Dear Nativity Family,

The Vestry would like to inform you of our actions as part of the search for the 12th Rector of the Church of the Nativity.

The Spiritual Development Committee (SDC) has agreed to create a nomination form that will be used to identify parishioners to serve on the Self-Study Committee and the Discernment Committee. A parishioner may self-nominate (i.e., volunteer) or nominate other parishioners to serve on these committees.


Using input from the Diocese, the SDC will develop the nomination form. This form will reflect the specific needs of Nativity. Heavy emphasis will be placed on the spiritual aspects and qualities required of individuals desiring to serve on these two very important committees. The SDC will submit the nomination form to the Vestry for approval on October 17.

On **November 12**, at the Annual Parish Meeting, nomination forms will be made available throughout the church. On **November 13**, a link to an online version of the nomination form will be available on the website. The nomination form will also be included in the November 22 Steeple. After much prayerful consideration, parishioners should submit completed nomination forms no later than **November 30**. Nomination forms should be placed in clearly marked boxes in the church office and the breezeway outside the Mary Chapel entrance. Electronic versions may be emailed to communications@nativity-hsv.org. If a parishioner previously made a nomination via telephone, a follow-up paper or electronic nomination form must be completed and submitted by **November 30** in order to be considered for participation.

After November 30, the Vestry will review all nomination forms received and will choose the members and chairs to serve on the committees. The respective chair of each committee will notify its members by **December 31**.

The search process is being coordinated around the fall annual stewardship campaign which culminates at the Annual Parish meeting on **November 12**. We, Nativity parishioners, must not be distracted from the important work of providing financial support for the church, our missions in the greater Huntsville community, our Diocese, and the world. The Vestry looks forward to completing this important work in December, and continuing the process of calling the 12th rector to the Church of the Nativity.

October 31, 2017 marks the 500th anniversary of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation. One of Martin Luther's greatest contributions to the church is the large number of hymns and tunes that we still sing today. Later in the 18th century, Johann Sebastian Bach harmonized a vast number of these tunes and other Reformation chorales for congregational singing (see hymn 174, 309, 688, etc.) but also in his two passions (St. Matthew and St. John). Bach's contribution to world of church music is one of the largest and most important. Not only did he write harmonizations of chorales, a sacred cantata for every week of the liturgical year, and chorale preludes, he composed free works for organ that include his preludes and fugues. In addition to singing several of these chorales that are either Martin Luther original or results of the Reformation during the month of October, I will be playing a Prelude and Fugue of Bach's once a month as a nod to this historic event in Protestant church history and to pay homage to two of the greatest contributors

to sacred music.

Verger's at Nativity- Prentice White and Terry Clevenger

Verger's – we see them at every service held at our church. We've come to realize that our services do not start or end without them, but few of us know anything about the powerful lay ministry of our faithful Vergers, Prentice White and Terry Clevenger.

In the Episcopal church Vergers are committed lay assistants with a special calling to the Order and conduct of the church's liturgy, reporting directly to the clergy and carry out a liturgical style directed by the clergy as do the Altar Guild, Acolytes, Lay Readers, LEMS, Sextons, Musicians and other lay participants of the liturgy.


As Vergers they are the protectors of the Procession and are the first person in the Procession followed by the Crucifer, Acolytes, Choir and Ministers.



The Verger's basic vestment is a black cassock with a sleeveless gown covered by a chimere typically in gray, purple or black. Vergers carry a "virge" which is a staff of office carried in the Procession.

<u>Exciting Verger News</u>. Terry Clevenger has been a Verger-In-Training for the past year under the tutelage of Prentice White, our Head Verger, and the direction of the Vergers Guild of the Episcopal Church. He has completed the one year course study which was approved by Rev. Dr. Andy Anderson and the Vergers Guild which concurred with Father Anderson's recommendation that Terry be accepted as a Member of the Vergers Guild. 


What are You Reading? - *Sapiens*By: Yuval Noah Harari Contributed by: Paul Bonner

"...Then the eyes of both of them were opened and they discovered that they were naked: So they stitched fig-leaves together and made themselves loincloths."

Genesis Chapter 3 Verse 7

I have always been fascinated with the Creation Story in *Genesis* especially from a secular perspective. Yes, the core of the story is spiritual, but I have always admired the logical intuitive conclusions that set in place the order of events meant to explain who, what and why we are.



As I read *Sapiens* by Yuvakl Noah Harari, I became even more impressed with the skills of observation that led to what we now see as the Creation Story. In Sapiens, Harari takes a straightforward look at the events and environments that resulted in who we are as Homo Sapiens today. He identifies four major developments: The Cognitive Revolution, where human kind developed tools and organizational practices that eventually led homo sapiens to become the sole human species dominating the planet; The Agricultural Revolution, where humans began to identify ownership through agriculture leading to the development of wealth, cultural identification, poverty and conflict; The Unification of Humankind, brought about through migration around the globe and the technologies that made contact among cultures more and more frequent; and The Scientific Revolution that has resulted in a technological expansion where rapid acceleration of technology has brought an existential element to the future of human kind.

In *Genesis*, the *Bible* identifies epochal events that lead to the constant ecological and economic conflict that has become our human condition. In Sapiens, Harari goes into great deal explaining what we know of that history through scientific study and anthropological scholarship. Be warned, Harari is an atheist, who does not write kindly of the development and justification for Religion which he claims was a product of the Agricultural Revolution that began around 12,000 years ago. Being a believer, however, I found Sapiens to be an affirmation of my understanding and admiration of Genesis as a tool to explain how God works in our world.

I find that reading intellectual perspectives that dismiss God often provide a logical explanation of God's work in the world. I once heard Billy Graham say that learning of an expanded Universe was not to him a denial of God, but recognition of the vastness that many suspected all along. The experiential expansion of the human understanding of our connectedness, our world, and even our universe not only heightens our separation from God, but our dependence


on the spiritual journey.
