## Goal 4 Alliance

April 21, 2020

1. Call to order: Mr. Jorge Gonzalez called the meeting to order at 3:10 pm

#### 2. Approval of Minutes

Tyler Peterson, supported by Caylie Peet, motioned to approve March 17, 2020 Meeting Minutes. None opposed. Motion approved.

#### 3. Retail Incubation RFP Discussion

Mr. Kitavi stated during last month's meeting we focused on how we can better utilize the small business attraction grant. Today, we will be discussing the second phase of that grant which focuses on incubation. Mr. Kitavi referred to the RFP draft included in this month's agenda packet. This RFP is a broad example but can be rewritten to narrow down the expectations of incoming proposals. Mr. Kitavi asked the members if a proposal were presented, what are the elements you are looking for within that program and how do we evaluate it?

Mr. Klooster asked if the proposal applies to new businesses or existing businesses? Mr. Kitavi answered it can be for both existing and new businesses. Mr. Kitavi stated we have completed 7 grants for small businesses primarily for 50% rent coverage, however, we can use the funding more creatively.

Ms. Lach-White asked if DGRI would be the entity that houses that program or would be in a partnership with another entity? Mr. Kitavi stated DGRI would be the funding party and the technical assistance would primarily come from an ESO. When DGRI funds 50% of the businesses rent, part of his role is to make sure the businesses have technical assistance.

Mr. Kitavi stated DGRI will not be able to provide all the wrap around services and that is why we will need to partner with an organization that will provide technical assistance. What information do we want to know in order to improve this type of proposal?

Mr. Cuevas stated he thinks it is going to depend on how we measure success. He also mentioned we should be looking at partners who have the capacity to take this on. Who is the right partner right now and can be held accountable to certain measurables?

Ms. Lach-White asked is it possible for there to be multiple partnerships or a collaborative partnership? Mr. Kitavi stated the agreement we are trying to put together is primarily between DGRI, the property owner, and the technical assistance provider.

Mr. Peterson asked Mr. Kitavi asked if there were other city models of incubator programs to review? Mr. Kitavi stated he will work on getting more information to the group and to also keep in mind we are in a situation to create something new.

Mr. App stated considering the current situation, it may be a better idea to fill spaces downtown with temporary businesses and short-term leases. If they work, the accelerator space at Studio Park could intubate them until we find long-term space. Doing something shorter term creates an urgency.

Mr. Kitavi stated it is very likely a proposal will be presented to this group soon. Before that happens, he would like to receive feedback and suggestions of what are the elements we should be looking for within that program and how do we evaluate it?

#### 4. Small Business Expo Updates

Mr. Kitavi stated September 9<sup>th</sup> is the small business expo, however, it may now be a virtual meeting. He will have more details by the next meeting.

SUBJECT: MEDC Match on Main – COVID-19 Response Program

The Match on Main – COVID-19 Response Program temporarily expands the MEDC's Match on Main Program and will provide up to \$50,000 to local downtown management organizations to administer to eligible small businesses located in traditional commercial districts, including downtowns, neighborhood and commercial districts, or areas planned and zoned for concentrated commercial development. This temporary expansion increases access for additional communities, expands eligible activities, and eliminates match requirements for businesses.

#### Program Guidelines:

- The maximum contribution to any one business is capped at \$10,000, the minimum amount must be at least \$2,000. This means that a minimum of 5 businesses or a maximum of 25 businesses must be selected for potential funding. Within these funding limitations, the applicant will determine which businesses will be included in the application for support and at what desired grant amounts.

#### Eligible Uses:

- The business was affected by the COVID-19 outbreak
- The business is for-profit and headquartered in Michigan
- The business has 25 employees or less
- The business sells products or services face to face within a traditional downtown, neighborhood or commercial district, or area planned and zoned for concentrated development
- The business has not received or been approved to receive MSF Small Business Relief Program funding or an MEDC Match on Main grant within the last 24 months.

#### Proposed Timeline:

5/19 – Announce to Goal 4 and select evaluation committee

5/20 - Send application to eligible businesses

5/25 - Application deadline

5/26 - Review and select recipients

5/27 - Submit grant request to MEDC

6/10 - Grant awardees announced

5/11 - Background checks due
