
Presiding Bishop Michael Curry's Christmas Message

From Isaiah Chapter 9:

For unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government shall be upon His shoulder; and His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

These words of Isaiah are often seen as words that foretell and foreshadow the coming of Jesus of Nazareth, born of Mary. The truth is, these words befit Him because this child changed the world. This child changes lives. This child changes us.

I remember when our oldest daughter was a baby. My wife and I were young. We were footloose and fancy-free. It was just the two of us newlyweds, so if we wanted to go out to eat dinner, we went out to



And then, all of a sudden, this little, innocent human being, a little child, came into our lives, and literally gained control over our entire world. Before we could do anything else we had to think about, "Who's going to keep the baby?" or "Is this a good time for us to go without the baby?" We soon learned that we were not in control of our lives anymore. Even our sleeping patterns became very different. We would stay awake when the baby was awake and we went to sleep when the baby went to sleep. Literally this child began to control our lives and the child didn't even know she was doing it. And then we had a second one she did the exact same thing. And I've since learned that that's what babies do. When they arrive they take over! And their parents begin to develop their lives around this child. To mold their entire lives around this precious needy baby.

Isaiah wrote, "Unto us a child is born, unto us a Son is given... and His name will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." This child who was born of Mary changes everything. This child born in a manger, wrapped in swaddling clothes changes how we live. This child born to the sound of angels singing Gloria in excelcis Deo this child to whom the wise ones came from afar bearing gifts — this child, changed the way the entire world works.

And this Jesus, born into a world torn by strife and hatred and division and pain and poverty, this child is born anew wherever men and women say, "I'll follow Him. I'll follow Him as my Savior. I'll follow Him as my Lord."

When this child grew up, He said His reason for coming, again quoting Isaiah, from the 61st chapter, he said,

The spirit of the Lord is upon Me, because He has anointed Me to preach Good News to the poor, to proclaim release to the captives, the recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty all those who are oppressed, and to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord.

This child, when He grew up, came to show us the way to live lives of love, lives of compassion, lives of goodness, lives of kindness, lives of justice. This child came to show us how to change the world. So this Christmas, make room for him to change us. This Christmas help us change the world. And make a new commitment, to go out from this day, to let this Christmas Day, be the first day of a new world.

God bless you. God keep you. Have a blessed Christmas. A Happy New Year. And go on out and change the world!

A Christmas Message from Bishop Kee Sloan



It's one of our favorite stories, still compelling after all these years: Joseph and Mary, expecting their first child, are required by the politics of the day to leave their home in Nazareth of Galilee and go to his family's hometown, little Bethlehem in Judea. It was something they had to do, something about a census, something beyond their control. And while they were there, the child was born. They had no place to stay, so they wrapped their new son in what cloths they could, and laid him in a trough used to feed the animals.

It's compelling in its ordinariness, in its humanity: they're caught up in something they didn't choose and while they are making the best of difficult situations, in the middle of

all that turmoil and uncertainty, a child was born. Like the birth of most children, it was at the same time completely ordinary and altogether extraordinary, routinely miraculous.

As the story goes on, as we combine and join together different traditions and narratives, angels appear to shepherds watching their flocks to sing about good news of great joy for all the people, and then a few days later mysterious strangers come from the faraway East to bring extravagant gifts. The neighbors must have wondered what in the world was going on.

But Mary knew. Joseph knew. They couldn't have known the end of the story, but they knew the beginning, that Mary had given birth not to Joseph's son, but - incredibly - to the Son of God.

Into the darkness, into the ordinary, into the confusion and strife of the world Jesus was born and laid in a manger. The Word of God became flesh, the limitless extraordinary invaded the mundane complacent everyday, and the Light of Christ pushed the crowding darkness back.

We are invited into the mystery of the Incarnation of Almighty God, to come and behold the infant King, to sing with the angels, to wonder with the shepherds, to offer our gifts alongside the wise of the far-flung world. We are invited to take up the Light of Jesus the Messiah and shine it into the darkest corners of our lives and of this world. The Light of Christ, born so long ago in little Bethlehem, still shines when we hold it up in our faith in Jesus Christ, in the hope of the Spirit of God, and in the joyful forgiving love of our gracious God.

I hope you and yours have a wonderful, beautiful and meaningful Christmas.

RENOWNED ICONOGRAPHER ELIAS KATSAROS GIVES ICON TO CHURCH OF THE NATIVITY

Shortly before Christmas, Huntsville iconographer Elias Katsaros who is well known across the United States for his beautiful Byzantine Iconography, made a gift of the icon of Christ Pantocrator to the Church of the Nativity in thanksgiving to God for our mission and ministry and commitment to worshipping "in the beauty of holiness."



Katsaros and his wife Elaine presented the beautiful icon to Rector Andy Anderson along with Nativity parishioner and Huntsville artist Helen Vaughn, to whom Katsaros is grateful for her artistic endeavors and inspiration, especially in connecting art and spirituality. In 2014, Helen was co-chair of Nativity's Icons in Transformation art exhibit and Mr. Katsaros was a featured speaker. The Church of Nativity's recognition of iconography as a pathway to the holy and prayer resource is another reason the icon was given to Nativity.

Elias Katsaros was born of Greek parentage in Istanbul, Turkey and moved to Athens, Greece at the age of 19 where he attended the Art Institute of Athens. He spent five years studying art, including the basics of the Byzantine technique of writing (painting) icons. Moving to the

United States in 1969, he continued to study Byzantine Iconography in New York before moving to Huntsville where he established his studio with his wife Elaine. His work is found in churches across the United States. After 45 years of painting murals and filling churches with Byzantine Iconography, Elias retired in 2016. He now only offers his work as gifts, and Nativity is the first recipient of his artistic generosity.

The icon of Christ Pantocrator (or *Christos Pantokrator* in the Greek) is one of the most widely used religious images of Orthodox Christianity. In Medieval eastern church art and architecture, an <u>iconic</u> mosaic or fresco of Christ Pantocrator occupies the space in the central dome of the church, in the half-dome of the <u>apse</u> or on the nave vault. The image of Christ Pantocrator was one of the first <u>images of Christ</u> developed in the Early Christian Church and remains a central icon of the Eastern Orthodox Church. In the half-length image, Christ holds the New Testament in his left hand and makes the gesture of teaching or of blessing with his right. The most common translation of *Pantokrator* is "Almighty" or "All-powerful." In this understanding, *Pantokrator* is a compound word formed from the Greek words $\pi \tilde{\alpha} s$, pas (GEN $\pi \alpha v v \dot{s} s$), i.e. "all" and $\kappa p \dot{\alpha} \tau o s$, i.e. "strength," "might," "power." Another, more literal translation is "Judge of All," or "Ruler of All" or, less literally, "Sustainer of the World". In this understanding, Pantocrator is a compound word formed from the Greek for "all" and the verb meaning "To accomplish something" or "to sustain something" ($\kappa \rho \alpha \tau \dot{s} v$), $\kappa v \dot{s} v$). In the *Christos Pantokrator* icon, the name of Christ is written on each side of the halo, as IC and XC. Christ's fingers are depicted in a pose that represents the letters IC, X and C, thereby making the <u>Christogram ICXC</u> (for "Jesus Christ"). The IC is composed of the Greek characters iota (I) and <u>lunate</u> sigma (C; instead of Σ , s)—the first and last letters of 'Jesus' in Greek (I $\eta \sigma o \tilde{s}$); in XC the letters are chi (X) and again the lunate sigma—the first and last letters of 'Christ' in Greek (X $\rho \iota o v v$). In many cases, Christ has a cruciform halo inscribed with the letters O Ω N, i.e. $\dot{\sigma} v$ "He Who Is".

The Pantocrator, largely an Eastern theological conception, is less common by that name in Western Christianity. In the West the equivalent image in art is known as *Christ in Majesty*, which developed differently. The typical Western *Christ in Majesty* is a full-length icon that usually shows Christ holding an orb symbolic of the world, again with hand held out in blessing. This image occupies the central apse window behind the altar at the Church of the Nativity. Nativity's first Icon was presented in 1998, *Our Lady of Kazan*, and will adorn the soon to be completed expanded **Lady Chapel** as a focal point for prayer. In 2008, a mid-19th century icon of the Nativity was acquired in Bethlehem and was blessed at the original Church of the Nativity in Bethlehem and is located in the Sanctuary as the primary icon bearing our parish church's founding and naming image. The Flower Guild and other donors presented Nativity with a modern interpretation of iconography by artist Ludmilla Pavlovski after our Icons in Transformation exhibit in 2014. Utilized as a pathway to prayer and spiritual devotion and theological understanding, icons are used in many Episcopal and Anglican Communion churches to draw people into God's holiness and the story of redemption they portray. Icons either tell a story or explain an important theological premise (usually both!) and therefore they are "written," not painted.

STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION Care for Creation thoughts and tips as we begin the new year

Creation provides us with the physical fabric of our lives; the natural environment gives us the stuff we use every day. It gives us the food for our tables, the material for our clothes and the materials to build our houses and churches. It is also a place where people have experienced a great closeness with God through its beauty and wonder. Creation is a gift from God and provides us with these things, the basics for our lives, yet it can so easily and so often be taken for granted.

Respect for human life means respecting all of God's creation. We must re-engage with our environment and take responsibility for it; live sustainably, live so that there are enough resources for everyone.

"Creation is not a property, which we can rule over at will; or, even less, is the property of only a few: Creation is a gift, it is a wonderful gift that God has given us, so that we care for it and we use it for the benefit of all, always with great respect and gratitude."

Tips to make life greener

We all want to care for the planet, but can't do everything at once. Here are a few tips to think about. Some can be done today, some this month, and some are not for you. Everyone can do something!

- Lights Out turn the lights off when you leave the room. It is a myth that they use more energy to start back up. A fluorescent light bulb left on for 15 minutes uses 500 times more energy than it would if switched off when not needed. And remember to use low energy light bulbs!
- **Second Chance Plastic** For the times your purchases end up in plastic bags, put the bags to good use by using them instead of bubble wrap for packing material. See if your local charity shops would like surplus bags, and get into the habit of taking a re-useable bag next time you go shopping.

- Are you a bookworm? Instead of buying new books, start a book-sharing club with friends and colleagues or buy books from The Friends of the Library book store. Sharing books saves resources and money, and can improve your social life! Buying books at The Friends store supports the book funds for the public library!
- Do you need it? It is almost always better to use something that you already have than to buy something new, even if the new item is a 'green' product. Doing more with less is not the same as doing without! Ask yourself: Do I really need it now? Do I have it already? Is there something else I could use instead? Could I borrow it? How much can I save by not getting it? What would it really add to my life?
- **Get "unplugged"** One night a month, don't use any electricity for phones, video games, cooking, etc. Instead, play board games, eat raw food, play music with real instruments or simply talk to those with whom you share your home.
- Happy hens. Far too many laying hens live their lives in miserable conditions. You can make a difference by buying for your eggs from local producers at the Greene Street Market Store, or other sources of locally raised eggs or opting for grocerystore eggs labeled "humanely-raised & organic."
- Time for a cuppa? Use real cups/mugs at work or church or club. Reduce the billions of polystyrene cups that end up in landfill sites, or, here in Huntsville, going into the air your family breathes when the polystyrene is incinerated.

As you consider these and other ways to show your care for those around you and for God's creation, remember:




