Our Mission

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

THE NATIVITY TRUST: One way of Ensuring Nativity's Legacy

Over the past several weeks we have been sharing information about ways of Ensuring Nativity's Legacy through our two planned gift programs, The Nativity Trust and the Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation. Information describing these distinct funds has been mailed to every parish household. The most recent Steeple gave an overview of our endowment and trust opportunities that you can support through a planned gift through your will or with other direct financial gifts. This week we are highlighting the Nativity Trust as a way you can help Nativity's mission expand, reaching out to others in creative ways.

In 1997, Nativity's leadership established the Nativity Trust to enable funding for creative new ministries reaching out to the community that can't be supported by annual funds. Nativity's rich and diverse ministries are supported by the tithes and offerings you make annually. But every year, although we always have enough to do what we've been doing well, there is rarely anything left over for new efforts.

The income from this trust fund primarily supports new outreach and ministry efforts, and some funding for capital needs. In January 2000, the Nativity Trust became a part of the Alabama Episcopal Foundation when the parish entered a covenant agreement with this diocesan Foundation. Our documents state that not less than 75% of an annual distribution from the Trust must be used for expenses outside the normal operations of the parish, with particular concern for outreach, both local and that promoted by the Anglican Communion worldwide. The remaining portion of an annual distribution (not to exceed 25%) is to be used for major maintenance, capital improvements, property acquisitions, and any related debt service. The Covenant Agreement stipulates that all undesignated planned gifts from wills and estates will go toward the Nativity Trust. [Hence, gifts to the Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation must be specifically designated in either your will or a codicil.]

This bold and visionary effort has enabled Nativity to reach out in remarkable new ways, for example, through the 305 8th Street Group Home supporting mentally challenged adults; our helping a family who lost everything in the April 2011 tornado; the Icons in Transformation exhibit; helping build a new chapel at Limestone State Prison; and, assisting children through enrichment programs in economically challenged elementary schools in the area. The Nativity Trust has also helped with small capital needs including repaving the Greene Street parking lot, youth classroom renovation, and supporting the new sound system.

With a \$50,000 gift received in May from the estate of Wayne Hendricks, the Nativity Trust now has a corpus of approximately \$475,000 (based upon the April 30 report from the Alabama Episcopal Foundation). The Vestry has not taken the 2015 Distribution of \$20,474, of which \$15,356 could be used for new outreach ministries or other ministries reaching out into the community and \$5,118 for capital needs. We cannot take this distribution until all the funds from the 2014 distribution have been expended.

The Vestry appoints the trustees for the Nativity Trust who must be Nativity Communicants in Good Standing and non-vestry members. Current Trustees are Jane Booth, Terry Clevenger, Ronnie Crawford and Jim Douthit. The Rector and the Senior Warden customarily attend Trustee meetings. The Vestry also appoints a Vestry Liaison to the Nativity Trust and Lou Durnya currently serves in this role. If outreach and new ministries reaching out into the community in creative ways to share God's love are your passion, then the Nativity Trust is a way for you to plant seeds for the future *Ensuring Nativity's Legacy!*

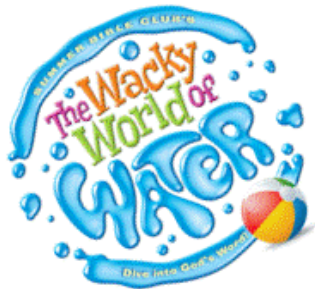
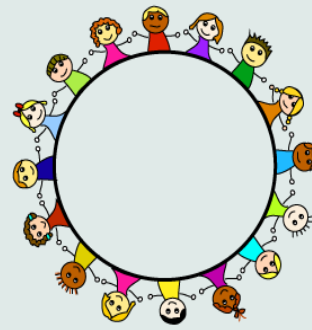

Why are there two creation stories in Genesis?



According to the documentary hypothesis, the Pentateuch (first 5 books of the Bible), were compiled and edited from four different sources. The original creation story (GEN 1:1-2:3) originates in the oldest source, called the J-document, written in Judah (the South) which uses the name YHWH or Yahweh (Jehovah in English), revealed to Moses on Mt Sinai, as the name for God. This was combined with the E-document, written in the Northern Kingdom of Israel about 850 BC, which used the name Elohim for God, a generic name for God used before Moses.

The second creation story (GEN 2:4-3:24) was added in the P or Priestly document, written around 500 BCE by Jewish Priests during the Babylon exile. They placed their creation story first, before the original J story.

Stewardship of Creation -

A message from Susan Stephenson, Executive Director,
Interfaith Power and Light

Next month Pope Francis will release his encyclical on the environment, lending a strong voice and considerable influence to our moral obligation to protect Creation. With the impacts of global warming growing more severe – and putting the most vulnerable at risk – the need for action is stronger than ever. We have only a short window of time to get emissions under control before we lock in a dangerously unstable climate. Check out these shocking facts about the recent impacts of climate change, and then share them with your friends and family to help us spread the word!

- **The planet recorded the highest-ever level of Carbon Dioxide (Co2) in the atmosphere.**

This spring, Co2 in the atmosphere reached 400 parts per million at measuring sites around the world – a high-water mark for the amount of contaminants in the atmosphere. And that amount of Co2 is 50ppm worse than what most scientists consider a safe level to avoid the worst effects of climate change.

- **California's drought killed more than 12 million trees in just the past few years.**

High temperatures, low snowpack, and the lack of rainfall have killed millions of trees in California. The state's national forests are filled with 999,000 acres of dead trees. With forest fire season around the corner, all that dry wood puts the region at great risk of wildfire. In some areas, the number of tree deaths has almost doubled just since last July.

Forest fires are a natural part of the California ecosystem, but the current rate is almost double the historical rate. All those fires just put more black carbon into the atmosphere and undermine the ability of our forests to absorb carbon dioxide.

- **Doctors claim patients' health is already being harmed by climate change.**

The National Medical Association found that almost 90 percent of its members said climate change impacted their patient care. Doctors are already seeing more respiratory problems and heat-related illness. And if climate change continues, this will be only the beginning.

- **Climate change may be contributing to earthquakes like the one in Nepal.**

Heavy monsoon seasons and rising sea levels put pressure on tectonic plates – leading to more frequent earthquakes, volcanoes, and tsunamis. Scientists believe that even small increases in sea level will increase volcanic eruptions.

- **Sea levels are rising faster than originally thought.**

New satellite data shows that the rate of sea level rising has accelerated since 1993 as ice sheets in Greenland and Antarctica have melted. The study warns that sea level rise puts coastal cities like New York, Tampa, and New Orleans at risk as “once-in-a-lifetime” floods become more frequent.
