God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

"This week's story of crucifixion and resurrection is not a fairy tale" Easter 2016 message from Presiding Bishop Michael Curry

I actually love fairy tales and I used to enjoy reading them to our children when they were young and little. Now to be sure those were the more sanitized fairy tales but there was something good about them, a way of confronting what was tough in life with genuine hope. But they were fairy tales.

This week called Holy Week, the remembrance of Jesus entering Jerusalem and offering His life in the ultimate act of sacrificial love. Good Friday, the experience of betrayal, the experience of friends abandoning you, the experience of injustice and wrong, criminal self-centered conspiracies. And then beyond that Holy Week, the resurrection from the dead. This is not a fairy tale.

The truth is even as we speak this Holy Week, we do so not only in the shadow of the cross but we do so in the shadow of those who have been killed in Brussels, of those who have been wounded and maimed, of those who weep and mourn. And of a world mourning, and not too sure how to move forward. And this world does not need another fairy tale. This week's story of crucifixion and resurrection is not a fairy tale.

Some years ago in the last century George McLeod, the founder of the Iona Community, had fought in the First World War, a war that he came to realize was fought for no good reason. He eventually became ordained, and founded the Iona Community, and at one point he said this about this faith that we hold as followers of Jesus:

I simply argue that the cross be raised again at the centre of the marketplace as well as on the steeple of the church. I am recovering the claim that Jesus was not crucified in a cathedral between two candles, but on a cross between two thieves, on the town garbage dump, at a crossroads so cosmopolitan that they had to write his title in Hebrew, Latin and Greek. It was the kind of place where cynics talk smut, thieves curse, soldiers gamble. That's where he died. And that's where we as Christians ought to be and what we as Christians ought to be about.

This week called Holy, the season called Easter, the remembrance of death and the realization of resurrection, this is not a fairy tale, but the revelation of ultimate reality. Now the truth is it's easy to dismiss or discount whether by conscious conviction or by unconscious resignation to dismiss this as naïve, nice, but naïve. It's easy to dismiss it whether consciously or unconsciously as a great hope, a wonderful ideal, but not realistic in a world like this. Maybe, parts of us I suspect wonder, maybe the strong do survive, maybe might does make right, maybe you better look out for number one. I suspect we all share those feelings once in a while.

But, I have to ask myself a question. It's not my question, it's Dr. Phil's, "How's that workin' out for ya?" How's that workin' out for the world? The truth is, the way the world very often operates is not working out. It's not sustainable. It's not the way to life. Jesus has shown us the way. He has shown us that unselfish, sacrificial love, love of God, and love of the other, is the way to life. That, my friends, is the ultimate reality. And that's not a fairy tale.

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION Harvey Cotten offers some important springtime tips

Lawns and gardens are waking up and growing with reckless abandon. How do we keep up with this amazing transformation? What tasks we should be doing now?

LAWNS

- Spring is when warm season grasses like Bermuda,
 Zoysia and Centipede begin to grow actively.
- Wait until the grass has been mown at least once before fertilizing a warm-season grass.
- Use a slow release fertilizer, high in nitrogen (the first number on the bag) that is made for turf.
- The first fertilizer application is the most important, to get the turf off to a good start.

Mow the grass low to start (this removes all the old dead grass blades) and then gradually raise the mowing height as the temperature climbs during the summer. Mowing this way puts much less stress on the grass and helps control weeds by shading the soil, thus slowing down germination from weed seeds.

Always use a sharp blade, to 'cut', not 'tear', the blades of grass.

Harvey recommends the practice of core aeration – the removal of plugs throughout the lawn allowing the lawn to breathe and eliminating compaction. By aerating the lawn, roots are better able to grow; water and fertilizer move through the soil profile more efficiently,

and drainage is improved. With heavy clay soils of our area, this practice provides great benefits to the turf.

Harvey also stresses the importance of good watering practices. With automatic irrigation systems, it is easy to become lazy because 'the system' is working. It is better to water ONLY WHEN THE GRASS NEEDS IT, and this changes throughout the year. Water deeply with each watering, and it is best to water before 9 am.

FLOWER GARDENING

In the flower garden, mulching, fertilizing, and pruning is at hand.

Prune those shrubs THAT HAVE JUST FINISHED FLOWERING, plants like azalea, forsythia, spiraea, quince, and camellia.

In shrub beds, fertilizing with an organic fertilizer accomplishes two important functions: it provides nutrients over an extended time, and it helps build up the micro-organisms found in the soil. One might say it is a way to "feed the soil" that will take care of your plants. Harvey emphasizes the importance of doing everything we can to make the soil more vibrant and alive - with healthy soil comes healthy plants.

MULCHING

Harvey stresses that mulching is a necessary task that we all must do in the south. It provides many benefits including aesthetic; he says "It is like a fresh coat of paint on a house." He recommends using pine straw or pine bark as mulch. Both work well, but if one has a slope to deal with, pine straw is better because it tends to stay in place after a heavy rain. Regardless of which mulch you

use, make sure you only put down two to three inches and never pile it up against the trunks of trees or the stems of shrubs – NO MULCH VOLCANOES PLEASE.

NEW PLANTS

Remember to regularly water any newly installed plants. The first year is the most critical in getting them established. Many plants are drought tolerant, but they must be allowed to settle in and have their roots grow into the native soil before they can fend for themselves. Be extra attentive for the first growing season and it will pay dividends.




