# Board Meeting: Potpourri Of Issues

Minutes of the BCA  
Board of Directors  
August 20, 1984

### Trot For Tots

Community Manager Fred Bott briefed the Board on the project "Trot for Tots". Connie Pollard, Marketing Director for the Brandermill Company, had submitted a letter to the Board asking for permission to conduct the "Trot for Tots" family run in support of MCV Auxiliary of VCU on September 30, 1984. The Board unanimously voted to approve the request.

### Safeway Roads

John Maphis asked for a discussion on the subject of Safeway's Maintenance concerns. After considerable conversation, the Board agreed that it would be acceptable for Safeway to divert a percentage of their assessment funds to direct road maintenance costs.

### 10th Birthday

As the next order of business, Maphis asked the Board to consider the recommendation made by the Community Manager in support of the 10th Birthday Celebration. The Board unanimously approved an expenditure of \$2800 from uncommitted funds to cover costs of fireworks, security, and boating on September 15, 1984.

### LRPG Study

Art Haake reviewed with the Board a report of the first meeting of the Long Range Planning Group (LRPG) held on July 27, 1984. That report was sent to each Board member on July 31. The Board did not enter into any detailed discussion of the document. However, several Board members recommend that the LRPG include in its considerations the matter of the availability of funds to improve, and perhaps increase, the amount of maintenance being provided in Brandermill, particularly on the highways.

### Budget

The Board reviewed the first seven-month budget comparison and balance sheet. Members had no specific comments on that document.

### Business Park Association

The Community Manager briefed the Board on the status of the formation of an association by the first located in the Business Park. He pointed out that he attended a business meeting on August 17, at which time a decision was made to recommend the formation of a Business Park Association. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to the businesses located in the Park, proposing a schedule of pay-

ment of assessments and suggesting a date for a general meeting. The Business Association asked the BCA Board to provide one additional round of general maintenance, allowing the business group to accumulate "start-up" funds. The Board considered the request and approved the expenditure.

### Brandermill/Woodlake

The Board discussed a recent meeting on Brandermill/Woodlake relationships, concluding that the general spirit and policy should be one of cooperation with Woodlake regarding cooperative ventures and use of facilities. The Board will make a final decision on the exchange/use of specific facilities at its meeting in September.

### Playground Equipment

John Maphis shared with the Board a letter from Sue Ann McNeer, the coordinator for a project to expand the playground facilities at Swift Creek Elementary School. Sue stated in her letter that she understood that the BCA was considering construction of additional playgrounds throughout Brandermill and felt that a general concentration on their efforts in one particular central spot would be more advantageous than several smaller locations. The Board voted unanimously to disapprove the request for the following reasons: a) the Board has, at present, no plans to establish mini-playgrounds, b) the Board is reluctant to use assessments paid by residents and intended for general use for special-interest projects, and c) there is the question of using Brandermill funds to purchase equipment that would become County property.

### Genito Road Project

The Community Manager brought to the attention of the Board a recent request by the State Highway Department to continue the project that has just been completed on Genito Road, from

Coalfield to Old Hundred, to improve the site distance and rework the shoulders and banks and plant grass on that particular stretch of road. The Highway Department would like to continue these improvements on Genito Road all the way to the Brandermill Parkway. To do this, they need the joint cooperation (as was the case with the original project) of the Highway Department, the Brandermill Company and the BCA. The previous project cost the BCA around \$1800 with considerably more spent by the Highway Department and the Brandermill Company. The Board, in discussing the project, observed that it is not really the province of the BCA to involve itself in the development of roads. The one project was agreed to in order to improve what was a very hazardous area from Coalfield to Old Hundred.

The extension to Brandermill Parkway is, in the opinion of the Board, not as critical.

In summary, the Board would like to know more about the project before it makes any decision and has directed the Community Manager to gather facts and figures to present at the September 17th Board meeting.

### Marathon Request

The Board took action to ratify a marathon project to be held on October 7 in Brandermill by the Jaycees. The community is reminded that there is a requirement to seek prior approval of such worthwhile projects through the BCA Board, in order to forestall any possible conflicts with regard to available space and plans of other organizations.

### Storage Area

The Community Manager asked the Board to approve, in principle, the preparation of a project which would outline the dollars to be spent, and the size and shape of the improvements to be made, to the current storage area in order to support the continued demand for

storage of equipment not authorized to be stored on individual lots. He pointed out that there were two phases to the project that had been constructed during the last four years. Phase I includes 37 storage spots of which 2 are currently available. Phase II includes 67 storage spots of which 3 are available. The land was donated by the Brandermill Company in 1980 and the BCA took on the responsibility and the cost to cut the trees and fill in the floodplain area to make it useable as a storage area. The subsequent adding of tons of gravel, extensive cyclone fencing, planting of small trees and plants and the building of wooden screening fences at the front and back of the area, add up to the total cost, thus far in excess of \$35,000. The Community Manager pointed out that Southeastern Engineering, who owns the property on the north side of the storage area, is willing to negotiate with the BCA for the sale of perhaps a thirty foot strip along the fence line. This would permit the BCA to move the fence back and to gain about forty more spots. This should be enough to satisfy the community's storage requirements to build-out (completion of Brandermill). The Board directed the Community Manager to put the project together and bring the matter back to the Board at its meeting on September 17, 1984.

### Neighborhood Rep Council

Board member Bill Dix discussed the Neighborhood Rep Council, indicating that he felt that the Board had acted wisely in encouraging the reestablishment of the program. The group has held two meetings. It was felt that a closer working relationship between the Council and the Board, with regard to community concerns, might be beneficial and, accordingly, it was agreed to invite Council chairpersons to the next meeting of the BCA Board.

The next meeting of the BCA Board of Directors is scheduled for Monday, September 17, 1984.

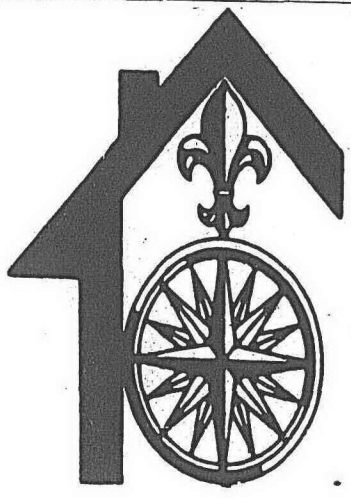

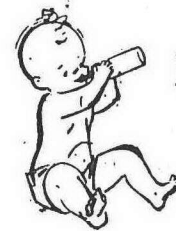

### Crop Walk Benefits World's Hungry

Walkers are now being recruited for the 1984 Brandermill CROP HUNGER WALK set for 1 p.m., Sunday, October 7. Beginning at Brandermill Church, the 10-mile course will be marked off into smaller increments for those not walking the full distance.

CROP is the name given to local community efforts at hunger education and fundraising for Church World Service, the relief and development agency of more than 30 Protestant and Orthodox denominations in the U.S. Over 90 cents of each donated dollar goes directly to help the people in need.

According to Laura Lee Chandler, CROP Walk Coordinator, the Brandermill CROP Walk will coincide with the Richmond Crop Walk which is set for the same day. "Several community organizations, church groups, and civic clubs are working jointly with the coor-

dinators on this first Crop Walk in Brandermill," Mrs. Chandler said. While some of these groups have additional special tasks, all are working at recruiting walkers.

"Once walkers agree to take part they will be required to sign up sponsors who will pledge money for the distance covered," Mrs. Chandler said. "We will have Crop Organizers at each check point along the route to verify the distance each walker covers."

Following the walk, each walker will then collect the pledge money from their sponsors and turn it in.

Organizations participating in the CROP Walk are: The Brandermill Kiwanis Club, Brandermill Lions Club, Brandermill Jaycees, Brandermill Retiree Men's Club, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Brownie Scouts, Tomahawk Baptist Church and Brandermill Church Youth Group.

# Clover Hill



## Clover Hill Farm Chesterfield County, Virginia

"Clover Hill" is a name that is familiar to most Brandermill residents. We live in the Clover Hill district of Chesterfield County, our children attend Clover Hill High School, and there are real estate developments and private businesses that have adopted the name. "Clover Hill" is inextricably linked to the community of which Brandermill and Woodlake have become a part.

I got my first clue as to the origins of the name when I read that General Robert E. Lee had visited "Clover Hill" on April 2, 1865 during his retreat to Appomattox. This piece of information, alone, was enough to assure my continued interest.

I discovered that Clover Hill occupies a 527-acre tract known as Winterpock, the land having been registered to one Henry Cox, Jr. in 1777. Henry deeded the tract to his son, James in 1834. (The property was to remain in the Cox family until 1920.)

In 1837, a slave discovered coal on the Winterpock land and James, who had been educated at Hampden-Sydney College and prepared for a career in law, turned, instead, to the business of developing this unexpected resource. His success in his mining endeavors was to be equalled by an outstanding political career.

It was Martha Reid Cox, wife of James, who renamed Winterpock "Clover Hill". And it was Martha and James who invited General Lee to supper, upon hearing of his retreat encampment nearby.

After reading even such a brief history of Clover Hill nothing would do but that I see the house for myself. I gathered that it must be somewhere in the vicinity of Winterpock Road, an area of Chesterfield County that I had not yet explored.

Finding Winterpock proved fairly easy, and I enjoyed the meander-

ing country road for awhile, until I began to wonder if perhaps I had driven too far. I stopped to ask directions at a corner grocery store (a white frame building with a front roof overhang that once sheltered gas pumps and now provided refuge for an assortment of soft drink machines). A young woman unpacking cartons knew nothing about "Clover Hill", but an older gentleman in the store did. "You're just about there" he told me. "Take the right fork outside this place, go down about three miles to the wooden bridge, then watch the street signs. It'll be a sharp right turn, just after you see another store 'bout like this one... only it's closed up." I did as he said and found Clover Hill -- a one-lane, quarry stone road.

The road went only one place -- up to the house. I must admit, my heart skipped a beat when I first saw it. It was quietly magnificent. Permission from the present owner, Dr. Lewis Lush, to "look around" was quickly granted. I remarked to him how "beautifully kept" the old place was and Dr. Lush allowed "that's all my wife's doin'." Then he went back in the house and left me to wander about.

It's hard to describe how I felt, standing there on the lawn of Clover Hill, but I can offer this: I didn't feel as though I'd been left alone. I could feel the presence of others who had walked these grounds, on summer afternoons long since past. Children and servants and friends who had known and loved this place.

The thought was not discomforting.

The fair has been held each year since its beginning in 1911, with the exception of 1917 when an influenza epidemic threatened the entire nation, and once again during World War II when the country was at war.

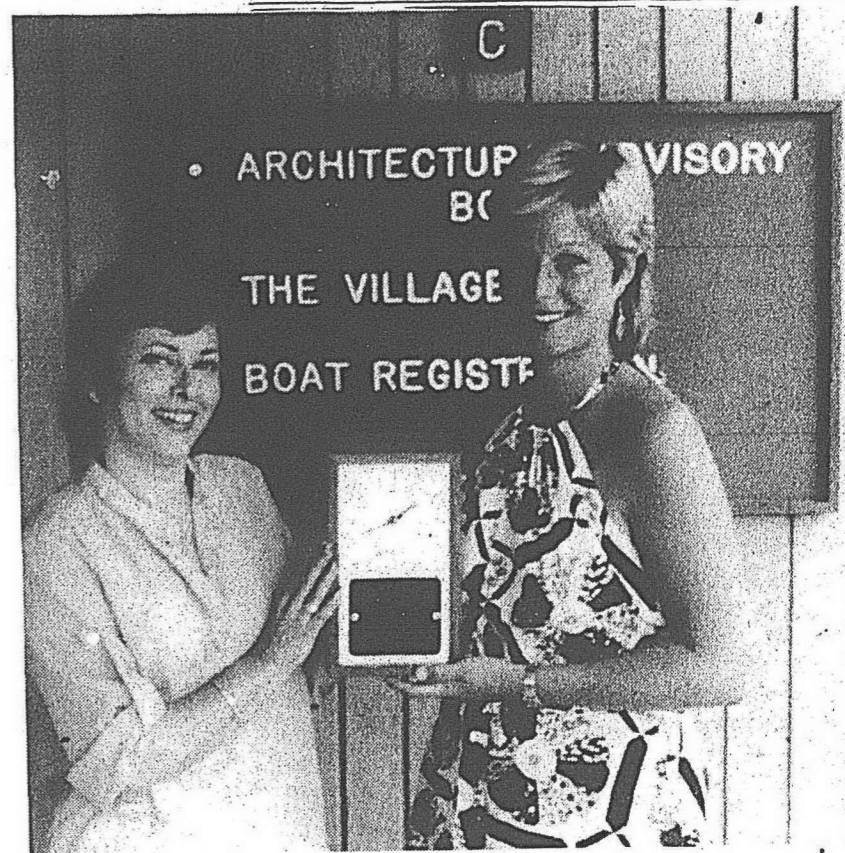
Influenza no longer poses a threat to fairgoers, but Avian Flu does threaten Virginia's poultry industry, so this year there will be no poultry or other feathered birds at the fair.

Residents of Chesterfield County, the 1970 Annexed area of Chesterfield County, Colonial Heights and Powhatan are eligible to enter any of the farm crops, livestock, cooking, canning, arts and crafts competitions for prize money. This year, for the first time, residents of Amelia County have

been invited to enter the livestock competition.

According to Vernon L. Goodwin, president, this year's fair should be the largest yet, attracting more than the 63,000 persons who attended in 1983. Additional prize money will be awarded, and there will be a free grandstand show, a free fireworks display each night, and two daily free performances of the Johnson Family Circus. Returning to the fair will be the amusement rides, shows and carnival games of Fun Air Amusement, Inc. and the addition of Amusements of America. Bingo will be played every night, operated by the Disabled American Veterans, Chapter 50.

Premium list books are available for anyone interested in entering an exhibit at the fair. They are available at the County Administration Building Lobby, the County Extension Agent's office, any Chesterfield County Library and numerous stores throughout the county.

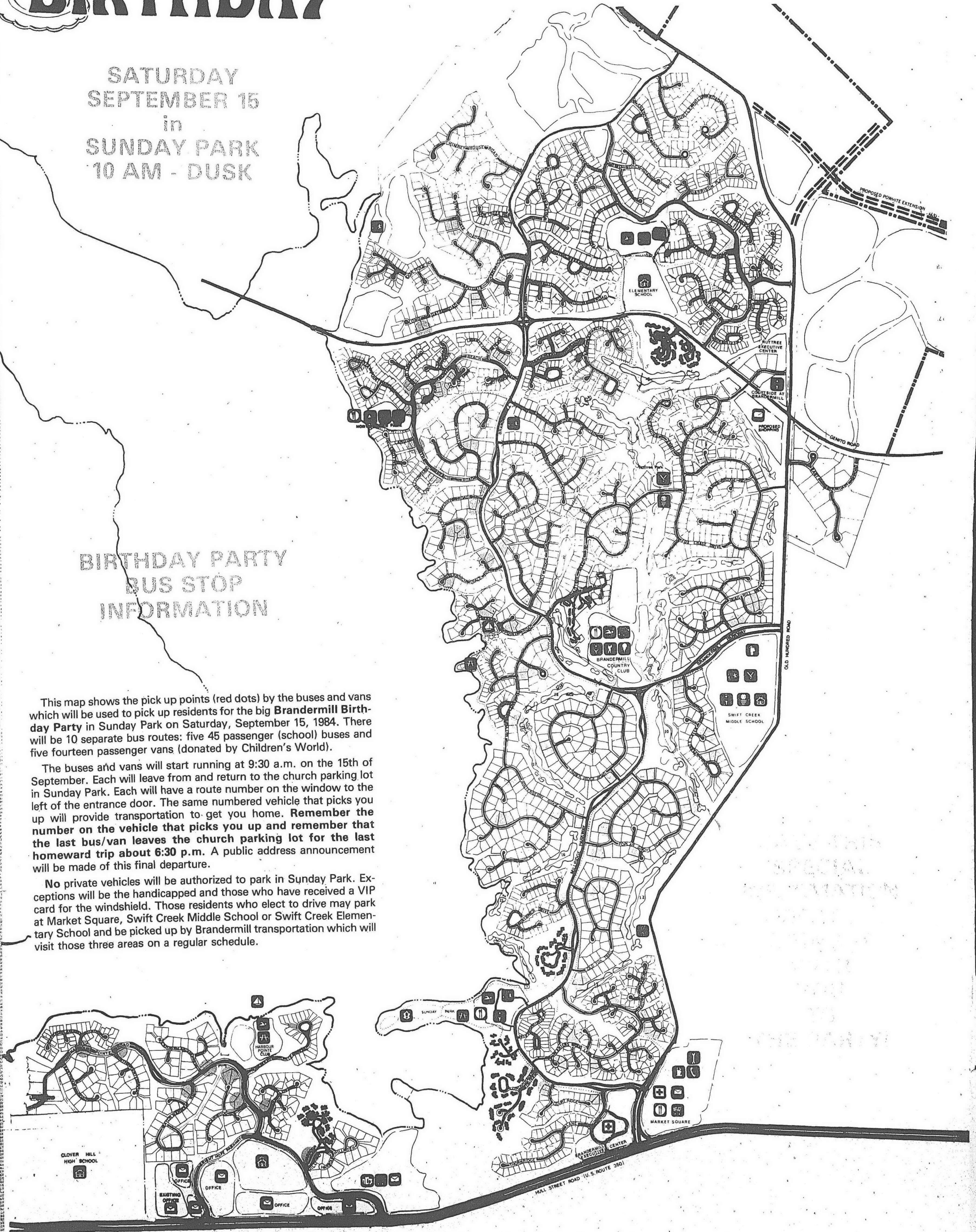

### BIRTHDAY PARTY BUS STOP INFORMATION

This map shows the pick up points (red dots) by the buses and vans which will be used to pick up residents for the big Brandermill Birthday Party in Sunday Park on Saturday, September 15, 1984. # Land & Lake Development

*In our search for information regarding the history of Brandermill's development we came across this "Questions and Answers" column (Village Mill 2/78) by then General Manager Harry Frampton. The article was concise and informative, addressing developmental questions most often asked by Brandermill residents.*

## What is the Early History of Brandermill and How Was the Lake Developed?

The land over which Brandermill is being developed was originally owned by Lea Industries, a company owned by the Powell family of Richmond. In 1969, the Powell family sold Lea Industries to Sperry & Hutchinson, but the timber land that they owned in Chesterfield County was retained in a new subsidiary, Chesterfield Land & Timber Corp. (CL&T). CL&T was established to oversee and manage the timber land with the idea of developing the land.

Angus Powell, President of CL&T, had seen planned communities such as Reston and Columbia in the Washington area and believed strongly that orderly, planned growth was the way of the future. He spent a great deal of time traveling all over the United States observing planned communities, and significant studies and analyses were done to lay the groundwork for the new community.

CL&T had decided to build a 700-acre lake on the land they owned in the vicinity of Highway 360. At that time, Chesterfield County was purchasing its water from the City of Richmond at a very high rate. A joint venture was worked out between CL&T and Chesterfield County to develop a lake that would provide a water supply for the County. As a part of the agreement, CL&T gave the county an easement to use the water over

1,200 acres of land it owned, and gave in payment the land under the water filter plant and dam (35 acres) and also contributed several hundred thousand dollars for clearing the land and various engineering services. The County then purchased easements for approximately 500 additional acres from other property owners, mostly on the northern part of the lake, for the 1,700-acre lake. CL&T retained fee simple ownership of its 1,200 acres and therefore retained all recreational rights and other normal ownership rights as long as the activities that occurred on their land were not damaging to the water supply.

CL&T got the lake built at less than it would have had to pay if it had done it itself, and the County was able to develop its own water supply at a greatly reduced cost when the County did not have the financial resources to fund an independent venture. The County was also able to produce its own water at a savings of several hundred thousand dollars per year over what they were paying the City of Richmond.

## A New Commitment

In 1970, CL&T entered into an agreement with Reynolds, Smith & Hills, an architectural, engineering, and planning firm from Jacksonville, Florida for a joint venture to develop the new community to be called Swift Creek. During 1970 and 1971, the new partnership worked extensively at obtaining zoning, and sewer commitments with Chesterfield County. These initial commitments were received and the partnership undertook to begin the project.

In the fall of 1972, the Sea Pines Company of Hilton Head Island, South Carolina became interested in the Swift Creek Development. Sea Pines wanted to expand its residential activities and believed the Swift Creek property offered an outstanding opportunity. In June, 1973, the Sea Pines Company

bought RS&H's fifty percent ownership, along with forty percent of CL&T's ownership. CL&T's involvement remained as a ten percent partner along with being the lender on the land purchase.

During the Summer and Fall of 1973, Sea Pines moved in a core management team to begin the planning and development of Swift Creek, (it's name was shortly changed to Brandermill). During the next 12 months, the local management team went through the extensive planning process of a new community. Approximately 15 to 20 planners and over 25 consultants worked on the master development plan. During that year of planning, application was made to The Equitable Life Assurance Company for long term financing. A year of review and analysis was needed by "The Equitable" but they made a major long-term commitment of 15 million dollars to finance the project. It was encouraging that "The Equitable" made their strong commitment to Brandermill at the depths of the real estate recession. After a year of planning and hundreds of redraftings of the "Brandermill Plan", the management team made application to Chesterfield County to modify the existing zoning and sewer commitments that had already been received to be more in line with the experiences of the Sea Pines Company. During the County approval process, the issue of public use and environmental damage to the Swift Creek Reservoir became a very public spirited and controversial issue.

**"I remember the first day I met Angus Powell. It was February, 1973, and we took a jeep ride to (what is now) Sunday Park. Actually, we couldn't really get to the Park — there weren't any roads! But we got close, and walked around that piece of the Brandermill property.. I remember thinking: how beautiful and unique this land is."**

—Harry Frampton, VM Interview 1984

The key question raised was whether the development of the Brandermill Community would adversely affect the water supply of Chesterfield County. After months of emotional hearings, Chesterfield County retained an independent task force composed of professors of Virginia Polytechnical Institute to evaluate the effect of development on the water supply. The report recommended that the development of Brandermill was the best of the viable alternatives and that it would not degrade the water supply. Additionally, as part of a County sewer application to the Federal Government, the Environmental Protection Agency came to a similar conclusion. **During the spring of 1974, the Chesterfield Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors voted unanimous support for the development of Brandermill.**

## Development Begins

In the summer of 1974, construction was started and a retail lot sales program was begun over the winter. In July of 1975, the Sunday Park complex was opened with the initial homes under way. Lot sales continued and in the Fall the initial residents moved into the community with the Clapps of Old Fox Trail and the Davis family of Winterberry Ridge as the first residents. Brandermill was underway!

In late 1976, the local management team formed a new corporation, Community Development Associates, and with the cooperation of "The Equitable" purchased Brandermill from the Sea Pines Company and Chesterfield Land & Timber Company. The new company is committed to the long-term build-out and development of the community with the strong support of "The Equitable". The Sea Pines Company, however, did retain a three-year management consulting agreement with Brandermill. As a part of that agreement, the key management personnel of the Sea Pines Company continue to serve on our Board of Advisors and we continue to use many of their financial, accounting and business systems.

During the last two years ('76-'78), an additional 500 families have moved to Brandermill. Lot sales are now close to 1,000! The foundation is strong and we look forward to a great future.

## Historic Highlights Stir Imagination

Brandermill enjoys a historic location, being near Jamestown, first permanent New World Settlement, and Richmond, Capitol of the Confederate States of America.

The Appomattox Indian - a tribe of the Algonquin Nation - lived on the Brandermill property. The First Chief of all these tribes was Powhatan, father of Pocahontas. Some Appomattox lived in Chesterfield county right up to the Civil War, but were then relocated to reservations. Numerous Indian artifacts have been found on the Brandermill property.

During the Revolutionary War, Jacob Rubsamen (referred to in various accounts as both a "German immigrant" and a "Bavarian chemist") established the first gunpowder mill in the vicinity of Brandermill. He specialized in the manufacture of salt-petre, a vital ingredient in gunpowder. He was a heavy supplier to the Continental Army and, as such, his mill was a prime target of the British - who ultimately succeeded in destroying it.

At the time of the Civil War, Brandermill witnessed Lee's retreat, which proceeded down Route 360 to Genito Road. There was a Confederate campsite at Genito and Old Hundred Roads. Civil War artifacts have been found in that area.

Prominent families in the early 1800's included the Goode, Lockette, Clay and Morissette families.

Route 360 was once known as Goode's Bridge Road; the 360 bridge that crosses the Appomattox River is still called "Goode's Bridge".

According to the will of Captain Edmund Lockett, his family once

owned a large amount of Brandermill property. He is buried in the St. Ledger section (June 3, 1761-June 24, 1834).

Eleazar Clay was an outspoken opponent of the established Chesterfield church. A Baptist minister, Clay was ordained in 1775. He established the first Baptist church in Chesterfield (which burned in 1890). Tomahawk Baptist church was the second church, built at Genito and Old Hundred Roads. There is a story about Phineas Clay that tells of his burial - standing up and with a glass window before his eyes - on Brandermill property. Phineas was removed to a Richmond graveyard some 20 years ago, after graverobbers broke into the vertical mauseum and discovered his ossified body.

The Morissette family lived in a house they called "St. Ledger". It had been built by a French-Huguenot family named Flourinay in the late 1700's. A famous horsetrack of the day (in the area of Swift Creek Middle School) was also called "St. Ledger". Rebecca Morissette is buried on the property (May 2, 1800 - September 22, 1870).

By 1880, there were 25 families living on the Brandermill land, including: Goode, Clay, Lockett, Morissette, McTye, Watkins, Salle, Taylor, Smith, Bailey, Bowles, Duval, Ellett, Logcastle, Brooks, Snellings, Nunally, Lacy, Wer-shanis, Lester, Cheatham, Woolridge, Hancock (ruins of the Hancock house can still be seen at Harbour Pointe), Gilpine and Beasley.

By 1886, the Firkin, Ellett, Johnson, Winfree, Wilkerson and Spier families had joined the Brandermill community.

## "Poplar Grove"



John Brander built this house, ca. 1800. Note the unusual asymmetrical facade (which allows for a large gracious entrance hall). Originally called "Brandersburg" the house has been known as "Poplar Grove" since the mid-nineteenth century. It is located on Branders Bridge Road and is presently owned and occupied by Patricia and Wolfgang Peters. The Peters' are thoughtfully restoring and maintaining "Poplar Grove".

## John Brander

John Brander was born in Elgin, Scotland and emigrated to the United States in time to serve with the Virginia Army during the Revolutionary War. He was probably about 16 years old when he enlisted and made his home in Petersburg.

Brander became a man of means, owning land in Chesterfield and Dinwiddie Counties and in Petersburg. He early recognized water power in Chesterfield County as a natural resource and, with William Douglas, purchased 60 acres of land on Swift Creek.

There were many mills on Swift Creek, but certainly Brander's bakehouse and large milling complex was among the most successful. Brander also owned another large grist mill on Falling Creek in partnership with Thomas

Baker.

John Brander married Martha Field Robertson, daughter of Col. George Robertson (and kin to John Royall Robertson, former Chesterfield County Supervisor).

Brander died in 1826 and Martha in 1827. The site of their interment remains a mystery, as no family graveyard has been discovered at Poplar Grove, nor are there conclusive cemetery records available.

Suffice it to say that John Brander made significant contributions to the early growth of Chesterfield County, and is fittingly memorialized by the community that bears his name - Brandermill.

\*Many pre-1840 Virginia Cemetery records were destroyed by fire.

## "Brander's Mill"



It is probable that John Brander's flour mill was located in this area on Swift Creek near what is today Branders Bridge. In 1805, Brander won a court decision to build a toll bridge at his mill, with the proviso that he keep the bridge in good repair. When the creek is low, a wooden dam and channel are revealed.

## To Bake A Cake

Most people don't think twice about the ingredients needed to bake a birthday cake. However, Lloyd Stowell, Safeway's Bakery Merchandiser, had more to consider than the average person preparing a cake for a birthday party. 75 pounds of shortening  
90 pounds of sugar  
188 pounds of water

It will take a hydraulic lift to place the cake on the stage.

Now, we have just one last question: Where did Lloyd find the bowl large enough to mix the Brandermill Birthday cake?!

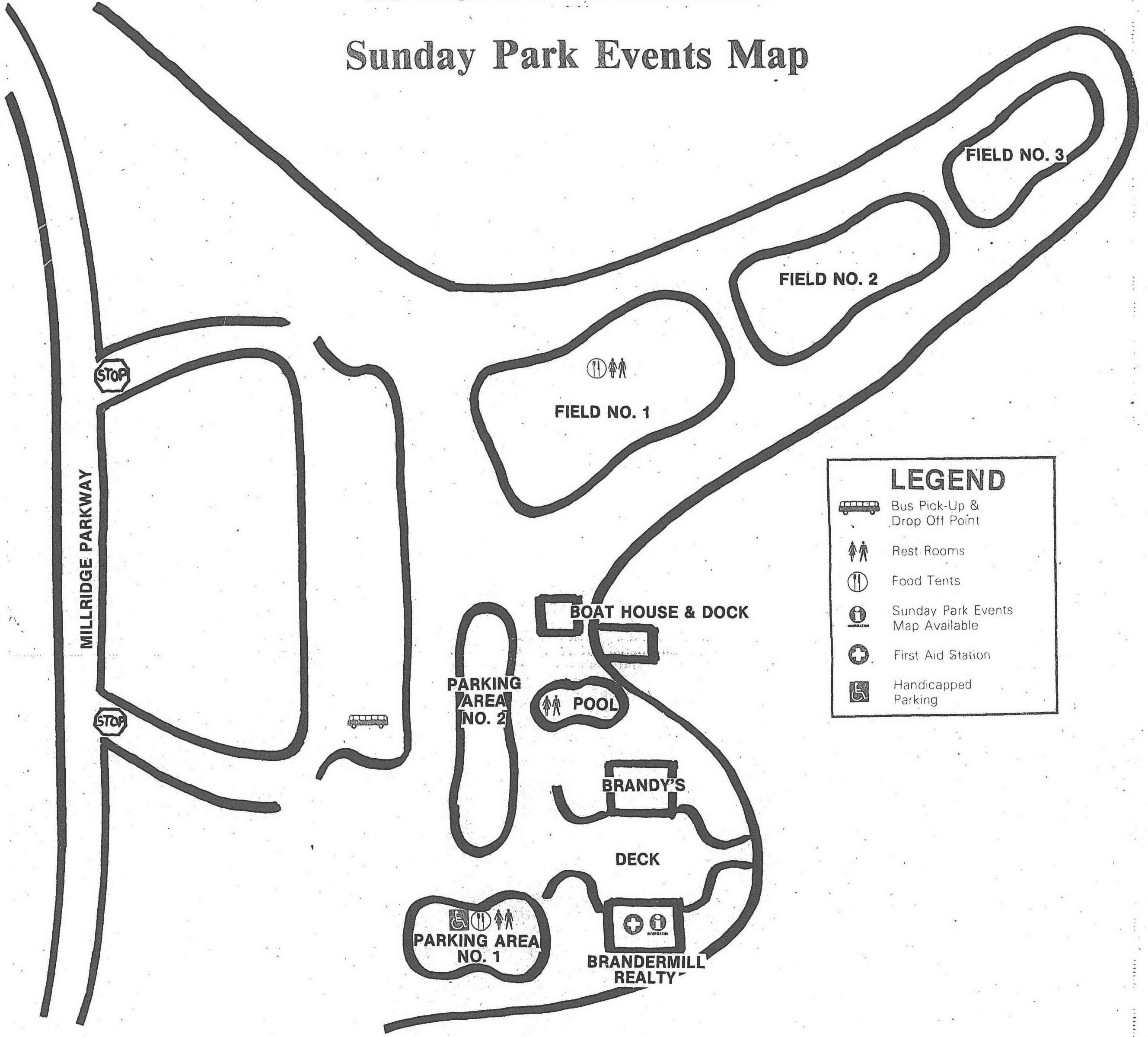

## BOOK REVIEW

**ANASTASIA, The Riddle Of Anna Anderson, by Peter Kurth.** Little, Brown. 394 pp.

Ten years in the writing and backed with intensive research, Peter Kurth unfolds evidence concerning the Grand Duchess Anastasia that leaves us spellbound, incredulous, indignant, angry and woeful.

Did Anastasia really escape death? The startling facts are more harsh, ominous, and forlorn than a tragic opera.

Written in meticulous detail, the story of Anastasia is the story of a family in crisis - those inclined to doubt her identity would believe the story of her escape even less. None in monarchist circles would believe the remaining daughter of the Tsar was mother to a bastard son, and even worse, to one left behind in Rumania. If Anastasia was recognized, how many more claimants to the heritage of the Romanov's might surface from this orphaned child?

A typical news article, while not taking a firm position did acknowledge, "in everything that she does she is quite a lady, a real princess." Many who sought to prove her a fraud did so without having met her, while others who came to know her well, fought for her rights. She was referred to as "the tubercular Polish girl," "the invalid," and "the lady from Berlin." Princess Xenia, cousin to Anastasia, summed it up in three words, "She was herself."

Anna Anderson, enduring years of trials and demands for proof, reaches the point of refusing to perform.

With sixty pages of footnotes and index, Kurth leads us through the years from Dalldorf to Charlottesville, with the evidence overwhelmingly in favor of "Anna" being the true daughter of the Tsar.

Kurth's writing has the power to diffuse old doubts and draw us to a more realistic judgement on this haunting mystery of our time. Regardless of our own verdict, it is noteworthy reading.

**NERVE ENDINGS, by William Martin.** Crown Publishers. 406 pp.

James Whiting - single, talented, successful - has been given a second chance in life as a recipient of a kidney transplant, but finds himself experiencing feelings of restlessness. He traces the donor, a popular Hollywood producer and victim of a boating accident.

Whiting visits the donor's widow, Jeanne Darrow, to be confronted first with harshness and then an unexpected inside look at the last days of her husband's life.

Roger Darrow had been taping a solo trek across America. The tapes reveal a narration that is at first hopeful, then cynical, and finally filled with despair. Whiting and Jeanne watch as Darrow slowly deteriorates until he loses touch with reality and with his wife. His chief target had been a cable empire, but before the wall of evidence was completed he had succumbed to his own melancholy and then, his death.

Curiosity surrounding the tapes and their possible release is causing quite a stir: "What is to fear?" "Which of Darrow's innuendos or bits of depressed rambling have merit?"

Whiting and Jeanne begin to retrace Roger Darrow's journey from Los Angeles to Maine, interviewing, photographing, and probing. The more they uncover, the more intricate, baffling and alarming their story becomes.

This coast-to-coast sensation has all the elements of an engrossing thriller. In the Hitchcock style of surprise endings, William Martin has us racing through page after page as we follow the good guys and the bad to a stunning climax.

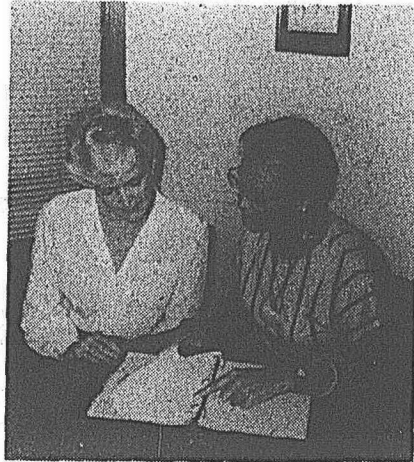

## What's Cooking

The summer days of August will be over soon. September will bring the hecticness of getting the children ready for the school year. I have already become melancholy, while helping my son pack for college, and knowing that the summer is coming to an end; which also brings to an end the family picnics, ball games and swimming outings. Soon our family will be "minus one". We will miss not sharing the next few months together - the Thanksgiving break seems so far away.

Before we become busy with our school activities, football, etc., every year I plan one last barbecue for us to share together. I like cooking outdoors, because it is one of the few times I am able to relax and enjoy my family and guests. I keep my menus simple and limited, but plentiful.

Even though barbecuing, grilling, cooking over an open fire, is the oldest and most universal way of preparing food, I'll share some common rules of thumb:

Hot Coals - Gray or white in color (approximately 45 minutes to get to that stage)

Clean oiled racks, skewers, etc. To raise temperature; use a poker to gently tap away the ashes from the charcoal then push them closer together.

To lower the temperature, separate the coals with a poker, or raise the grid.

Smoke cooking is also very popular, and most grills can be used.

Hickory Chips or powder: Soak the wood chips in water for a half hour and distribute them over the heat.

Water Smokers: Use a pan of water in the grill to keep the foods moist during the smoking process.

Some parts of the country use dried corncobs instead of wood. Also, bran cereal or brown sugar can be used. Place a double layer of tin foil over the coals. Place in the foil the bran or brown sugar.

I hope your family will share a time of fun and good eating, bringing back happy memories and topics of discussing this winter

around the fire. Yes, soon Autumn will be upon us. Happy eating!

### Barbeque Menu

- \* Baby Back Beef Ribs with Mystery Sauce
- \* Sweet Potato Souffle
- \* Corn on the Cob (if I can find fresh)
- \* Mexican Corri Bread Salad
- \* Chilled Fruit in Orange Cups with spiced cream
- \* Ice tea, lemonade and coffee

### Mystery Sauce

(Sauce can be prepared ahead of time)

- 1 24 oz. bottle of ketchup
- 1 cup brown sugar (light)
- 2 Tablespoons Worcestershire Sauce
- 2 Teaspoons chili powder
- 1 medium onion chopped
- 1/2 Tablespoon garlic salt
- 1/2 Cup Tarragon vinegar

Combine all ingredients in blender - blend one minute. Bring to boil, simmer for 30 minutes.

### Ribs

Par-boil ribs with 1 cup water. The amount of the water will vary depending on the size of the pan used. Par-boil 10-15 minutes. (Only until slightly done). Paint ribs on both sides with sauce after par-boiling. Continue to baste as you see the previous sauce begin to bubble.

REMINDER: Allow charcoal briquets to become gray prior to putting the ribs on the grill.

### Sweet Potato Souffle

- 3 cups sweet potatoes, cooked and peeled
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 stick butter
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup cream
- 2 cups pineapple
- 3/4 cup coconut
- 1/2 cup pecans, finely ground

### Topping

- 1/2 cup self-rising flour
  - 1/2 cup butter
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- Mix sweet potatoes, butter, sugar, cream, vanilla, and egg yolks. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold into mixture. Pour into a greas-

ed 2-3 quart casserole. Mix topping and sprinkle on top. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes. Top with marshmallows the last 5 minutes of baking. Serves 6 to 8.

VARIATION: Double topping recipe and make a pie crust. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes at 400°.

### Mexican Corn Bread

Using a basic corn bread recipe, add green peppers, several chopped mild Jalapeno peppers, 2 tablespoons of pimento; graded Cheddar cheese.

Allow 10 to 15 minutes more baking time. Checking frequently to make sure it does not overbake.

### Fruit Cups with Spiced Cream

Strawberries, bananas, raspberries, orange slices, balled melon and watermelon balls; pineapple, chopped apples, chopped walnuts. Mix together with a little lemon juice and cinnamon. Place in frozen orange cups.

### Spiced Cream

Whip cream until frothy with sugar and cinnamon; spoon over fruit just before serving.

\*Add bananas just before serving.

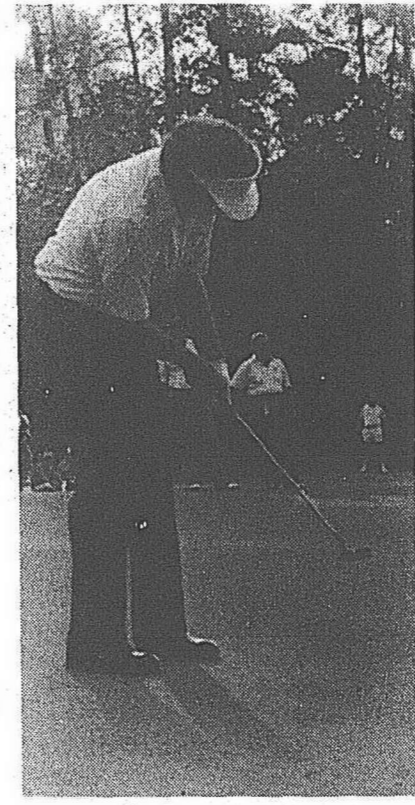

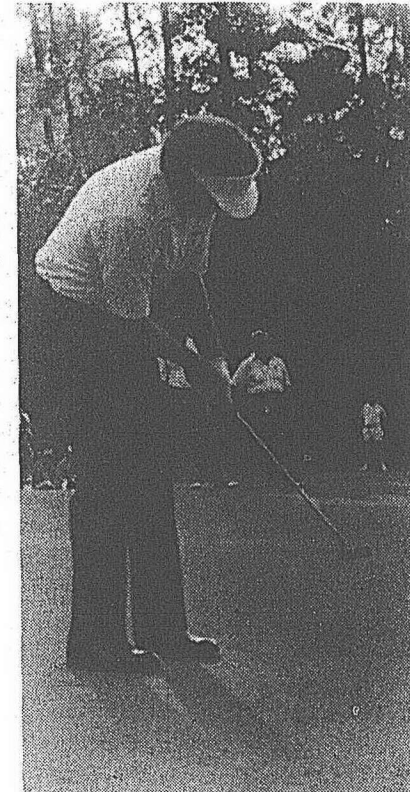

A Public Water Safety Demonstration, for anyone who uses the lake, will be held at 12 noon, at the Sunday Park Boat Ramp.

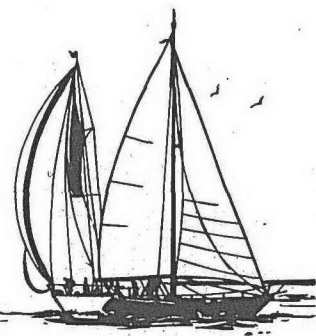

**Appomattox River Canoe Launch Opens**

The Appomattox River Canoe Launch, a new recreation facility in Chesterfield County, officially opened on June 16.

Several agencies have cooperated with the county's park and recreation department in the development of this facility. The Appomattox River Authority contributed the land, and financial assistance was provided by the Virginia Outdoor Fund. The Coastal Canoeists offered valuable river information and assisted in making detailed drawings of the major rapids for an Appomattox River Canoe Guide. A brochure, which was funded by the Virginia Game and Inland Fisheries Commission, illustrates the rapids and suggests routes running along the river.

Large permanent river maps have been placed at the canoe launch area and in the Appomattox Riverside Park in Dinwiddie County. These signs contain river rescue numbers, river level information and a large drawing of the river and its major rapids. Warning signs have also been posted along the river to alert boaters of dams and other hazardous areas.

This 6 1/2 mile section of the Appomattox River from the dam to Ettrick contains some of the best white water in the area and is designated as a Virginia Scenic Waterway. It offers history as well as white water, but is for the skilled canoeist, NOT the beginner. Information on the signs suggests recommended white water canoeing skill levels necessary for canoeing the river at different levels.

Rapids are classed at 1-3, with one level four (4) rapid. Users, of this stretch of the river, come from all parts of the state to enjoy one-day canoe trips as well as to take part in competitive races and river rescue training.

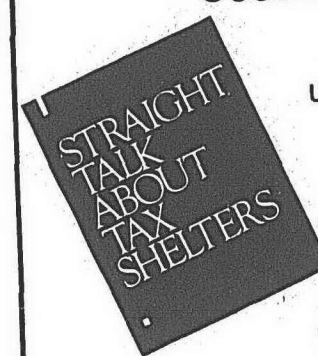
Prior to the development of this new facility, use of the area was uncontrolled, there were no river warning signs and river access was difficult.

With the construction of the launch facility and the placement of signage along the river, those who are already using the river will have a safer journey, and canoeists new

to the river can be oriented. Parking for cars and trailers, steps leading down to the dock, and an informational exhibit are all part of the facility.

## Registration Has Started At Tyler Community College

If you would like to go to college but you don't know what area you want to major in, you're in "good company", according to Ray Drinkwater, counselor at John Tyler Community College's Watkins Annex.

Sitting comfortably in his new office in Midlothian, Mr. Drinkwater explained the need to make a decision about a career is not pressing for an incoming freshman, and that, often, delaying a decision for a few quarters can benefit a student.

"This gives a student an opportunity to find out more about himself by talking with peers, counselors and faculty, and by doing library research on careers." Further more, taking a course in an area that a student thinks he might be interested in certainly can provide additional insight.

Anyone contemplating attending the two year community college in the fall will find lots of help from Mr. Drinkwater.

After filling out an application form to the college, spending a bit of time with a counselor before signing up for courses is something which he definitely recommends. "It's not time consuming," he said, but can be very beneficial in helping a student select the right courses which could fit into almost any core curriculum. Career choices can then be made at a later time without losing any of the credits already earned.

Mr. Drinkwater explained the placement testing which is ad-

ministered by the college and which most students elect to take.

According to the counselor, placement test give information on a person's current level in reading, writing and math. "This", he said, "tells how a person is functioning right now in these areas" and "helps prevent him from taking a course for which he is not academically prepared." He added the results of placement testing are then discussed with a student so that he can make intelligent decisions on what courses to take or what remedial help may be needed before course selection.

For the person who has absolutely no idea of what he wants to do career wise, interest-inventory testing is also available at the college. Mr. Drinkwater said that these tests and the information gathered from student-counselor conference, concerning hobbies, high school activities, current full or part-time work, and just plain "interests", go into making a career decision.

Registration for the fall quarter will begin September 5. Mr. Drinkwater advised that anyone contemplating attending the college in the fall give him a call at 794-1166 or stop by the Watkins Annex (behind Sycamore Square Shopping Center), and talk with him about educational plans. Both day and evening sessions are available. Counselors are also available at the Chester campus, 796-4165 or toll free 1-800-552-3490.

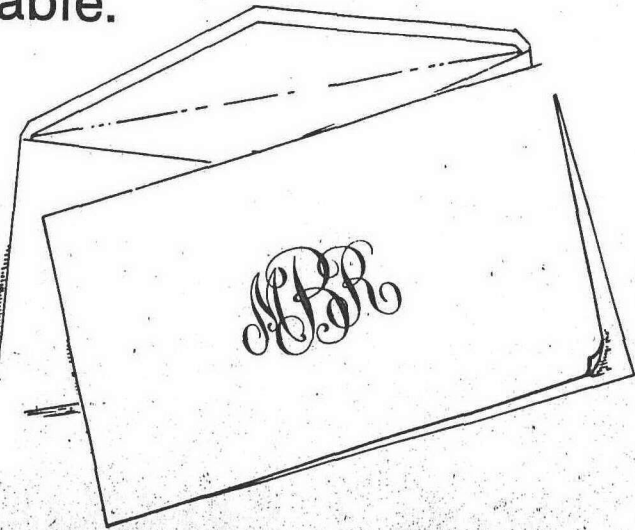

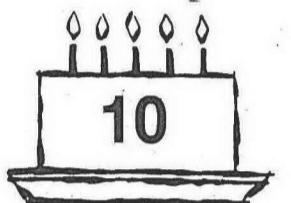

## Sky Watch

A Monthly Feature Prepared by The Science Museum of Virginia

**SEPTEMBER SKY CHARTS:** To use these sky charts face either north or south and hold the charts directly in front of you with the horizon on the bottom. The charts show the brightest stars and planets between the horizon and the part of the sky directly overhead during the early evening hours this month.

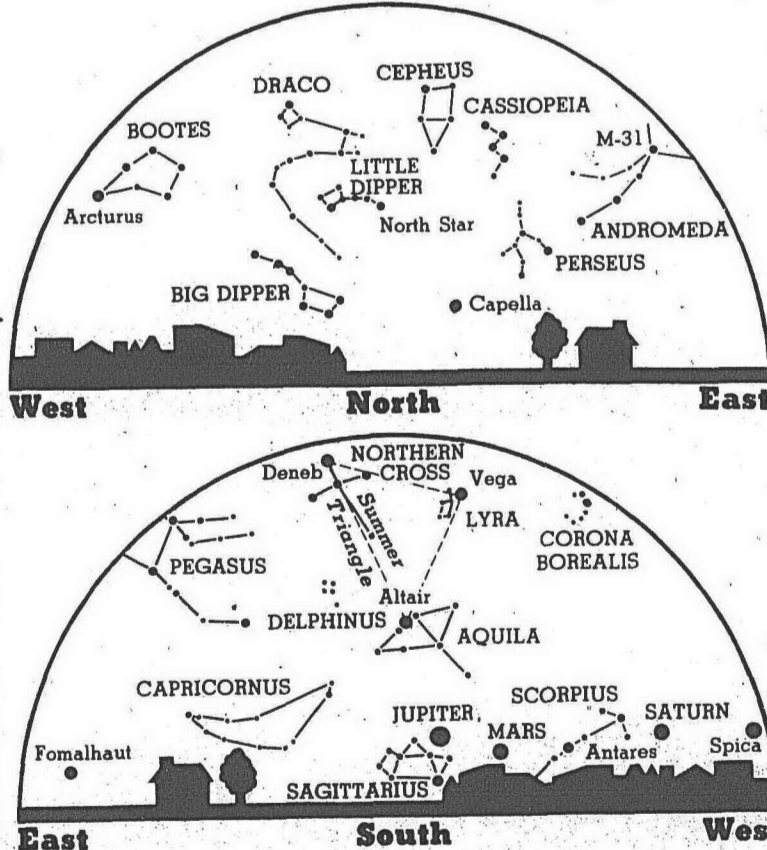
**CONSTELLATIONS:** High overhead in the southern sky look for the Summer Triangle. This bright star pattern is formed by three stars - Deneb, Vega and Altair - with Vega being the brightest star in the triangle. Closer to the horizon look for the bright star, Antares, which marks the "heart" of Scorpius. Antares means "rival of Mars" and during the month as the planet Mars passes through Scorpius, notice the color similarity between the two objects.

The easiest constellation to find facing north is the Big Dipper, formed by seven stars of nearly equal brightness. It is visible with its handle pointing upwards and to the west towards the bright star Arcturus.

**PLANETS:** Three planets are visible in the early evening sky this month.

Mars, low in the south at sunset in the south, is the planet to watch as it moves rapidly eastward through Scorpius during the month. It will pass within 2° of the bright star Antares on September 3.

Jupiter, the most brilliant of the three visible planets, is low in the south at sunset, just above the spout of teapot-shaped Sagittarius. Saturn appears for a short time



low in the southwest at sunset, to the left of the bright star Spica, before disappearing from view beneath the horizon.

In the morning twilight, look for Mercury low in the east. The planet passes 3° south of the bright star Regulus on September 4; becomes stationary on September 6; then passes 1.6° south of Regulus again on September 8.

**CELESTIAL EVENTS:** This year's Harvest Moon - the full moon nearest the autumnal equinox - brightens the evening sky on September 10. It is traditionally called the Harvest Moon because it occurs near the time to harvest summer crops when farmers use its extra light to work at night.

At 4:33 p.m. EDT on September 22, fall arrives when the sun crosses the equator moving southward. On

this day the sun will rise directly in the east and set directly in the west.

The moon will provide some additional star-gazing treats this month when it passes closely by each of the three planets in the evening sky. On September 2, watch a waxing crescent moon pass within 1.7° of Mars. As the moon approaches its full phase, it will pass within 3° of Jupiter on the 4th. Later in the month, a waxing crescent moon will pass 9° south of Saturn on the 27th, and 3° south of Mars on the 30th.
