October 25 is Commitment Sunday

Proper 24 Mark 10:35-45

Abraham cast Hagar and her baby into the desert with nothing but some bread and water. When those ran out, Hagar left Ishmael alone because she could not bear to watch him die. When baby Ishmael lost everything— parents, sustenance, shelter—he had nothing—but the God that saved him.

Ishmael's polar opposite is Willy Loman in "The Death Of A Salesman." Thomas Dumm describes Willy as lonely, alienated, and trapped in the struggle to succeed by having. But the life of having is empty. "Getting and spending we lay waste our powers. Little we see in nature that is ours." (Wordsworth)

Psychoanalyst Eric Fromm said that Western culture had promised us happiness through possessions, but that a life of getting, spending, and clutching had failed to deliver. It cuts us off from ourselves and reduces us to jumping through economic hoops. But we can live happily through participation in the dance of humanity. Fromm calls that "being." We develop the capacity for being through letting go of possessions and connecting with each other.

Gabriel Marcel says the problem is treating the world as something we can watch, dominate, possess, manipulate. He calls that "having." We can "have" our families as much as our homes. We stand one step removed from everything; using instead of celebrating.

Real life happens when we give ourselves away. It's as vulnerable as baby Ishmael because it is engaged with others, participating rather than controlling. It's surfing.

Jesus' disciples left everything to follow him. Eventually, they asked, "Now what will we get in return?" Jesus said, "Whoever finds his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake

will find it." The word translated as "life" is psyche. It means our core identity.

Communion is about plunging into a spontaneous flowing state of appreciation and gratitude. We place our gifts on God's altar to represent all we have and all we are. Our gifts are blessed, broken, and shared with one another. It is the exchange of having for being. We give ourselves to God and open our hearts to life.

Meister Eckhart said, "The person who is full of things is empty of God;

but the person who is empty of things is full of God." He also said, "No one ever gave so much of himself away that he did not have more to give."



Reflection Questions:

How does "having" mark the habits and values of your life? How do you practice "being" in the world rather than having? How has God opened your heart?






The Anglican service of Choral Evensong is one of its most treasured traditions. Come and worship in the beauty of candlelight and holiness on Sunday, November 1st.

Through the Season of Pentecost, we will use a different text for the core or *canon* of the Eucharistic Prayer, called Prayer 3 in Enriching Our Worship, an authorized supplement to our current Book of Common Prayer. It contains the same components as the familiar Rites I and II: praise, remembrance (*anamnesis*), offering (*oblation*), and invocation of the Holy Spirit (*epiclesis*).

Some of the imagery in Prayer 3 reflects ancient traditions in scripture depicting Jesus as Wisdom incarnate (1 Cor. 1:24), and God as giving birth to us in Creation (James 1:18).

The Memorial Acclamation is directed toward Jesus Christ, rather than talking about him, allowing us to declare to God our praise and our hope for his "coming in glory." The <u>EOW</u> preface reminds us that praying these different words helps us expand our vocabulary of how we acknowledge the magnitude of the mystery of the Holy One.

Let us listen closely to how God may manifest anew for us in these prayers!

The Heart of St. Francis of Assisi with Renaissance Florence and classical Rome Join Nativity's pilgrimage to Italy: May 26June 6, 2016

Father Andy Anderson and Academy International Travel lead this 12 day trip praying in the steps of St. Francis and St. Clare in Assisi other holy places significant to Francis. We begin our pilgrimage in Renaissance Florence and will explore Francis' impact upon the arts through seismic changes initiated in the church in the early 13th century inspired by Francis' life and ministry. Our pilgrimage's final stop is Rome where Francis's order was recognized in 1209 by Pope Innocent III. Departing from Huntsville on Thursday, May 26, we fly to Florence, returning to Huntsville from Rome on June 6. Father Anderson spent considerable time in Italy "chasing St. Francis" during his 2011 sabbatical. Francis' motivation to "rebuild" the church spiritually has been the focus of Andy's ministry since then after leading the parish in physically rebuilding Nativity's historic landmark church from 2007 to 2011.

Stewardship of Creation

"Good reasons to avoid bottled water": PART 1

It's expensive, wasteful and, contrary to popular belief, usually not any healthier for you than tap water. Most bottled water isn't any healthier than tap water, and the plastic bottles end up in landfills or oceans.

Marketers would have us believe that bottled water is healthy water. Just look at the labels or the bottled water ads: deep, pristine pools of spring water; majestic alpine peaks; healthy, active people gulping down icy bottled water between biking in the park and a trip to the yoga studio. In reality, most bottled water is just water. That fact isn't stopping people from buying a lot of it. Bottled water is big business. But in terms of sustainability, bottled water is costly, wasteful and distracts from the brass ring of public health: the construction and maintenance of safe municipal water systems.

Want some solid reasons to kick the bottled water habit? Here are some to get you started:

Bottled water is NOT a good value.

For example, the 20-ounce bottled water sold in vending machines with soft drinks, at the same price. Assuming you can find a \$1 machine, that dollar works out to 5 cents per ounce. The bottled water is filtered tap water, bottled close to their distribution point. Most municipal water costs less than 1 cent per gallon.

Huntsville Utilities recently provided the following:

DID YOU KNOW?

Estimated cost of a 20oz bottle of bottled water: \$1.59

1,000 gallons of HSV Utilities Award-Winning Water: \$1.30

Studies of bottled water have found that 22% of the brands tested contained levels of contaminants above state health limits. Plastic bottles (especially those labeled #1) can leach phthalates into the water, which can disrupt hormones in humans who consume it.

So, there's no guarantee that bottled water is safer or cleaner than water from the tap! And, up to 40% of bottled water comes from municipal water systems. That's water paid for by taxpayers and sold back to the public at a steeply inflated price!

Bottled water means garbage

Bottled water produces 1.5 million tons of plastic waste per year. According to Food and Water Watch, that plastic requires up to 47 million gallons of oil to produce. And while the plastic used to bottle beverages is in demand by recyclers, more than 4 of 5 plastic bottles are simply thrown away. That assumes empty bottles make it to a garbage can. Plastic waste is now at such a volume that vast eddies of current-bound plastic trash now spin endlessly in the world's major oceans. This represents a great risk to marine life, killing birds and fish that mistake our garbage for food.

Thanks to its slow decay rate, the vast majority of all plastics ever produced still exist — somewhere.

A study quoted on the WebMD News site cites when people buy bottled water, health is not usually their primary motivation, but rather the primary motivator is [simply their own] CONVENIENCE.

Something to think about: Somehow our parents managed to bring us up and keep us hydrated before there were such things as plastic water bottles!!


