God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.



The Story at Nativity: Reading the Bible Together this Year COME GROW WITH US!

Nativity is committed to being a place where spiritual growth in our life in God is a priority. Our RenewalWorks Ministry begun last year is ready to take a major step in encouraging you to move ahead in your spiritual

journey. We will begin reading and studying scripture together as a parish family beginning in September. The Spiritual Life Survey taken last fall reveals this as something you want. Reading scripture together is an important way to grow.

I am thrilled to let you know officially we will be reading *The Story*, an *accessible*, abridged version of the Bible that features segments of scripture woven together with transitional text so it reads like one grand narrative: the story of God's loving relationship with us. Join your parish family in a commitment to read the Bible starting this September through May 2016.

The Story will be available in multiple forums so that all will have an opportunity to share this adventure in spiritual growth. On Sunday mornings beginning September 13, **The Story** will be taught in Sunday school for pre-school through high school, and for adults in a special Sunday morning clergy and lay led Bible Study class in the Bibb Chapel, as well as in the Breakfast Club Class for couples and parents.

We will also have a special week-day class for adults (young and old, single and couples) on Monday nights at 6:00, with shared beverages and pizza in the library. In addition, discussion questions and deeper study will be available on-line through Nativity's website. Each week there will be a reading assignment, and if you do them all, you and your family will have read the entire Bible by the end of May!

The parish will provide appropriate age level books for ages 2 through high school. **This is a gift to our children and their families!** Adults are encouraged to buy copies for themselves at The Greene Street Market Store or order online (Amazon or Barnes & Noble).

This past Sunday and over the next 3 Sundays, our Gospel reading is Jesus' "Bread of Life" discourse from John's Gospel, reflecting upon Jesus' Feeding of the Five Thousand. Jesus tells us, *I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry; whoever believes in me will never be thirsty.* Jesus knows we hunger for much more than food. Jesus reminds us in so many words, we are not who God created us to be unless we are nourished spiritually. And so he also tells us: *Do not work for the food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life...* How easy it is for us to concentrate, for ourselves and for our children, on the food that fills our stomachs, paying little attention to that food which sustains our souls—our lives in God. Quoting the Old Testament,

Jesus reminds us early in his ministry that one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from God. Through the living bread that comes down from heaven, through the revelation of Jesus as the Son of Man in God's incarnation, we discover our deepest hungers are met and satisfied. We find this living bread in this community of faithful people who support God's mission and praise in so many ways. We especially find this living bread in bible study.

The Bible is a wonderful, rich, sometimes mysterious story, the story of God creating, redeeming, and sustaining us and the world. The Bible is a story of hope. The prospect of our entire church family reading and listening for what God has to say to us can only deepen our life together and help us be the people God intends us to be. I hope you will be a part of reading *The Story* together. Come grow with us!

Jonathon Daniels Pilgrimage, August 15th, Hayneville AL

Special civil rights pilgrimage marking the 50th Anniversary of Jonathan Daniels Death

Fifty years ago this August, a 26year-old white Episcopal semi-

narian was gunned down in Hayneville, AL, while working to help register African Americans to vote. Jonathan Myrick Daniels, and other martyrs of the 1960's civil rights movement in Alabama, will be remembered and honored for their sacrifice during a special pilgrimage weekend Aug. 14th through 16th.

On Saturday August 15, Holy Eucharist will be celebrated from the judges bench-turned altar. The Rt. Rev. Michael Curry, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of North Carolina and Presiding Bishop-elect will deliver the sermon.



Stephen G. Schaeffer Called to Serve as Interim Organist and Choirmaster



Please welcome Dr. Stephen G. Schaeffer as our Interim Director of Music and Organist and Choirmaster beginning September 4 through Christmas. Stephen served during Suzanne Purtee's sabbatical in 2013 and we are delighted to have him on the bench and leading the choir this fall. Stephen brings a depth of professional and artistic experience. The clergy and staff are delighted to work with him again! After a tenure of 25 years as Director of Music and Organist at the Cathedral Church of the Advent, Birmingham, Alabama he was named Director Emeritus in August 2012. Under his leadership The Advent Choir completed two residencies in English cathedrals (2004 - Ely and St. Albans, and 2008 – Durham), morning services at St. Thomas Church, NYC (2000), and an East Coast concert tour including services at Washington National Cathedral, St. Thomas Church, NYC, and St John the Divine, NYC. Prior to his appointment at the Cathedral in 1987 he was a tenured member of the music faculty at Presbyterian College, Clinton, South Carolina, (1971-87) where he was also chairman of the Department of Fine Arts.

Dr. Schaeffer is a graduate of the St. Thomas Choir School in New York City. Following graduation from Davidson College, he pursued work at the College-Conservatory of Music of the University of Cincinnati receiving the Master of Music and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees. He holds the First Prize in Organ from the Conservatoire National de Région in Lyon, France. A frequent recitalist, Dr. Schaeffer has also served throughout his career as a organ consultant to numerous churches. In March 2012 he recorded his first solo compact disc on the 1988 100 rank Möller organ at the Cathedral, the organ which was his first "project" at the Cathedral.

In retirement, Dr. Schaeffer remains active as a church musician, In addition to these duties he was appointed in 2013 as the regional representative in Alabama and West Georgia for the Reuter Organ Company of Lawrence, Kansas.

He is a member of and has served on the Executive committee of the Birmingham Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, holds membership in the Association of Anglican Musicians, where he has served in many leadership capacities, and is a member of the Organ Historical Society.

Education for Ministry (EfM) classes starting in September

The University of the South's School of Theology is again offering Education for Ministry (EfM) at the Church of the Nativity. Learn to think

theologically as well as deepen your understanding of the Old Testament, New Testament, church history, and theology in a four year course. We meet weekly on Monday or Tuesday nights from September to May. Cost is \$350, which includes books.

The second year book is *Introducing the New*Testament: A Historical, Literary, and Theological Survey by Mark Powell (2009), has been everyone's favorite so far – a "keeper". He provides a very balanced description of both traditional and current understanding among scholars. Many call-out boxes are included in the book with detailed information.

How was the New Testament created?

The New Testament (NT) canon or authoritative list of books developed slowly. At the turn of the first century (100 CE), scripture still referred to the Septuagint (Tanakh or what would become our Old Testament). All 27 of the books now in the NT were complete by 150 CE. However, many other gospels, letters, homilies, and apocalypses existed at the time which are not in the NT today. Different communities used slightly different sets of books. There was not too much dispute about the most commonly accepted books - the four gospels and the letters of Paul, but much discussion about less accepted books. Even the four gospels were not always accepted -some Syrian churches used the Diatessaron (a 2nd century harmony which combined the gospels into a single narrative) into 5th century. The criterion for inclusion in the canon was whether it had catholic (universal) usage and acceptance. The canon was fairly well established by 250 CE and firmly established in the Latin West by Jerome's Vulgate Bible, commissioned in 383. Even today, many stories have been passed down to us from non-canonical books, e.g. according to the Acts of Peter, Peter is crucified upside-down.

Stewardship of Creation Green Tips: What's Wrong with Styrofoam?

A lot! Styrofoam, the trademark name of the Dow Chemical Company for polystyrene foam, used for disposable cups and plates, food packaging, mailing material, appliance packaging and much more, is manufactured from petroleum as well as other chemicals, one of which, benzene, is a known carcinogen.

As school and church and other activities begin to ramp up, be mindful of the products used at these events/gatherings.

Because polystyrene is so prevalent, many of us assume it is safe, but according to a Foundation for Achievements in Science and Education fact sheet, long-term exposure to even small amounts of styrene can cause fatigue, nervousness, difficulty sleeping, low platelet and hemoglobin values, chromosomal and lymphatic abnormalities, and carcinogenic effects. It has not been proven to cause cancer in humans, although there is evidence it causes cancer in animals.

Polystyrene can release potentially toxic breakdown products, *especially when heated*. It's never a good idea to put plastic in the microwave – use glass instead.

Styrofoam also takes a long time to break down in the environment and is not easily recycled. Styrofoam is classified as a #6 plastic (which many recycling centers don't take). Styrofoam is said to take up 25 percent of space in the landfills where it leaches chemicals into the soil and groundwater. Furthermore, Styrofoam can be lethal to any animal that might ingest it by blocking their digestive tracts, ultimately causing starvation.

Try not to buy products packaged in Styrofoam, particularly food items. *Food and petroleum really don't go together!* It is inevitable you'll probably have some, so reuse your Styrofoam for packing materials or crafts (donate them to schools for art projects).

Instead of Styrofoam cups and plates, there are now some eco-safe alternatives used in some restaurants and hotels, which are made from biodegradable cornstarch or from useless agricultural by-products and mushroom roots, and many restaurants put take-outs in paper boxes or other non-styrene containers. Be sure to give a compliment to those places!

Try, as often as possible, to take advantage of existing dishware and flatware but when a situation requires purchasing non-reusable plates and cups and storage containers, be sure to make your selection based on the best choices for the health and well-being of the people who will be ingesting the food served or stored in the dishware.

The next time you buy a coffee to go and it comes in a Styrofoam cup, ask if you can have a different cup. Even if they don't have one, you'll be planting a seed and eventually change will happen.

Nativity adds Instagram to its Social Media offerings

This is a place where you can share photos of the church, photos taken at church events, etc. Our hashtag is: #nativityhsv For all who are relatively new to Instagram, here are a few quick pointers:

Adding a Photo:

When you add a photo and tag it with #nativityhsv the following occurs:

The photo become part of the collective hashtag #nativityhsv.

The photo does not appear on the church Instagram page unless an admin for the church page reposts it. We will make an effort to periodically repost your photos to the church page. However, this does not automatically occur when you add a photo.

Searching:

You can always search by people, tags, or places. If you search by tag, using our hashtag #nativityhsv, you will see all the photos that our members have added to this tag. This is the most effective way to rapidly see all the photos for our church page at any given time.

Hashtags & @ Tag:

Hashtags are for posts set to public and they provide a way to widely share your photos. Hashtags should be relevant to your photo, and probably should be hashtags already in use on Instagram. (If you make up your own hashtag, you may be the only one using it and thus the only one seeing it.) As stated above, we are using the hashtag #nativityhsv. Here is an example of how you might use hashtags for a photo you took at Camp McDowell during the Parish Weekend: #nativityhsv #campmcdowell #familyfun #Alabama #parishweekend

The @ tag allows you to tag another Instagram user. Typical use of this feature is to leave a comment under a photo you want to share with another user. To do this, type the @ sign in the comments field, then start typing the username and a list will pop-up, allowing you to select the user you want to add.

Connecting your FB with Instagram:

Many people connect their accounts on setup, but if you didn't, don't worry, it's very easy to setup! The settings are slightly different depending on what type of phone you are using, so if you need further guidance look this up on Instagram help. It takes about two minutes and it

well worth the time, as it allows you to rapidly share your favorite Instagram photos directly on your FB page.

I hope this helps any of you who are Instagram "newbies". If you still have questions, there are many excellent tutorials online for you. Don't be afraid to jump in and post your photos, we want your participation. Instagram is another great way for us to connect and share special moments in our parish.

Sunday, August 16th - following the 10:00am service


