

BCA Board Has Busy Agenda

OCTOBER 15, 1984

President John Maphis brought the meeting to order, all members of the Board were present. In addition, the Community Manager, the Assistant Community Manager, and Helen Fitch were in attendance.

Neighborhood Rep Council

As the first order of business, the President asked Helen Fitch for a report on the operation and functioning of the BCA's Neighborhood Rep Program. Helen reported that the program was progressing well. She asked for an update on the status of her request (made at the September 17, 1984 Board meeting) to look into the matter of the failure of the Company to complete the bike paths in the area of Watkins Glen, plus building a playground at St. Ledger. Both projects have been identified for years on the Brandermill sales map as proposed construction. She added that many of the residents of the area indicated to her that the sales people had pointed out the advantages of living in the area since it would be supported with bike paths and a playground conveniently located at St. Ledger. The Community Manager asked Helen Fitch to please advise the members of the Neighborhood Rep Council that Max Gardner, General Manager of the Brandermill Company, has advised the BCA that they are studying the entire matter of additional bike paths throughout Brandermill, which will include the areas which many residents feel are not now adequately supported by bike paths. He also promised to look into the matter of the playground at St. Ledger. The Community Manager advised Helen Fitch that there is a parallel action instigated by a neighborhood petition. Max indicated that he would get back to the BCA Board just as soon as possible on actions planned by the Company in connection with these two projects. Also, on the matter of the petition by residents of Whispering Oaks regarding the "large unattractive hill" in the middle of the island in the cul-de-sac at Whispering Oaks Ct, Helen was advised that this will also be looked into and a report made from the Company. Mrs. Fitch asked if someone could develop the basic responsibility areas of the Company and the BCA. This information is helpful, especially for new residents. John Maphis asked Art Haake to work with the Community Manager to produce such a list for review by Pat Cooke and Helen Fitch.

Brandermill Woods Resolution

At 8:00 p.m. Dr. Bedford Berry, representing Brandermill

Woods, appeared before the Board requesting that a resolution be approved by the Board in support of a pending request to the State of Virginia for a 60-bed nursing home to provide skilled and intermediate services to the residents of Brandermill Woods, Brandermill, and the citizens of Chesterfield County. At the request of John Maphis, Dr. Berry made a rather comprehensive presentation on the background for the construction of the life care retirement community to be supported by a 60-bed nursing home. He pointed out the advantages to the community of the construction of this total-life-care retirement/residential community. Bill Dix made the

knowledge of their accuracy and they appear to be in rebuttal to a State Health Department decision.

The resolution raised certain issues which might have been discussed with Brandermill groups before being signed.

Approval Of The Minutes

On a motion by Branch Lawson and seconded by Art Haake, the Board of Directors Minutes of September 17, 1984 were approved with paragraph 3 amended to include a statement by John Maphis that he is unalterably opposed to the discussion of any policy either by the Board, or by the Long Range Planning Group, which recommends the raising of assessments first and then deciding where the money should be spent. He stated that, historically, the BCA Budget has generally understated expected income and overstated estimates of operating costs.

1985 BCA Budget

Bill Dix, Chairman of the BCA Budget Committee, presented the 1985 Budget to the Board. Back-up data for the presentation to include a report to President John Maphis as well as other back-up data concerning the support for the recommendations on the area of Maintenance and Salary are attached to these Minutes as enclosure 4. Bill stated that the Budget Committee recommends approval of the entire budget presented to the committee by the Community Manager, with the exception of two accounts. These are Maintenance and Salary. In the case of the Salary Account, he stated that the Budget Committee disagreed with the recommendations of the Community Manager, which was for a 7 percent raise in salary for the office staff, except for Bill Pugh, who would be given a 5 percent raise and the Community Manager, who, at his request, should be given no increase. The committee felt that since the Community Manager had reported to the Budget Committee that all of the staff were excellent employees and had been so rated by him on his annual performance rating that all should be treated equally and all should be given a 7 percent raise. This would include the Community Manager, but for a different reason. Bill Dix stated that the committee felt that eventually there would be a turnover in the Community Manager's job and that as the years passed, the pay for that job should be kept abreast of the job market, as far as salary was concerned and accordingly, he should be given a 7 percent increase. As regards the Maintenance Account: The Community Manager had recommended \$257,000 be included in the budget in support of Maintenance. The Budget committee, working toward a balanced budget, recommended that \$40,000 be taken out of the Maintenance Account. \$20,000 of this amount to be placed in the Special Repair and Maintenance Account. These funds to be used by the Community Manager to accomplish, on a priority set by him, those functions that were cut out of the contract. The other \$20,000 would simply be a savings in the overall cost of the 1985 budget.

motion that the resolution be approved as written with the exception of the word "critical" listed in the fifth "Whereas" of the resolution. He asked that that word be deleted. The motion was seconded by Clem Carlisle and after a discussion, the motion carried 4 in favor and 1 against. Art Haake in voting "no" to the resolution took exception mainly to the wording of the resolution rather than to its intent. He asked that his objections for voting against the resolution be stated in the Minutes. They follow:

Verbatim acceptance of the language of the resolution (except for one word) written by a consultant for Brandermill Woods.

An acceptable resolution (for me) would have been a straightforward recommendation for a nursing facility in Brandermill. Instead, the focus was on a previous submission for a Certificate of Public Need for a 60-bed facility by Brandermill Woods which was turned down by the State Health Commissioner. The statements made about the need for health care in Chesterfield are unacceptable to me, since I have no



Record Run

Trot For Tots Raises \$2,700

The 4th annual Trot for Tots run for MCV pediatrics was held in Brandermill on Sunday, September 30th. A record 511 runners participated in the fund raising event and raised \$2,700 for the Children's Medical Center.

Organized by the MCV Auxiliary of VCU and sponsored by the Brandermill Company, Children's World, and WRVA radio, the run attracted over 1,000 onlookers and participants and some special guests. Senator John Warner, Supervisor Chairmen Harry Daniels and John Waldrop, and Supervisor Joan Girone attended to cheer on those running to raise money for the children in need of service at MCV.

In addition to a one-mile fun run, a 5 kilometer and 10 kilometer run were also held. Barry Maroney placed first in the 5K run with a time of 15 minutes and 17 seconds. Barry was closely followed by Jay Turner at 16:28 and John Hollowell at 17:00.

In the 10K run Damien Howell placed first with a time of 34 minutes and 22 seconds. Second and third place runners were Robert Childress 36:14 and Warren Wallace 36:16.

An awards dinner for the MCV Auxiliary of VCU was held on Wednesday, October 17th where a check for the proceeds was presented to Dr. Harold M. Maurer the Chairman of MCV Pediatrics. Dr. Maurer com-

mended everyone associated with the Trot for Tots run and said the money would most likely be put into the Child Life Program at the Medical Center.

Coordinated by Janet Winder, this program is an attempt to try to normalize the hospital experience for the child. Through family support activities the program keeps the child and the family in a unit, interrelating as they would at home. By allowing the child to visit the hospital prior to admission, the hospital becomes less threatening because they know what to expect. The program has many other worthwhile goals and greatly benefits both parents and children at The Children's Medical Center.

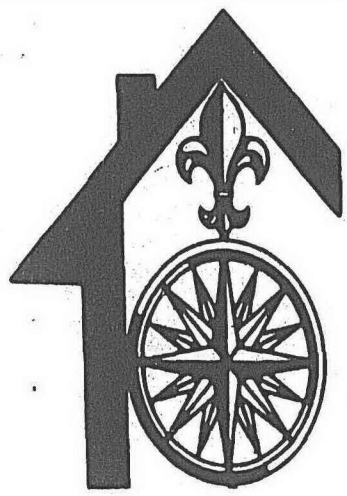

Cub Scout Olympics



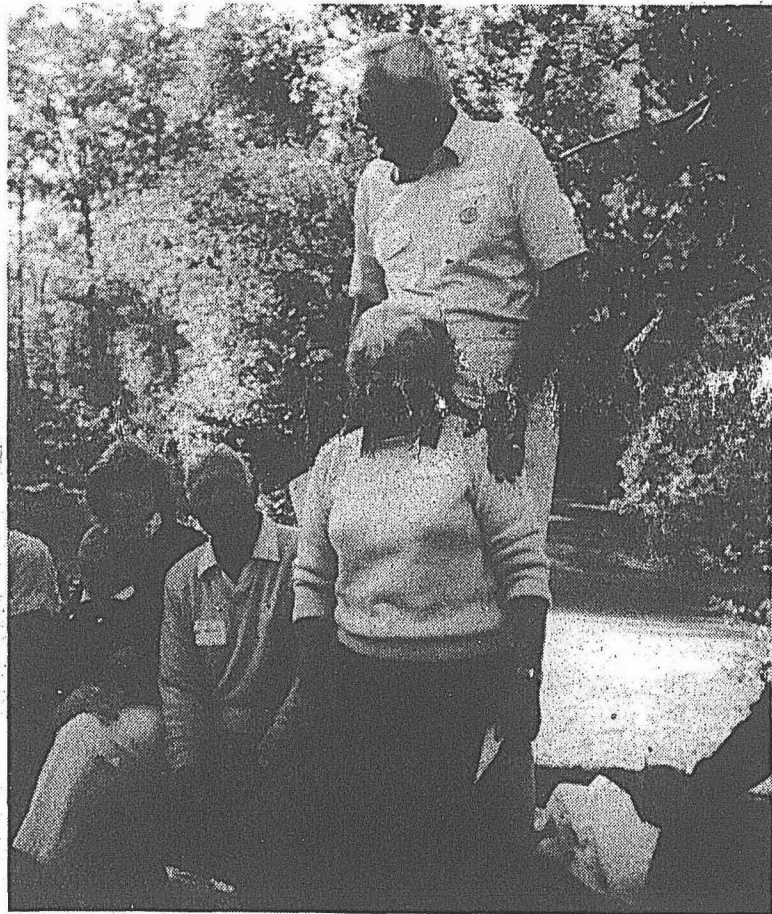
Bear Den No. 7 tries its hand at the javelin throw

From the Editor's Desk

Thanksgiving

Remember Thanksgiving? It's that holiday that gets lost every year between the wind-up of the World Series games, the beginning of the football season, and Christmas.

I remember when it was different, when Thanksgiving was "special". You knew you were getting close to the big day when your art project in school was making a turkey out of an apple and toothpicks and marshmallows. When the Third graders put on a play about the First Thanksgiving and everyone giggles watching John Smith kiss Pocahontas. When you cleaned out your school desk and were reminded to take home your gym clothes so that your Mother could wash them over the four-day weekend. Four days! It was better than Christmas or Spring vacations (you expected a long recess then). But Thanksgiving came at just the right time, and even teachers who had threatened to give you holiday homework softened at the last minute, as eager as their young chargers for a few days of freedom.

We celebrated a traditional Thanksgiving, with a day spent at my grandparent's farm and all the family there. My paternal grandparents would drive in from the city and maiden aunts

would scurry about, putting finishing touches on the holiday table. As children, we were seldom required to do more than print names on place cards or search the house for extra chairs to supplement the dining set. But I loved to drift back to the kitchen, to watch as my grandmother would respond to each inquiry of, "what can I do to help?" with an important job for each one. If you stood in just the right spot, you could catch a glimpse of the turkey as it was pulled from the oven to be basted, or you might be called upon to scrape a whipped cream bowl.

Testing the turkey for "doneness" became a ritual. Anyone in the vicinity of the oven was asked if they thought it was done and each person solemnly offered an opinion, based on the brownness of the skin or how will a drumstick might wiggle.

Dinner was a feast to the eye - and delicious! With five extra leaves in place, the old oaken table could stretch to comfortably seat a dozen. Sometimes my brothers and I would rearrange place cards so that we could sit next to a favorite grown-up (grandmother would pretend not to notice).

After eating more food than

any of us felt comfortable with, and still finding room for "just a small piece of pie" and two cups of coffee, the men would retire to the living room to read and talk (and sleep!) while the ladies tackled the after-dinner clean up task. To the horror of modern-day feminists I can only say that, at the time, the women seemed to enjoy this opportunity to talk and catch up on the news, and did not seem to view the chore as a burden.

With the grown-ups thus occupied, we children were free to explore the farmyard and the attic, playing childhood games and sometimes seeing who could collect the most chestnuts from beneath the old trees on the front lawn.

When dusk fell, it was time for turkey sandwiches made on leftover dinner rolls and slivers of mince and pumpkin pie. Then "goodbye" to my grandparents, as they stood reflected in the evening porchlight.

Times change. Now, I am the "grown-up", and the one who must plan the days festivities for my family. We'll have turkey, served with great-grandmother's cranberry relish recipe. The Village Mill will be close to December's copy deadline (a busy, busy time!), so our pumpkin pie is likely to be frozen! But we'll try to make it a happy, "special", day-to-remember holiday. Whether you spend the day with football or family-or both-I hope it will be special for you, too.

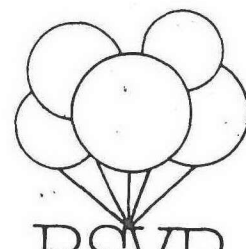

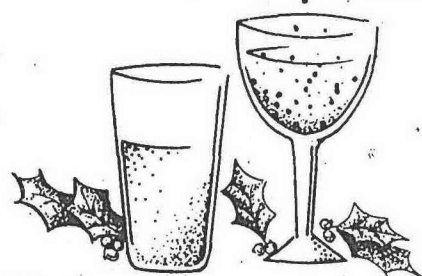

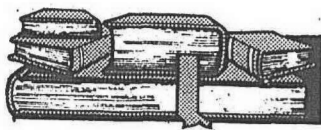

BOOK REVIEW

THE COLOR OF LIGHT, by William Goldman. Warner Books, 355 pp.

William Goldman, a master storyteller, portrays his character Charles Fuller, not through descriptive phrases, but with Fuller's own short stories wherein he reveals his frustration at accepting his father as a failure; the fear of his own success; and his dependence on his friend Two-Brew Kitchel's "on-to-the-next" critique.

Radiant with perception and penetration, the book is not seen as a story of "Chub" Fuller, the unlikely hero, but rather it is a story of lasting friendships, betrayals, love and hope.

William Goldman's brilliance has brought us not only many best-selling books such as **MARATHON MAN**, but also numerous screenplays. He now brings to us his latest work, **THE COLOR OF LIGHT**, filled with telling insights and observations.

SEXUAL TURNING POINTS, The Seven Stages of Adult Sexuality, by Lorna J. Sarrel, M.S.W., and Phillip M. Sarrel, M.D. MacMillan Publishing Company, 303 pp.

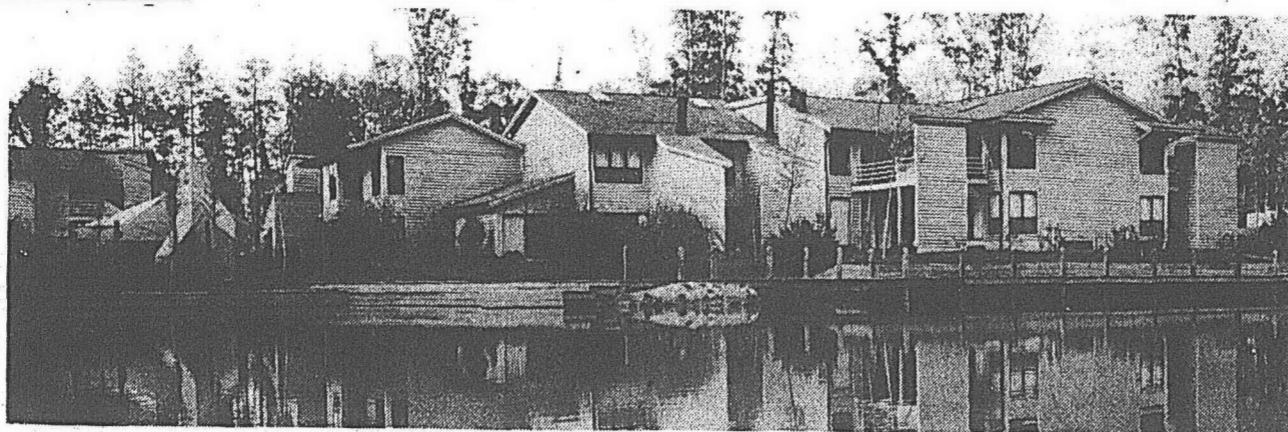
Lorna and Phillip Sarrel, directors of the Sex Counseling Service at Yale University, have drawn from their years of experience in dealing with their "patients" to bring us specific and expected life occurrences encountered by most people that tend to produce alterations in sexual behavior, attitudes, and feelings.

The central theme of the book, as we are guided through the seven stages, or turning points, is to bring us to an awareness that our sexuality grows, changes, and shifts as long as we live, and that it is questioned, disputed, and pressured continually by life's events and our own biological changes.

The yearning to fall in love is almost universal in our culture, but at various periods in history, love has been defined differently. The yearly Christians separated sex and love. Love was spiritual and holy. Sex was sinful (or just barely acceptable). In the Middle Ages, courtly love became the ideal, with the Victorians taking it a step further by idealizing love within marriage.

But marriages, like other partnerships, need to function smoothly in day-to-day operations. Perhaps the most important reason for reading this book lies in the fact that most problems described could have been prevented if there had been more understanding of what constitutes "normal" human experience.

Dealing with such turning points as divorce, menopause, aging, and the death of a spouse, the book is for all ages and gives a clear presentation of the facts.
