How to Get a Washington State Identification Card

STEP 1

- Check if you have one of the “stand alone”* documents. If you have one of these documents, then you may go directly to the DMV with the \$20 replacement fee for a new card. If not, proceed to Step 2.
- If you cannot afford the \$20 fee, please see the list of organizations* that can help you pay for a new ID card.

STEP 2

- Which age group are you in?
 - 1) Under 18 years old
 - 2) 18-25 years old
 - 3) 25 years or older
- See acceptable list of ID replacement documents for your age group*. In general, the acceptable documents for all age groups are one of the following:
 - Option 1: Two “A-List” documents*
 - Option 2: One “A-List” document and 2 “B-List” documents*
 - Option 3: Four “B-List” documents*
- If you don’t have any of the above documents, check to see if you have any of the “Option 5”* documents for your specific age group.
- If you have these documents, then go directly to DMV along with the \$20 replacement fee for a new card.
- If you cannot afford the \$20 fee, please see the list of organizations* that can help you pay for a new ID card.

STEP 3

- Do you have a mailing address that you can use for the ID?
- If not, please see the list of organizations that provide mailing address services*.
- If you don’t have enough documentation to satisfy these requirements, proceed to Step 4.

STEP 4

- If you have minimal or no documentation at all to prove your identity or address, please see the list of organizations* that can provide case management services to help you obtain identification without proof of identity or address.
