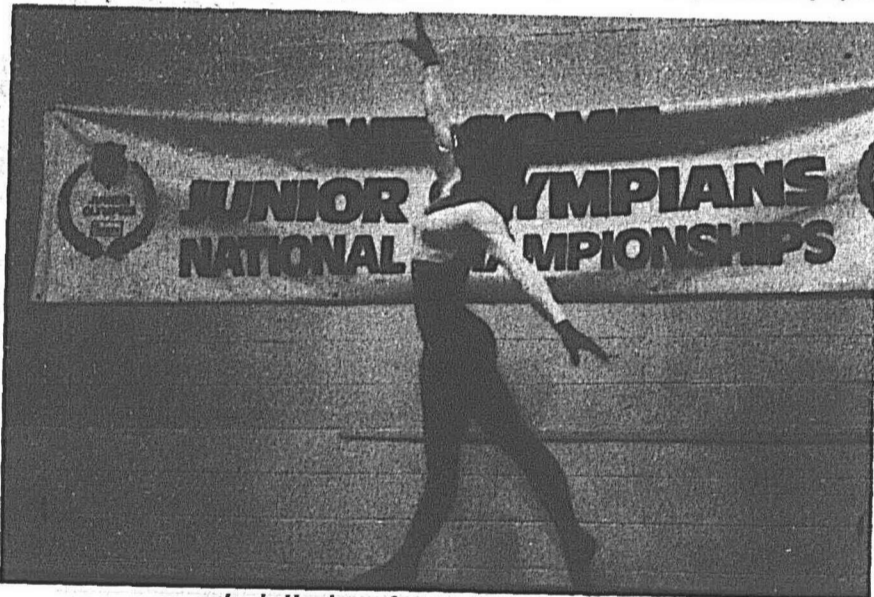

The Richmond Olympiad School of Gymnastics has brought gymnastics training on the scene in Richmond and surrounding counties. The School operates in two different areas, classes to the public and sponsorship and training of a competitive team. Earl McKesson Cited

Bond's Effect on Brandermill

On September 2, residents of Brandermill will have an opportunity to address several community needs for public school facilities for the 1800 families now residing in this community.

Included in the 1980 School Bond Issue package is construction of an elementary school to be located in the center of Brandermill on Genito Road. This school is planned to not only provide adequate educational facilities for Brandermill children in kindergarten through the fifth grade, but to relieve Watkins Elementary School, which has been experiencing serious problems precipitated by overcrowding for the past five years. Approximately 800 students attending Watkins for the 1979-80 school year came from the Brandermill and Genito Road communities alone, which represents more than half of Watkins' student body. Enrollment data compiled this month by school officials has revealed that Watkins has exceeded its enrollment projection for September 30, 1980, by 64 students. This means that on opening day, students attending Watkins can expect to occupy all classroom space in the main building and its annex as well as at least four trailers to handle its burgeoning school population.

Although the actual site for the second elementary school proposed for the Clover Hill District has not yet been determined, it possibly would be located southwest of Brandermill near Clover Hill High School. This school would be constructed to relieve Grange Hall and Chalkley elementary schools as well as serving those children in Harbour Pointe and those communities located on the Route 360 corridor.

At the secondary level, the bond issue addresses the needs of an everincreasing middle school population, especially in the highly populated attendance zones for Providence, Robious and Swift Creek

middle schools. At Swift Creek Middle School alone, school enrollments exceeded projections on opening day, with 1250 students attending that facility last fall and with 1450 expected this fall. If the bond issue passes, all three of these facilities would receive some relief with the conversion of the present Midlothian High School to an 1100-capacity middle school when a replacement 1500-capacity senior high school would be constructed in that area.

Enrollment studies using the actual numbers of students currently in upper elementary grades countywide have revealed that even if no further growth in school population should occur by the 1984-85 school year, an additional 2000 students would be in need of classroom space in grades 9 through 12. Therefore, at the senior high school level, the 1980 School Bond Issue includes several additions to existing high school facilities, one of which is a 300-pupil addition to Clover Hill High School to increase its capacity to 1500 and to enclose some of its interior space for a more effective learning environment. Even with this proposed addition, without construction of a larger high school in the Midlothian area, Clover Hill High School will face serious

VILLAGE MILL TELEPHONE SURVEY

Survey Notes:

Sample Size: 100 residents

Sample composition: 3 residents from each of 33 neighborhoods with the following exceptions:

The Oaks: 2 residents
Thornridge: 4 residents
Timber Ridge: 4 residents

Telephone interviews were conducted between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., August 12, 13 and 14, 1980.

Brief Synopsis:

— 71% of the residents interviewed receive it on a regular basis.

— All the residents interviewed (who receive the paper) read it.

— The Neighborhood News is the most popular feature.

— 86% of the residents who receive the paper could not say what they liked least about it (or had a criticism of it).

— 67% of the residents interviewed (who receive the paper) had no suggestions for features to be added to the paper.

— All the residents interviewed from McTyre's Cove, Barne's Springs and Seven Oaks had problems receiving the paper. At least one resident in each of 16 additional neighborhoods stated they had problems receiving the paper.

OPEN LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

From

Ted Chandler, President of BCA

This is a report to the community on the effectiveness of the first year on the job of Community Manager, Fred Bott. Fred lives with his wife, Marie, and daughter, Lisa, at 3818 Timber Ridge Road in Brandermill. The Board of Directors of the BCA expected big things from him when he was hired in August of 1979, but we have been even more pleased with the results of his first year as Community Manager.

The Community Manager's primary job is to supervise the day to day operation of the BCA and to carry out Board directives and programs. Fred has done a fine job in this regard and has, additionally, recommended to the Board several long term programs which the Board has adopted.

The first big project which Fred undertook was getting our maintenance contract under a bidding process rather than direct negotiations with one contractor which had been the practice in the past. As a result of this competitive bidding, the maintenance contract for 1980 was a little more than the cost of maintenance for the previous year with an almost 40% increase in the area to be maintained. The maintenance contract is one of the largest expenditures in the BCA budget as it accounts for almost \$100,000.00 of our funds. So, it is important that we carefully monitor the expenditures in that area. The maintenance contractor, Jerry Branch, and his crew cut all of the grass throughout the community, remove snow from the roads with help from the State of Virginia crews, sweep the streets, police the Brandermill area and accomplish various other maintenance jobs.

Fred recommended, and, after careful Board consideration, implemented a plan for erosion control on the Sunday Park peninsula. That very beautiful parcel of land, which had been deeded to the BCA by Brandermill Company several years ago, was literally washing away as a result of wind and water erosion. The Board allocated \$11,000.00 for the control of erosion on the peninsula and as you can see, by walking out in that area, erosion has been effectively halted.

Another project which Fred has supervised is an evaluation of the boating problem in Brandermill. We simply have never had a solid, system of registering, assignment and control of boats in Brandermill. With the able help of the Chairman of the Boating Committee, Earl McKesson, and Pat Cooke of the BCA office, a plan was developed for registration of boats and assignment of spots for the 1980 season. The results have been excellent. The Community Manager has also assisted in the Boat Rental Program and now there are canoes, sailboats, and jon boats available for rent by those residents of Brandermill who don't wish to make a large investment and purchase a boat of their own. The rental program has eased, to some extent, the demand for boating spots in Brandermill.

Fred has done a detailed evaluation of our system of computer service support for all of the books and records kept by the BCA. The computer support services had been provided by the Swift Management Company on a direct negotiation basis. The

Community Manager recommended and the BCA Board approved putting the contract out to bid. As a result of that action, instead of inflation raising the cost of computer support as it might be expected to do, the cost of the overall contract for 1980 is less than the previous year's contract.

Fred recommended to the Board a snow removal plan for the removal of snow from the roads in Brandermill and that plan was put into effect last winter. Based on the comments and letters received from many of the residents in Brandermill, the plan must have been a success.

The Community Manager has also developed a plan of construction for a secure area wherein the residents would have a place to store their boats, trailers, extra cars, etc. which they could not, either because of the covenants or lack of space, keep on their own property. In the past the only place to store such items was at Bright Hope, an unsecure area. Based on the plan submitted to and approved by the BCA Board, a secure area is presently being constructed and will serve two real purposes. First it will offer, at a reasonable rate to residents, a secure place to store their excess vehicles or equipment and will also help the Community Manager in the enforcement of those covenants which prohibit the storage of these items on the resident's property.

The Community Manager has spent much time working with the County and particularly Supervisor Buck Bookman of Clover Hill District to insure that our complaints, requests, requirements and needs get a sympathetic ear. Specifically, he is watching very closely the development of the landfill which has been approved for construction on Warbro Road. Based on the request of your Board, a special watch-dog citizens committee will be established to monitor the operation of the landfill and the Community Manager will be a member of that committee.

In addition to these projects, the Board has asked Fred to prepare a special security program which involves the Brandermill Company and all of the builders in Brandermill, develop a comprehensive erosion plan for the lake, and prepare an overall five year plan for the BCA.

The Board of Directors feel that Fred has done an excellent job as our Community Manager over the past year. We also have high expectations for the future as our community continues to grow and require new innovative approaches. I encourage all of you to give Fred and the BCA permanent office staff, Pat Cooke and Shirley Collier, your total support so that our BCA will grow with the community and be able to provide the services that we need.

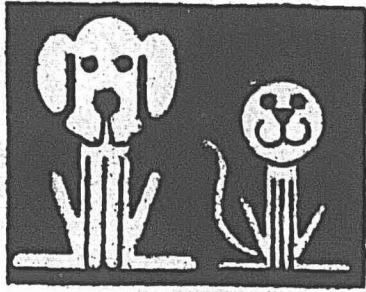

Your Pet

CANINE PARVOVIRUS

During the spring and summer of 1978 scattered outbreaks of a new gastrointestinal disease were reported by veterinarians in different parts of the country. Autopsy specimens sent to veterinary laboratories revealed a small virus as the causative agent. The parvovirus replicates rapidly in the small intestine producing intractable vomiting and diarrhea both of which are often bloody. Dehydration and death often occur within 48 hours. Puppies less than four weeks of age develop a myocarditis, i.e. and infection of the heart muscle. Puppies greater than four weeks usually develop the intestinal form of the disease. There is little hope of survival for puppies, however supportive treatment can often save adult dogs.

Interestingly, the virus is identical antigenically to the feline panleukopenia virus (cat distemper), however it is biologically different precluding transmission between the two species. The symptoms of cat distemper are almost identical to the canine disease leading virologists to theorize a mutation of the cat virus has occurred.

This spring and summer, severe outbreaks of the disease are being experienced in the south and midwest. Tidewater has been the hardest hit area of Virginia. At the time of this writing two dogs have died in the Chesterfield shelter and other cases of parvovirus have been seen in Richmond. Since the principle mode of transmission is through the feces, places where dogs are in close quarters such as grooming parlors and boarding kennels should be avoided until vaccination is completed.

Two vaccinations a few weeks apart are necessary for immunity. Virologists seem to think the parvovirus will be a continuing problem in the future. Fortunately researchers say they will incorporate the parvovirus vaccine into the canine distemper vaccine soon. Hopefully this will prevent serious outbreaks in years to come.

overcrowding in view of the numbers of children already in our fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades. This situation will be created without further influx into our county and will be exacerbated by the inadequate facilities and limited site at the present Midlothian High School, which would force Clover Hill and Monacan high schools into extended attendance zones to handle large senior high school populations.

Recent school census data has revealed that between 1977 and 1980 the number of children in the category of from 5 to 17 years has increased by 3,458. This figure represents an actual head count of those children currently residing in homes throughout our county. Such an increase clearly indicates that Chesterfield County has been growing steadily and would substantiate predictions for a continuing trend in the future. Accordingly, the 1980 School Bond Issue addresses itself to our growing communities and the educational needs of all children, whether these needs can be satisfied through the construction of new schools or additions to present ones to provide adequate space for existing programs and to equalize these facilities throughout our county.

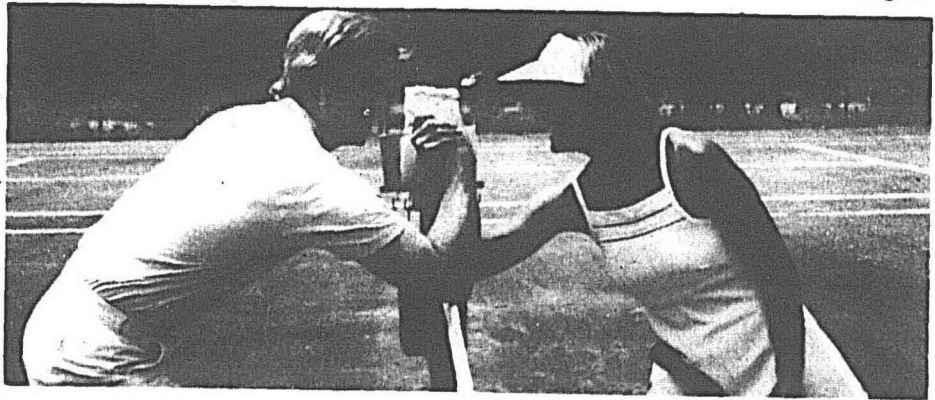

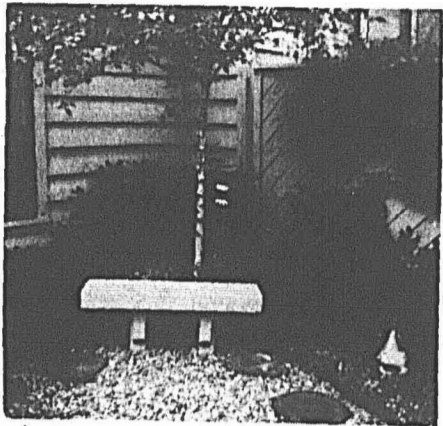

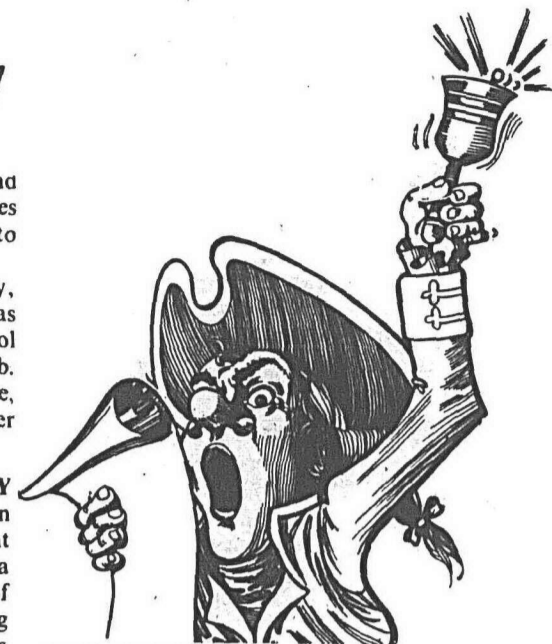

The Boys' Club at 408 N. Robinson, the Complete Gourmet, Breslers at Cloverleaf, and Breslers at Regency Square Mall.

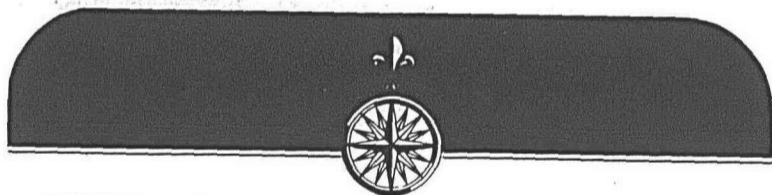
The Virginia State Fair will be here from September 18-28th at the Richmond fairgrounds. This is a treat the whole family can enjoy.

ALUMINUM RECYCLING PROJECT TO TAKE ON NEW LOOK

The Aluminum Recycling project sponsored by the Teens of Brandermill will take on a new look in September. The present collecting arrangement of residents bringing their aluminum to Market Square the first weekend of each month causes an inconvenience to Brandermill residents and teens. For residents, storage of cans for a month at one's home is minimally satisfactory. For teens, the borrowing of vehicles for collection and transporting of cans and the storage are hurdles. In order to meet the schedule of the recycling plant, a truck has to be borrowed for several days and in order to avoid inconvenience to truck owners by keeping their truck several days, sometimes several trucks have to be borrowed and the cans are handled several times.

It is felt that the recycling of aluminum is a valid fund raiser with satisfying ecological merit, however, until a large amount of volume can be achieved, pick-up cannot be arranged. In order for expenses and inconvenience to be minimal storage is

necessary.

Therefore, the teens have approached the BCA and Brandermill Company about an aluminum repository to be constructed for residents' use. Two locations have been mentioned, Market Square and the Country Club parking lot adjacent to the Teen Center.

The Aluminum Recycling Project originated with the young people active in the Teen Club and is a joint venture with Reynolds Metals Recycling Division. Upon completion of the repository, Reynolds will furnish the teens with sturdy plastic bags for residents' use, magnets to separate aluminum from other metals, and a listing of items such as pie plates, T.V. dinner trays, and other items that should be included in the collection.

Plans are that the repository will be complete and available for your convenience in time for the September 6 can drive. Please cooperate with this venture and unite with us in our efforts to help toward maintaining the Teen Center and providing youth activities.

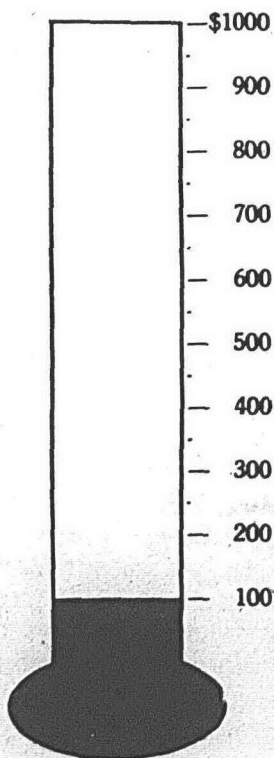

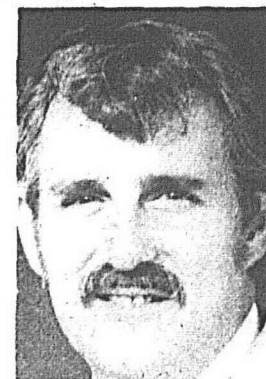

Creative Movement Classes to be offered at Greenwood

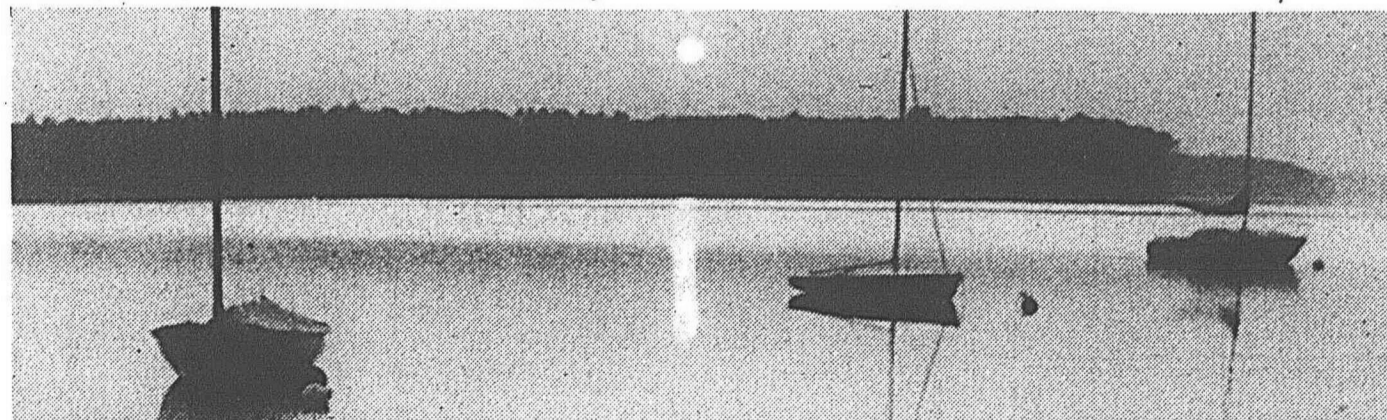





