		<i>present simple</i>	<i>{future} + {base verb}</i>
	If	it rains ,	I will stay home
	If	Sue is late again,	she is going to be fired.
	If	it snows tomorrow,	what will you do?
	If	you are a good boy,	you can watch television tonight.*
*Sometimes we use can , shall , may , should , or might instead of will or going to .			
Second Conditional	If	Condition	Result
		<i>past simple</i>	<i>would + {base verb}</i>
	If	I won the lottery,	I would buy a new car.
	If	I had a good job	I would be happy.
	If	it snowed in July	would you be surprised?
	If	the building was on fire	I might jump out the window.*
*Sometimes we use should , could , or might instead of would .			
Third Conditional	If	Condition	Result
		<i>past perfect</i>	<i>would have + {past participle}</i>
	If	I had won the lottery	I would have bought a car.
	If	I had seen Mary	I would have told her.
	If	you had bought a lottery ticket	you might have won.*
	If	it had rained yesterday	what would you have done?
*Sometimes, we use should have , could have , or might have instead of would have .			
Zero Conditional	If	Condition	Result
		<i>present simple</i>	<i>present simple</i>
	If	you heat ice	it melts .
	If	I am late for work	my boss is angry.
	When*	I miss the 8am bus	I am late for work.
	If	you heat ice	does it melt?
*You can also use when instead of if .
