

Our Mission

God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

Finding Your True Life, The One Hid with Christ in God

You have been raised with Christ...you have died and your life is hid with Christ in God. The Christ in God life affirmed by God's incarnation in Jesus of Nazareth's birth, life, death and resurrection continues in us. God's divine presence since the first incarnation in the creation of the Cosmos has always indwelt our human existence; Spirit and matter are one, not two separate realities. Our sacramental understanding of the holy in ordinary things and events testifies to this, making it real in us.

Paul's letter to the Colossians encourages us to seek this true life God gives, the self created in God's image, that is fully revealed in Christ Jesus. Unfortunately, Paul sometimes uses language that is not helpful. He writes to seek the things that are above, not of the earth which might seem to create a division between Spirit and matter; that God is "out there" and we must cross a great chasm to get to God. And so we try to bridge that gulf in many ways. But the reality is that we don't have to work so hard. God wants to shape us with God's life that is deep within us if we would just recognize it and let God do the building and shaping.

Now for certain, you and I have allowed other things to shape our lives. We have allowed the safe expectations of others to create us in something less than God's image. Our deepest longings for God, who has made us for God's self (and so as Augustine put it, our hearts are restless until they find their rest in God) have been replaced by other needs, some necessary for preservation, some sinful in that they exploit others and undermine God's purposes for the world and our lives. And so the greatest spiritual work we have to do is to dismantle, even die, to this false self so the life hid with Christ in God can live.

Jesus says stop your scheming and looking elsewhere, God's Kingdom is within you. He is restating God's truth revealed early on through the Moses prophetic tradition, restated by the prophet Jeremiah and others, and later affirmed by Paul in his letter to the Romans.

English mystic Dame Julian of Norwich wrote this: *The place which God takes in our soul he will never vacate, for in us is his home of homes, and it is the greatest delight for him to dwell there...The soul who contemplates this is made like the one who is contemplated.*

Wow! God's delight is in you so much that God's home is deep within your life. God will never desert you or anyone else! Finding the life hid with Christ in God, we are made like him, and our true life and self lives. I admit, it's a scary thing to have to die to live; it's a scary thing to fall into the hands of the living God. But turning 60 this summer, I realize there is nothing else to do....where else can I go, for God in Christ gives us the words of life.

So, my friends, two suggestions to allow this life hid with Christ in God to live:

- + Find a prayer and reflection discipline that connects you to God daily.
- + Join our parish efforts to connect to God's story of the life hid with Christ by reading *The Story*, immersing yourself in the Bible, revealing God's word that is already very near to you and in your heart and mind and soul.

And your life will be caught on fire with God's love and life, not only transforming you, but through your life hid with Christ in God, making a difference in this world like nothing else!





Education for Ministry (EfM) classes starting in September

The University of the South's School of Theology is again offering Education for Ministry (EfM) at the Church of the Nativity. Learn to think

theologically as well as deepen your understanding of the Old Testament, New Testament, church history, and theology in four year course. We meet from 6:00 – 9:00pm weekly on Monday or Tuesday nights from September to May. Cost is \$350, which includes your books.

The third year book is *Christianity: The First Three Thousand Years* by Diarmaid MacCulloch (2009), which was also a New York Times bestseller. MacCulloch traces the origins and development of Catholic, Orthodox, Syrian, Coptic, and Protestant Christianities, and he provides a more in-depth look at the development of Christianity in Asia and Africa than standard histories of Christianity. As one reviewer summarized "Excellent, comprehensive, simply-written, and engages the facts (and fiction) of history in a thoughtful way. A must-read for Christians and non-Christians interested in understanding Christianity"

Why is Jesus not involved in the Immaculate Conception?

The immaculate conception is the conception of the Virgin Mary in her mother's womb free from original sin by virtue of the foreseen merits of her son Jesus Christ. Although the belief that Mary was sinless and conceived immaculate has been widely held since Late Antiquity, the doctrine was not dogmatically defined until 1854, by Pope Pius IX in his papal bull *Ineffabilis Deus*.

How many letters in the New Testament were actually written by Paul?

Thirteen letters (epistles) were attributed to Paul, but scholars believe only seven were written by him: Four letters are believed to be pseudepigraphic (written by someone else in Paul's name). Scholars are divided on the authenticity of the remaining two letters.

Stewardship of Creation

What is Stewardship of Creation?

In most issues of The Steeple, the 'Stewardship of Creation' article provides information ,along with actions, we can take to live out our call to care for God's amazing creation and each other. So, exactly what is 'Stewardship of Creation' and what does it have to do with our lives as Christians?

David Rhoads, Professor of New Testament, Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago provides the following:

Steward is a biblical term that refers to a manager who handles the goods and property of another. A steward is not therefore an owner, but one who has a responsibility to an owner to treat property with care and respect. Stewardship is a term that refers to the responsibility of a steward to manage wisely. The unjust steward was one who took advantage of his position to aggrandize himself (Luke 16:1-13).

Stewardship has come to be used in the Christian community in a broader sense for our responsibility to manage wisely the goods and property that are in our possession. The assumption is that we do not possess or own anything. Rather, the world, including us, belongs to God, and it is arrogant for humans to think otherwise. Therefore, we are not owners but stewards of all that comes into our arena of responsibility—income, assets, property, goods, time, talents, and our very selves. Religious stewardship is management as a sacred trust.

In recent times, the concept of steward has been applied in its most original and fundamental meaning to refer to our human responsibility to care for the Earth itself (Gen 1-2). Our human failure to be responsible stewards of Earth has led to the current ecological crises threatening global climate stability, the ozone layer, and the diversity of plant and animal species. Ecological problems also include the pollution of air, the despoiling of land, the degradation of fresh water, and threats to the health of the oceans. The loss of forest and arable land in alarming proportions has tremendous implications for food security. Human population, now over seven billion, is stressing every ecosystem on Earth. As Christians, what is our responsibility?

Stewardship of Creation Is Our Human Vocation:

The Bible is a good place to find guidance. The concept of environmental stewardship originates with the first of the creation stories; where God gives humans dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air, and the animals of the land (Gen 1:1–2:4). Traditionally, Christians have distorted the mandate to "exercise dominion" to mean that creation is for human beings and that we have a right to

dominate and exploit creation for our wants and needs. This has led to incalculable abuses of nature.

We now know the Hebrew word for dominion does not mean "to dominate" or "to exploit." Rather, it means "to take responsibility for," as a ruler assures responsibility for the well-being of those in the realm. In this first creation story, human beings were created last, not as the so-called "crown of creation," but to exercise responsibility for the well-being of the garden Earth. According to Genesis 1, exercising responsibility as part of God's creation is the main reason humans were created. Therefore, being stewards of creation is foundational to what it means to be human. Caring for creation is not an add-on, not a sideline, not related just to part of our calling. It represents our proper human relationship to Earth. This portrayal puts human beings squarely in a caretaker position regarding environmental stewardship.

We Are Called "to Serve and to Preserve"

The second creation story goes even further in clarifying the concept of environmental stewardship (Gen 2:5-15). In this story, God put Adam and Eve in the garden in order "to till and to keep" the land. However, the words translated as "till" and "keep" may be misleading. The Hebrew word for "till" is a word used to depict the service that a slave gives to a master. And the Hebrew word for "keep" means to preserve for future generations. Hence, the mandate "to serve and to preserve" the land places human beings not in a hierarchical position over creation but a position of service to it.

Just as the later Christian message depicts Jesus as a servant-king, so humans are challenged in this creation story to assume a similar role: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all" (Mark 9:35). Care for creation is to be exercised not to serve our wants and desires but to serve the best interests and well-being of all Earth-community together, including ourselves.


