## 1984 Annual Meeting Elects New BCA Board Of Directors

The 1984 Annual Meeting of the Brandermill Community Association took place on Monday evening, April 30, at the Brandermill Church. A voting quorum having been established, BCA President Bob Katherman called the meeting to order at 7:45 p.m.

President Katherman introduced the 1983 Board, and 1984 Board candidates were then asked to stand and be recognized. Katherman called for nominations from the floor; there being none, nominations were closed. There followed an explanation of proxy votes and an opportunity for change was provided during a brief adjournment. The meeting reconvened at 7:55 p.m.

### 1983 Highlights

Bob Katherman addressed the BCA membership present in a review of the highlights of his term in office. He reflected on the accomplishments of the 1983 Board, which included: establishing a working rapport with newly elected Chesterfield County Supervisor Jeff Applegate, publication of a new Brandermill Directory, new neighborhood street lighting, rehabilitation of mailboxes in cooperation with the Brandermill Jaycees, repair and painting of all Brandermill directional signs, upgrading of neighborhood signs, improvements at the Genito/Old Hundred Roads intersection, repair of bikepaths, replanting of parkway shoulders, and establishment of a permanent office for the Brandermill Community Association staff.

### Community Grows

Before closing his remarks, Katherman remarked on the rapid growth that Brandermill has experienced. He said that there were sixty-seven separate neighborhoods in Brandermill, with approximately seven more still planned by the Brandermill Company within the next couple of years. This will make a total of seventy-four separate neighborhoods. As of this date, there are about 2500 homes in Brandermill, with eighty more under construction.

### Company Report

Branch Lawson, General Manager of the Brandermill Country Club, delivered an address on behalf of the Brandermill Company. He remembered 1983 as an "eventful" year. The last quarter of 1983 saw housing sales surpass all previous sales, reflecting the public's continued support and enthusiasm for the planning concept that makes Brandermill such a unique community. Lawson remarked that with the completed construction of the Swift Creek Elementary School, the community now has excellent schools to offer all ages. He made special mention of the increased services at Market Square, including the 1983 opening of the new Safeway store which "have demonstrated themselves to be excellent new neighbors." Another new addition to Market Square is the soon-to-open Children's World, providing the community with yet

another pre-school care resource. An overview of the development of the Brandermill Inn and Conference Center (presently under construction at Harbour Pointe) was presented. Lawson had high praise for the newly formed Swift Creek Athletic Association, commenting that "they have raised over \$8,000 this year . . . proving that we are not a community of homes, but of people, caring people."

The Company report concluded with a reminder to vote on June 12 (Powhite Extension Referendum Day), and an invitation to visit the newest Brandermill development, Woodlake.

### New Board Announced

Following the Company report, Bob Katherman introduced Rob Schutrumpf, a CPA and the Inspector of Elections. Mr. Schutrumpf announced that William Dix and Arthur Haake had been successful in their campaigns and congratulated them on their election to the 1984 Board of Directors. Both will serve two-year terms. John Maphis will continue his term of office and Branch Lawson will represent the Brandermill Company. The other Company Board member is Clem Carlise, Brandermill Sales Manager and Vice-President, who replaces Max Gardner.

### Katherman Honored

After adding his congratulations to the newly-elected Board, 1983 Board Vice-President Don Didrickson assumed the speaker's podium to make a presentation to exiting Board President Bob Katherman. A second presentation was awarded to Max Gardner, accepted by his wife Arlyn in his absence. Both men were lauded for their service to the Board and to the Brandermill community.

There followed a brief question and answer period, with Community Manager Fred Bott fielding questions from the audience.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 8:40 p.m.

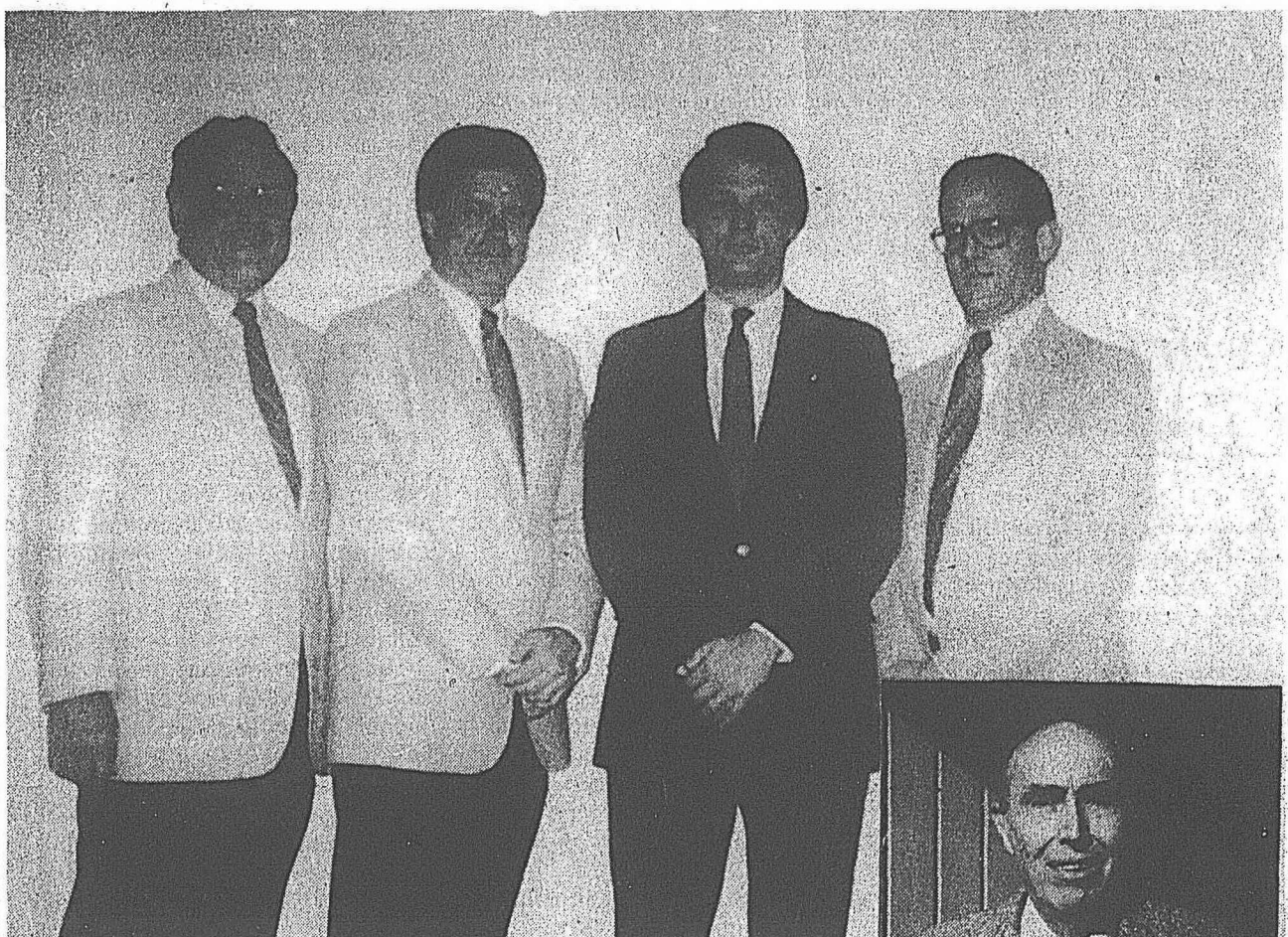
## Veeco To Interrupt Service To Some Area Residents

Laura Coker, a Community Representative for VEPCO, has advised the Brandermill Community Association that the following areas of Brandermill will have their electric service interrupted on May 17, 1984 (raindate May 18, 1984) beginning at approximately 8:00 a.m. and lasting until approximately 5:00 p.m.:

Autumn Woods, Cooper Hill, Cove Ridge, Huntgate Woods, Long Hill, Ridge Creek, Spring Gate, Tanglebrook, Two Notch, Walnut Creek, Whispering Oaks.

This temporary interruption of service will allow VEPCO to install lines and equipment along Brandermill Parkway which will result in reduced outage time in the future.

VEPCO's advance notice is to allow residents sufficient time to schedule or reschedule their activities around this outage. The VEPCO management thanks the affected residents in advance, for their patience and cooperation in this instance.

## Investors Savings And Loan Sponsors Tennis Classic At Brandermill Country Club

Just when you thought big time tennis had left Richmond for good, The Investors' Savings and Loan Tennis is coming to Brandermill Country Club Sunday, May 27 through Sunday, June 3. The event is a satellite tournament of the United States Tennis Association's Circuit. The USTA Circuit, one of the most competitive tours in tennis, features a 64 main draw with players ranging from 50 to 200 on the computer listings.

In the hierarchy of men's professional tennis, the satellite circuit is the "grass roots" level. Players compete not only for a share of the prize money but, more importantly, for circuit points which will help them move up the Association of Tennis Professionals' (ATP) computer rankings. The Circuit is arranged in five segments consisting of five \$10,000.00 tournaments each with the fifth and final tournaments known as the "Masters" tournament. During the first 4 tournaments of each segment players are

awarded USTA Circuit points determined by the round they reach in the main draw. After the fourth tournament the top 32 point winners in singles and doubles move on to the Masters tournament. Circuit points are also awarded during the Masters tournament. At the conclusion of each Masters tournament, the final point standings are used to allot the ATP computer points each player is entitled to. The coveted ATP points allow entry into the prestigious Grand Prix events and the chance to move up in the world ranking.

John DePew, Tennis Director for Brandermill Country Club expects over 120 entrants in this year's Investors' Classic. Forty eight players are granted immediate entry in the 64 man main draw. Qualifying matches are held Sunday, May 27 and Monday, May 28 for the remaining 16 places in the main draw.

According to DePew, some of the most hotly contested matches are often played during the qualifying

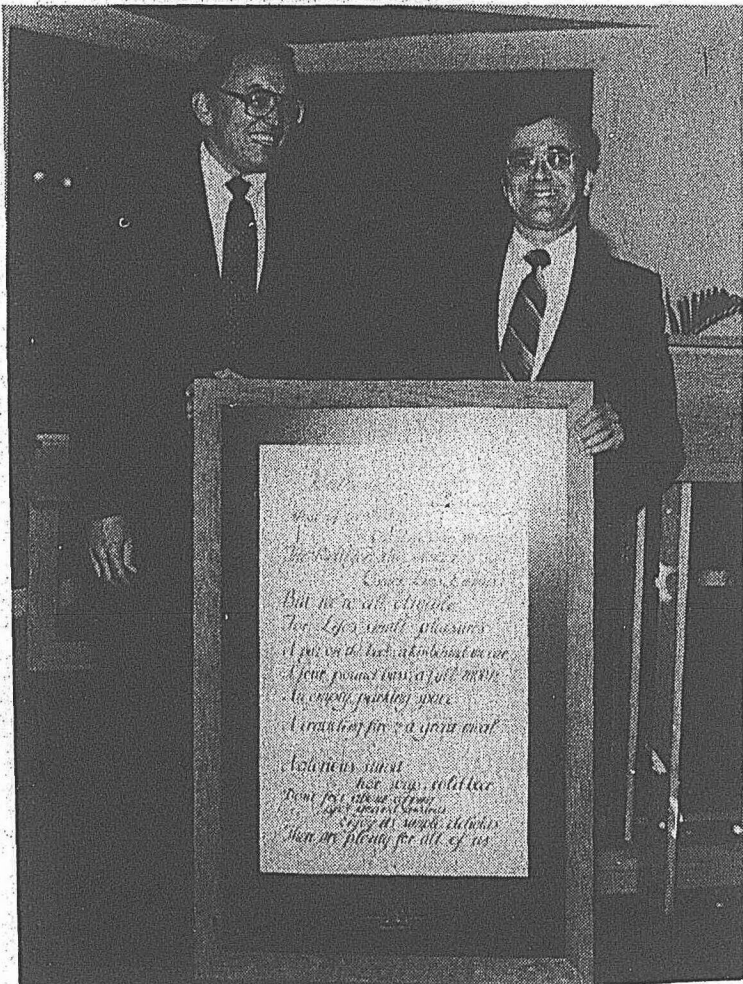
rounds. While the names of the entrants will not be known until approximately 2 weeks before the tournament, it is likely that some big name players will find their way to the Investor's Classic. Although the Circuit is designed to primarily aid developing professionals, some of the top names in tennis have been known to make appearances on the tour. Jimmy Arias, Eliot Teltscher, Van Winitzky, Vince Van Patten, Chip Hooper, Rodney Harmon and Chris Lewis are among those who have been part of the Circuit in recent years.

If anyone has any doubts about the quality of play on the USTA Circuit, past history indicates that the winner's circle is up for grabs. Jimmy Arias and Vince Van Patten both have suffered defeat at the hands of amateurs!

Though players come from all over the world just for the opportunity to qualify for the main draw, the Investors' Classic has had its

## Swift Creek District Voters Encouraged To Register

The 26th Amendment of the United States Constitution grants the right to vote to all eligible U.S. citizens 18 years or older. By registering to vote, you have a chance to express your choices and opinions in national and local affairs.

Chesterfield County residents will soon be called upon in mid-June to do just that. A special bond referendum for the Powhite Expressway will be on the ballot at that time. Because of the great importance of this issue, and the impact it will have in our county, we are urging all eligible voters to turn out and vote, and for those of you who are yet registered within Chesterfield

County, we strongly urge you to register in time, so that your vote will count.

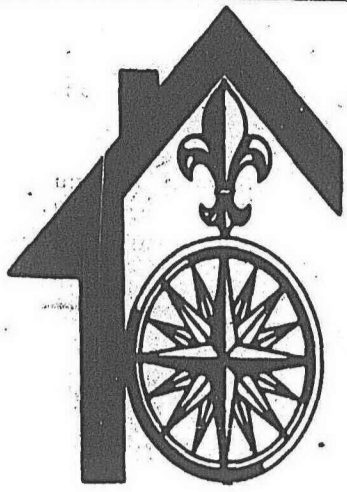
Two major voter registration areas are open daily: (1) The Chesterfield County Courthouse (the main administration building) 9901 Lori Road, Room 100 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and (2) The DMV (Dept. of Motor Vehicles) located at the corner of the Crossroads Mall next to the Interchina Restaurant on Route 60 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday and 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Thursday.

The only necessary document needed for voter registration is your social security card. Without the

card you must take an oath, confirming that all given statements are true. All eligible voters MUST BE REGISTERED no later than Wednesday, May 30, 1984 to participate in the referendum vote.

On referendum day, the polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the Swift Creek Elementary School, Genito Road, Midlothian.

### BCA Board Votes To Support Powhite/288

The 1983-84 BCA Board of Directors, at its April 30th meeting, voted unanimously to endorse and support Chesterfield County's twenty-two million dollar bond issue for the Powhite/288 project. The referendum will be placed before Chesterfield County voters on June 12, 1984. The Board took note of the fact that the funds raised by the County would augment the seventy million dollars authorized by the State of Virginia in support of this much-needed road net.

The Board, in publicly stating its support, observed that the new roads would serve to improve property values both residential and commercial in Brandermill, as well as to ease the traffic problems created by the current road system.

Brandermill residents will be provided complete details on the bond issue in the June issue of the Village Mill -- details needed to help them make up their minds concerning the support of the June 12th referendum.

### Swift Creek Elementary School PTA Outlines School Needs

At the last Executive Board meeting of the Swift Creek Elementary PTA officers, some real needs of the school were brought up by the school's principal, John Temple. In an effort to realize some of these needs it was felt that the people of the Brandermill community and its clubs or organizations could help, or offer suggestions to the PTA Board if made aware of them.

1st priority - 5 sets of science filmstrips for grades 1-5. The County will not purchase these and the school needs help. Each set costs \$281.

2nd priority - bike racks to hold 50 bikes.

3rd priority - The library needs 2 for 3 sets of encyclopedias to handle large classroom research projects.

Also the classrooms could use donations of older sets of encyclopedias (as old as 1975).

4th priority - Software for a total of 6 computers for the 1984-85 school year for all grade levels K-5.

5th priority - Physical Education Department needs equipment: hockey set, mile club patches, crash pads.

6th priority - The school is in much need of playground equipment (similar to that in Sunday Park).

7th priority - Golf umbrellas for teachers on bus duty (8).

Dear Bob,

I appreciated your call today advising me that the formerly all volunteer Clover Hill Fire Station is now being staffed by your regular career fire fighters Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

You and I had talked several times about the possibility of a permanent crew at Clover Hill but I didn't realize that you would be able to provide that support so soon. Please accept the thanks of our Board of Directors and of a grateful community for your work and that of your department in providing for us an even better trained fire fighting team than the fine group of volunteers who had previously responded to our calls.

The addition of a sergeant and two fire fighters should provide enough permanent personnel for Brandermill to be guaranteed a first response from Clover Hill Fire Department on each fire call. The fact that all of them will be medically trained technicians pleases us also. They should provide excellent support to our rescue efforts on the lake.

As an aside, the Woman's Club has always supported the Clover Hill Volunteer Fire Department with a generous donation each year. Since the volunteers will still be an integral part of Clover Hill station's fire fighting team, the BCA will encourage the Woman's Club to continue that financial support.

## Questions & Answers

1. What are the size and price ranges of homes to be built in Woodlake?

Number registered to vote - 3244

Number eligible but not registered - 723

Percent of eligible who have registered - 82 percent

The above statistics were obtained through the use of a voter registration list for Swift Creek Precinct, dated April 19, 1984 and the BCA directory cards.

The Swift Creek Precinct lists a total of 3434 registered voters. 190 of these registered voters are not Brandermill residents.

## Bloodmobile To Be Held During Market Square Jubilee

A blood drive will be held on Saturday, May 19, 1984, in conjunction with the annual Market Square Merchants Jubilee. The Brandermill Women's Club has agreed to help coordinate participation among numerous Brandermill clubs and organizations and to insure a successful blood drive.

Everyone is welcome to donate. The following organizations have been asked to provide donors: Brandermill Chamber Series, Brandermill Men's Retiree Club, Sailing Club, Ski Club, Theatre Group, Jaycees, Jaycettes, Kiwanis, Lyons Club and the Brandermill Church.

A bloodmobile unit from the Richmond Metropolitan Blood Service (RMBS) will be parked in Market Square on May 19 between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m.

Donors are encouraged to sign up for a specific time and call one of the following individuals to make an appointment: Jo Owens (744-2626); Lena Bartges (744-3176); or Jan Patton (744-1457).

For those of you who have never donated a pint of blood, be assured it is a safe, simple procedure. More importantly, your one pint of blood, once it is broken down into its components, can result in saving up to three lives. The procedure takes about thirty minutes and includes medical screening, a mini-physical and refreshments after the blood is drawn.

In order to donate, a person must be between the ages of 17 and 65, and weigh at least 110 pounds. Some medications and illnesses will defer a person from the donation process, but if you are generally in good health, consider yourself a good candidate to donate.

The blood program relies on volunteer donors and operates under the philosophy of Community Responsibility—that is, if everyone who can donate, does so, then we can be sure of having a safe and adequate blood supply.

Unfortunately, Richmond is not self-sufficient in its blood supply. RMBS, the sole supplier of blood to our 14 area hospitals, must import blood from other centers around Virginia. Though the blood itself is free, the cost of importing it, in addition to collecting, processing and distributing it, is passed onto the patient. RMBS' goal is to have a self-sufficient blood supply so as to contain costs for patients. In order to do this, more people in this com-

munity will need to donate and they will need to do so more regularly. One can donate every 56 days (six times a year).

Hopefully, Brandermill residents, noted for their strong civic consciousness, will exercise their community responsibility by donating blood on May 19. Questions regarding donor qualifications can be directed to Elizabeth Horn, RMBS Consultant (359-5114) and Brandermill resident (744-5264).

There will be an awards presentation at the end of the program. As in previous years, the recital is open to the public without charge.

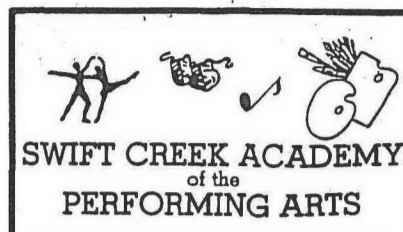

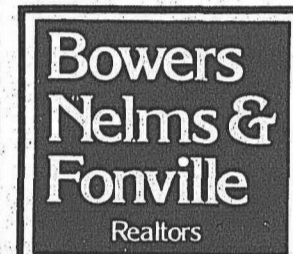

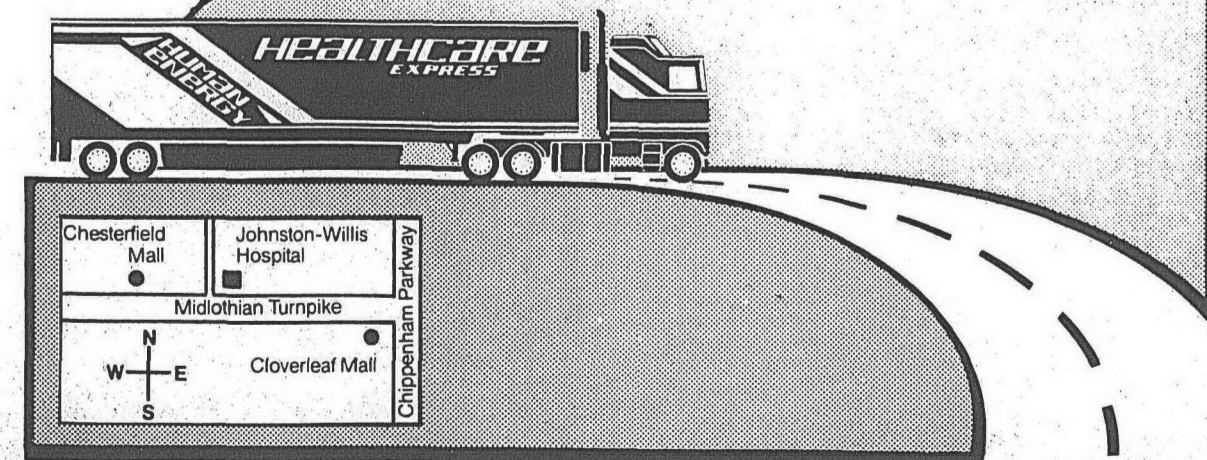

## The "A" Team Of Hotel Management

There was a time, back in 1980, when Tom and Mary Lackey would have told you that they were managing their "last" hotel. Mary, better known to friends as "Jackie", laughs about that now. "We were on Hilton Head Island and had pretty much decided to retire there. But that was before we were offered the opportunity to open the Brandermill Inn and Conference Center."

The 60-unit Conference Center is described in marketing literature as "a specialized facility designed to provide personalized guest services, a quiet, serene atmosphere, spacious townhouse suite accommodations, and a variety of meeting and recreational facilities." It is located at Harbor Pointe, off Route 360. The Lackeys moved to Brandermill in July of 1983 at the request of Jim Bristow, project developer and President of Jaimen Enterprises, Inc. They live and have a temporary office in the Woodbridge neighborhood.

Tom Lackey has a many-faceted hotel management background, with over twenty-four years experience in Private Club Food and Beverage management alone. Several years ago, Tom and Jim Bristow met while both men were working at a Hilton hotel in Port St. Lucie, Florida, where Jim was the resident manager. It was here that Tom also met the future Mrs. Lackey, who, at that time, was managing an on-site hotel boutique. Tom, whose hotel experience includes such noted vacation and conference spots as the Playboy Club at Lake Geneva and the Clubs of Inverary in Lauderdale, joined Jim at the Hpliday Inn Resort on North Beach in Fort Pierce, Florida, where Bristow had accepted a position as General Manager. However, rather

than being the end of their cooperative ventures, this experience turned out to be just the beginning!

The trio were to again practice their "teammanship" at the Hilton Inn Gateway in Orlando and, later, at the Royal Villa in Greensboro. In 1978, Jim went to work for the John Yancey Company and Jackie and Tom were called to work at the Hilton in Baton Rouge, LA. By 1980, Jim Bristow and a partner, Gary Gillis, had formed their own company which they named Continental Hotel Management. One of their first hotel management contracts was with the Sheraton in Salisbury, MD. That concern was attempting to "turn around" some management and fiscal difficulties and called upon Continental for assistance. Jim and Gary, in turn, called upon their friends the Lackeys to move to Maryland and provide on-site management team support.

In 1981, Bristow moved his family to Harbour Pointe and shortly thereafter began the financial planning that eventually resulted in the construction of the Brandermill Inn and Conference Center. Approximately a year and a half later he once again called upon the Lackeys to help him open and manage the new Inn and Conference Center.

Jackie Lackey is a bright and cheerful woman, and her enthusiasm is barely containable when asked to talk about the new facility. "All of the units will be fully furnished with linens and cooking utensils and will have telephones and televisions in the bedroom and living room," she says. "Every unit will have a private deck that overlooks the lake (Swift Creek Reservoir), and there will be an indoor/outdoor pool. I am really ex-

cited about the informal lobby that we have planned - it will be so comfortable, our guests will feel as though they are in their own living room!" Tom adds that the lounge and dining room, "which we will call the 'Contential Cafe', will be open to the public."

Additional facilities include a two-bedroom Executive Suite, a Conference room that will accommodate 80-100 people, and a Board room that will hold 16-20 persons. Sixty Non-Prime Time memberships will allow guests to use the Brandermill Country Club facilities. One very special feature of the Brandermill Inn and Conference Center is the design inclusion of a Pool/Deck-level "Health Suite", to better serve the handicapped guest. It will be a barrier-free apartment and close to all the amenities that the Inn will offer.

The Brandermill Inn and Conference Center is being marketed on a limited partnership basis, which means that investors will actually purchase 1/60th of the total project,

rather than a specific unit. Owners may reserve use of a unit two weeks out of each year, either for their personal use or to house out-of-town guests. The other fifty weeks the units will be available to persons attending seminars and conferences at the Center, as well as overnight guests. Each unit is priced in the \$70,000 range, requires a ten percent down payment, and carries a ten-year mortgage. Both Tom and Jackie are pleased that they will be able to offer weekly and monthly rates, as well as special prices for corporations and special holidays, remarking that "the first package rates will be available for Thanksgiving 1984."

The Brandermill Inn and Conference Center is scheduled to open in October 1984, and will eventually employ between twenty and thirty people in housekeeping, dining room, and office personnel capacities. ## Swing Into Spring: Junior Golf At Brandermill

From Ashland to Petersburg, from Bottoms Bridge to Powhatan, on over twenty private and public courses, boys and girls from 9 to 17 years are looking forward to playing golf this summer and spring.

According to Greg Jaeger, Executive Director of the Metro Junior Golf Association (MJGA), it wasn't always so. "The MJGA began six years ago as Greater Richmond Junior Golf and was formed to allow juniors, who were not members of established clubs or the Virginia State Golf Association, to play competitive golf." He remembers, "we began with about twenty-five junior golfers and ran six single-day tournaments. As interest grew, the number of events was reduced to three, but we maintained the original six play-days of golf by holding two-day tournaments. The MJGA anticipates about 150 entrants in this year's tournament.

Junior golf is open to boys and girls ages 9-12. For boys, tournament flights are divided into four age groups: 11 and under, 12 and 13, 14 and 15, and 16 through 17. The State association divides girls into two flights: 14 and under and 15 through 17, while the MJGA reserves flight decisions for girls until the number of available players is determined.

The MJGA sponsors three tournaments - Classic, Invitational, and Open - as well as a Rules Seminar and an Instructional Clinic. Junior tournaments are scheduled this year at Belmont Park Golf Club (Classic - June 25/26), Stonehenge Golf and Country Club (Championship - August 1/2), and Brandermill Country Club (Open - August 16/17). Permanent homes for each tournament are still being sought.

Says Jaeger, "It is interesting that the evolution of organized junior golf can be directly traced to the development of the electric golf cart! Years ago, boys who worked as caddies learned a lot about the game simply by working on the courses. For many, this exposure to golf was all that was needed to kindle an interest in playing the game themselves. Now, the need for caddies has almost been eliminated."

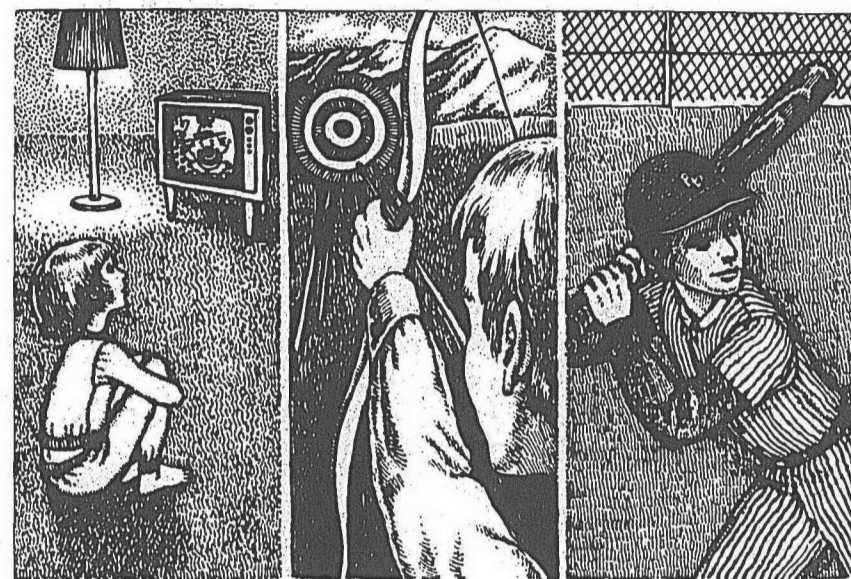

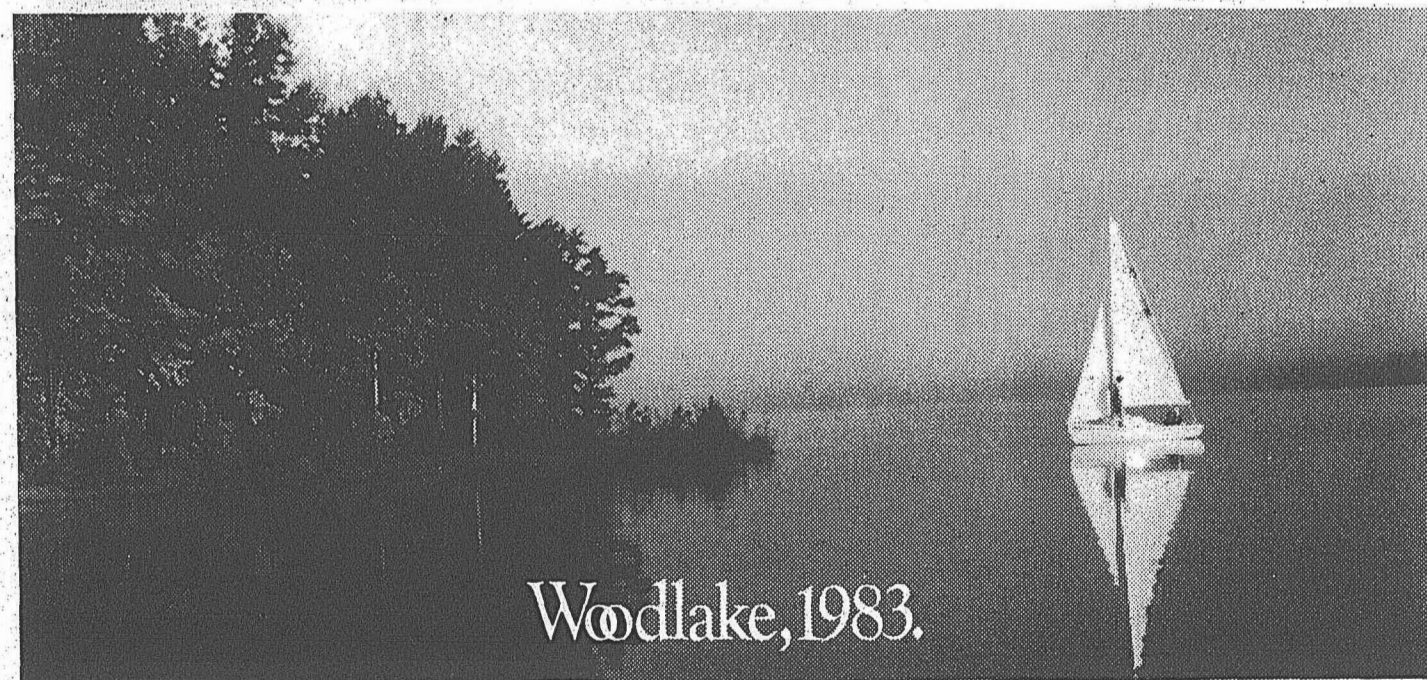
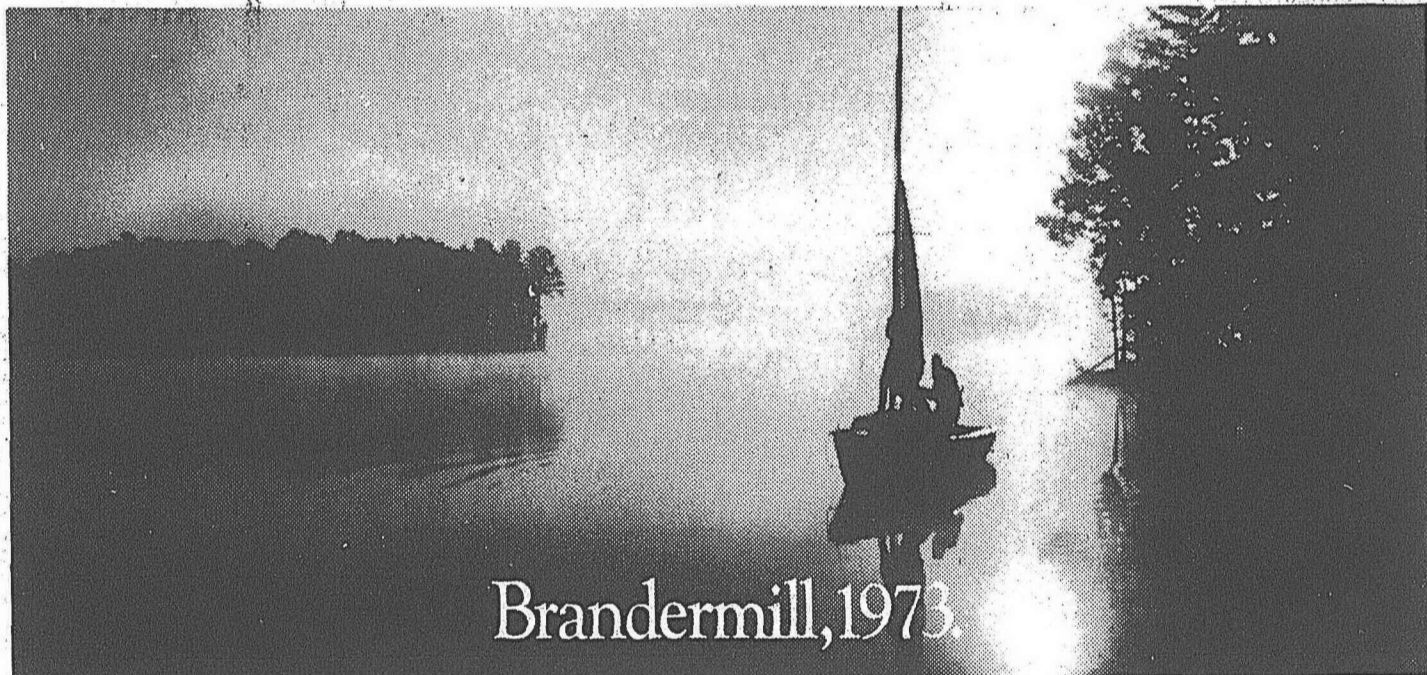

with the younger players, plus a big effort by golf professionals. What we're doing couldn't be accomplished without them." Jaeger is himself a volunteer, as are the other MJGA organizers. "Some clubs find it hard to get people to head up junior golf - Brandermill is fortunate" says Jaeger.

His enthusiasm for teaching golf to juniors is evident as Jim Leonard remarks, "we expect about 75 juniors at Brandermill this year. All our classes are co-ed, and open to boys and girls from 8-17. We meet every Monday morning." And what does a junior golf lesson involve? To that query Leonard responds with a good-natured, "A LOT! Specifically, we do swing drills, putting and chipping exercises, and sandtrap strategies. We also cover club selection, golf etiquette and safety, and take an annual trip to the Kings Mill Classic." The young golfers often follow their lesson with a practice round, as Monday morning is reserved for junior-priority play.

Jim is realist about junior golf. "It's hard for kids to maintain an interest in golf. There are now many other organized sports to consider and golf really demands an awful lot from a young player. That's where organizations like the MJGA come in - they provide not only the exposure to the game but also the encouragement that the beginner requires." He continues, "golf is a very individualized solitary sport, yet it also requires team cooperation. That makes it pretty unique. We try to teach not only game skills but also teammanship. For the young golfer it takes a real time commitment to pull it all together, and that can be difficult if all your peers are spending the afternoon at the swimming pool!"

Apparently the MJGA, the Brandermill Pros, and the adult volunteers have found the right formula. Junior golf grows in popularity with each new season. Registration for instruction was held on April 28 at Brandermill, but any interested young golfers may still sign up simply by stopping by at the Pro Shop. A Rules Seminar will be held Tuesday, May 22 at 7:30 p.m. at Douglas Freeman High School.

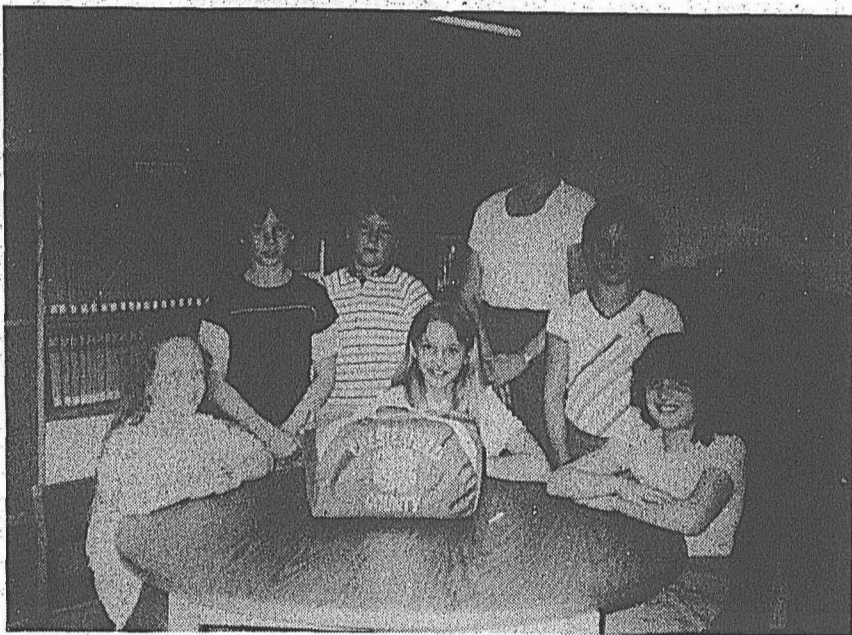

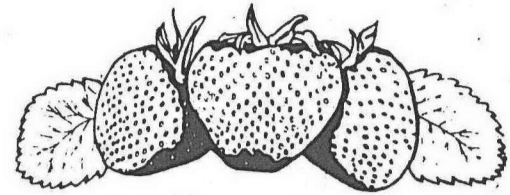

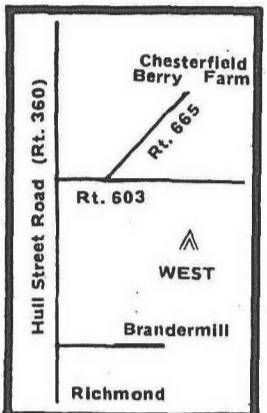

## Chesterfield Receives High Blood Pressure Screening Grant

W.P. Wagner, Jr., M.D., health director, announced today that the Virginia High Blood Pressure Control Program of the State Health Department has awarded the Chesterfield Health District (which encompasses the city of Colonial Heights and Powhatan County as well as Chesterfield County) a grant for high blood pressure screening and follow-up services.

The latest population figures, supplied by the 1980 Census, reveal that the total population in the Chesterfield Health District is 170,943. According to national statistics one out of every four Americans has high blood pressure, with an increased incidence in the black population. These figures indicate that there could be as many as 42,000 citizens of the Chesterfield Health District who have high blood pressure, those groups at highest risk are males, age 20-50, members of minorities and Senior Citizens. Each year in America, high blood pressure directly impacts on the 180,000 deaths from stroke and plays a significant role in the mortality and disability from heart disease.

Because high blood pressure has no symptoms, the condition goes unnoticed until the blood pressure is checked. By the time that symptoms appear, serious damage may have been done to the brain, heart and kidneys.

Although there is no cure for high blood pressure, the means for controlling it and preventing its serious complications are readily available. Unfortunately, one person in four with high blood pressure does not know that he or she has it, and of those who do know only about one third have their blood pressure under control. This poor control rate points to the need for continued surveillance and appropriate patient education to enable the aware hypertensive to successfully manage this chronic disease.

Dr. Wagner stated that the grant award will make possible the following services:

- 1) Screening and referral services;
- 2) Monitoring and patient counseling services for award hypertensives;
- 3) Public Community education; and
- 4) Technical assistance to community groups in sponsoring high

blood pressure activities.

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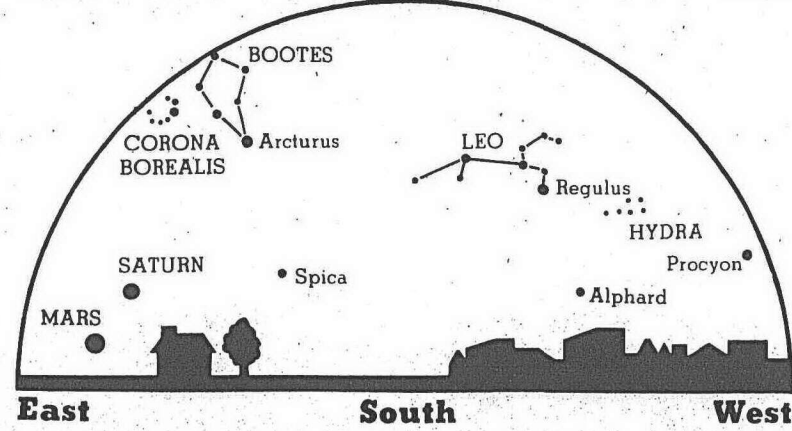
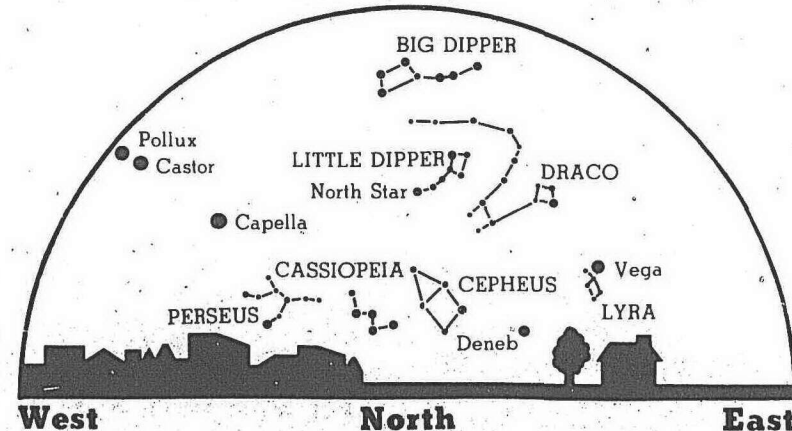
## Sky Watch

A Monthly Feature Prepared By The Science Museum of Virginia

MAY SKY CHARTS: To use these sky charts face either north or south and hold the charts directly in front of you with the horizon on the bottom. The charts show the brightest stars and planets between the horizon and the part of the sky directly overhead during the early evening hours this month.

CONSTELLATIONS: Leo the lion is visible high overhead in the southern sky. The figure of the lion shouldn't be difficult to find since it is one of the few constellations whose outline of stars resembles the figure it represents. Leo's head and mane are formed by a backward question mark with the bright star Regulus the terminating dot. To the east of Leo look for another easily recognizable star pattern - kite-shaped Bootes. The tail of Bootes is marked by the bright star Arcturus. High overhead in the north the Big Dipper is visible upside down in the sky with its bowl pointing towards the horizon. Beneath the Dipper and to the west, notice three bright stars - the Gemini twins, Castor and Pollux, and Capella.

PLANETS: The red planet Mars dominates the constellation of Libra this month, visible very low in the east. The planet rises about sunset and sets about sunrise. Joining Mars in Libra is Saturn, which also rises at about sunset and disappears from view by sunrise. Jupiter rises about five hours before the sun and is visible low above



the southern horizon for a short while before setting at sunrise.

CELESTIAL EVENTS: For a few days before and after May 4, meteors from the Eta Aquarid shower will appear in the eastern sky after midnight. The shower, which averages 20 meteors per hour, is a result of debris shed by Halley's Comet which intersects Earth's orbit twice a year - on May 4 and October 21. Look for an almost full moon to pass within .5° of Saturn and 2° of Mars in the evening sky on May 14. On May 18, a waning gibbous moon will pass within 3° of Jupiter.

The first "annular" solar eclipse to occur in Virginia skies in 153 years will take place on May 30. The

moon will begin to block the sun's light around 11 a.m. and the sun will become almost totally eclipsed except for a thin ring of light at 12:45 p.m. The eclipse will end by 2:30 p.m. An annular eclipse occurs when the moon is too far from Earth to cover the sun completely; hence, at the time of the eclipse, a thin ring or "annulus" of sunlight is still visible. The next annular eclipse over Virginia will take place on September 14, 2099.
