Advent Stewards

I love this season of Advent with its messages of yearning and hopeful expectation; of God's reign we are called to embrace because God embraces us; and especially of God's light in Christ always piercing the darkness. We are blessed to have the season of Advent to center us. Especially after our bitter political season, the season of Advent is a gift helping us know hope. And so with all gifts God blesses us, how will we be Advent stewards?

An important question because the culture around has pushed the fast-forward button and we are reeling ahead to Christmas. Christmas carols have been blaring since before Halloween. Christmas trees have been decorated and lit weeks before Thanksgiving. And instead of God's Kingdom being the focus, materialism and consumerism engulf us. With all the wonderful and frenetic demands upon us, we can easily lose sight of the season of Advent and its pregnant hope of God's reign always coming into our lives and world.

Advent calls God's people to pay attention, to slow down and simplify. Nativity's emphasis on spiritual growth through year round stewardship reminds us to step back from the culture's consumerism and materialism so prevalent at this time. Easier said than done, right?

So let me recommend a wonderful little book that came out in the 90's that I have taught in other parishes: *Unplug the Christmas Machine* by Jo Robinson and Jean Staeheli. This accessible book helps reduce the stress and increase the season's enjoyment by suggesting you make simple changes in your Christmas preparations and celebration. The authors encourage readers to examine their current practices, define their values, and then combine all their insights into a workable plan for the coming holiday season.

The ideas expressed challenge the way our consumer society continues to usurp our holy days and to exploit people and the environment. We *can* experience the joy that comes from celebrating and living in ways that affirm all. In Advent, before we run up credit card bills and have January regrets from over-spending, we can evaluate our relationship with money and spending and talk about these things in our households.

Although none of us can, in all probability, stop "the Christmas machine," we can at least take some time to get perspective and slow down. We can pay attention to Advent even if we feel compelled (and for some good reasons, too) to get our Christmas trees up prior to Christmas Eve! One way to give attention to Advent is to light your Advent wreath at family meals and use the Advent at Home booklet provided by our Children's Christian Formation ministry.

This Advent you can establish a holy routine of reaching out to others in need—a good routine to develop year round. As we will hear from our readings this coming Sunday, God's reign is breaking into this world as we reach out to the poor, the hungry, the sick, the stranger and the lonely. Beginning the church year, Advent sets the pace for our journey in the months ahead. Can you slow down and pay attention? Take a few minutes each day to sit still and be quiet and pray. This Advent make spiritual New Year's resolutions.

As Advent Stewards, may we claim our hope found, not in consumerism and materialism nor in political agendas, but in God's reign in Christ. Setting our fears aside and welcoming God's kingdom into our own lives, we discover a holy perspective that locates all humanity in the embrace of a loving and caring God...a God who is revealed in Jesus, the vulnerable babe of Bethlehem, whose birth we celebrate at Christmas and whose presence comes again into the lives of those who choose to be stewards of God's life and blessings.



What Are You Reading? When the Heart Waits by Sue Monk Kidd Contributed by: Marcie Wingo

When the Heart Waits by Sue Monk Kidd was written in 1990 before Kidd's book The Secret Life of Bees was published. During one of our women's retreats at Sewanee our guest speaker mentioned When the Heart Waits. Since then it has become one of my favorite books, one that I have re- read many times. Sue Monk Kidd wrote this autobiography because of her own life crisis.



Sue Monk Kidd quotes Kierkegaard, Henri Nouwen, Joseph Campbell, Thomas Merton and T.S. Eliot and other spiritual writers and poets along her journey.

We probably all question our lives whether we challenge our purpose, confront our darkest nights, futility or our mortality. I feel I was invited to look over Kidd's shoulder as she compares her life to a chrysalis. The chrysalis is a metaphor for her soul transformed inside a cocoon. The chrysalis is unable to escape the dark night because of the wait, requiring stillness.

But stillness also means healing. Once the chrysalis is ready to emerge the soul has healed and the beautiful butterfly is able to fly. The butterfly cannot be forced to emerge because it's wings would not be fully developed. So too, our own souls cannot fly without compassion, forgiveness, and patience.

Among Kidd's own quotes this is one of my favorites.

"I've tried to grapple with the sacred questions of life, with the journey and mystery of the human soul as it grows spiritually, moving through passages most have forgotten exist. You'll find me talking a lot about waiting, for in many ways waiting is the missing link in the transformation process. I'm not referring to waiting as we're accustomed to it, but waiting as the passionate and contemplative crucible in which new life and spiritual wholeness can be birthed."

I hope you find joy in this book

As we move through Advent, let us THINK about our actions, our purchasing decisions, our use (or abuse) of natural resources, our gift-giving practices, our attention (or lack of attention) to the impact of doing things *only for convenience* and without consideration for the longer-term effects of our actions, the influence those decisions have on the children in our lives, and the environmental impact we have, for good or for bad.

As participants in Stewardship of Creation, we encourage one another, share our knowledge with one another and rejoice in each person's efforts to care for God's creation, because God is praised through every good work however small! The words above are the "why." Now, here is "how": We have been blessed during the last week to again have RAIN but we can't forget the drought and the scary lack of water many people have been facing, both those who live near us and many who are far away.

One of the most important and, in some places, scarce resources on earth is water. It is easy for those of us who live near the Tennessee River to forget that fact!

If every Nativity household would do some or all of the familiar water-saving steps listed below, we —the members of this parish- can save gallons and gallons and gallons of water as well as saving money.

(Did you know that water consumption charges increase with higher volumes of usage!)



There are a number of ways to save water, and they all start with you!

- Dishwashers typically use less water than washing dishes by hand. Now, Energy Star dishwashers save even more water and energy. When shopping for a new dishwasher, use the <u>Consortium for Energy</u> <u>Efficiency website</u> to compare water use between models.
- If your dishwasher is new, cut back on pre-rinsing.
 Newer models clean more thoroughly than older ones.
- Designate one glass for your drinking water each day, or refill a reusable water bottle. This will cut down on the number of glasses to wash.
- Soak pots and pans instead of letting the water run while you scrape them clean. Why fight to get something clean when a little soaking will make the job easy.
- If washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run. Fill one basin with wash water and the other with rinse water, or at least do not let the water run the whole time you are washing the dishes. Run water only to rinse after the dishes are washed.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Instead, compost vegetable food waste and <u>save gallons</u> <u>every time</u>.
- Don't use running water to thaw food. For water efficiency and food safety, defrost food in the refrigerator.
- Reuse leftover water from cooked or steamed foods to start a nutritious soup; just keep a "soup jar" in the freezer and add to it, thaw when you're ready to make soup; it's also one more way to get 8 glasses of water a day.
- If you accidentally drop ice cubes, don't throw them in the sink. Drop them in a house plant instead.
- Collect the water you use while rinsing fruit and vegetables. Use it to water house plants.

Do one thing every day to save water (and your money!)
Every person can make a difference.


