Minutes - November 18, 2015



- 1. <u>Call to Order-</u> Moeller called the meeting to order at 11:05am

3. Approval of 9/16/15 & 10/21/15 Minutes-

Motion: Chad LeRoux, supported by Eddie Tadlock, moved approval of the September16, 2015 and October 21, 2015 minutes as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

4. <u>Meeting Purpose-</u>

Moeller took a moment to give an overview of the meeting agenda. Moeller explained that DGRI Diversity and Inclusion efforts and Community Engagement efforts were the main focus of the meeting.

5. Downtown Census-

Rotondaro presented the Downtown Census Project. He said that the project overviews a baseline estimate of the downtown residential population, data acquisition, and benchmarking in the DGRI region. Rotondaro explained how data was collected from a variety of populations linked to ethnicity, work, transit, housing, growth, and more. He added that the data is compared from all



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sources and will be used to target city block outreach efforts. Van Driel said that the information is helpful for the Alliance working groups and their marketing targets. Rotondaro stated that data is evolving and being used across the Alliances and DGRI staff. Moeller asked if there was data being collected in regards to preferred communication outreach. Rotondaro said that he will be getting information on the best way to accomplish outreach efforts based on census data.

6. DGRI Outreach and Engagement-Organization and Events-

Guy overviewed the importance and focus on additional inclusion, equity and diversity outreach efforts. He added that progress has already been made, and more are to come with the addition of LaTarro Traylor to focus on this goal. Guy said that Traylor works on diversity through event programming, workforce, and community engagement. Traylor said that there was an event matrix on each table, which listed organizations and events aimed towards inclusion, equity, and diversity. She said that the matrix puts these organization and events on our radar to start planning months ahead with appropriate support where needed. Traylor added that DGRI aims to be a resource to positively connect intentionally and impactfully, by collaborating and building new relationships. She said that Gustavo Rotondaro's census data and the GR Forward Plan are helping to outline this goal. Traylor asked the Alliance to add any events or organizations to the matrix, explaining that is an ongoing and growing list. Buller asked for an example of support given related to this goal and matrix. Traylor said that LLS reached out to DGRI for sponsorship, and she offered supplies for the kid's games rather than a monetary contribution. She explained that this allowed DGRI to be present at the event and helped make the event successful. Traylor said that the Boy Scouts of America luncheon was another example of support given, by buying a table at the event and inviting community members to see other professional works. She said that people and groups that are looking to diversity boards ask her for a point of connection. She added that there are other ways to help support these efforts besides just monetary, by being an overall leader in engagement and a helpful resource. Moeller suggested adding events that DGRI is currently involved in or working on, like Tate of Soul to the list.

*Alliance brainstormed events they know of amongst themselves.

Event Calendar - Data Entry, Notable Anniversaries:

Van Driel said that Broomball is happening this year, and currently has the best registration in its history. She said this event will activate Rosa Parks on every Monday and Tuesday night during the winter season. Van Driel added that the GR Forward Plan needs one more approval, from the City Commissions Office. She said that Tim Kelly received all of the Calder Plaza RFP applications, and a steering committee will be assembled to help with the selection process. Van Driel asked if anyone from the Alliance was interested in being on the committee to let her know.

7. DGRI Staff Update-



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Traylor stated that the Beer, Wine and Food Festival, along with the Antique Fair, kick off this weekend at DeVos Place. Moeller asked if DGRI will have a presence at the Festival. Traylor said not professionally but some will be in attendance.

Buller said that the holiday lights are being put up all over downtown continuously. She added that there was a slight delay, but all of the lights will be up by December 3rd for Holiday Tree lighting and the opening of Rosa Parks Circle ice skating. Buller said that Window Wonderland voting is happening currently. She added that Grand Caroling will take place on all Friday's in December, and that Holiday's Cheer will be in multiple places in downtown throughout the season. Buller said that Valent-ICE is coming up as well, but will not be marketed strongly until mid-December. Van Driel said that starting December 18, DGRI and the UICA will offer five free holiday movies, first come first serve, to encourage the first round of Movie's in the Park voting. She added that impact results will be in soon. Moosbrugger asked if there would be a free parking incentive this year, similar to other years. Buller said that she is working on getting the parking to encourage shoppers

3. Approval of Minutes:

Van Driel moved the approval of November meeting minutes to next month.

4. <u>Meeting Purpose</u>:

Van Driel went over the meeting purpose, starting with Kelly's presentation to discuss how the Alliance can contribute to the GR Forward initiatives.

- Presentation on the final GR Forward Plan's initiative to understand how they align with AFV initiatives in 2016
- ii. Discussion on the Calder Plaza Re-design
 - Winter Programming Updates/Outcomes on WWL, Décor, and Valent-ICE



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5. GR Forward Plan:

Kelly briefly went over the GR Forward Goals and transition up until its final approval by the City Commission on December 15, 2015. Kelly said that the public comment period on the draft plan lasted seventy-three (73) days due to high public interest. Kelly explained how public comments were incorporated into the final draft of the plan. Kelly said that most of the one hundred and nighty four (194) actionable comments focused on Inclusion & Equity and concerns from the Rowing Community. Kelly went over specific changes that occurred due to these actionable comments, including: housing efforts, arts and culture, formatting, and diversity inclusion and equity. Kelly added that there were six specific, actionable goals focused on diversity, inclusion, and equity efforts. Kelly said that DGRI will use partner support, incentive programs, and the Alliances moving forward. Kelly added that some partners have already signed up to help with implementation, including volunteers. Kelly explained the implementation matrix that divides tasks into completion timeline and partners. Kelly explained he will be breaking down this matrix to create specific work items for each alliance to work on as the budgeting decisions are around the corner. Kelly added that the goal in the next month is to help with the budgeting process by showing main implementation goals specific to the Alliance.

6. <u>Calder Plaza Re-design Update</u>:

Kelly explained that the project is transitioning into the consultant hiring phase to create specific plans for the Calder Plaza area. Kelly said the Calder Plaza steering committee chose four (4) teams to interview in the next two weeks. He added that the planning of the project will be complete in six to eight months, with input from the City and County to ensure all considerations are addressed. Kelly said once a contractor is chosen, the committee can work with existing events to determine how the Alliance can contribute. Korn asked if the final planning will be done by end of summer 2016. Kelly responded yes, followed by a bid for the project and funding allocation. Kelly added the nature of the project will dictate the timeline of construction, but it is aimed for 2017.

7. Winter Programming Update:

Buller said that Window Wonderland was over and a success. Buller explained that the event featured window art displays created by Kendall College students that partnered with local businesses. Buller added that public voting was through our CRM program which allowed information to be gathered about voters. Buller then showed the winners of Window Wonderland. Buller said that there was some investment into the Downtown Holiday Décor, which will continue throughout the winter season. Buller explained that the tree lighting was possible by working with local partners in the community, which also launched ice skating in Rosa Parks Circle. Buller said that the numerous caroling events had a good turnout in the community, and the event will return in the 2016 season. Buller said Valent-ICE was currently underway, with voting on designs open today. She added that forty-one (41) venues are



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participating thus far, exceeding the number last year. Buller explained that all of the sculptures will be unveiled on February 12, and the most popular vote will be announced on February 13. Buller added that the Downtown Market is creating an ice lounge during the weekend of Valent-ICE, featuring happy hours and activities each day. Buller said professional photographers will be available to capture moments on February 14.

8. Working Groups:

9. DGRI Staff Update:

Van Driel told the Alliance that the new Event Sponsorship Program was officially approved by the DDA. Van Driel added that if members knew of upcoming free events that DGRI could sponsor to email her. Van Driel went over the upcoming winter events, saying that Valent-ICE is coming up quickly and Human Hungry Hungry Hippos is now open for registration for the March event. Van Driel said that Movies Not in the Park, which occurred in December at the UICA, was successful. Van Driel added that a Movies in the Park promotion was played in all downtown movie theatres to encourage participation.

10. <u>AFV Members Update</u>:

Roehm said that Laughfest will be March 10-20 this year. Roehm added they will be announcing all free community programming soon, while other events are already posted. Roehm said that Laughfest will be collaborating with DGRI to help with diversity and inclusion efforts to target audiences. Van Driel added that Laughfest may be doing a rendition of Relax at Rosa, with family fun activities during the week.

SUBJECT: Appointments to DGRI Alliances

On October 24th, 2013, the DGRI Board of Advisors (DGRI BOA) approved the initial seating of the Alliances as a part of the new organizational structure. Most of the individuals involved were previously a part of the volunteer structures of the combining organizations. The compositions were based upon attempts to accommodate each individual's preference for volunteer contributions to a particular subject matter category germane to the organization.

In early 2014, DGRI staff engaged each of the Alliances in exercises to determine "who was missing", and to expand upon the definition of diversity for their respective functions. Following the completion of these exercises, DGRI staff worked to develop an analytic tool to help guide the strategic expansion of the composition of the three Alliances. On January 9, 2014, the DGRI Board of Advisors approved the approach of using this analytic tool, an asset mapping survey instrument, to be administered to all DGRI Alliance and Board members.

The survey instrument was designed to capture general demographic information, such as: age, gender, and race, psychographic and personality-based information such as: generational affiliation, people's hometowns, where they live, where they work, educational attainment, profession, years of experience within the profession, and areas of passion. Each individual respondent was then asked to provide opinions on their ideal composition of DGRI Alliances, based upon their respective roles and areas of focus. When combined with the objectives for demographic diversification, the resulting gaps between the current composition and ideal functional compositions helped to inform the strategic direction for moving forward in recruiting new members to each of the Alliances.

The DGRI Board of Advisors has since approved two additional slates, with this slate being the fourth set of recommendations for each of the three Alliances. The work to populate the 2016 Alliances was guided by the following direction:

1. The approved DGRI Organizational Performance Measures, specifically:

IV. Key Investment Focus: Inclusion and Participation

A. Demographically representative leadership – Boards and Alliances

2. The 2014 & 2015 Asset Mapping Studies that evaluated needs to bolster diverse gender, racial, and age oriented representation combined with appropriate professional experiences and passions needed to make sound recommendations to the DGRI fiduciary boards. That analysis yielded the following needs:

Vibrancy

- General demographic diversity needed: people under 40, males, non-whites
- Expertise / passions needed: events, promotions, economic development, art, restaurant / retail, urban living.

Livability

- General demographic diversity needed: people under 35, females, non-whites
- Expertise / passions needed: public safety, transportation planning, landscape architecture, art, design, housing

Investment

- General demographic diversity needed: people under 40, females, non-whites
- Investment expertise / passions needed: economic development, real estate brokerage, accounting / finance, business owners & managers, housing, urban planning, urban living

Using this detailed understanding and roadmap for building diverse, productive recommendation committees, in November of 2015 DGRI launched its annual effort to recruit new and diverse talent to serve on the Alliances. To accomplish this task, DGRI staff and leadership developed a thoughtful, partnership-oriented outreach program to assist in strategically positioning the Alliances both from inclusionary and expertise-driven orientations. That effort yielded the submission of 93 applications to serve on one of the three DGRI Alliances, by far the most interest DGRI has received to date.

These appointments will make further, incremental progress in assisting DGRI in achieving representative diversity according to the factors considered, including age, sexual orientation, race, gender, and places where individuals live and work. On topics such as educational attainment, the Alliance slates significantly exceed (>90%) the citywide percentages (31%) for individuals having completed at least a bachelor's degree.

The following is a summary of the significant progress made between the 2015 and 2016 Alliance slates:

For the 2016 slates, DGRI staff followed the same path of strategically broadening the composition of the Alliances while ensuring that the most needed perspectives, expertise, and passions were around each of the respective tables. The lists on the following pages detail a slate of recommended appointments for 2016. The names in bold represent the **32 new members** whom will be joining the Alliances to assist and guide the work of DGRI. If approved as presented, each Alliance will have an average of 26 members, with a total of 78 members of the community volunteering in the three Alliances.

With regards to organizational representations, the following highlight summary breaks down the organizational representation according to For-profit, not-for-profit, and governmental representatives.

For profit interests: 36 companies represented
