#### MEETING OF THE DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY

#### August 11, 2021

1. <u>Call to Order</u> – This meeting was called to order at 8:02 a.m. by Chair Rick Winn.

#### Attendance

#### 2. Approve Meeting Minutes from June 10, 2021

Motion: Mr. Talen, supported by Ms. Dunn, moved approval of the June 10, 2021 Meeting Minutes as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

#### 3. Accept June 30, 2021 Financials

Mr. Winn asked why the Debt Tax Increment (Statement A) shows a negative fund equity. Ms. Chapman stated this became negative 3 fiscal years ago and is something currently being investigated; local tax increment funds may have to cover this. Mr. McNeilly asked if the variance between the budgeted and actual principal repayment for The Gallery was anticipated. Tricia Chapman stated the note payment plans were changed; Tim Kelly confirmed it was fully anticipated.

Motion: Mr. Eddie, supported by Ms. Dunn, motioned to accept Statement D: June 30, 2021 Expenditures. Motion carried unanimously.

#### 4. <u>Degage Ministries Downtown Enhancement Grant Request</u>

Mr. Eledge presented on behalf of Degage Ministries, who is seeking a Downtown Enhancement Grant for the renovation project at 144 South Division Avenue. Among the improvements they seek to complete are a conversion of the S. Division Ave space (the current dining room) into a retail space for Paul's Mom's Cookies, improvements to patron sleeping areas, and upgraded internal wayfinding signage. In addition, they are moving the main entrance from S. Division to Sheldon Ave adding a

publicly accessible outdoor green space on Sheldon Ave, enhancing exterior signage, and increasing ADA accessibility in both the new Sheldon Ave entrance, the new retail entrance on S. Division and within the newly renovated public restroom in the retail/storefront space. These improvements are in line with the recommendations from both the Heartside Quality of Life Study and the GR Forward Master Plan. Total project costs for the renovation are budgeted at \$7,377,016. Degage is requesting funding under the Downtown Enhancement Grant program for an amount not to exceed \$45,500 for DDA eligible activities including ADA improvements to the restroom and entryway, and the incorporation of green space on Sheldon Ave. This project was reviewed and recommended by the Goal 2 Alliance. The estimated completion date is March 31, 2022. Mr. Talen asked for clarification on when the public will have access to restrooms. Mr. Eledge stated the restrooms will only be open during store front business hours but accessible to the public during those times.

Motion: Mayor Rosalynn Bliss, supported by Ms. Dunn, moved to approve funding under the Downtown Enhancement Grant to Degage Ministries in an amount not to exceed \$45,500. Motion carries.

#### 5. Van Andel Arena Alley Design

Mr. Kelly stated in 2018 an RFP was issued to advance the Van Andel Arena project into design work for plaza improvements, which also included conceptual designs for the alley east of the arena. Construction on the plaza (Phase 1) was completed in October of 2020. Presented today is a request to move forward in finalizing construction documents and bidding for the alley work (Phase 2) at Van Andel. Project goals include greening, accommodating service/emergency access and public space activation. The request of \$230,100 includes a 10% contingency for design work on this phase of the project; this was budgeted in FY22 under Public Realm Improvements utilizing local tax increment. Mayor Bliss inquired as to who owned the green space on Ionia; this is partly owned by Van Andel Arena and partially owned by the DDA.

Motion: Mayor Rosalynn Bliss, supported by Ms. Dunn, moved to authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract with MKSK for an amount not to exceed \$230,100 for the design of Phase 2 of the Van Andel Arena (alley) project.

#### 6. <u>Air Quality</u>

Mr. Kelly stated on October 14, 2020, the DDA Board finalized funding in the amount of \$30,000 for a partnership with Rapids Air Quality to support the deployment of air quality monitoring sensors in Downtown. Darrin Riley provided a recap on their strategy to mitigate the disparity gap in air quality and the progress made since deploying these sensors. 5 sensors were deployed downtown in June and 2 months of data has been collected to date. The data confirms an (unhealthy) air index is significantly high in some locations. A plan of action is in now order to address the mitigation of these disparities.

#### 7. Common Notice

Mr. Kelly introduced Patrick Parkes, Business Development Coordinator of Disability Advocates of Kent County, to provide an update on the DAKC Citizens Initiative for Inclusive Design. Mr. Parkes shared participants with disabilities feel Downtown is inaccessible and unpredictable. To address this issue, the Inclusive Design & Assessment Program places individuals with disabilities alongside designers and planning professionals to explore and workshop. This prototype testing was put into action this summer with two inclusive design charettes focused on accessible social zones and wayfinding solutions. Aside from informing further program development, these charettes left design and planning professionals with actionable insights to apply directly to their roles. Hazards found have

been mapped collectively, though this information still needs a permanent home for public use. The Accessible Parking and Pathways Guide is the second prototype being established. The University of MI School of Information Digital assisted in developing a paper prototype as well as a digital prototype to report hazards and rate constantly changing pathways.

Todd Herring presented the Adaptive Strategic Plan that has been in progress since September of 2020. Research inputs included leadership interviews with the city, Kent County, and transportation leaders as well as best practices from the US Access Board and disability commissions from other communities. Mr. Herring presented Draft Strategies that are being recommended to implement. The first recommendation is to establish a formal GR Accessibility Council or Committee to create a formal forum for collaboration. The second recommendation in regard to our built environment is to reduce the number of curb cut variations (from 80 to 10). We need to establish best practices for accessible public service, prioritizing inclusion over compliance. The third strategy is employment representation; each agency that can include disability into employee engagement will improve understanding of physical and cultural barriers and provide additional employment opportunities. Fostering strategies to ensure disability is represented and planned for will add to our cultural environment. Also, technology can foster a more inclusive community through wayfinding, traffic safety, and public transportation. Recommendations for next steps include establishing an Accessibility Council, launching a mobile app for crowdsourced hazard and access reporting, lead accessibility council to establish employment best practices, and continue Inclusive Design training and pathway assessments.

#### 8. <u>Executive Director Report</u>

Mr. Kelly highlighted key updates of current downtown projects. Acrisure construction is complete at Studio Park, which will eventually bring 400 employees downtown. Later today, BAMF Health is hosting a groundbreaking ceremony in the Doug Meijer Medical Innovation Building with build out set to be complete in June of 2022. Phase 2 of the Retail Strategy is underway and will deliver next step recommendations and a geographically focused strategic plan in September 2021. The Hill and River Network Plan, previously known as Switchback Park, will enhance connections between Belknap Hill and the river; this RFP issued in June solicited 13 responses and interviews are scheduled with a shortlist of firms the week of August 23rd. A recommendation for this consultant will be sought at the September meeting. A Request for Proposals was issued for our World of Winter festival for frozen fun in 2022; a committee reviewed more than 30 proposals and will advance some proposals for DDA consideration in September. Womens Way ribbon cuttings will take place throughout the month of September. ArtPrize will take place September 16 – October 3, 2021. DGRI will host a Silent Disco on August 21<sup>st</sup> and on August 29<sup>th</sup> we will host a Bicentennial Commemoration for the 200-year anniversary of the 1921 Treaty with the Grand River Bands of Ottawa Indians.

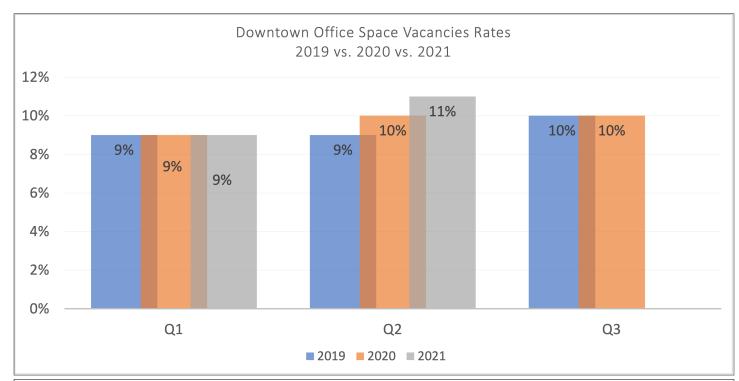

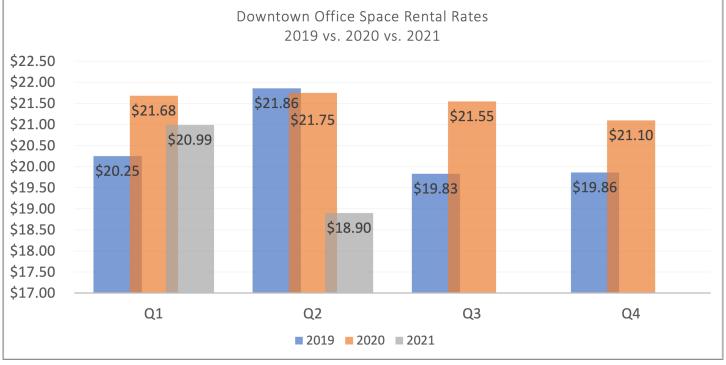

March 10, 2020 - Michigan confirms its first two COVID cases; State of Emergency declared

March 13, 2020 - Gov. Whitmer closes all K-12 schools; bans gatherings of 250 or more March 15, 2020 - Gov. Whitmer orders the closure of bars/restaurants for dine-in, gyms, theaters, and other public places

March 24, 2020 - statewide stay-at-home order begins (subsequently extended 4 times)

April 13, 2020 - first round of stimulus payments begins

June 19, 2020 - stay-at-home order expires

September 9, 2020 - gyms, pools, and organized sports are allowed to reopen/resume October 9, 2020 - movie theaters, performance venues, arcades, and other businesses can reopen at limited capacity

November 15, 2020 - Gov. Whitmer orders the closure of high schools and universities, as well as other businesses (extended on December 7, 2020)

December 18, 2020 - partial shutdown extended but allows for some businesses like theaters, casinos, and bowling alleys to reopen at limited capacity

December 18, 2020 - first COVID vaccine administered in Kent County

December 29, 2020 - second round of stimulus payments begins

SUBJECT: Fish Ladder Improvements

Goal 1 of GR Forward envisions the creation of a robust trail system on both the east and west sides of the River (page 62), ensuring sufficient River access (page 87), and enhancing neighborhood access to the River (page 78).

Additionally, the City of Grand Rapids River For All Plan identifies a series of improvements to the Fish Ladder Park Site (Opportunity Site #5, page 12) that include improved walkways and a boat ramp for access. The plan also recommends improving river access along trails and enhancing existing paths along the river (Trail Guidelines pages 29-37).

To this end, in October 2020, the DDA authorized funding to support the design and engineering of various Riverwalk improvements in collaboration with the City of Grand Rapids Parks and Engineering Departments, including the south access to the fish ladder, which had previously failed due to substantial adjacent erosion.

These services were completed, and the project was recently bid by the City of Grand Rapids. Three bids were received, and Dykema Excavators was the low bidder at a cost of \$35,080.

This work is scheduled to be completed by mid-October and includes riprap repair and concrete walkway improvements.

This project budget was included in the FY22 DDA budget as part of the Goal 1 River Edge Improvements line item in the LTI budget.

Recommendation: Authorize funding in an amount not to exceed \$35,080 for the fish ladder improvement project.

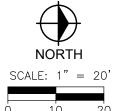

In 2019, DGRI collaborated with the City of Grand Rapids to improve two pedestrian crossings on Michigan Street – one on the east side adjacent to DeVos Place with a median and pedestrian refuge island and one on the west side adjacent to Bridgewater Place with a rapid flashing beacon. Since that time, these crosswalks have been evaluated for performance, and while they have made pedestrian crossing a bit easier, the eastern median has also proven to require more features to make it easier and safer for pedestrian crossing.

To address this, the City of Grand Rapids, DGRI, and ASM began discussing possible solutions in January 2021. After these discussions and vetting various solutions, it was decided that two rapid flashing beacons (RFBs) be installed at the eastern median, one on each side of the crossing.

DGRI is requesting that the DDA fund the install of the RFBs, which includes the electrical power to the units. RFBs (or other pedestrian safety signage) were originally planned as part of this median design but were intended as a later phase once the median was more thoroughly evaluated after its installation.

The engineer's estimate for this work is \$27,197.78. Due to the small size of the project and the still somewhat volatile prices of materials and labor, the city engineer has recommended that funding be requested at a not to exceed amount of \$35,000. This work will be start in October 2021.

This project budget is from Goal 3 Streetscape Improvements in the LTI budget.

Recommendation: Authorize funding in an amount not to exceed \$35,000 for the RFBs at the Michigan Street Crossing.

Goal 5 of GR Forward seeks to reinvest in public space to better serve the entire community and further activate Downtown Grand Rapids. Specifically, the plan envisions creating new non-riverfront open space assets in the form of a Switchback Park on Belknap Hill (page 280) and an Ionia Linear Park (page 282). Additionally, within these projects (and as part of Goal 3 Mobility) the plan envisions strengthening east-west connections to the Grand River.

As part of the effort to implement these projects, DGRI collaborated with City of Grand Rapids leadership; various institutions that are active in, and adjacent to, Monroe North; Neighbors of Belknap Lookout; the Monroe North Business Association; and downtown residents to craft the Hill and River Network RFP and form a steering committee. The RFP garnered nine responses and after a thorough review by the steering committee, four firms were shortlisted and interviewed. The Smith Group was selected as the preferred consultant after the interview process.

The Smith Group is an Ann Arbor based, award-winning interdisciplinary firm and one of the largest architecture engineering, landscape architecture, and planning firms in the United States. On this project they have teamed with local firms Fishbeck (civil engineering, survey, traffic engineering), Materials Testing Consultants (geotechnical engineering), and Disability Advocates of Kent County (accessibility). The Smith Group also has a nationally recognized lighting design team, a forward-looking mobility strategist, urban ecologists, and green stormwater infrastructure specialists – all in house and dedicated to this project. Their comprehensive approach, thorough understanding of the project complexities, knowledgeable and purposeful project staffing, and portfolio of implemented high-quality projects made them stand out during the selection process. Their team demonstrated an excellent balance between design, engineering, and implementation.

The Hill and River Network project, originally envisioned as the implementation of the Switchback Park concept, also includes a variety of other interventions, including enhanced pedestrian crossings at Division Avenue, improved connections on Fairbanks and Newberry Streets; the design and repurposing of the Ionia Avenue right-



of-way; and the pedestrianization of the railway tunnel connection under I-196. The hillside project includes the redesign of the existing stairs, an accessible/non-motorized connector up the hill (the switchback), and the Hastings connector (which will connect the existing Hastings corridor to the hillside). Refer to attached description of interventions from the RFP.

While the RFP sought a full scope of services from concept design to construction drawings and bidding, DGRI and the steering committee recommend undertaking only the concept design and design development portions of the proposed scope (phases 1 and 2 in the attached proposal). This will allow DGRI and partners, along with the consultant team, to better strategize and understand the necessary scope to create construction level drawings (phase 3 of the scope) while also focusing on specific elements of the project to undertake first. In this way we will collectively be able to purposefully implement the various pieces and parts over multiple funding cycles.

The professional fee for phases 1 and 2 of this work is \$400,130. In addition, the total project allocation also needs to include survey and geotechnical work. The survey is a not-to-exceed fee of \$84,000 and may be less depending on what portions of the hill need to have topographic information collected as the design evolves. Some of these survey costs may be carried over to the phase 3 work when it is undertaken. The survey work will also include boundary information, utilities, and easements. The geotechnical services are \$32,500, and like the survey work, a portion of the fee may carry over to the future phase 3 work, when a clearer picture of the hillside design is in place.

The combined fee of \$516,630 include phases 1 and 2, and all the project's combined survey and geotechnical work. The Smith Group's proposal included a fee of \$374,640 for phase 3, which is not included in this request, but will eventually need to be revisited when it is time to embark on phase 3. The Smith Group fees were approximately in the middle of the fee range presented in the 9 proposals that were received for the project.

This project is expected to commence in September 2021 and the phase 1 and 2 portions of the work are expected to take approximately 10-12 months to complete.

This project budget was included in the FY22 DDA budget as part of the Goal 5 Public Realm Improvements line item in the LTI budget.

**Recommendation:** Authorize the Executive Director to enter into a professional services contract with the Smith Group for an amount not-to- exceed \$516,630.

#### KEY TO NETWORK INTERVENTIONS (refer to adjacent page)

Switchback Pathway on Belknap Hill connecting Hastings Trail to stairs and Division Avenue Switchback may be an elevated pathway due to grades (refer to rendering, inside front cover), an atgrade installation, a combination of the two, or something completely different to achieve the same intended results and purpose.

Hastings Connector links Hastings sidewalk to Switchback Pathway

Existing Hastings sidewalk ends at Livingston Street. Due to grade, the connector may need to be elevated and not at grade, especially at retaining wall where it curves toward the hillside.

Stairs at Newberry and Fairbanks connect Belknap Neighborhood to Monroe North and River Stair at Newberry is non-functional and will need to be reconstructed. Stair at Fairbanks, while functional, may also need to be reconstructed, restored, or rehabilitated. Consideration should be given to strategically connect stairs to the Switchback Pathway at key intersection points and landings.

# Key pedestrian crossings at Division Avenue

Integrated with sidewalks, crosswalks, and future implementation of phased Separated Bicycle Lanes.

Former rail tunnel under elevated highway I-196 is envisioned to provide a non-motorized connection between Monroe North and MSU Campus / Downtown

**lonia Avenue**Consider future land use and infrastructure within this underutilized right-of-way and how it may accentuate the various desired connections. For instance, GR Forward envisioned a linear park and bikeway here (bikeway was considered prior to using Division Avenue for a protected bicycle lane pilot project).

# **East-West Connectors**

**Railway Tunnel Connector** 

Newberry and Fairbanks Streets should be integrated into the overall connection strategy to allow for a low stress pedestrian environment that connects the Grand River, parks, and the river trail system to the adjacent neighborhoods, residents, and businesses. Newberry Street has recently been partially reconstructed to include elements recommended in the River For All Plan, but still requires a more purposeful design consideration for pedestrian connection. Fairbanks Street does not extend all the way to Monroe Avenue and will be integrated into planned Spectrum Campus, phase 1.

• • • • • Separated Bicycle Lanes on Division Avenue (not part of design)

Collaborate with Mobile GR on integration of planned Phase 2 separated lanes. Existing lanes are currently striped. Phase 2 envisions installing barricades to accentuate the separation and protection. Future phases may create a more integrated and permanent facility. The project design should consider and integrate into these future iterations, however bicycle lane design is not part of this project.

# Project X by Robert Morris

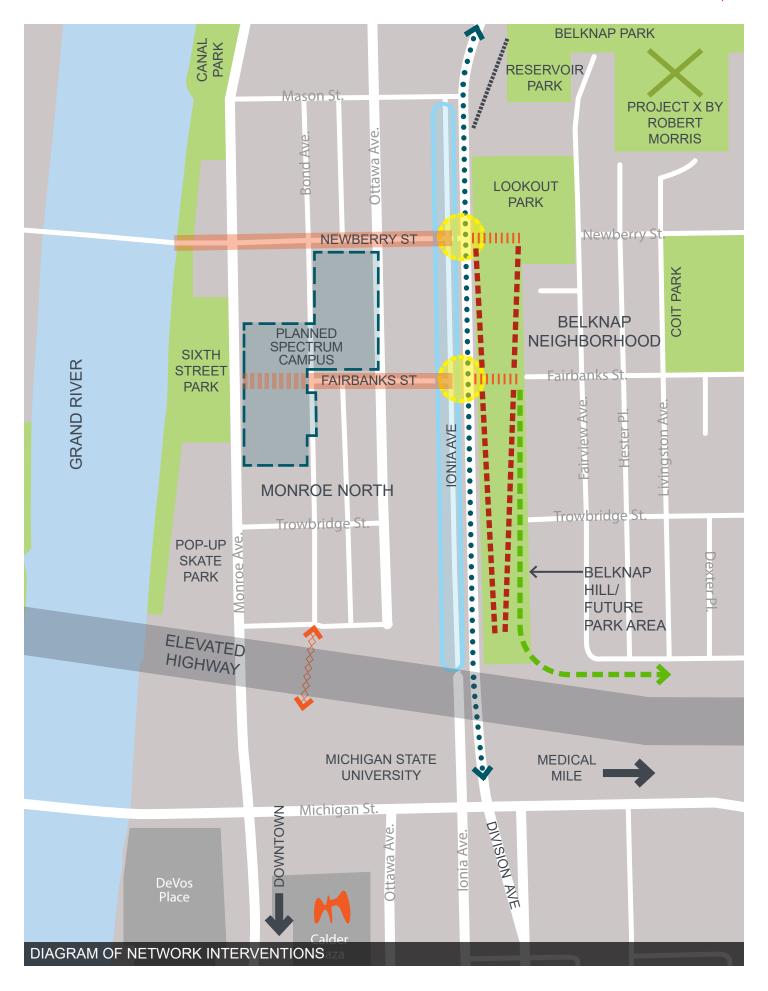

SUBJECT: Development District Liquor License - Woodrow's

The City Commission policy establishing procedures for the review and approval of development area liquor licenses requires the City Clerk to forward any such requests in the DDA district to the DDA Board for review and recommendation. In evaluating a proposal, the DDA Board may consider how the issuance of a license would promote economic growth in a manner consistent with adopted goals, plans or policies of the district.

Woodrows GR, LLC ("Woodrow's), is requesting DDA Board consent to the issuance of a Development District liquor license for their proposed venue in the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel. The new concept will be in partnership with Brunswick Bowling and will include a full-service bar along with 7 duckpin bowling lanes. Woodrow's will not have its own kitchen, but customers will be encouraged to order food from surrounding restaurants to have delivered, thus supporting other businesses within Downtown.

Staff has reviewed the applicant's request and believes it meets the investment, activity and seating capacity requirements and as such it is recommending approval of the application. If approved by the DDA Board, the request will proceed to the City Commission for consideration.

SUBJECT: Winter Art Activation Funding Authorization

Goal 5 of GR Forward advocates for public space activation during the winter months. Events are an important way of encouraging foot traffic in Downtown with a range of initiatives for festive winter programming and activities. Best practices around the world emphasize illumination and color during the darkest months of the year, an innovative strategy that does not need to rely on snowy weather forecasts for activities.

Last year, DGRI was able to bring in over 400,000 attendees to Downtown during the World of Winter Festival that hosted 52 events, 20 art installations (75 participating artists), 109 ice sculptures, supported 16 grants, teamed up with 20 organizations all for 60 days of activation. For this effort, we were awarded the International Downtown Association (IDA) Pinnacle Award. With last year's success, the Goal 5 Alliance has been working towards bringing even more installations for 2022 while combining some of our past large events into the mix to bring an even larger footprint and attendance with diverse programming into Downtown.

In June of 2021 an RFP was issued seeking winter art installations to be hosted here in Grand Rapids utilizing effects of lighting. After careful deliberation of over 50 submissions, the Goal 5 Alliance has decided to make a recommendation to the DDA to bring in ten interactive art installations. Installations include range from local to national to international talent. Each installation has their own unique opportunities for interaction, programming, and activities that will help rejuvenate Downtown during this winter season.

If approved, each installation will be placed in various locations within the Downtown footprint for a two-month period during January 7 through March 6, 2022. Additional programming, partnerships, and winter activities will take place throughout Downtown as part of the annual World of Winter festival.

The total request for the ten installations is for an amount not to exceed \$450,000, and would cover rental fees, insurance, equipment, security and logistics. This amount equals the budgeted amount in the approved DDA NTI FY22 budget and is included as part of the Public Space Activation line item.

Recommendation: Approve expenditures not to exceed \$450,000 to support ten winter art installations for World of Winter 2022.

# DOWNTOWN GRAND RAPIDS WORLD OF WINTER ART INSTALLATIONS 2022

#### PROJECT SUMMARY

Our goal is to remind our citizens that we are a 4-season city. In an effort to activate the downtown during the cooler months of the year, we invest in various initiatives through art, placemaking and events to get people to come downtown and experience all our city has to offer.

Downtown Grand Rapids Inc. (DGRI) sought proposals from qualified vendors on ideas for public space and placemaking art installations for the months of January 7, 2022, through March 6, 2022. We are particularly interested in installations that incorporate light and sound as well as being able to allow citizens to interact with the installations.





### INSTALLATION # 1 & 2 – Trumpet Flowers and Crank Zappa by Amigo & Amiga http://www.amigoandamigo.com/amigo-installations/

Trumpet Flowers allow you to feel as if you've shrunk as you immerse yourself in the super-sized trumpet flower garden. Experience a giant's musical garden as 27 trumpet flowers from two to six meters tall tower over you. Visit the center of the forest to play the massive trumpet keys and make your own spectacular floral sound and light show by pushing the trumpet keys that will illuminate and make a different sound with the corresponding trumpet flower.

Crank Zappa Jellyfish is an interactive sculpture created from plastic waste. Lights animate and respond to touch sensors at the ends of the tentacles. The sculpture is also accompanied by music and voice acting to bring the character of Crank Zappa to life, as well as educating the public on plastic waste in an accessible and engaging way.

## INSTALLATION # 3 – Light Maze by Ilmex & Brut Delux <a href="https://www.ilmex.com/the-light-maze-p-11-en">https://www.ilmex.com/the-light-maze-p-11-en</a>

The Light Maze is a fully immersive, 24hr a day, indoor/outdoor light experience. The maze was originally commissioned for the Luneng Sanya Bay Light and Art Festival in Hainan, China by Brut Deluxe. The immersive experience premiered in Brussels (Belgium) and Seville (Spain). The maze is based on a triangular geometry and built of 2, 20m high panels of acrylic glass. A dichroic film is glued to one side of the acrylic glass that converts the panels into semi-transparent, reflective panels. This allows light rays from the sun during the day and LED light during the night to illuminate a range of rainbow colors as the spectator moves through the maze. On the other side of each acrylic glass sheet, a unique pattern is

mechanically carved into each panel to elevate the spectator's experience. During the night, these patterns are highlighted by powerful LED rails creating reflections and mirroring effects of the panels creating a unique cosmos of overlapping light patterns and constantly changing colors.

The original *Intrude* classic artwork by Amanda Parer contains five large rabbits ranging in positions and sizes. During the day these large stark white inflatable rabbits look at home in their surroundings and at night they are transformed into stark white illuminated artworks. the rabbit is also an animal of contradiction. They represent the fairy-tale animals of our childhood, of furry innocence, frolicking through idyllic fields. *Intrude* deliberately evokes this cutesy image, and strong visual humor to lure you into the artwork only to reveal the more serious environmental messages in the work. The bunnies of *Intrude* are huge, the size referencing "the elephant in the room", the problem, like our mismanagement of the environment, big, but one that we too easily ignore.

INSTALLATION # 5 – Control No Control by Iregular and Live Space <a href="https://iregular.io/work/control-no-control/">https://iregular.io/work/control-no-control/</a>

CONTROL NO CONTROL is a big LED cube that reacts to everything that touches it and every movement performed on its surface. Streamlined patterns and generative sound emerge as interaction occurs. Allowing 48 people to participate at the same time, the experience is extremely intuitive, leading to quick audience engagement and prolonged interactions. A sort of socio-digital experiment, the piece explores the relationship between participants and interactive installations. It tests the artwork's ability to intrinsically "instruct" and delegate the final audiovisual result to the audience that ends up gaining control of the piece. After presenting it many times across continents and cultures, CONTROL NO CONTROL revealed that people all over the globe tend to behave the same way around the cube, and all seemed to spend a lot of time engaging. This in turn suggests the ability for the artwork to manipulate the public as well, highlighting the back-and-forth blurred nature of the control relationship.

### INSTALLATION # 6 – Loop by CREOS https://www.creos.io/en/

This illuminated musical installation, featuring a distinctive retro-futuristic look, uses cylinders two meters in diameter and plays short flipbook-style movies inspired by Quebec literature. The work is inspired by the zoetrope, an optical toy invented in the 19th century. *Loop* is a hybrid of the music box, zoetrope and railway handcar. Members of the public are invited to sit down inside the zoetrope, pump the bar, and make the image cylinder turn. The pictures will spring into motion. At the center of each giant wheel is a music box to provide accompaniment for the beautiful hand-drawn animations. The animated images, tinted by a strobe effect, are reminiscent of the earliest movies. The speed of the whirring pictures, the frequency at which the light flickers and the tempo of the music are all determined by how fast you move the bar.

The work continues Squidsoup's ongoing explorations and obsession with elemental themes, particularly water. Each orb in the wave is an autonomous sensate unit consisting of LED lights, speaker and microcomputer, with movement sensor and wireless connectivity. Together they create a walkthrough immersive experience; 500 points of light, 500 voices, interconnected using *Internet of Things* technology and acting in choreographed harmony to create a series of emotive and enticing, sensual immersive environments – a sanctuary in this crazy world.
