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From the Rector

<u>September 4th book</u>: Sisters in Law: How Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsberg Went to the Supreme Court and Changed the World by Linda Hirshman. The relationship between Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg—Republican and Democrat, Christian and Jew, Western rancher's daughter and Brooklyn girl—transcends party, religion, region, and culture. Strengthened by each other's presence, these groundbreaking judges, the first and second woman to serve on the highest court in the land, have transformed the Constitution and America itself, making it a more equal place for all women.

October 7th book: Dead Wake...The Last Crossing of the Lusitania by Erik Larson. It is a story that many of us think we know but don't, and Erik Larson tells it thrillingly, switching between hunter and hunted while painting a larger portrait of America at the height of the Progressive Era. You know the outcome, but it is a well-written book that is difficult to put down.

Tuesday Evening Discussion Group

We have begun the second session of Tuesday Evening Gatherings. These sessions follow the format of a pre-study light repast (please bring an appetizer, salad, casserole, salad, or dessert to share) from 5:30 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. followed by a 30-minute DVD and discussion of what we watched. Great books are the subject matter. Next Chapter Update

Since our last report, contracts and permits for the city sewer installation have been signed, and we expect work to begin within the next few weeks. This should be completed well before winter weather sets in.



With regard to the Parish Hall project, we have spoken with a number of contractors and find that many of them do not do competitive bids any more. They prefer to work with a client toward what can best be described as a "negotiated bid" where both parties work to bring the scope of a project to a mutually agreeable budget. Members of the Committee and our architects interviewed three companies on August 12: a large firm from Greenville, SC, a medium firm from Shelby, NC, and a small firm from Hendersonville, NC. After careful deliberation and due diligence, we have chosen to begin discussions with Strickland Construction of Shelby. Theirs is a fourth-generation family firm that has done church and other construction projects as close as Columbus and Tryon, and they seem eager to expand into our area. Strickland staff will take two to three weeks to examine our plans and make suggestions, and then work with us toward a "negotiated bid." If we cannot come to an agreement with them, we are free to move on to other discussions.

The Committee appreciates your continued understanding, support, and prayers. As the parish enters its annual fall Stewardship Campaign, the Committee will remain busy but not actively solicit. The annual budget has many pressing needs. However, I am convinced we can run and fly at the same time!
