Bike Path Map Inside

The BCA has received many requests for a map of the bike paths. Also, complaints have been received concerning the lack of markings showing bike path users how to get from one bike path to another. Finally, as a result of a rash of accidents involving children on bikes and automobiles, the BCA has marked STOP signs at the intersection of each bike path and the road.

I suggest that you cut out the bike path map -- fold it and keep it for

future reference.

Also, please obey the few simple rules regarding the use of your bike trails. Above all, please stay off the parkways. We have had reported to the BCA office far too many instances of near misses between cyclists and automobiles. Let's not wait until someone is seriously hurt or God forbid, killed, before we obey the rules. Since most near misses involve children between the ages of 10 and 17, parents are especially alerted to the need to discuss Bicycle Safety with their children.

Phase III Of Chesterfield Cable Television Begins With Laying Of Cable In B'mill Neighborhoods

The Chesterfield Cable Company advised the BCA that phase II of the installation of cable TV in Brandermill started in December 1983. Following is a list of the areas that have already been engineered and placed under contract for the installation of cable under the phase II program: Spring Gate, Huntgate Woods, Walnut Creek, Whispering Oaks, The Oaks, Crosstimbers, Sagewood, Carriage Creek, Muirfield Green, Five Springs and Gleneagles. Other areas such as Tanglebrook, Harbour Pointe, and Two Notch are still in the engineering stages.

Residents are advised that the BCA can not intercede on their behalf to deal with those problems that may arise as a result of the installation of cable in or near their property. It is the responsibility of each resident to contact the cable company if the problem cannot be resolved with the crews that are

working locally.

However, the BCA will intercede on behalf of the residents if the problem remains unsolved between the residents and the cable company after a reasonable effort has been made by the residents to resolve the problem.

The cable company has promised to pass out doorknob-type information flyers prior to the start of construction in a given area. All of the cable will be laid in the front of the properties, since the State Highway Department has given the cable company permission to install the cable in their right-of-way (easement). Individual residents may not decide on their own that they do not want cable installed in front of their home. That permission, as has been mentioned, has already been granted to the cable company.

Some residents have asked why the cable cannot be installed in the

back where the telephone and electric lines have been installed. The cable company has been negotiating for quite some time with the utility companies in order to get a "common ditch" system approved. That is where all three, the electric, the telephone and the cable lines would be installed in the same ditch. Those negotiations have not been completed, so the cable company is not permitted at this time to use the current utility easement.

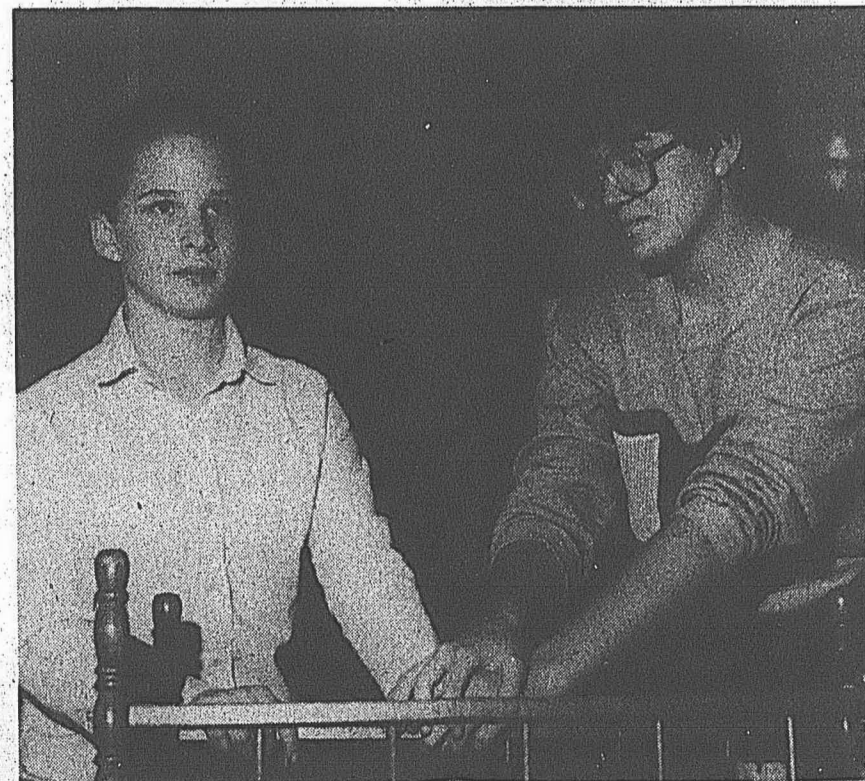

Residents Welcome To Take "Guided Tours"

The new BCA facility located in the Business Park at 3001 East Boundary Terrace, off Old Hundred Road near the intersection of Old Hundred and Genito Roads, is now complete. It is composed of office space of approximately 1425 square feet, located in a portion of an office building owned by Mike Dumont Construction Co. The adjacent warehouses provide facilities for Atlantic Grounds Management Company, which is the contractor for the BCA for the maintenance of all of the open space and other maintenance support functions throughout Brandermill. It also contains a carpenter shop which was formerly located in the Brandermill Country Club maintenance facility. This carpenter shop is operated by the BCA and manufactures all of the mailboxes and signs for

Brandermill. Atlantic Grounds Management Company pays the BCA a monthly rent of \$500 for the facilities it uses in support of the BCA's maintenance program.

These fine office and maintenance support facilities are open for viewing by any property owner in Brandermill. Anyone desiring to see the facilities need only come to the BCA any time during regular office hours, 8:30 to 5:00, Monday - Friday. There is no advance call necessary. The community manager or another member of the BCA staff will be happy to provide a "guided tour" to any interested property owner. This facility will probably be the permanent home of the BCA, since there is an option to buy after three years of occupancy. Come and see us!

Village Mill To Publish Summaries Of BCA Board Meetings, Actions, Discussions

Some residents have expressed an interest in the business conducted by their elected representatives on the Brandermill Community Association Board of Directors. Accordingly, the Board voted at its December 20, 1983 meeting to publish in each following issue of the Village Mill a summary of the business conducted by the Board at their previous meeting.

Board Members

For the information of all concerned, here is the makeup of the Association's Board of Directors: President is Bob Katherman, who lives in Timber Ridge and was elected in 1982. He will serve until April of 1984. 1st Vice President is John Maphis of Winterberry Ridge. He was elected to the Board in 1983 for a two year term. He serves until 1985. 2nd Vice President is Don Didrickson (Fortune's Ridge). He was elected to the Board in 1982 and leaves the Board in April of 1984.

Two of the five Board members are, by law, appointed by the Developer, the Brandermill Company. These members are rotated every two years. The current members appointed by the Company to serve on the BCA Board of Directors are Max Gardner, the General Manager of the Brandermill Company. He was appointed in 1982. The other Company member is Branch Lawson, who is

General Manager of the Brandermill Country Club. He was appointed to the Board in 1983.

Actions of the Board

Approval of the BCA's Operational and Capital Budgets for 1983. Final approval of these budgets was postponed until distribution of the budgets was made to all property owners and sufficient time had passed to allow input from property owners. There being no input from the property owners, the Board proceeded to approve both the Operational and Capital Budgets.

The Community Manager at this meeting asked for authority from the board to add some screening fence to the front and back sections of the BCA storage area in the Business Park. The storage area is a large area that has been fenced in for the purpose of providing places for Brandermill property owners to store their boats, recreational vehicles and trailers. Items stored in the area, facing the office buildings in the Business Park, present a less than attractive view to the occupants of those office buildings. The rear of the storage area, which faces Old Hundred Road, presents an unsightly view for the traffic passing on Old Hundred Road. The Board voted a maximum expenditure of \$2900 to fence the front and the back of the storage area, using an eight-foot high fence made of salt-treated vertical boards, with clipped edges. The firm with the lowest bid was Jennings Fence Co. and they will start work on this project in the near future.

The Board reviewed a signage project for Brandermill, which was initially approved by the Board at its November 14, 1983 meeting. The background on this matter is

that a lot of the signs in Brandermill are six or seven years old and need some care and attention, to include repair and/or repainting. The new standard sign color for Brandermill is called "Tobacco Brown." All the signs that are repaired and repainted will be painted that color. Those signs that need very little repair will, nonetheless, be repainted to standardize the signs throughout Brandermill, in order to present the orderly, attractive signage that Brandermill has always had. The Company will share the cost with the BCA for this rehabilitation of the signs throughout Brandermill.

The Board also voted to once again inform residents that the Board meetings are open to all residents, based on the following two considerations:

- 1) A resident may simply want to sit through a Board meeting without participating in the action. If so, he/she should advise the Community Manager of this intention in order to permit the scheduling of the board meetings in a room large enough to accommodate the expected attendance. (Usually the Board meetings will be held in the small conference room available at the new BCA facility.)
- 2) A resident may desire input directly to the Board on a given matter. In that case, arrangement will be made for a resident to present his/her problem to the Board. In these instances an allocation of time to discuss the matter will be arranged by the Community Manager and the resident will be advised as to when and where he/she is scheduled to appear before the Board.

The next meeting of the Board of Directors is scheduled for January 10 at 7:30 P.M.

Sunday morning, January 8, could be a lucrative time for the Swift Creek Athletic Association.

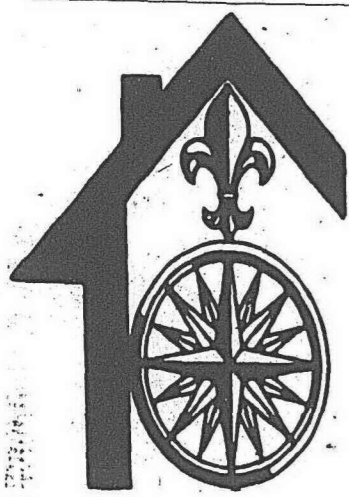
Between the hours of 7 - 11 A.M., cash receipts from all breakfast sales at the McDonald's in Rockwood Square shopping center will be donated to the Association.

Highway Department To Make Road Improvements On Sections of Genito

For the information of Brandermill residents, the Virginia State Department of Highways and Transportation have set aside money for a project to improve the site distance, (increase visibility) banks and shoulders on sections of Genito Road.

You will note that the cutting of trees has started, which is the first step in this project. The State Highway Department will cut trees

back to a distance of about ten feet along the edges of Genito Road, from Coalfield Road to the Swift Creek Reservoir. Some of the tree cutting work has been done this Fall and will continue through the Winter, weather permitting.

The project will be completed in the Spring and early Summer of 1984. At that time the stumps will be removed, the banks will be graded and the shoulders extended. This

project is being done in coordination and cooperation with the Brandermill Community Association and the Brandermill Company. The end results should be not only a nicer-looking road, but a basic improvement in the site distances for what is becoming a heavily-traveled thoroughfare.

Discretion Should Be Used When Purchasing Or Using BB Guns

A recent incident involving a B.B. gun has resurfaced the issue of their use within the Brandermill community.

The Chesterfield county police department has told the Village Mill that there are currently "no ordinances regulating the purchase or use of B.B. guns." Apparently, attempts to legislate restrictions on their use has met with little support. The County Attorneys office had little to add, other than to say that

B.B. guns are not considered "firearms."

However, parents should be aware that they assume a very real liability risk when purchasing a B.B. gun for unsupervised use by their minor children. Obviously, great discretion should be used when purchasing such a "toy", ie. considering both the age and maturity of the youngster who will be shooting the gun.

A B.B. gun has the capacity to

kill a small animal or seriously damage and/or blind a human eye.

In a heavily populated area, such as Brandermill, there are very few areas where a B.B. gun may be shot without the risk of someone crossing the line of fire. Parents who choose to allow their children to own and shoot B.B. guns should make sure that the youngster fully understands the very "grownup" responsibility attached to that ownership.

Brandermill Community Theatre Celebrates Over A Year Of Successful Entertainment

The Brandermill Community Theatre enjoys a brief but illustrious history. The Village Mill thanks Julia Chilson for sharing her memories of the founding and growth of the BCT.

The Brandermill Community Theatre has recently celebrated its first year as a non-profit organization. It was founded to enhance and encourage the appreciation and performance of the creative arts in the Richmond Metropolitan area.

What began with several hand-lettered flyers posted on bulletin boards throughout Brandermill and the surrounding area announcing preliminary meetings rapidly developed into a community theatre in full swing. The flyers were prepared and distributed by four Brandermill residents, Dennis Lacey, Cassandra Lasey, Drina Kay and Karen Fredrichs, who felt that there were probably a lot of area residents like themselves who would welcome the opportunity to develop a community theatre, and that they simply needed to get the ball rolling. Their feelings proved to be quite accurate.

An initial meeting was held at the Brandermill Community Center on Sunday, August 29, 1982, and attended by more than forty people who were interested in participating in all aspects of the project from directing, performing and various requirements of behind the scenes production work, to the general organization and administration of the theatre as a non-profit corporation. Attendees included both individuals who had studied theatre or worked with various other theatre organizations in the past, as well as many who had little or no experience, but who came to learn and to help.

It was decided at that meeting that the proposed community theatre was not only a desired, but most importantly, a feasible reality. It was also decided that the first production would be "Dark of the Moon," selected because of its large cast and suitability for community

theatre production. Auditions were held and casting completed by September 13, 1982. Rehearsals began September 15, and the play was scheduled for performance on the last two weekends in October.

An organizational meeting of the general membership took place on Sunday, September 12, 1982. A constitution and bylaws were approved and temporary officers and committee chairmen were elected.

Since then permanent officers have been elected and the theatre has successfully produced three plays - "Dark of the Moon," "Sabrina Fair," and "Arsenic and Old Lace." A unique offering for an area community theatre, was the youth musical revue, entitled "A Kid Again" performed December 9 and 10th. This presentation was unique in the fact that it was a show that utilized performers in the theatre 18 years of age and under to perform a revue consisting of musical production numbers from family-type shows. The need for a forum for the youthful performer was clearly established when young people from all areas of Richmond and localities as far away as Chase City, Virginia answered our audition call. It was by far the largest response that we had ever experienced.

We feel that 'community' is the keynote of our theatre. The 100+ membership represents a real cross section of the Richmond community. They are professional actors, lawyers, educators, secretaries, housewives, students, retirees, salesmen, nurses, as well as many others. But community spirit does not stop simply with membership. The theatre group has marched and performed in local parades, secured 100 extras for the "Kennedy Years," provided talent for a commercial for the Virginia Department of Highways and Transportation and has performed at various local festivals and gatherings such as Craft Shows and local health fairs. The "Pass the Hat Players" unit of our group will provide a coterie of skits

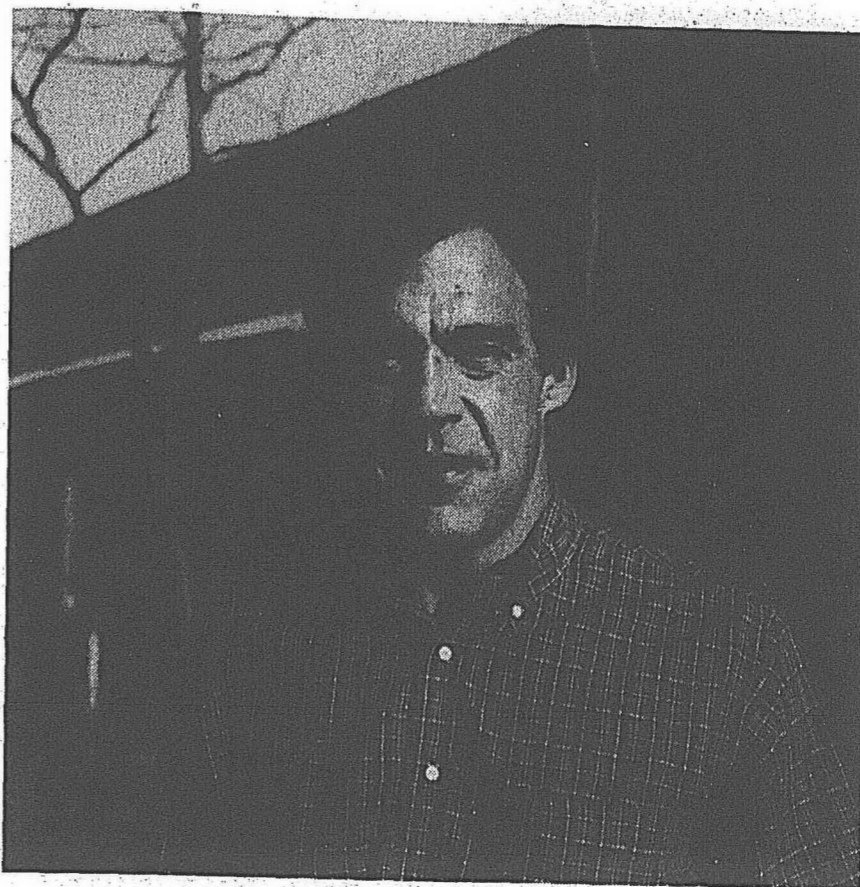
and shenanigans upon request for a donation to the theatre.

This season we carried out plans to entertain the patients at Johnston and Willis Hospital and Chippenham Hospital by singing Christmas Carols in theatrical costumes. Also, we shared parts of our youth revue with the residents at Chesterfield Nursing Home.

In the spring the Brandermill community Theatre will produce "You Can't Take It With You," with auditions to be held just after the first of the year.

Membership is open to anyone who enjoys the theatre. Auditions are completely open and are conducted on strictly non-political and competitive basis.

The deadline for the February issue of the Village Mill is Friday, January 27.



Mike Norton Returns, Joins Woodlake Sales Team

Mike Norton, one of Brandermill's very first residents, has returned to join the sales team of the new Woodlake community.

Woodlake Achieves Record Sales In Short Time

Woodlake reported over \$4 million inland sales by year-end, which significantly exceeded all Company projections. "The sales volume is even more impressive when you consider that we only received final approvals from the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) agency in November," said Gary Fenchuk, President of Woodlake, "and all the sales contracts were signed between late November and December 31."

The reasons cited for this incredible surge in land sales is the buyers growing preference for the unique things that Woodlake offers: year-round recreation, (winter activities such as the indoor-outdoor aquatic center, ice skating, sledding park, new winter tennis court surface, etc.), numerous neighborhood playgrounds and parks, a broader diversity of housing styles and colors, larger lots, and more grass and attention to landscaping for a brighter, more colorful streetscape. In addition, most buyers have indicated a strong desire to be a part of the early stages of development of the new community and the potential appreciation that accompanies it.

Revolutionary Year-Round Clay-Like Tennis Surface Planned For Woodlake Development

The developers of Woodlake are planning to utilize a revolutionary new tennis court surface called Tennis Fluid which is the only synthetic, "sliding", granular surface playable all year round, regardless of temperature or climate.

Tennis Fluid is soft and easy on the legs and back, yet engineered for 12 month outdoor use and easy maintenance. It offers the desirable playing characteristics of clay and fast-drying granular courts plus the advantages of the materials and construction methods.

The surface itself feels like rubber but plays like a clay court; it requires no watering, as it is playable in all temperatures.

This surface is widely accepted and used throughout Europe and is again a step forward in the state-of-the-art. It represents more than five years research and development by scientists in Germany seeking a superior alternative to the limited playing period of conventional clay courts.

The initial courts in Woodlake are scheduled to be completed in the fall of 1984.

Brandermill Men's Retiree Club Elects New Organization Officers

Registration Is Now Being Accepted

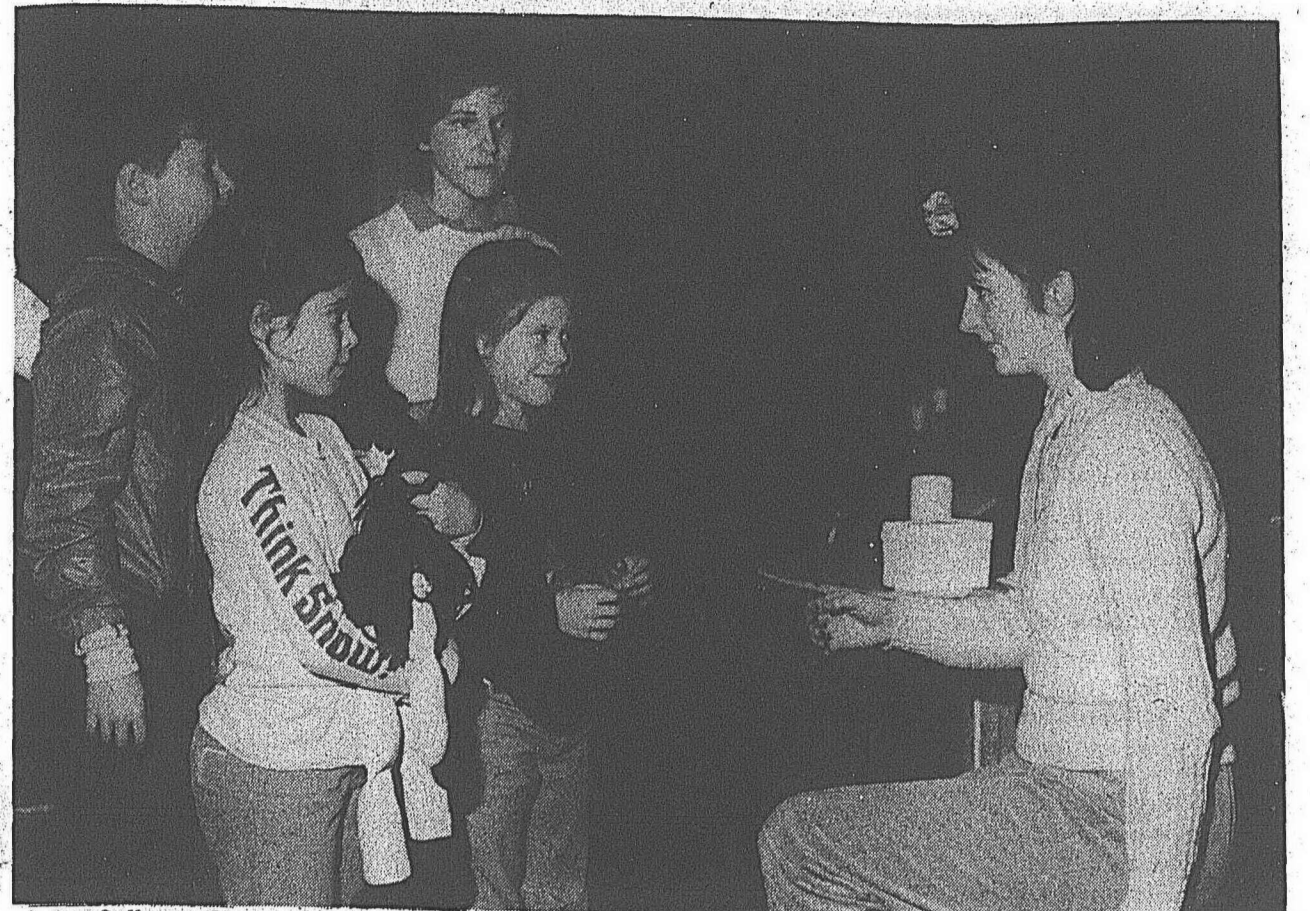
Second semester classes will begin at Swift Creek Academy of the Performing Arts on January 26. The academy is accepting pre-registration now and will be open for registration only on January 23 - 25 from 4 to 8 p.m.

Tooth size is also important, small teeth will leave spaces (diastemas) while large teeth create crowding. Long teeth give the appearance of being "toothy" or "Horse Teeth", while short teeth can give the appearance of excessive wear or too much gum tissue.

Tooth shape is often different for each sex. For teeth to look feminine, the edges can be rounded to create a soft, smooth look with gentle curves along the angles. For the masculine look, teeth have flatter edges and sharper angles.

Tooth color should match the complexion and eyes. People with olive skin should not have white teeth. Nor should a fair skinned blonde have yellowish teeth. Natural teeth gradually get darker and develop small fracture lines

The SMILE LINE determines the proper length of teeth. The proper smile line has edges for the front teeth following the curvature of the lower lip when we smile. Too much, or not enough curvature can greatly effect the naturalness and beauty of the smile.

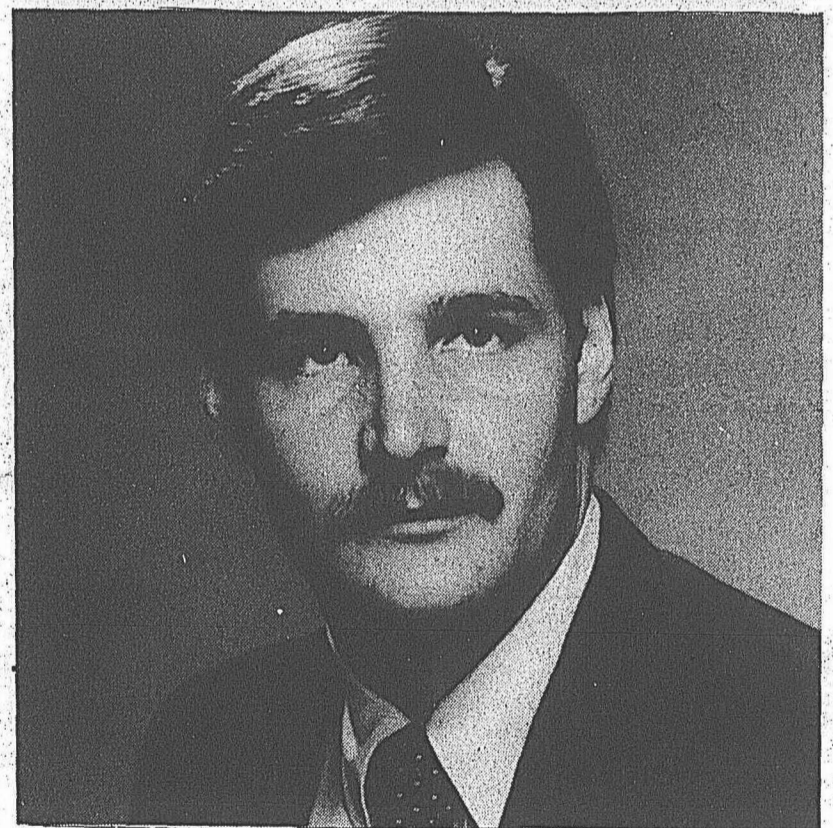

Biscuits and Cakes Offer Tempting Brunch Fare

Sausage Cheese Biscuits
 1 package (8 oz.) frozen fully cooked sausage links
 1 cup milk, soured*
 3 cups flour
 4 teaspoons baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 2 cups (8 oz.) grated Colby Cheese
 Grated Parmesan cheese

1. Place links in a preheated pan. Brown over medium heat for 7 to 8 minutes, turning links frequently. Remove from pan; drain on paper towel.
2. Line a large cookie sheet with Reynolds Wrap aluminum foil. Preheat oven to 425°F.
3. In a large mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder and salt. Using a pastry blender or two knives, cut butter into flour mixture until crumbly.

*Make sour milk by adding 1 tablespoon lemon juice to milk; let stand 10 minutes.

Mexican Brunch Bake

1 (7 oz.) package cornbread mix
 5 eggs
 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted and cooled
 1/4 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
 2 cups (8 oz.) shredded sharp Cheddar cheese
 1 can (4 oz.) chopped green chilies, drained
 1/2 cup chopped tomato, drained
 1/4 cup finely chopped onion
 1 package (1 1/4 oz.) cheese sauce mix
 1 medium avocado, peeled and sliced

Prepare cornbread batter according to package directions and bake in one greased Reynolds Redi-Pan Square Cake Pan. Reduce oven temperature to 350°F. 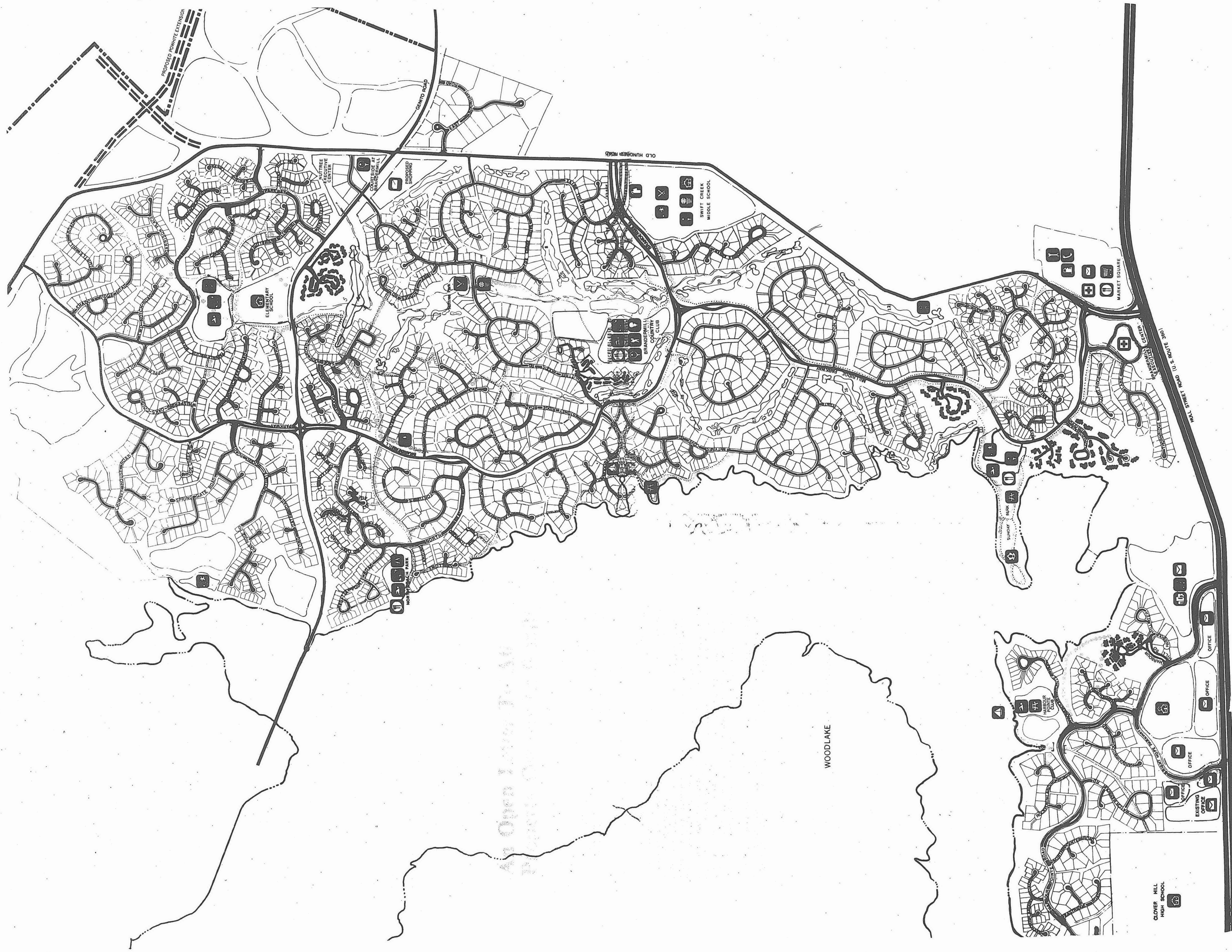
An Open Letter To All Property Owners In B'mill

Dear Property Owners,
 The bike paths throughout Brandermill are constructed by the Brandermill Company and turned over to the Brandermill Community Association (BCA) for the use of all Brandermill property owners. The BCA maintains these bike paths and is responsible for their use. Here are those rules:
 1. Only those bicyclists who have a valid driver's license and a written permission is obtained from the BCA office. Note: Exceptions are made for maintenance personnel.
 2. Cyclists should use Brandermill roadways only when necessary to make connections between bike paths. PLEASE STAY OFF THE PARKWAYS!
 3. Cyclists must stay on bike paths and may not provide (or make) their own short cuts across BCA property.
 4. Parents are responsible to insure that both they and their children are knowledgeable and responsible users of the bike paths.
 5. There are some additional information signs on and off the bike paths. Here are some additional information signs:
 1. For safety reasons, each bike path has a "STOP" sign painted in iridescent paint at the junction of the bike path and the road. All cyclists are required to observe these stop signs. Note: A few bike paths also have a stop sign mounted on a post.
 2. To help residents find their way from termination of one bike path to the start of another, directional arrows have been painted in the adjacent roadway, or on the paths.
 3. Bike paths are here for your use. Encourage your family and friends (visitors) to use them. Please do not allow the dog or simply strolling in any case. PLEASE STAY OFF THE PARKWAYS. They are extremely dangerous.
