Offers perspective and context to the lesson's Bible passage

Much of the content of Paul's letter to the Ephesians focuses on the believer's identity in Christ. In chapter 1, Paul encourages them to rejoice in their identity; in chapter 2, he asks them to remember where they came from (what they have been saved from); in chapters 3 through 5, he exhorts them to live as "children of light" (5:8) and to live up to the calling they have received. In chapter 6, he asks them to remember that the enemy will try to break them down, destroy the unity of the body of Christ, and make them stray from the glorious calling they have received in Christ.

Why did Paul spend so much time discussing the idea of identity in his letter to the Ephesians? Ephesus was the third most populated city in the Roman Empire, on a bustling trade route. It was wealthy, important, and cosmopolitan. Because of this, the Ephesians' identity in Christ might have warred against the lure of money, prestige, or power.

In addition, because of the Roman fascination with Greek culture, Ephesus was Hellenized (turned Greek) under Roman rule. Temples dedicated to Greek gods were built, and much of Greek culture and philosophy were incorporated into Ephesian life. The Ephesian people were surrounded by the lifestyle and culture of pagan worship.

For these possible reasons, God inspired Paul to write this impassioned and beautiful letter. God gave Paul the words to speak the truth about who we are in Christ: “dearly loved children ... [chosen] before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight” (Ephesians 5:1; 1:4). These words resonate with us today. It is still astounding that through Christ we’re able to “live as children of light” (5:8).

Support

Provides reflection and assessment through encouragement, prayer, and time in God's Word

The first chapter of Ephesians is essentially one unbroken thought—an overflow of powerful emotion. It is Paul’s impassioned declaration, full of faith and joy at the free, lavish gift he received in Christ.

Read through Ephesians 1. Then read it again and pray “that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance” (Ephesians 1:18). Pray God will give you a similar overwhelming sense of joy at the knowledge of the salvation that you have in Christ.

In the same way that Paul prayed for the church in Ephesus, pray for your kids. Pray God will fill them up with a sense of joy from the glorious gift of Himself that He freely offers. Pray they will be overwhelmed with joy because they know they have been chosen to be His own.

CONNECT// 10 min.

Children develop relationships with their leaders and one another through simple activities and conversation starters.

My Name Is ...

Paul reminded the church in Ephesus about their identity in Jesus. In this activity, children will describe themselves to the group as they begin thinking about identity.

SUPPLIES

- None

RELATE

CONNECT QUESTION: Welcome and greet children. Open your time by asking this question: **What is something for which you're known?**

Other people know us for different things—maybe for our curly hair, or our happy laugh, or how we're good at soccer. Today let's share how we would describe ourselves.

To begin, ask the children to sit in a circle. Then go around the circle and have each child describe herself by sharing an adjective that starts with the first letter of her first name. For example, a child named Amy might say, "My name is Amy, and I am active." Go around the circle at least once, making sure each child gets a chance to share. If time permits, go around the circle another time or two.

Developmentally Speaking

Peer relationships are very important to kids of this age group, and being different isn't something that children typically praise in one another. Although it might be difficult for them, encourage children to respect the unique qualities of one another.

GATHER// 30 min.

*Children experience and learn more about God through memorizing Scripture, storytelling from *The Big God Story*, prayer, and discussion.*

Remember Verse

Each week children will spend time memorizing a portion of Scripture together. The Remember Verse focuses on a character trait of God that's highlighted in today's portion of *The Big God Story*.

Game: Writing Race

SUPPLIES

- Table
- Chairs (1 per child)
- Paper (2–4 sheets)
- Pencil or pen
- Timer

RELATE

Have the kids sit around a table. Review the verse a few times with the class. Then give one child in the circle a sheet of paper and a pencil or pen. When you say, “Go!” start the timer and have the child write the first word of the verse on the paper and then pass the paper and pen to the child on his right. That child will write the next word of the verse and pass the paper and pen to the child on her right. Have children continue to pass around the paper and pen until they’ve written all of the words of the verse. Then stop the timer. Check to see if the verse is written correctly, make any corrections if needed, and then read the verse aloud. Challenge the class to another round to see if they can beat their first time.

Storytelling

Bible Passage: Acts 19; Ephesians 1

Storytelling Technique: Categorizing Images

God Calls Us His Own

SUPPLIES

- Bibles
- Magazines (3–4, include both popular magazines and family or Christian magazines)
- Scissors
- Poster board (2 sheets) or butcher paper (2 pieces, each approx. 2')
- Marker
- Tape
- Glue sticks (2–3)

PREPARE AHEAD

Using the magazines, cut out a variety of images of things that relate to what the world finds important versus what God finds important. For example, you can cut out images of cars, money, travel, beauty supplies, music, celebrities, makeup, etc. Also cut out images of families, friends, nature, Bibles, churches, smiling people, sad people, hurting people, etc. Make sure you have enough for each child to have at least one image, preferably two. On one of the poster boards or pieces of butcher paper, write “World’s Own” across the top. On the other, write “God’s Own” across the top.

SET UP

Tape the poster boards to the wall at a height the children can reach. Set the marker, images, and glue sticks nearby.

RELATE

Lead children in a Prayer of Release to pause, be still, and ask the Holy Spirit to quiet their hearts and minds. **What is the farthest away you’ve ever traveled?** Invite the kids to respond. **You’ve been to some interesting places! After Jesus rose from the dead and rose up to heaven, The Big God Story started to**

spread to many places because Paul, as well as Jesus' other disciples, wanted everyone to know Jesus' message. They traveled to places such as Antioch, Philippi, Thessalonica, and Athens.

The next stop on Paul's journey was the city of Ephesus. Ephesus was a beautiful city with many rich people. The Ephesians had many nice things. They worshipped many false gods and didn't believe in the one true God. The Ephesians thought that sports and beauty and money were some of the most important things in life. Many people today think that way too. What are some of the things that people today think are most important? Invite kids to respond. **Good thoughts! Things such as movies, being beautiful, nice cars, or lots of money. These are things the world, or the culture around us, finds important.** Invite the kids to look through the magazine images that you cut out. Invite a few volunteers to come glue some of the images that relate to things the world considers important to the "World's Own" board.

When Paul went to Ephesus, he shared the truth about Jesus with the Ephesians. Many listened and believed in Jesus and the salvation He offers. After a while, Paul had to leave and go to another city. Without Paul there, some of the new believers in Jesus had a hard time staying strong in their identity in Christ. It was tough to stay righteous without Paul teaching and guiding them.

What does *identity* even mean? Invite the kids to respond. **Our identity is who we are! Sometimes, like the Ephesians, we think our identity is in how good we are at sports or school or how good-looking we are. But God says our identity is found in Him. When we choose to trust and obey Jesus, the truest thing about us is what He says about us. God created us in His image, and we belong to Him.** Invite kids to look through the pictures and glue some images that represent our identity in Christ on the "God's Own" board—for example, Bibles, churches, friends, crosses, smiling faces, etc.

God called the Ephesians His very own. And God encouraged Paul to write a letter to the Ephesians so that they could be reminded of this—of their identity as God's own children, made in His image. We still have Paul's letter today—it's the book of Ephesians in our Bibles. Invite the kids to turn to the book of Ephesians in their Bibles. If you have an image of a Bible, invite a child to glue it to the "God's Own" board. If not, write "Ephesians" on that board.

Paul wanted to remind the Ephesians that their identity was in Jesus because of His great love for them. Read Ephesians 1:4–7 aloud while the kids follow along. **Because of Jesus, we are God's own people. He adopts us as His own children! Do any of you know anyone who was adopted?** Invite the kids to respond. **What an amazing love—parents who choose to make a child their very own! This is exactly what God did for us through Jesus.** Invite a few volunteers to come glue images of families to the "God's Own" board.

Paul encouraged the believers and reminded them of the good news about Jesus. Read verse 13 aloud while the kids follow along. **The believers had heard the gospel and received Jesus. God gave them His Holy Spirit to live inside of them—they could find their identity in Him!**

Paul wrote this letter to remind the Ephesians of God's truth. But this letter is still useful to us today! It is a great reminder of how Jesus came to die for us. He chose us as His own children, and He gives us His Holy Spirit so that we can live for Him and find our identity in Him. **Our identity doesn't come from our money or our grades or how good we are at sports.** Ask a few volunteers to glue the remaining "worldly" images to the "World's Own" board.

Our identity is in our relationship with Jesus! He has saved us and calls us His children. What an amazing God we serve! Consider sharing a time when you recognized your identity in Christ. As you do, glue

a few key images from your story on the “God’s Own” board. Then invite a couple of volunteers to share a time they recognized their identity as God’s children. You can write down key words as they share as well, or invite them to come glue related images to the “God’s Own” board.

Discussion Questions

- **Why did Paul write a letter to the Ephesians?**
- **What were some of the things the Ephesians found their identity in?** (money, beauty, etc.)
- **What made the Ephesian believers God’s children?** Ephesians 1:15
- **How does it make you feel to know God calls you His own?**
- **How can we fight against the lies of the enemy?**

RESPOND// 15 min.

Children reflect on what the Holy Spirit is teaching them and respond to God through creative activities and games.

What God Says about Me

Children will look at what God says about identity and write down words that express who God says they are.

SUPPLIES

- Door mirror
- Dry erase markers (various colors)

SET UP

Lean a door mirror against a secure corner or wall of your classroom. Put a variety of dry erase markers by it.

RELATE

What are some things that make you unique? Invite responses. **Those are great thoughts. Paul wrote a letter to the Ephesian church to encourage them and remind them of their new identity in Christ. When we choose to follow Jesus, we receive a brand-new identity that says we belong to God!**

Invite the kids to close their eyes and listen carefully as you read Ephesians 1:4–8. When you finish reading, discuss the following question: **What are some of the key words or phrases that stood out to you in this passage that describes your identity in Christ?**

After the kids have shared, invite each child to think through the different words he heard and choose one word that most stands out to him. Once each child has her word, invite her to go to the mirror and write the word on it. When she’s finished, she can look at the mirror and see the word of God’s truth over her reflection.

Keep the mirror up so children and parents can look back and be reminded of God’s truth during the next Remember & Celebrate weekend.

(Optional) I Belong To ...

Play a matching game with your kids and then discuss the concept of belonging.

SUPPLIES

- I Belong To cards (see Resources)
- Scissors

PREPARE AHEAD

Print the I Belong To cards and cut them apart. You'll need two of each kind of card to make a matching pair of them. Each child will get one card (with another child in the class getting its match).

RELATE

Paul reminded the Ephesians of their new identity in Christ. The Ephesians didn't belong to themselves anymore; they belonged to God!

Invite your children to play a game during which they will find out whom they belong to. To begin, give a card to each child. Every card should have a match. Then, invite each child to look for his partner by acting out what's on his card. For example, if the card says "chicken," the child will have to cluck like a chicken and look for his fellow clucking chicken. Children who find their matches can sit down until everyone finishes.

Then encourage the kids to discuss some questions related to the game: **Was it easy or difficult to find the person whom you belonged to in this game? Why or why not? Do you think people can tell whom you belong to by the way you act or speak? How do you think we can show others we belong to Jesus?**

BLESS// 5 min.

Children receive a blessing from their leaders and sometimes one another. A blessing can be a prayer of commission, a portion of Scripture, or words to encourage and guide.

SUPPLIES

- Remember Verse cards (see Resources)
- At Home Weekly: Lesson 11 (see Resources)
- Name tags or blank labels (1 per child)
- Marker
- Bible

PREPARE AHEAD

On each name tag or label, write one of the following words or phrases: "royal," "chosen," "holy," and "God's special possession."

RELATE

Gather your kids and invite them to stand in a circle together as you read 1 Peter 2:9 over them:

But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light.

Go to each child and give her one of the labels or name tags. As you give each child the name tag, read the word or phrase on it by saying, (Child's name), **may you know you are** (word or phrase on name tag).

Once you have blessed each child individually this way, have the kids stand together as you bless the entire class.

May you know you have been chosen by God. You belong to Him. May you praise Him for calling you His own.

Send home Remember Verse cards and the At Home Weekly with your kids.
