whom many of us know as Al's cheerful assistant, were the "married couple" in the liturgical drama in which the children experienced their beautiful wedding and the miracle of Jesus turning water into wine (in this case for the children, grape juice!).

John Buyse, Property Manager who works side by side with Al each day says, "More than anything else, He is a friend and a really good guy. I'll miss him because he is so much fun to be around."

Al mentioned that his retirement plans are pretty loose right now. "Maybe some travel. But it will be on my own time!"

We are grateful for Al Ford and his work with and among us. We will honor Al and Lois at a parish reception on Sunday, June 14, after the 10:00am service. Our tradition is to honor retiring lay employees with a monetary "purse" to be used for their retirement enjoyment. 

## Stewardship of Creation - The Basics, Part 2 Tips for Safer Plastic Use and Less Waste

Realistically, there are times when plastic use is unavoidable, here are some guidelines and tips to help using common plastics, when you simply can't avoid it.

The SAFER CHOICES among common plastics for limited, ideally, single-use with food and drink are:



High density polyethylene (HDPE)



Low density polyethylene (LDPE)



Polypropylene (PP)





Polyethylene terephthalate
(PET or PETE or polyester)

Polyvinyl chloride (V or Vinyl or PVC)





Polystyrene (PS)



Other (O) - all other plastics

Especially avoid Polycarbonate (PC) which leaches bisphenol A (BPA), which is a known endocrine disruptor with numerous adverse health effects, including increased risk of cancers.

Avoid polycarbonate (PC #7) baby bottles and sippy cups, which contain bisphenol A (BPA). For baby bottles, try and use glass, polyethylene or polypropylene instead. Sippy cups made of stainless steel, polypropylene, or polyethylene, are safer. Be sure to check bottles or cups for the type of plastic it contains. As for baby bottle nipples, try and use natural rubber or silicone that does not leach carcinogenic nitrosamines sometimes found in synthetic latex rubber.

Carry reusable bags, bottles, coffee mugs, take-out food containers, and utensils. For water, try to avoid plastic bottled water. Tap water is much more regulated than bottled water. If the tap water in your area is questionable, consider installing a home filtration











system or using a portable filter, such as a binchotan charcoal filter. Non-plastic reusable water bottles (stainless steel, glass) are now very easy to find - they reduce plastic waste, as well as exposure to toxins, and they save you money the more you use them

If you must use plastic water bottles, minimize their use and exposure to temperature extremes. Plastic bottles made from PETE #1 or HDPE #2 are intended for single use only. Avoid cleaning them with strong detergents that can degrade the plastic and increase leaching - try and use a natural biodegradable detergent.

Avoid heating plastic food and drink containers, especially in the microwave. Heating plastic containers creates stress; causing them to degrade faster and making it more susceptible to leaching chemicals. Even if the container says "microwave safe," it still could leach chemicals. If the plastic is showing signs of wear scratched, worn, cloudy, sticky, cracked - recycle it.


Use plastic wraps with caution. Some plastic cling wraps are made of polyvinyl chloride (PVC, #3) and should be avoided if at all possible. Plastic wraps should not be used in the microwave. Alternatives include wax paper, paper towels, or a plate to cover food. Also, avoid freezing plastic food and drink containers. Freezing stresses the plastic, causing it to degrade faster and thus making it more susceptible to leaching chemicals. If the plastic is showing signs of wear – scratched, worn, cloudy, sticky, or cracked-recycle it.

Avoid putting fatty or acidic food and drink in plastic containers. Fats and acids (tomato or lemon-based foods) are more likely to cause the plastic to leach chemicals into the foods. When fatty foods are heated in the microwave, there may be a residue left on the plastic (such as a reddish ring with tomato sauce). This residue is the sauce going into the plastic, which means the plastic is also going into the sauce.

#### **REMEMBER:**

2, 4 and 5 are OK for limited use AVOID 1, 3, 6, 7, and (PC)!

## Nativity's "Be the Change Alabama" Project – Progress Report

Our Parish is beginning a new and exciting project of relationship and engagement called "Be the Change Alabama," which is part of a resolution of General Convention of identifying "Mission Enterprise Zones" that engages under-represented groups such as: youth, young adults, people of color, working-class people, people with a high-school education, and the un-churched. This initiative also supports the concept that leadership arises out of a deeply intentional process of linking our individual call to the needs of our local community. Leadership in this context is developed when people creatively combine their resources to address an urgent challenge while reflecting on how God is moving through their communal lives. Through "Be the Change Alabama" we are developing church leaders who are empowered to make systemic changes in the local community and hence change the world.

Our Parish team brainstormed ideas and considered a variety of possible programs revolving around food injustice issues and how we might leverage the success of our "Greene Street Market." We then initiated community conversations to develop an ongoing relationship with a neighborhood dealing with food desert\* geography issues and possessing a desire to garden and learn more about local food. This led us to begin a relationship with the Huntsville Inner City Learning Center, whose mission is to provide a solid foundation of education to our inner city youth and provide at-risk children with the extracurricular support needed to succeed in school. These tools enable youth served to build meaningful lives and careers and become socially responsible members of society who are productive and competent lifelong learners. The Center provides children ages 6-13 with tutoring, mentoring, bible classes, life skills, health and fitness activities; as well as meals outside of school and on weekends. The Center also offers gardening, music rehearsals and after school activities for older teens and recently opened a Women's Center to provide a safe environment for educational opportunities, parenting classes and social opportunities for moms and their children.

Each parish is developing their mission relationships and project. Each Parish's effort is being coordinated by a seminarian from Sewanee, and Brother Aelred Dean is doing his field placement in Contextual Education at Nativity in support of this project.

Be the Change Alabama is a partnership with the Diocese of Alabama, Sewanee, The Episcopal Church, and Leadership Development Initiative of the Diocese of Massachusetts. Leadership Development Initiative's mission is to awaken the Church and enable it to live its true vocation of social justice, reconciliation, and the transformation of individuals, communities, and the larger world through the power of the Spirit of Christ.





A Resource for Blessing Same-Gender Relationships

## 5 SESSION STUDY COURSE CONTINUES THROUGH WEDNESDAY, MAY 13, 6:00pm. IN RIDLEY HALL

The Episcopal Church's resource exploring how the church has discerned missionally, theologically, and scripturally to move forward with same-gender, faith rooted, life-long, monogamous commitments, I Will Bless You And You Will Be A Blessing, has been available on our website for a few months now. These materials contain a Five (5) session study guide to help individuals and parishes understand why the church and our Bishop Kee Sloan believe we should offer these blessings. Bishop Sloan's policy on offering blessings asks that vestries explore the materials first, and that they be available to the parish membership at large, preferably offering the 5 sessions in a class. The Nativity Vestry has been studying the materials and we are making them available to anyone in the parish who would like to engage the materials in an interactive class.

Remaining sessions are May 6, at 6:00pm in Ridley Hall, and May 13 in the Joffrion Library. The schedule follows:

**April 8:** History: Reviewing the history of The Episcopal Church's decisions regarding same-sex relationships and reflecting on the current context

April 15: Theology and the Bible: Examining our understanding of God's blessing through the lens of theology and scripture

**April 22:** Liturgy: Discussing liturgy and the liturgical resources developed for the blessing of same-gender relationships

April 29: Study Session does not meet this week.
