

In other words, seek the welfare of the place where God has sent you. Think of yourself as "sent" there by God for his glory. Because you are.



Volunteer Training

The women we are privileged to serve have already been through so much that we can never understand. We feel it is our responsibility to come alongside them with as much training as possible in order to protect them from further harm. Anyone who desires to volunteer directly with the women will be expected to complete RAHAB's training and orientation process.

Adult Safe House

For women 18 and older, this ministry provides restoration, healing, education, and reintegration skills for women. Provided at no cost, the women receive counseling, spiritual discipleship, life skills training, and more. For many of our residents, this is their first real home with positive family like interactions.

Minor Safe House

For girls 17 and under, age-appropriate activities, counseling, education and Bible study are some of the ways girls are helped to reintegrate into society.

Donations

- **Clothing-clean**, gently used, in-style clothing only; all sizes appreciated: jeans (always needed!), tennis shoes, boots, coats, jackets, hoodies, gloves, warm scarves, hats, purses and accessories (scarves, jewelry, belts, etc.), new or gently used bras.
- **Miscellaneous**: new notebooks/journals, NLT Recovery Bibles, study Bibles (NIV, NLT, or NKJV), recent Christian books, devotionals, reading glasses, shop vac, fire pit, laptops, extension cord (outdoor 50+ feet), fax machine, pens and gel pens, adult coloring books, gift cards (Wal-Mart, gas, Home Depot, Marc's, Sams Club), Fabreeze, new propane grill, new stainless steel refrigerator, tall kitchen garbage bags, DVD player, ink for Cannon 245XL printer, cleaning supplies, foil, plastic wrap, zip lock bags.

SCOPE: Supporting, mentoring, and connecting with young people, giving them a fighting chance to rise above their circumstances while enhancing the quality of their lives as they learn to make great life choices through guidance and training. Hannah's House 119 carries out this mission by connecting young, at risk women, including young mothers and sex trafficked individuals, to mentors. Mentors are committed to offering support and guidance along with resources and opportunities making the transition into adulthood successful.

Hannah's House 119 is a nonprofit organization depending, in faith, on God's provision through grants and private donations from those who want to partner with us in breaking the cycle, helping young people rise above their circumstances, making a better life for themselves and becoming a contributing citizen of their communities. Hannah's House 119 is more than a physical place; it's a support system for the many young women of Stark County who often have no one to count on. With a growing set of programs and mentors to offer guidance, life skill training and opportunity, we lessen the odds of them falling into homelessness, sexual exploitation, gangs, early motherhood, joblessness or imprisonment. Be a part of helping others rise above their circumstances!

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Drivers/Childcare: We are in need of drivers on Monday nights and to transport girls to appointments. You must be at least 18 years old and have a valid drivers license. We are looking for those willing to provide childcare Monday evenings.

Cleaning: If you like to clean or organize, this is for you! We need someone to come in to Hannah's House once a week to organize supplies and food, and general cleaning.

Food Prep: Do you like to cook? We feed over 200 youth each week through our groups. We are looking for those that are available once a month on Monday mornings from 9:30 to 11:30am to help prep food for the week.

Bakers: Do you like to bake? We are always in need of cookies or snacks for our groups. We are looking for those that are able to commit to baking for us once a month. Snacks: make 8-10 dozen sweet or savory snacks. You pick the week.

Graphic Design: Do you have a talent for designing graphics or print materials? We are looking for someone who is able to help us design Facebook graphics and event flyers throughout the month.

Girls/Guys Circle

- · Girls Circle In School: We are seeking mentors for our in school Girls Circle groups. These groups meet around the lunch hours and normally require a 2 hour commitment once a week.
- \cdot Girls Circle: After School We are seeking mentors for our after school Girls Circle groups. These groups meet after school and normally require a 2 hour commitment once a week.
- · Guys Circle: In School We are seeking male mentors for our in school Guys Circle group. This group meets around the lunch hours and normally requires a 2 hour commitment once a week.

Girls Club

- · Girls Club Monday Night: This group meets every Monday evening from 5-8pm at Beacon Academy in Canton. We are seeking mentors that are able to commit to this time frame once a week, year round.
- · Girls Club Tuesday Night: This group meets every Tuesday evening in Alliance. We are seeking mentors that are able to commit to this time frame once a week, year round.

BRAVE

 \cdot We collaborate with Pathway Caring for Children for this group. It is made of boys who are in the foster care system. This group meets on the first and third Thursdays of each month, year round. We are seeking men who are able to commit to that time frame.

Parenting

· Mentoring with our high-risk youth on an individual basis.

One-to-One Mentoring

 \cdot 1 to 1 Mentors: We are seeking mentors who are willing to become 1 to 1 mentors. This involves specialized training regarding issues associated with high risk youth. These mentors become a friend to the youth. The amount of time involved varies depending upon the youth, but you are expected to reach out to the youth often throughout the week to foster the relationship.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

The Martin Center is impacting lives on a daily basis. There is a physical and educational emphasis with the possibilities of college and job placement. But there is also a spiritual piece in partnership with local churches and youth groups that are changing lives in a greater way. There are various opportunities for you to serve with us. The Martin Center believes that by changing even one life at a time a difference is being made not only in downtown Canton, but our world.

GYMNASIUM: The Martin Center has a premier gym with the recent Heritage Christian School renovations for the neighborhood to hold games, basketball and volleyball clinics, etc.

GAME ROOM: In the game room there is a pool table, two air hockey tables, a foosball table, two TVs with gaming systems, and a cafe area where board games can be played, and refreshments are sometimes available.

COMPUTER / TUTOR ROOM: The Martin Center has been blessed with the donations of many things, one of them being computers and workstations where children and youth can do their homework.

WEIGHT ROOM: Fitness is important to many. At The Martin Center, we have a weight room stocked with the essentials for strength training.

How to partner with The Martin House:

We are in need of full time and part time coordinators as staff. We are in need of finances to the director and two coordinators. The total of all salaries [34 individuals] is \$60,000. The remainder needed is described below:

Total Funds Needed approximately, \$ 200,000

· Adopt A Monthly / Annual Operational Budget Need:

Republic Waste \$100 [\$1,200 Annually] Miscellaneous \$150 [\$1,800 Annually] City Water \$300 [\$3,600 Annually] AEP Electric \$700 [\$8,400 Annually] Columbia Gas \$2200 [\$26,400 Annually]

We have an entire 3rd floor that can be rented to ministries and nonprofits to raise more funds. However, the local codes require an elevator be installed to utilize the 3rd floor on a permanent basis.

SCOPE: We believe that no one should have to die cold and alone regardless of mental health issues, addictions or spiritual condition. We are working on a solution to help make a difference. Please pray with us as we seek God's will in this.

CORE VALUES:

- · Homelessness is unacceptable.
- There are no homeless people.
 Only people who have lost their homes and deserve to be treated with dignity and respect.
- · Homelessness is expensive.
- · Homelessness is solvable.
- · Homelessness is preventable.
- · We collaborate, encourage and partner with those interested in preventing and ending homelessness.

DESCRIPTION:

SHELTER: For the least of these... Providing a bare minimum safe warm dry place for those that cannot find it anywhere else. For H.O.T. this is our priority and mandate, no one is to die on our watch.

THINK TANK: Brainstorming . . . Gathering people together, from engineers to homeless, discussing and thinking about the problem; realizing that what is being done now only treats the symptoms. We work on new ideas and creative solutions that can help raise the oppressed and homeless out of poverty.

PANHANDLERS: Most panhandlers are not homeless. Most homeless are not panhandlers. Please don't give panhandlers money, give them our card and we will help them if they are truly homeless. Giving them money only supports their addictive behavior (i.e. smokes and beer).

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

PALLETS TO PROSPERITY

We are seeking donations of wood scrap, including wood pallets, from the community, to use as firewood to generate heat and electricity, and also make shabby chic crates for sale.

AQUAPONICS

Raise food and vegetables using green science low environmental impact off the grid ideas and concepts because we think they partner well with problems of housing the homeless, including decreasing the environmental impact of any individual.

BEEKEEPING

Raising bees is a complex job, but for some people it is intuitive and partners well with personality disorders and the social challenges that cause homelessness.

H.O.T. "CHANGE FOR CHANGE" PIGGY BANK

HOT brings banks to your group (church, Sunday school, club, business, etc). Please ask your group members for change (coins) by emptying their pockets and purses daily for six to eight weeks. This fund raiser campaign has been very successful. It doesn't disrupt your current revenue streams like tithing, but with many of the hundreds of churches and business groups and organizations participating these funds add up to sustain a minimal shelter for the "least of these".

NO CASH FOR PANHANDLERS... PLEASE!!!

You can simply give panhandlers our H.O.T. card which you can get at Total Living Centers or by contacting us. H.O.T. also has this packet in a ziploc bag, which includes a water bottle, a nutritious granola bar and our card, and a paper telling them to call H.O.T. to talk to a friend that helps homeless people.

BLESSING BAGS TO THE HOMELESS

Donate any of these items, to help us make blessing bags. Disposable lighter, matches (adults only), assorted bandaids, pocket size pack of kleenex, chapstick/lipbalm, bottle of water (or nonalcoholic beverage), pack of gum, mints, hard candy or nonperishable snacks, cough drops, individual wet wipes, hand sanitizer, adult toothbrush with cover, travel size toothpaste, floss & plackers, 3 in 1 body wash or shower gel, bar of antibacterial soap & wash cloth in ziplock bag, small hair brush/comb, travel size shampoo & conditioner, pocket size flashlight/batteries, used candles, lotion, travel size mouthwash, deodorant, nail clippers, plastic rain parka, takeout cutlery, wrapped, travel size detergent or pod in ziplock bag, activities: cards, pencil, pen, pad, books.

Additional items for a woman's bag:

Tampons, pads, pantyliners, makeup bags, or clear plastic bags with zippers.

For nearly 30 years, it's been our privilege and honor to see people join together to build and renovate homes that offer hardworking families the opportunity to live life from a position of strength, stability, and self reliance. We have witnessed the power of a decent shelter and how it removes barriers that block opportunity, helps families thrive, and keeps children healthy. We have seen that an affordable home changes the future of a family for generations.

If you are excited about that mission, we would love to talk about ways we can work together.

HOW HABITAT WORKS

Each and every day, people all over the world (and all over east central Ohio) partner with Habitat for Humanity to offer families strength, stability, and self reliance through shelter. Through this partnership, each family has the opportunity to build and purchase their own decent home with an affordable zero interest mortgage. When hardworking families are surrounded and supported by determined volunteers and generous donors, a future full of opportunity is built. Here's how Habitat works . . .

ONE: the partnership begins

Habitat for Humanity partners with individuals and families to help them achieve strength, stability, and self reliance through shelter. Families must be currently living in substandard housing, have a steady income, and be willing to partner with Habitat. Learn more about home ownership.

TWO: property is acquired

Land for a family's future home is donated to or purchased by Habitat. Habitat also renovates existing homes that are donated or purchased to create safe housing through the PreserveAHome program. Would you like to make a tax deductible land or property donation? Contact us today.

THREE: resources are secured

Sponsors and donors contribute the financial resources that allow Habitat to secure the required materials and services to build or renovate each home. Businesses and organizations also donate their materials and services as a tax deductible gift-in-kind. Contact us to learn more.

FOUR: future homeowners prepare

Future homeowners progress through the Habitat partnership by completing sweat equity hours. This includes building their home and the homes of other families, participating in Homeowner Maintenance Education (HOME), completing financial literacy courses, and much more.

FIVE: the home is built or renovated

Volunteers contribute their time to build or renovate a family's home. While serving with Habitat, volunteers will work alongside future homeowners and Habitat site supervisors - no previous experience or skill required. Volunteers are the heart of Habitat for Humanity!

SIX: the home is sold

Once all of the partnership requirements have been met and the home construction or renovation is complete, the home is sold to the deserving family with a long term, zero interest mortgage. The family or individual now owns a safe, decent, and affordable home.

SEVEN: the cycle repeats

As current Habitat homeowners make payments on their zero interest mortgage, they are helping to fund the construction and renovation of additional homes with other low income families. Every Habitat for Humanity home, whether new or renovated, has some funding from homeowner house payments and proceeds from Habitat for Humanity ReStore.

MISSION: Impacting children's lives, body, mind and soul.

History: Tiqvah Hands of Hope started in the fall of 2009, modeled after a program in Chicago serving one of its most impoverished neighborhoods. With the goal of impacting children's lives, body, mind, and soul; Tiqvah began developing relationships in the S.E. community center and helping students complete their homework, provide meals and offer enrichment opportunities. When we began to outgrow not only the space at the community center, but also a local church, we knew we had also outgrown serving only the southeast sector of Canton. TIQVAH opened at its previous facility, St Pauls Episcopal Church in 2012, and began offering services to families we already had relationships with but moved to a new neighborhood. Soon, we were offered a partnership with the school district and they began bussing the children to us from 15 different schools. We continued to add to our programming and attendance and soon found once again the need for more space. Now in our current home, Christ Presbyterian Church in downtown Canton, we are still serving Canton City Schools and loving our families.

Current Programs and Services

We offer mentoring, tutoring, enrichment classes (art, drumming, dance, science, cultural awareness, and more) and character development. Specifically, the services our program provides for local families include but are not limited to:

- · Nutritious family style meal each day three days a week.
- · Personal hygiene so children can brush teeth daily and receive other products they need.
- · Physical Education: dance, calisthenics, running, jump rope, basketball, and more.
- · Biblically based character development to aid in their maturity and decision making skills.
- · A clothing boutique for our students and their families.
- · Student and Family Celebration Meals: Christmas, in the spring and at the end of the school year.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Our program's success is dependent on our volunteers. The primary responsibility of a volunteer is to spend quality time with our students and follow the lead of our incredible team leaders in impacting students lives. Go to Tiqvah: Hands of Hope web site for more information: www.tiqvah.org

Gift Cards

Gift cards in increments of \$25 or more are useful for us when we take our students on field trips or when a specific need arises. In the past gift cards from McDonalds (or any fast food restaurant), Target, Sam's Club, Walmart and grocery stores have been helpful. Gift cards allow us to meet needs as they arise without having to store an abundance of supplies that may or may not get used.

Food

We provide a meal and a snack every day at Tiqvah. On our "get involved" page on our web site you will find the option to prepare a meal for Tiqvah. This is a great way to give us something so needed and appreciated. If you are looking to donate food items that do not require any preparation, please follow the same procedure as you would to provide a meal. Our site director will contact you with a date for your donation and our most recent food needs. This will prevent those who donate from giving items we may already have purchased or have acquired through other generous donations.

School Supplies

Because so many of the Canton City Schools now have programs that donate a FULL back pack to students at the fall open house events, we provide school supplies on an "as needed" basis.

Spring Family Dinner

Our students don't just show all of our lovely partners their talents at the fundraiser; they also get the honor of performing in front of their family and friends every spring. Our students dance, sing, entertain their families and share dinner together. If you are a volunteer or sponsor and are interested in attending a Spring Family Dinner (usually held in April), please contact us and let us know you are interested in joining us. It will be a very full house that night, so we will want to be sure we have seats prepared for all interested.

SCOPE: Canton Calvary Mission opened in 2001 in the building occupied by Calvary United Methodist Church until its closure in December 2000. The church had already begun some community outreach programs, so it was a natural step for the Mission to continue those programs. Since then programming has grown and continues to grow to reflect the needs of the neighborhood.

Food is a major component of the services provided by Canton Calvary Mission. Food programs include a Food Pantry, Direct Distribution in cooperation with the Akron/Canton Regional Foodbank, Wednesday Hot Lunch, Saturday Evening Meal, Children's Backpack Program, After School Snacks for children and a Summer Feeding Program for children.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

There are so many opportunities for you to volunteer! It's because of our many volunteers that we are able to offer so many free services to those in need throughout the community. God has given each one of us a talent, but never gave one person every talent, so the power of partnership is very important. Please look at the list below and see what talent you can give and make a difference in a life.

· Saturday Evening Hot Meal

Churches, classes, organizations, families, or groups of coworkers are needed to serve the Saturday Evening Hot Meal. This involves providing the food and preparation, setup and cleanup. The time involved is approximately 4-8 p.m. We can help with menu ideas. Choose one week each year to serve or sign up for several.

· Wednesday Hot Lunch Program

Cooks and crew are needed for the Wednesday hot lunch program. Hot lunch is served every Wednesday. Kitchen workers would need to arrive at around 10 a.m. and will be done by 2 p.m. Food is provided by the Mission, you are just needed to cook, serve food and help clean up! We can schedule you for each week, once a month, or whatever works with your schedule.

Tuesday Morning Foodbank Drivers

Drivers are needed for the Tuesday Morning Foodbank. We are in immediate need of folks who can pick up food at the Akron/Canton food bank on Tuesday mornings at 8:00 a.m. These persons would need to have a truck or large van and be able to help lift the cases of food. Food is brought to the Mission and unloaded and you are generally done before 10 a.m. We can schedule you for one week/month, every week or work out a schedule with you that fits your calendar.

Activity Aids for CAPS

Activity Aides are needed for the Calvary Arts Project (CAPS), which meets on Monday through Thursday from 2:30 to 5:00 p.m. Volunteers are especially needed at this time. Please call the Mission to volunteer.

After School Program Tutors

Tutors are needed for the After School Tutoring Program, Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Pantry Workers

Pantry Workers are needed to help every Wednesday 9:30-11:45 a.m. and 1-2 p.m., the first Saturday of the month, 1-4 p.m., and the third Thursday of the month 3:456. Volunteers are needed to help folks shop in the pantry and with computer entry.

Refuge of Hope's shelter is not just a place where a homeless man can sleep at night. Rather, it's a support center, in a safe environment, where men can come to grips with the personal, economical and societal issues that caused them to become homeless. We provide a hand up to encourage homeless men, to help them realize that positive life changes are possible regardless of their current circumstances. We were able to move over 132 men into permanent housing last year and through March of 2018 over 30 additional men are now living in their own apartments. Refuge of Hope is the only such shelter in Stark County for men.

Hot Meals: Hope can begin with a steaming cup of coffee and a hot meal. Hope can be nurtured through relationships with caring staff and volunteers. Our goal, in addition to serving free, hot, nutritious meals, is to meet the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of hurting individuals and families. We strive to go the extra mile by treating our lunch and dinner guests with love, compassion, and respect by providing the hope and encouragement they need.

Dinner is served Monday through Friday at 4:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Lunch is served Tuesday, Friday and Saturday at 11:00 a.m.

- · Host warm clothing giveaway at ROH. *We will provide all the items. Volunteers to oversee the project bringing items down, organizing giveaways and manning tables during meal ministry.
- · Set up a table on Sunday morning after church in your church lobby present Refuge of Hope's rescue mission information, an urgently needed items list OR host a canned food drive.
- · Plan a behind the scenes youth project.
- · Prayer Partners (Individually or with a partner) Volunteer during a meal and make yourself available to pray one-on-one with our dinner guests and shelter residents wanting to pray with someone.
- · Hold a fund raiser for ROH and purchase a piece of needed equipment for the kitchen (Example: 100 cup coffee pot, forks, and knives, cups, plates, etc.).
- · Host a shelter resident's special snack of ice cream (50 men).
- · Help us build community awareness! "Like" us on Facebook and share posts with your friends. "Follow" us on LinkedIn and Instagram. Share posts with your friends' list.
- \cdot Tour & A Meal Bring a group in for a tour of our rescue mission and eat a meal sitting with dinner guests.

DISCOVER THE HOW GOD'S KINGDOM LONGS TO BE EXPRESSED IN YOUR COMMUNITY

ASK: Where is God already at work in your neighborhood? In your city?

Look for the work of the Kingdom among the following people: the poor, the brokenhearted, those in captivity, the prisoners, those who are in mourning, those who are in despair.

Watch for the Gospel in unexpected places. Is it possible that God might be using non-Christians to bring redemption to your city? Make a list of the things you find.

DISCOVER THE KINGDOM IN YOUR OWN LIFE

ASK: Where in your life do you interact with people from the previous question? Make a list?

Think about people in your neighborhood, your job, your school, and the places you spend time.

Make a list of places where your life interacts with God's activity in their lives.

BE THE GOOD NEWS

In the next few days, be "good news" to some of the people in the previous lists. Send flowers or a gift card, mow a lawn, mentor a young person, clean up a park, help someone for free – construction, decorating, baby-sitting, cooking. Think about blessings in these 3 categories: words, actions and gifts.

- Invite people into your home. Invite neighbors for a meal, a game night or perhaps dessert. Some people can more easily invite others over on the spur of the moment, but most people need to plan and prepare ahead. If that is you, then set a regular time each week or month to invite others into your home.
- Make a list of people in both your faith community and in your neighborhood who would be encouraged by your offer of hospitality. For those in your church, invite them to join you for lunch after a gathering. For those who live nearby, invite them to join you for lunch or a cookout. Sometimes being outside is less threatening.
- Identify single parents in your neighborhood who need weekend childcare. Care for someone who is recovering from surgery. Provide short-term or long-term foster care. Talk with local pregnancy crisis centers about the use of your home for single mothers.
- Get your neighborhood to go to one of local kids sporting events to cheer them on. Do a food drive or coat drive in winter, anything that get neighbors helping neighbors.
- Be a "home away from home" for college students or those serving in the military who are away from home.
