Responding to the Prodigal Father's Love

This Sunday, we hear one of the most beloved readings from Holy Scripture. From Luke's Gospel, Jesus relays the parable of the loving father and his two sons, both of whom have lost any sense of their father's active, stretching, healing, forgiving, life-giving love and mercy.

This parable we typically refer to as the "Prodigal Son," is more the story of the Prodigal Father. For it is the father who is exceedingly extravagant, lavish, generous, profuse and yes, perhaps it seems, even wasteful, with the love offered to two undeserving children. The parable leaves us hanging as to what either son will do with the father's magnanimous gift. It begs the question: How will I respond to God's incredibly wide and generous love and mercy?

You and I receive a dose of God's lavish grace here at the Church of the Nativity. All are invited to come within these prayer-soaked walls and know the extravagant love of God in this place, kneeling where prayer has been valid. In our time of need, Nativity's prayers include us and those we love. Glorious music is offered to all as we worship in the beauty of holiness. At the altar we meet our prodigal God head-on in the life-giving food of the Eucharist, reminding us of Christ's great sacrifice for us and indeed, for the entire world.

In those times of our greatest need, the clergy and lay pastoral leaders of Nativity reach out, visiting us in the hospital and in our homes, praying with us, counseling us, and supporting us. When those we love move into God's nearer presence, the doors of this church are flung wide, embracing our families as we commit those dear to us to God's eternal care.

Nativity's life-giving opportunities for all ages include Church School classes, Bible Studies, EFM, Reunion Groups, Choirs, fellowship gatherings, and many other opportunities that build a strong community of love and support. Through our many outreach ministries, we discover a larger purpose as we work together to proclaim to the world that what we receive here.

And all of this is available and free to all for the taking. The prophet Isaiah invites everyone who thirsts to come to the waters...Jesus said, *Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink.* He promises to us that the water he gives will become a spring of the waters of life. All who are thirsty and hungry, weary and burdened are invited to come to him. Jesus refreshes us with life.



A Message from Bishop Sloan

You may have read in al.com a couple of weeks ago of an accusation of sexual misconduct made against a member of the Diocesan Staff in the 1980's who is now deceased. The Diocese of Alabama takes all such allegations seriously and engaged a company to conduct a full and independent investigation. Under the direction of the Diocese's law firm, a retired FBI agent has conducted and now concluded a comprehensive investigation, including documents where available and interviews with numerous people, including the source of the allegations and potential witnesses suggested.

I want to inform you that the investigation found that none of the allegations were substantiated or supported by any credible evidence. In the course of the investigation, one of the allegations was recanted, and other evidence and information has lead the investigator to report to us his conclusion that the alleged misconduct did not happen. While the investigation is complete, I invite you to pray for everyone concerned, especially for the families of the accused, and for victims of abuse.

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION

Here is food for thought if you are still looking for a Lenten discipline or, after reading the article, you begin to think of "possessions" in a new way.

Assya Barrette is an engineer and sustainability blogger who writes about how to live more environmentally sustainable lives. After her father died, she and her sisters had to clean out his apartment, and the experience changed her life. She then embarked on a project:

'I Went 200 Days Without Buying Anything New and Learned How Toxic Our Need for Possessions Is.'

"... It took weeks to clear out the lifetime of possessions in my single father's small apartment. Weeks to sell, donate, recycle, or throw out the boxes and boxes of kitchenware, clothing, furniture, office materials, and so much more. I threw away for a normal lifetime's worth of accumulation.

Time, money, and effort had been heavily invested in getting all of this stuff — only to be disposed of with great difficulty. People are destroying the planet for future generations, all so that we could enjoy a short lifetime full of material possessions that in many cases were hardly used, rarely necessary, and easily forgotten.

I decided that I didn't want this to be my 'normal.' And so I embarked on an experiment lasting 200 days where I would buy nothing new. Excluding groceries, medicine, and basic toiletries, I would borrow and <u>buy secondhand</u>, or simply go without.

Like many of us making a steady income, I'd never been very disciplined when it came to my purchases. If I could afford it — and even when I couldn't — I often just thought, 'Why not?'

So could I survive 200 days away from the mall? In fact, I could. And here is some of what I learned along the way:

Consumerism teaches us that it is good to accumulate for its own sake. That the world can endlessly supply us with all of the stuff we want. ... Here is the reality:

- We are not alone in the world What we buy and how much we buy impacts the world is so many ways. From sweatshops in Bangladesh producing clothing and goods, to forests destroyed to extract metals for our phones, to the destructive effect of plastic on our natural environment, the effects are devastating.
- We are not immortal When you die, you don't take what [the stuff] you bought to the grave. It stays behind for future generations to deal with.
- The earth is coming up to its limits of what she can provide We need to think of more collaborative and sustainable ways of getting what we need and want.

We need to fight consumerism. It inflicts deep spiritual wounds on our society. When everyone is buying so much all the time, there is no need to share and borrow. No need to fix things, or make quality items. No need to value old items.

My dad was an average consumer. Even still, there was just so much waste produced during his short lifetime that it struck me we are built to consume in industrialized societies was a form of extremism.

...I don't need that stuff. The truth is, some things you cannot find pre-owned. Lots of items, even common ones, are either impossible or impractical to find second-hand. When I was not buying new — even against my strongest impulses — I was surprised how nothing changed. Not my health, happiness, or inner harmony. I realized most things are just 'nice-to-haves'; real needs are more limited.

I felt that I had been made to bear witness to what consumerism means to people and the environment. I'd never truly understood its emotional, spiritual, and environmental costs until that experience."


