- 3. What is a permanent long range solution to the BCA needs for a building?
 - 4. What do we do about the dogs?
- 5. There is no specific provision in the BCA documents for a nomination process. This is an important procedure that needs to be officially established for BCA.
- 6. Obtaining property owner input and feedback is always an important issue. Communications is the foundation on which BCA is built and needs to be improved upon.



to them. "


