Home Resales Up 44%

Housing sales activity in Brandermill increased dramatically during the first 6 months of 1984. The rise was particularly strong in resale homes, climbing 44 percent over 1983 levels, while new homes sales jumped 31 percent. During the same period sales activity in the Richmond metropolitan area increased 4 percent, according to the Richmond Multiple Listing Service.

"We're delighted with the tremendous level of activity we are seeing," says H. Clem Carlisle, Vice President and Sales Manager of Brandermill Realty. Home sales have been strong the first 2 quarters of 1984, nationwide. However, what we've experienced in Brandermill has been exceptional." Mr. Carlisle pointed out that currently about 5 percent of the occupied homes in Brandermill are for sale. "This is a relatively low percentage and should be expected in a community with our growth and mobility."

When questioned about the possibility of rising interest rates, Mr. Carlisle replied "Our sales agents have not noticed any meaningful impact on sales as a result of changing interest rates. With so many attractive, variable interest rate programs, some starting as low as 9 1/2 percent, finding the right

financing for a buyer has not been a problem."

With August and September traditionally being the strongest moving months, the Brandermill community can realistically expect to see home sales continue to increase through the third quarter of this year.



Mailbox orders received by the BCA office are considered an indicator of homes being sold in Brandermill. According to Assistant Community

Manager Bill Pugh, "we have seen an all-time record for the number of mailbox requests [during the month of July]". Brandermill carpenter shops were busy building 45 new boxes and painting 15 name changes and 10 house number changes. "That's a total of 70 homeowners who have either moved within the Brandermill community or have bought new homes", says Pugh. "You might say we've been pretty busy!"



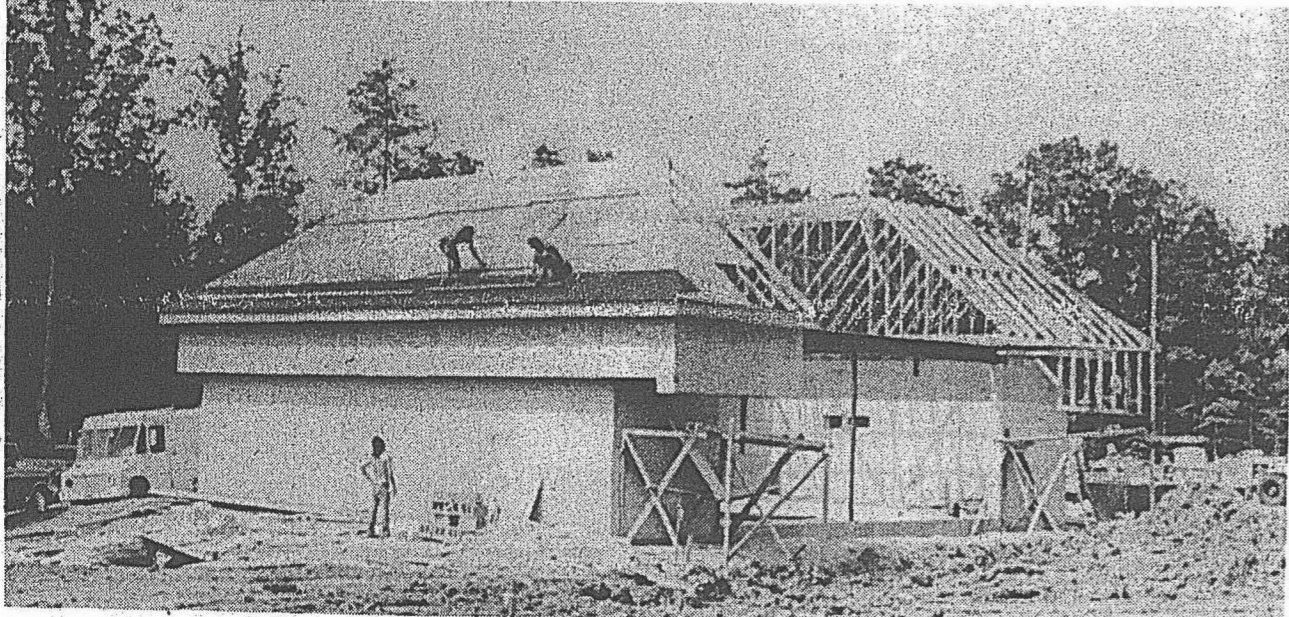

Reservoir Emergencies Demand Quick Action: Call 744-1000

Several Brandermill Residents have inquired as to the most effective procedure to follow when they are witness to an emergency situation on Swift Creek Reservoir. According to BCA Community Manager Fredric Bott, there are three alternative methods of summoning aid in a life or property threatening situation:

* **Call 747-1000.** This is the Brandermill Sales office telephone number in Sunday Park. It is answered Monday-Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m., Saturday 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sunday 9:30

to 7:30 p.m. (The operator will alert the BCA boathouse and the local fire department.)

* **Call 744-2291.** This is the telephone number for the Clover Hill Fire Department. The Fire Department has a rescue boat and a crew on duty and can coordinate a rescue operation.

* **Call 233-0011.** This is the telephone number for the Manchester Rescue Squad. They also have access to equipment for lake rescue.

It is suggested that residents call the 744-1000 number first, within

the hours indicated. This is the fastest way to reach a lake emergency, as our own rescue boat can be immediately placed into action while additional assistance is enroute.

Keep in mind that emergencies occur in ALL seasons and may take the form of an overturned boat or someone falling through the ice. Being alert to potentially dangerous situations and giving a thought to being "our brothers keeper" can make the difference between a successful rescue and a tragedy.

BCA Board Discusses Security, July 4th Parade Budget; Hears Birthday Party Plans; Air Conditions Center

Meeting held July 16, 1984, all members present, excepting Bill Dix.

The following actions were taken:

- The President noted the fact that all Board members had previously received a copy of the BCA's financial statement for January through June 1984. There were no questions and/or discussions on this document.
- Art Haake advised the Board the long range projections needed by the Long Range Planning Group prior to its first meeting would be received from the BCA's accountant, Rob Schuttrumpf and that he would have a report for them at the next meeting of the BCA Board, (scheduled for August 20).
- The Board then discussed the memorandum to the BCA Board from the Community Manager on the need for air conditioning in the Community Center. The Board recognized that the Community

Center needed to be air conditioned both from a standpoint of making it useable in the summer as well as to cut down on the high costs of the electric furnace during the winter months. Accordingly, based on a motion by Branch Lawson, seconded by Art Haake, the Board unanimously approved the expenditure of \$2450.00 with H. & H. Company for the installation of a 3 ton air conditioner in the Community Center. \$600 would be funded from the Community Center account from dollars already donated to that activity. The remaining \$1850.00 would be taken from uncommitted reserves.

• President Maphis invited discussion on the memorandum to the BCA Board on the subject of BCA Security. After an in-depth discussion of the matter, the Board decided to let the current security program continue "as is", with the exception that the Country Club would not have to be checked on the "first visit" as listed on the daily

report and time sheet prepared by the BCA Security Patrol. This would gain time for the security personnel to spend more time in the neighborhoods. The Country Club would then be checked on the second and third visits, with special attention to the pools and sensitive areas such as snackbars, etc.

• Clem Carlisle briefed the Board on the "10th Anniversary Celebration" or "Birthday Party" planned by the Brandermill Community to acknowledge 10 years of growth in the Brandermill community. He stated the current date has been set for Saturday, September 15. The Board unanimously endorsed the concept of a 10th Birthday Party and asked the Community Manager to report with regards to potential costs to be incurred.

• The next discussion by the Board revolved around the memorandum to the Board of Directors by the Community Manager which is an "after action" report of the 4th of July parade. The Community Manager asked the Board to approve increases in the budget for the 1985 Fourth of July parade in order to broaden the scope of the parade, get more residents involved and make it even more successful. On the matter of additional dollars for the 4th of July Parade, the Community Manager was asked to investigate the possibility of using the same band as is used by the Country Club in the 4th of July pool party in the afternoon and evening. The Community Manager was also advised that all of the costs, etc. for the 1985 4th of July Parade should be included in the 1985 BCA annual budget and that

all of these matters be discussed with the Budget Committee subject to a later review by the BCA Board. The Board at this time did not elect to approve any specific expenditure

in 1985 over and above that which was budgeted for 1984.

• Clem Carlisle, speaking as a member of the BCA Architectural Advisory Board, informed the BCA

Board Glenn German would officially discontinue his services with the BCA Architectural Advisory Board (AAB) effective July 31, 1984.

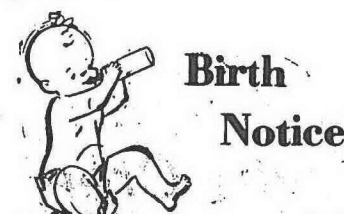

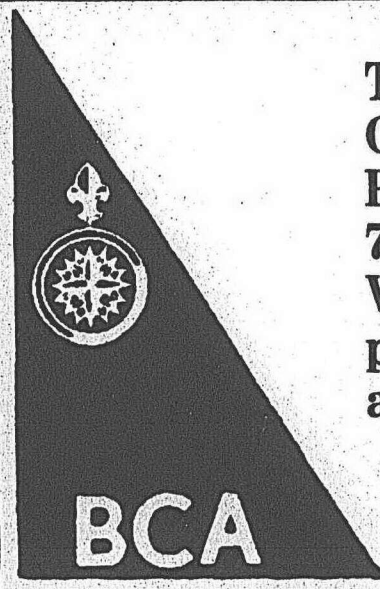

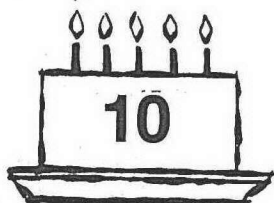

Neighborhood Rep Council Meeting August 26

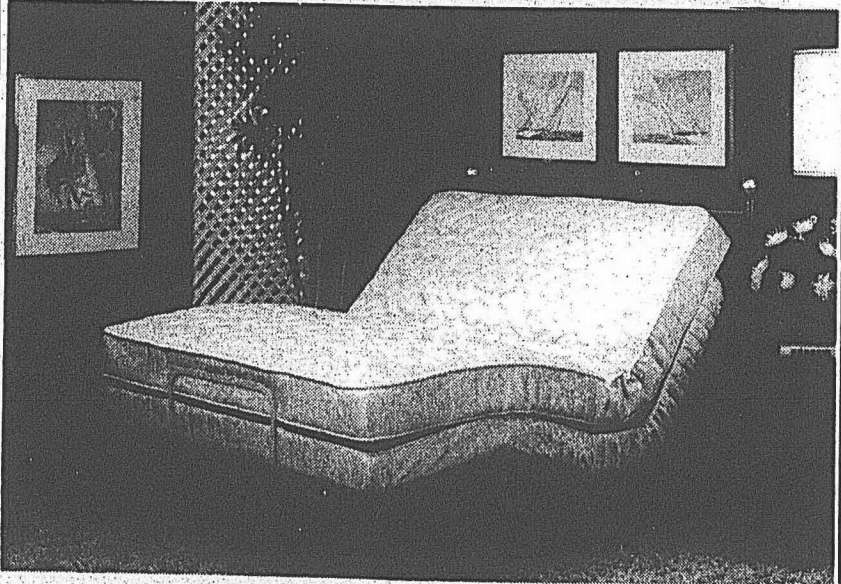

Book Review

THE DAYS OF ETERNITY by Gordon Glasco. Doubleday, 470 pp.

The year is 1944 and Lt. Karl Kruger is the Commander of the German garrison at Montefalco, Italy. Duty is an inseparable from him as his soul and his honor is bound in the sacred oath of unconditional obedience.

To Anna Miceli, a Tuscan girl, he is "Carlo", the man she loves - she cannot think of him and his office as one.

The Allied troops are advancing on Montefalco and the separation of the two lovers is inevitable - there is no opportunity for Anna to tell Karl of their expected child.

The German high command orders ten civilian men to be shot for each soldier killed in a Partisan raid. Anna is unaware of Karl's efforts to have the order revoked and knows only that he gave the order to five. She watches as both her father and brother are executed.

Karl, finding himself disillusioned with the German leadership and seeking to atone for his guilt, is content to endure the balance of the war as a wallflower in a prisoner-of-war post. Fearing the wrath of her antifascist family, Anna runs away, taking with her a bitter hatred, and seeks a new identity in a DP camp.

They will not meet again for 28 years.

The novel leads you through their individual lives up to the moment of their accidental shattering encounter. The climactic showdown at the conclusion is engrossing and perceptive. Glasco's portrayal of the characters is drawn from realism, acknowledging individual concepts and frailties.

THE DAYS OF ETERNITY is a story of love and survival.

CHOICE PEOPLE: The Greats, Near-Greats, and Ingrates I Have Known, by A.E. Hotchner. William Morrow, 412 pp.

For those who like the inside story on celebrities, this book is a must. Abundant in detailed narrative, the book emphasizes the joys, heartaches, obstacles, regrets, the highs and the lows of people Hotchner has known -- all written in an animated, intelligent and sensitive style.

"Clark Gable . . ." he says, "contributed importantly to my awareness that even the famous were vulnerable."

During his years as a free-lancer and part-time lawyer, Hotchner met most of the leading personalities of our time and brings to us a unique portrait of each. Included are such greats as Ernest Hemingway, Frank Sinatra, Jimmy Durante, Paul Newman, Tennessee Williams, Ingrid Bergman, Burt Reynolds, Barbara Hutton, John F. Kennedy, and many, many more.

For those who wish to "skip ahead" to a favorite celebrity, you will find the chapter titles a bit misleading, but in his own rambling style Hotchner does get to the point and ties it all together.

There will be scandal, laughter and tears. The book is illustrated with 32 pages of photographs and is excellent reading for these hot poolside August days.

ing instructions for cooking time is critical. Overcooking causes the seafood to become rubbery and tasteless. For fish only, you can follow the Canadian Department of Fisheries method for cooking: measure the fish at its thickest point, (Depth, not across!) and cook 10 minutes per inch. If frozen, add another 10 minutes. This rule does not apply to shell fish. Cook cautiously and follow instructions until you feel confident you can experiment on your own. These recipes may have a fancy name, but they are simple and quite delicious. Because I can not always find small selections as well as the all American famous hamburger. Yours will too. Give seafood a try!

Shrimp Gumbo

Shrimp Gumbo is often thought of as a very involved dish, but we have made the recipe simple but quite delicious!

- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 cups chopped okra*
- 1/2 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/3 cup chopped green pepper
- 4 cups hot water**
- 2 large tomatoes peeled and chopped
- 1 large clove garlic, minced
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground pepper
- 1/8 teaspoon thyme
- 1 teaspoon ginger (fresh pref.)
- 1 pound shrimp, shelled and deveined

Cooked brown or white rice

Melt butter in a large heavy skillet or Dutch oven, over moderate heat.

Add next four ingredients. Sauté about 10 minutes or until tender.

Add remaining ingredients except shrimp. Bring to boil, cover simmer for 1 hour.

Add shrimp and simmer for 10 minutes more. Remove bay leaf.

Serve over hot cooked rice in bowls or soup plates.

*If using canned or thawed frozen okra, add with tomatoes.

**Substitute one or two cups of the water with court bouillon or fish stock.

Shrimp Salad

- 1/2 cup of cream cheese
- 1/4 cup of mayonnaise (home made)
- 1/4 cup of well drained, crushed pineapple
- 1/2 cup almonds or pecans
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice freshly squeezed
- 2 tablespoon of diced black olives
- 2 tablespoon of diced cucumber
- 1/4 teaspoon of diced garlic
- 2 tablespoon of chopped green

- John Maphis advised the Board there had been no reply on the letter sent to Business Park firms referencing the assessment problem. The BCA is not a property owner in the Business Park and therefore will not participate as a member of the Business Association.
- In related action, the BCA Board felt it would be acceptable for Atlantic Grounds Maintenance Company to bid on maintenance work at the Business Park if it choose to do so (Atlantic is currently under contract to provide Brandermill maintenance).

Combine all ingredients. Chill. Serve on a bed of lettuce and tomatoes with lemon wedges. Accompanied with toasted pita bread.

Lobster

Add one (1) tablespoon salt to each quart of water. Bring water to a boil. Add lobster. After water begins to boil again, begin timing. Allow 3-4 minutes per 10 ounces.

Serve hot, with melted butter and lemon wedges or, separate and refrigerate until ready for sauces and salads.

Crab or Lobster Souffle

- 1 lb. crab or lobster meat
 - 1 tablespoon butter
 - 1 tablespoon flour
 - 2 eggs
 - 1/2 pint of cream
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - nutmeg to taste
 - dash white pepper
 - 2 tablespoon apple vinegar
- Melt butter, rub in flour to paste, Add milk, salt pepper and nutmeg.

Cook until thick. When cool, stir in the yolks of eggs slightly beaten. Add vinegar. Now fold in the stiffly beaten whites and meat, shredded. Put in baking dish with crumbs on top and cook at once in pan of hot water in moderate oven for 45 minutes. Serve immediately. Serves 6.

Seafood Pie

You can use shrimp, crab and lobster totaling 2 1/2 pounds or 2 1/2 pounds of any of the above.

- 2 1/2 pounds meat
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 2 tablespoons flour
 - 2 tablespoons cooking sherry
 - 1 pint cream
 - 1/2 pound cheese grated
- use a mild cheese salt to taste

In the top of a double boiler melt two tablespoons butter add two heaping tablespoons flour and stir until well blended - grate one half pound cheese add to butter and flour three quarters of cheese and one pint of cream and stir until thick. Add meat and two tablespoons cooking sherry, put into bak-

ing dish, cover with remainder of grated cheese and bake in medium oven until brown.

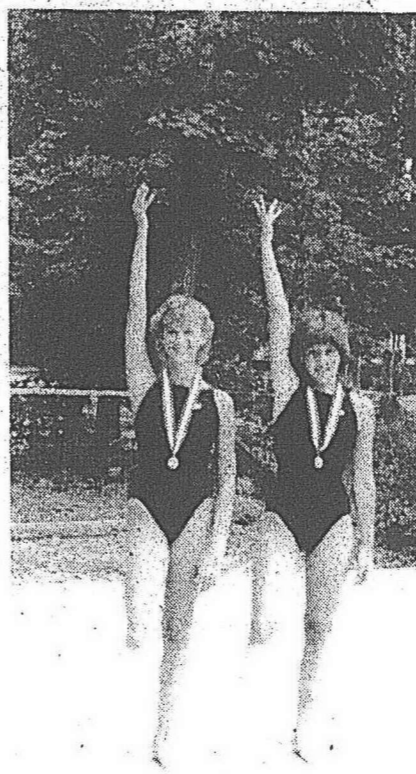
Swimmers To Compete In National Junior Olympics
