RECOMMENDATIONS FOR

Riverfront Sites on the Market Avenue Corridor



"Our job was to envision and evaluate which assets will bring the greatest community benefit," said Grand Action 2.0 co-chair Tom Welch. "With a proposed 10 acres of accessible public space, including a ribbon of parkland along the riverfront, the final recommendations placed strong emphasis on community access and green spaces.">>>

Executive Summary

2021 represents a unique moment in time for the City of Grand Rapids and the surrounding region.

The purpose of the Riverfront Conceptual Planning effort was to create a comprehensive vision for future development on the east bank of the Grand River between Fulton and Wealthy Streets, transforming it from a site that lacks activation and connectivity into a showcased, sustainable district that connects and serves a diverse community.

With millions of dollars of public / private investment in downtown in the past 10 years, Grand Rapids Whitewater implementation underway, and major businesses and universities taking root in downtown, it's time for Grand Rapids to consider how it can build and sustain this unique momentum. Diversifying downtown and the regional economy as well as attracting and retaining talent are vital objectives.

While many reports and studies have been commissioned by a variety of stakeholders over the years, no cohesive master plan for the entire 31-acre riverfront site has ever been created. This Riverfront Conceptual Planning effort considers all elements of the site together, including the Fulton and Market Site, 201 Market Sites, the riverfront, Market Avenue Corridor, as well as new supportable market uses identified by CSL in 2020 as part of the Grand Rapids Destination Asset Study. These uses could include:

- Amphitheater
- Traditional Mixed-Use District
- Trend Forward Mixed-Use
- Outdoor Adventure
- Signature Public Space
- Arts and Culture Park
- Urban Water Features
- Outdoor Education Center
- Immersive Art Experience
- Downtown Aquarium
- Unique Hospitality Experience

The Design Team focused on providing public open space and strategic mixed-use development accompanied by the corresponding infrastructure and circulation improvements that would optimize and activate the riverfront sites. This process was led and funded by Grand Action, working together with the City of Grand Rapids and Skot Welch of Global Bridge Builders to engage the community in an open and transparent process.

The goal was to create a catalytic vision that will improve quality of life for today's Grand Rapidians and guide the next phase of downtown development for the next generation. A collaborative effort undertaken by Populous and Progressive AE has resulted in the following project recommendations for the riverfront sites:

- 10+ acres of new public open space connected to the Grand River
- Alternatives for new pedestrian connections to the west side of the Grand River
- The Grand Rapids "Green Ribbon": an elevated and dedicated riverfront park connecting to the river trail system between Fulton and Wealthy Streets
- Adventure park, kayak pit-stop, zipline and seasonal attraction or cultural park
- Community green space to accommodate multigenerational gatherings and activities
- Ground floor retail and trend-forward mixed-use prioritized for minority-owned businesses
- 12,000-seat amphitheater on 201 Market Site
- Up to 1,500 1,750 mixed housing units, with a dedicated site at Wealthy and Market Ave for affordable housing on the park and river
- 1,675 new parking spaces to support mixed-use and other functions
- Recommended sites for future downtown development of housing, soccer venue or aquarium

Community Engagement and Input

The Conceptual Planning for Riverfront Sites in Downtown Grand Rapids began in October of 2020 with a public engagement process that included 26 one-on-one interviews with community groups, foundations, elected officials and a variety of other downtown stakeholders. Four community-only focus groups, organized by Skot Welch of Global Bridge Builders, were also conducted virtually with 15-20 participants, each with a combination of the following participant backgrounds:

- Hispanic Chamber
- · Latina Network of West Michigan
- Influencers in the Asian Community
- Native American Community
- Civil servants
- Entrepreneurs
- Small business administrators
- Housing representatives
- Realtors
- Teachers
- School administrators

The outcomes of these community engagement sessions helped the planning team identify desires, pain points and ideas for the future. Themes that emerged and influenced the planning efforts included (in order of desirability, 1 = most desirable / repeated theme):

- Riverfront activation and free-and-clear access to the water
- Local, minority-owned pop-up restaurants, shops, bars, music venues / clubs, etc. (on the river)
- Publicly accessible and multi-seasonal open space, parks, picnic pavilions, etc.
- Funding strategy for diverse programing opportunities
- Multigenerational spaces and places
- Bike trails
- Public Art
- Housing
- Amphitheater, soccer venue and / or aquarium downtown
- Adequate parking


RIVER CORRIDOR PLAN SUPPLEMENTAL MATERIALS

Building off the feedback from the public process, a series of priorities were developed that frame and expand upon the idea that certain spaces can be prioritized as they relate to: the possible scale and location of the program, the expansion of program into all four seasons, activation of places, and the inclusion of art. From this process, 15 priority riverfront opportunity sites were identified based upon their ownership status, their need for flood protection infrastructure improvements, and the potential use of these sites as construction staging areas for the GRWW initiative. Each of theses sites has one of four types of open spaces that help to create the new park system: Public Development Sites, Public/Private Partnerships, New Parks and Renovated Park. The detailed descriptions and elaboration on those types can be found in the main report under Goal 1. The illustrative content in this document portrays the intent of the GR Forward masterplan. The exhibits are conceptual in nature and serve as a resource and the basis of further coordination, technical recommendations, and potential implementation.






FIG A1.1: Birds-eye view of the Grand River looking north




FIG A1.5: 201 Market Street opportunities and constraints




FIG A1.6: 201 Market Street concept design

> Major sewer line with easement, one minor sewer line, 2 stormwater lines, 48" lake line

The goals of 201 Market are:

- > Create a destination, and large scale programmable open space
- > Manage flooding through the design of the landscape
- > Provide an ecological edge that manages on site stormwater and provides river habitat
- > Provide river access including boat access
- Provide a continuous multi-use trail connection and a connection north
- > Ensure there are active uses facing both Market Street and the River
- > Buffer 131 and the rail line from the open space
- Create safe intersections along Market Street
- > Establish a gateway at Cherry Street
- Establish new housing and supporting uses to active the River
- Visually extend "Downtown" south along the River




FIG A1.9: 201 Market Street flood considerations




FIG A1.8: Proposed 201 Market Street water access




FIG A1.10: Proposed 201 Market Street land program




FIG A1.11: Proposed 201 Market Street aerial view






FIG A1.12: Proposed 201 Market Street site sections




FIG A1.13: Proposed 201 Market Street aerial rendering




FIG A1.14: Fulton + Market opportunities and constraints




FIG A1.15: Fulton + Market concept design

> 1 major sewer line with easement, 1 stormwater line

The goals of Fulton + Market are:

- > Manage flooding through the design of the landscape
- > Provide a sloped/terraces landscape that allows the public to experience the river
- > Provide a continuous multi-use trail connection
- > Provide outdoor spaces to support ground floor uses
- > Bring the idea of water into the site, celebrate site stormwater management as a feature
- > Ensure there are active uses facing Market Street, Fulton Street and the River
- > Buffer 131 from the open space
- > Establish a prominent gateway at Market and Fulton intersection
- > Establish new housing and supporting uses to active the River
- > Provide new parking for the development and to serve Downtown day-time uses
- Visually extend "Downtown" south along the River




FIG A1.18: Fulton + Market flood considerations




FIG A1.17: Proposed Fulton + Market water access





FIG A1.19: Proposed Fulton + Market land program








FIG A1.20: Proposed Fulton + Market site sections








FIG A1.21: Proposed Fulton + Market site sections








FIG A1.22: Proposed Fulton + Market site sections






FIG A1.23: Proposed Fulton + Market aerial view

Grand River Corridor Revitalization Community Collaboration & Activity Report Q1 2021

*There's A LOT of good work happening to advance restoration, revitalization and activation of the Grand River corridor in the urban core of Grand Rapids. This summary is a DRAFT work in progress and not (yet) exhaustive. All additional initiatives and ideas for improvement welcome.

*Items in red designate updates/info added since previous report (Q1 2020)

Improve maintenance of existing river trail

- Identified need for comprehensive snow management plan
- Organizing boardwalk repairs from Louis St to Michigan Street anticipated spring 2021
- Organizing final design to repair Riverwalk from Louis St (JW Marriott) to Blue Bridge
- Enhanced maintenance partnership from Gillette Bridge to Michigan Street
 - o Lead: City of Grand Rapids in partnership w/ Downtown Grand Rapids Inc. (DGRI)

Enhance public, universal access to the river

- Organizing final design for access points at Wealthy Street and Fish Ladder Park
 - o Lead: City in partnership w/ DGRI and Grand Rapids Whitewater (GRWW)

Leverage Opportunity Sites to reinforce the whitewater initiative & restore the river as the draw

- Lyon Square renovation
