Attached are the Monroe North Tax Increment Financing Authority interim financial statements for first half of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018.

Statement C: Schedule of October 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017 Expenditures

The City Treasurer distributed Winter property tax increment revenues to the Authority in December. The amount of tax increment revenues in the "Actual" column on Statement B is lower than budgeted because the revenue was forecasted using estimated mills, which are 0.1119 mills higher than the actual mills levied.

The Authority also received a \$122,248 personal property tax increment revenue loss reimbursement from the State of Michigan in early December. FY2018 is the second year the Authority received this reimbursement. The City's authorities don't budget for these reimbursements since payment depends on net State sales and use tax receipts. On the next page is a brief explanation of the Personal Property Exemption Losses program.

DESCRIPTION OF THE PERSONAL PROPERTY EXEMPTION LOSSES REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

Beginning with calendar year 2016/FY2017, the Local Community Stabilization Authority (LCSA) Act, 2014 Public Act 86, (MCL 123.1341 to 123.1362) requires personal property tax reimbursement for all operating and debt millages to the extent that Michigan sales and use tax revenues are available.

The LCSA distributes PPEL reimbursements in the following order of priority:

- 1. 100% reimbursement for:
 - Local school district and intermediate school district (ISD) school debt loss in the current year and local school district sinking funding millage and public recreation and playground millage;
 - b. ISD operating millage;
 - c. School operating loss not reimbursed by the school aid fund;
 - d. Millages used to fund essential services (police, fire, ambulance, and jails);
 - e. Decline in the tax increment finance (TIF) plan captured value of commercial and industrial personal property; and
 - f. 2017 small taxpayer exemption loss.
- 2. Reimbursement for other millages are prorated and may be less than or more than 100%, depending on total calculated losses compared to available Local Community Stabilization Share (LCSS) revenue. The LCSS revenue is derived from the State Use Tax.

How to Calculate Local Unit and TIF Personal Property Exemption Losses (PPEL)

The PPEL is calculated by subtracting the current roll year's commercial and industrial personal property taxable value from the 2013 roll year's commercial and industrial personal property taxable value. Calculations include ad valorem property as well as property on the Industrial Facilities Tax (IFT) property roll with new facilities at 50%. For operating millage reimbursement calculations, the Michigan Department of Treasury subtracts any renaissance zone personal property taxable value from the PPEL calculations.

Meeting of the City of Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority

October 11, 2017

1. <u>Call to Order</u> – The meeting was called to order at by Chair Howard Hansen

2. Attendance

3. Approve Meeting Minutes from August 9, 2017

Motion: Mayor Rosalynn Bliss, supported by Kayem Dunn, moved approval of the minutes from the August 9, 2017 meeting as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

4. Accept Preliminary Financial Statement from June 30, 2017

Ms. Wallace gave an overview of the financial statements for the year end financials. Ms. Wallace said there is only one month of expenditures because the May financials were presented at the June meeting.

Motion: Kayem Dunn, supported by Jane Gietzen, moved to approve Statement C- Preliminary Schedule of June 30, 2017 expenditures as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

5. Adopt FY18 Budget and Priority Plan

Mr. Larson reminded the Board that this is the same budget that was previously approved. After it was approved by the Board and recommended to City Commission, bottom line authorization was approved by City Commission, and now requires adoption by this Board.

Motion: Shaun Biel, supported by Carl Kelly, moved to adopt the MNTIFA Annual Budget for 2018. Motion carried unanimously.

6. Accept Financial Statement from September 30, 2017

Ms. Wallace introduced the three (3) months of financials from the new fiscal year. Ms. Wallace shared that the financials are now categorized by GR Forward goals.

Motion: Shaun Biel, supported by Jane Gietzen, moved to approve Statement C- Preliminary Schedule of September 30, 2017 expenditures as recommended. Motion carried unanimously.

7. <u>Authorize Support for Grand Rapids Whitewater</u>

Mr. Larson introduced the request for support for Grand Rapids White Water and said that the DDA approved their share of support at their previous meeting. Mr. Larson said \$100,000 was budgeted in the DDA budget and \$25,000 in the MNTIFA budget. Mr. Larson said he has been working with Whitewater to understand their needs and how the DDA can contribute as partners. Mr. Larson said this contribution will be directed towards filing the required environmental impact statement. Mr. Larson said they plan to file in late October or early November.

Motion: Carl Kelly, supported by Mayor Rosalynn Bliss, moved to authorize the Executive Director to approve a payment in the amount of \$25,000 to Grand Rapids Whitewater to support their efforts to restore the Grand River and implement GR Forward. Motion carried unanimously.

8. <u>Authorize Contract Streetscape Design Guidelines</u>

Mr. Kelly introduced the request to enter into a contract with Nederveld and Williams & Works to complete an update to the Downtown Streetscape Guidelines. Mr. Larson noted that this project will be cofunded by the DDA. Mr. Kelly said the last document was completed in 2006 and needs to be updated to adjust for new boundaries, ADA design requirements, as well as the priorities outlined in GR Forward. Mr. Kelly said it is important to look at the Downtown collectively while also acknowledging that not all streets have the same demands and not all modes of transportation should be accommodated on each street. Mr. Kelly said Williams & Works is also a consultant on the Riverwalk Guideline project, and this will help ensure cohesion between both projects. Mr. Kelly said there have been great improvements as a direct result of the 2006 plan, but it did not give much consideration to areas such as the West Side or the Monroe North neighborhood as they have seen significant growth. Ms. Wong said that an RFP was released in August, and after receiving responses, staff worked with the Goal 3 Alliance to review the submissions. Ms. Wong said she was pleased to share that both staff and the Alliance recommended Nederveld and Williams & Work to complete the work. Ms. Wong said the goal is to have the guidelines completed and presented to the Board by April 2017. Mr. Biel asked if this project was budgeted for. Mr. Larson said yes, and because a local firm was chosen, the project is expected to come in under budget.

Motion: Jane Gietzen, supported by Mayor Rosalynn Bliss, moved to authorize the Executive Director to enter into a contract with Nederveld and Williams & Works for an amount not to exceed \$93,450 to develop Downtown Streetscape Design Guidelines, and approve the MNTIFA's share of the contract in an amount not to exceed \$18,690. Motion carried unanimously.

9. <u>ArtPrize Pedestrian Counts</u>

Ms. Wong gave an overview of the current pedestrian counters and their locations. Ms. Wong shared the data for pedestrian counters over the duration of ArtPrize for 2016 and 2017. Ms. Wong shared that the highest recorded pedestrian traffic is consistently located at the Pearl and Monroe Street intersection. Ms. Wong clarified that these are not exact number of attendees for ArtPrize, but what was counted at these exact locations. Ms. Wong shared the pedestrian counts with different overlays including temperature and weather. Mr. Larson thanked Ms. Wong for her report.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority (the Authority), a component unit of the City of Grand Rapids, Michigan, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Authority's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Authority's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority as of June 30, 2017, and the changes in its financial position for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Prior Year Comparative Information

We have previously audited the Authority's 2016 financial statements, and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on the 2016 financial statements in our report dated December 14, 2016. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein as of and for the year ended June 30, 2016 is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that management's discussion and analysis on pages 9-12 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Authority's basic financial statements. The Schedule of Projects is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

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Management's Discussion and Analysis

This section of the Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority's (the Authority) financial report presents a discussion and analysis of the Authority's financial performance for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017. This discussion has been prepared by management along with the financial statements and related footnote disclosures, and should be read in conjunction with, and is qualified in its entirety by, the financial statements and footnotes. This discussion and analysis is designed to focus on current activities, resulting changes and currently known facts.

Using the Financial Report

This financial report consists of two financial statements that focus on the financial condition of the Authority and the results of its operations as a whole.

One of the most important questions asked about governmental finances is whether the unit of government as a whole is better off or worse off as a result of the year's activities. The keys to understanding this question are the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities.

The Statement of Net Position presents financial information on all of the Authority's assets, deferred outflows of resources, and liabilities, with the difference reported as net position. Deferred outflows of resources are the consumption of net position by the Authority that is applicable to a future reporting period. The Statement of Net Position is prepared using the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenues and assets are recognized when the service is provided and expenses and liabilities are recognized when others provide the service, regardless of when cash is exchanged. The Authority's net position is one indicator of the Authority's financial health. Over time, increases or decreases in net position indicates the improvement or erosion of the Authority's financial health.

Current Assets

Equity in Pooled Cash and Investments

The City of Grand Rapids maintains an investment pool for most City funds and component units. The Authority's portion of the investment pool is displayed on the Statement of Net Position as equity in pooled cash and investments.

Noncurrent Assets

Capital Assets, Net

At June 30, 2017, capital assets of nearly \$1.9 million included land, land improvements, and buildings and structures, net of \$3.4 million of accumulated depreciation. The difference between the capital assets on June 30, 2017 and June 30, 2016 is the \$198,472 of annual depreciation expense recorded in fiscal year 2017.

Deferred Outflows of Resources

The 2008 refunding by the Kent County Drain Commission of contracts payable for the floodwall improvement project resulted in a gain on refunding. The total gain is being amortized on a straightline basis as a reduction in interest expense over the life of the new bonds. The unamortized portion at year-end was \$9,705.

Current Liabilities

Vouchers Payable, Accrued Interest Payable and Noncurrent Liabilities, Due Within One Year

Amounts due to suppliers and contractors, short-term staff compensated absences, accrued interest payable, and principal payments on noncurrent liabilities have been accrued in the amount of \$133,852.

Noncurrent Liabilities

Noncurrent liabilities consist of contracts payable, representing 2008 floodwall project principal payments scheduled to be paid after June 30, 2018, plus certain long-term accrued staff compensation. The decrease from 2016 to 2017 is due to scheduled debt payments made in 2017.

Net Position

Net position is the difference between the Authority's assets plus deferred outflows of resources, and the Authority's liabilities. Total net position at June 30, 2017 was \$3.1 million, which is 1.2% lower than at June 30, 2016.

Net Investment in Capital Assets

Net investment in capital assets of nearly \$1.7 million includes the historical acquisition costs of land, land improvements, and buildings, net of accumulated depreciation, any outstanding related debt, and related deferred outflows of resources. This category indicates the portion of the total net assets that are not available for future appropriation or spending.

Restricted Net Position for Authorized Projects

Restricted net position of nearly \$1.5 million represents the balance available for Authority projects on June 30, 2017. The Authority's net position is restricted by the requirements of Michigan Public Act 450 of 1980, as amended, which limits expenditures to those that further the Authority's development plan. The increase between the two fiscal years is due to the difference between the Authority's fiscal 2017 revenues and expenditures, not including the principal payment for the 2008 bonds and depreciation expense which affected the net investment in capital assets.

Revenues

Property Taxes

The Authority's revenues are generated primarily through the use of property tax increment financing in which the Authority captures ad valorem property tax and industrial facility tax revenues attributable to increases in the value of real and personal property within the district boundaries. Property tax revenues related to the State Education Tax, the Kent Intermediate School District and the Grand Rapids Public Schools levies are not captured, because the Authority had no eligible obligations outstanding when Proposal A took effect on January 1, 1995. Property tax increment revenues for the year ended June 30, 2017 include property taxes levied July 1, 2016 and December 1, 2016. There was a nearly 25% decrease in property tax increment revenues in fiscal year 2017. The decrease was due primarily to taxable value losses resulting from the State of Michigan's Eligible Manufacturing Personal Property (EMPP) exemptions which became effective during fiscal year 2017.

Other Revenues

In fiscal year 2017 the Authority received funds from the State of Michigan's Local Community Stabilization Authority to partly compensate the Authority for property tax increment revenue losses resulting from the EMPP exemptions. This reimbursement is identified as state grants on the Statement of Activities.

Expenses

Urban Development

These expenses include operating expenses, public improvement project expenditures within the Monroe North Development Area, and the annual fixed asset depreciation expense.

Interest and Paying Agent Fees

In 1997 and 2000, the Kent County Drain Commission (the Drain Commission) issued bonds for the purpose of funding the City of Grand Rapids' share of floodwall improvements along the Grand River. These improvements consisted of embankments, river edge walkways, wall restoration, storm sewer flap gates, pump stations, etc. The Authority is responsible for 12% of the overall project debt service.

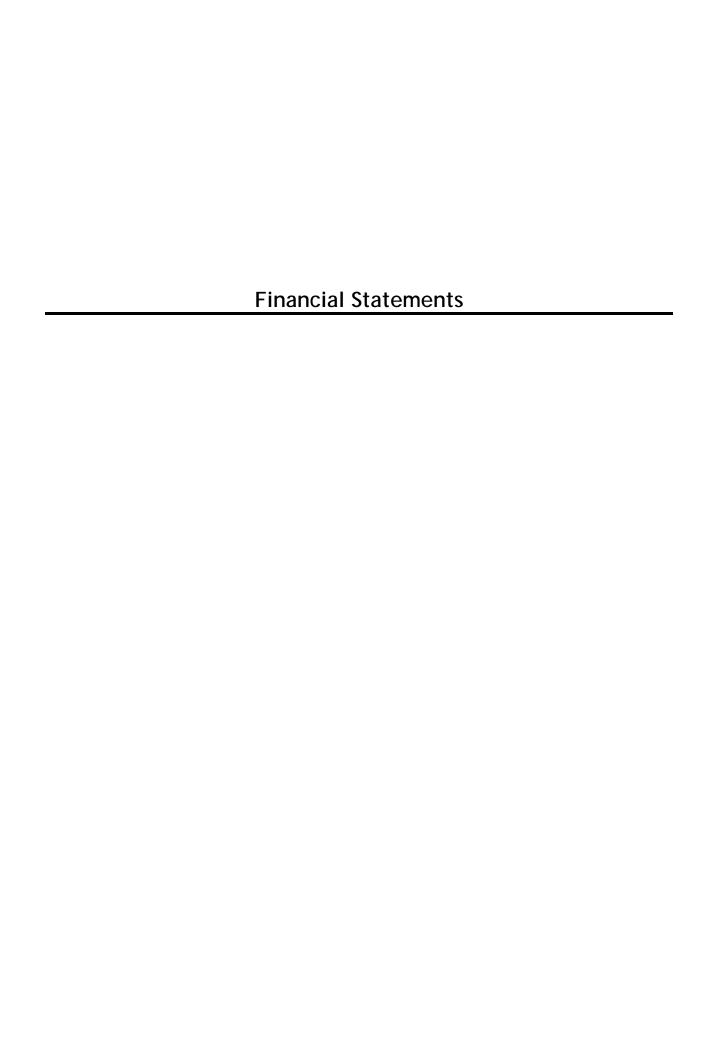
In 2008, most of the remaining maturities from both series were refunded by the Drain Commission for a net present value savings of 3.34%. The difference between the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price was \$37,200, which is being deferred and amortized over the remaining life of the bonds. The related debt service requirements for the Series 2008 bonds are met via assessments against the City of Grand Rapids, the Authority, and the Downtown Development Authority. As the amount of principal owed declines each year, annual interest expenses also decline. Annually the Authority accrues, as required, the amount of contract interest payable at June 30 of the year.

Overall Financial Position

Management believes the Authority is in good condition financially. Current tax increment revenues are adequate to cover current administration and project commitments, as well as ongoing debt service requirements.

Requests for Information

This financial report is designed to provide a general overview of the Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority finances for all those with an interest in the Authority's finances. Notes to Financial Statements

1. Reporting Entity

The Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority (the Authority), a component unit of the City of Grand Rapids, Michigan (the City), was created in December 1985 by the City and began operations in fiscal year 1987 under the provisions of Act 450, Public Acts of 1980 of the State of Michigan, as amended. The purpose of the Authority is to provide for the development of the Monroe North Development Area, which is bounded roughly by Coldbrook Street on the north, Ionia Avenue on the east, the Grand River on the west and the south line of Newberry Street on the south.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Presentation

The statement of net position/balance sheet and the statement of activities/revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance report information on the activities of the Authority. The adjustments columns are used to reflect the conversion from the balance sheet to the statement of net position, and the conversion of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance to the statement of activities.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The Authority uses the current financial resources measurement focus and modified accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current period. The Authority considers revenues available if earned and collected within 60 days after year-end; however, property tax increment revenues are recognized as revenues in the fiscal year for which they were levied. Expenditures are generally recognized when the related fund liability is incurred.

However, for presentation of the year-end audited financial data, the Authority uses the total economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting to prepare the statement of net position and the statement of activities. These statements are similar to statements used in the private sector. Revenues are recorded when earned, and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows.

Prior Year Columns

The columns labeled statement of net position 2016 and statement of activities 2016 are presented for information purposes only. These statements do not include the governmental fund balance sheet and the statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balance for fiscal year 2016, which are necessary for a complete presentation in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Budget

The Grand Rapids City Commission annually approves the Authority's budget after the Authority Board has reviewed and recommended it. After the City Commission approves the budget, the Authority Board adopts it. The budget for the Authority is a project budget rather than an annual budget. Therefore, budget to actual information has not been reflected in the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

Cash and Investments

The City maintains an investment pool for most City funds, including component units such as the Authority. The Authority's portion of the investment pool is displayed on the balance sheet as equity in pooled cash and investments. The Authority's equity in this pool is deemed to be a cash equivalent for financial reporting purposes because cash may be withdrawn at any time without prior notice or penalty.

The investment policy adopted by the City Commission is governed by the provisions of Michigan Public Act 20 of 1943, as amended. The policy is designed to prioritize the preservation of principal, while also providing an investment return. Details on the investment policy and the categorization of cash and investments are included in the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report of the City of Grand Rapids to give an indication of the level of risk assumed by the City at year-end. The losses shown on the Statement of Activities are a result of marking investments to market value on June 30, 2017, after a year of rising interest rates. The losses reflect the effect of the large relative increase in short-term interest rates from historic lows in July of 2016, not a default of any of the underlying securities. It is not feasible to allocate the level of risk to the various component units of the City because of the comingling of assets in the pool. Interest income and investment losses from the cash and investment pooling is distributed by the City Treasurer to the appropriate funds based on the fund's weighted average share of the investment pool.

Deposits are less than 10% of the total portfolio. They consist of bank money market funds, demand deposit accounts, and certificates of deposits with original maturities greater than three months at the date of purchase. Michigan statutes require that deposits be maintained in financial institutions with offices located in Michigan. Most deposits are uninsured and uncollateralized.

Investments are a diversified mixture of U.S. Government Agency and U.S. Treasury securities; money market mutual funds that maintain a \$1 value per share; obligations of the State of Michigan or its subdivisions with a rating of A or higher; and commercial paper rated by at least two rating organizations at their highest rating. All investments are reported at fair value.

Capital Assets

Tangible assets having a useful life in excess of one year and with a cost in excess of \$10,000 are capitalized. Capital assets are stated at acquisition cost or, for donated assets, the acquisition cost. When assets are sold or retired, the cost and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful lives of the related assets as follows:

Property Taxes

The majority of the Authority's revenues are generated through property tax increment financing. Summer taxes are levied on July 1 and attach as an enforceable lien at the time. Summer taxes are due without penalty on or before July 31. Winter taxes are levied on December 1 and attach as an enforceable lien at that time. Winter taxes are due without penalty on or before February 14.

Notes to Financial Statements

Deferred Outflows of Resources

In addition to assets, the statement of financial position reports a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense) until then. The Authority has only one type of item that qualifies for reporting in this category. The deferred on refunding of bonds results from the difference in the carrying value of refunded debt and its reacquisition price. This amount is deferred and amortized over the shorter of the life of the refunded or refunding debt.

Net Position

Net position represents assets, plus deferred outflows of resources, less liabilities. Net investment in capital assets consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by outstanding balances of debt issued for the acquisition, construction or improvements of those assets. Net position is reported as restricted when there are limitations imposed on its use either through legislation or other external restrictions. In the case of the Authority, enabling legislation restricts the use of all of the Authority's resources.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

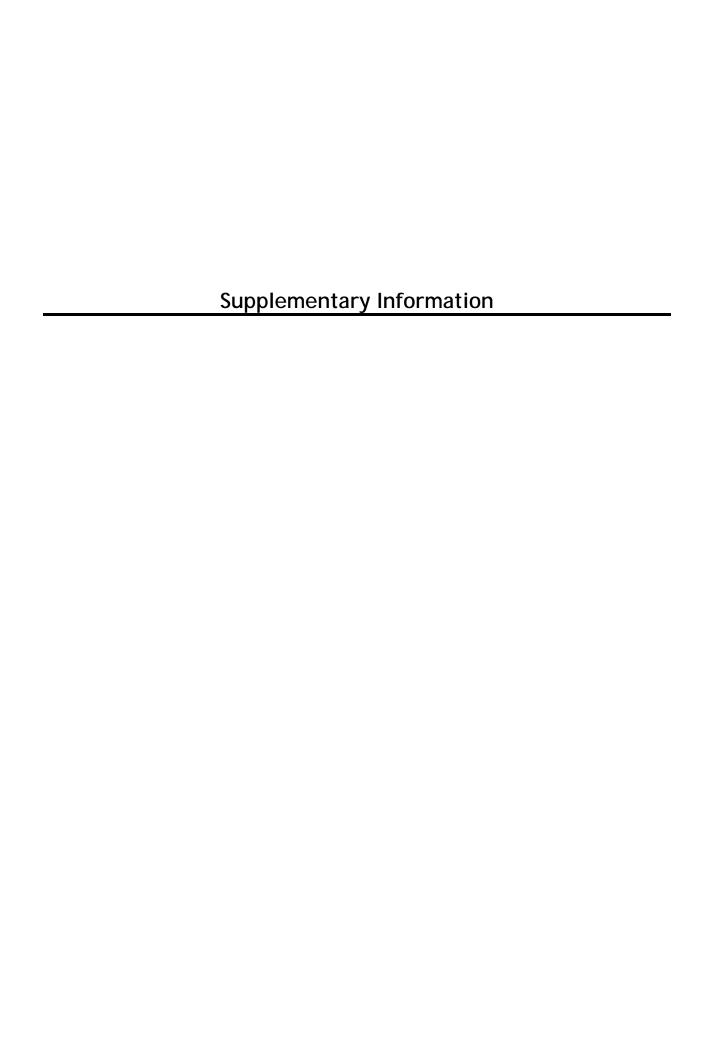

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Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority (A Component Unit of the City of Grand Rapids, Michigan)

Schedule of Projects (Unaudited)

In December 2015, the Authority approved GR Forward, which established a vision and strategies for the future of Downtown Grand Rapids. Drawing on input from the community, GR Forward prioritizes ideas and projects that align with and enhance the collective vision; and began building leadership around the following five goals:

- Goal 1: Restore the Grand River as the Draw and Create a Connected and Equitable River Corridor
- Goal 2: Establish a True Downtown Neighborhood That is Home to a Diverse Population
- Goal 3: Implement a 21st Century Mobility Strategy
- Goal 4: Expand Job Opportunities and Ensure Continued Vitality of the Local Economy
- Goal 5: Reinvest in Public Space, Culture and Inclusive Programming

The Authority has funds allocated to aid in implementation of the following priorities that align with GR Forward.

Goal 1: Grand River as the Draw and Create a Connected and Equitable River Corridor

Grand River Restoration

As part of ongoing community interest in providing access to the Grand River, the Authority included in its fiscal year 2016 budget funds to provide partial support for implementation of Grand Rapids Whitewater vision of a restored river, inclusive of improved ecosystem, fisheries habitat, and rapids. These changes would allow for recreational and commercial uses existing before the Grand River's natural features were altered for industrial purposes a hundred years ago.

River Trail Design Guidelines

Participation in a project to create a distinct identity for the future river trail. The project is being conducted in collaboration with the City of Grand Rapids Engineer and Parks and Recreation Departments.

Goal 2: Establish a True Downtown Neighborhood That is Home to a Diverse Population

Building Reuse Incentive Program

Request to continue funding the existing Building Reuse Incentive Program. Program funds will be used to cover existing obligations, and to continue to assist property and business owners in the rehabilitation of buildings constructed pre-1950 in Downtown. Funds are utilized to reimburse eligible activities, including barrier free improvements, fire suppression upgrades, providing a second means of egress, and many others.

Development Support Reimbursements

Continued funding for the existing Development Support Program. Program funds will be used to further promote economic growth and development in Downtown by funding approved eligible expenses in new construction projects over \$5 million in new investment and in rehabilitation projects featuring over \$1 million in new investment. Proposed funding is to cover existing obligations and to capitalize on new opportunities.

Grand Rapids Tax Increment Financing Authority (A Component Unit of the City of Grand Rapids, Michigan)

Schedule of Projects (Unaudited)

Downtown Enhancement Grant

Funding for the Downtown Enhancement Grant Program. Funds will be used to cover existing obligations, and to continue to assist property and business owners in the rehabilitation of the Downtown public realm. Funds are utilized to reimburse eligible activities, including installation of street furniture, snowmelt and other public realm improvements.

Goal 3: Implement a 21st Century Mobility Strategy

Accessibility and Mobility Repairs

Funding to implement recommendations from the Downtown accessibility audit conducted by the Disability Advocates of Kent County.

Bike Friendly Improvements

Funding for bike parking infrastructure to expand the current program in partnership with MobileGR, the Traffic Safety Department, and the Greater Grand Rapids Bicycle Coalition to enhance and expand bike parking options Downtown with a comprehensive bike parking plan (including new corrals, off-street parking, etc.). Funding to conduct a demand/feasibility analysis for a citywide bikeshare will also be provided through this line item.

Goal 5: Reinvest in Public Space, Culture and Inclusive Programming

Urban Recreation: Parks Programming

DDA contribution to Urban Recreation Programming helps to fund free outdoor fitness programming including Zumba, Werq, Kickboxing, and Pound classes as well as dancing classes including world dance, ballroom and street beats. This program will also help to fund outdoor walking and running tours.

Street Lighting Banner Brackets

Funding for infrastructure to continue street light banner program on key corridors.
