Watkins Reviews 1984 Assembly Agenda

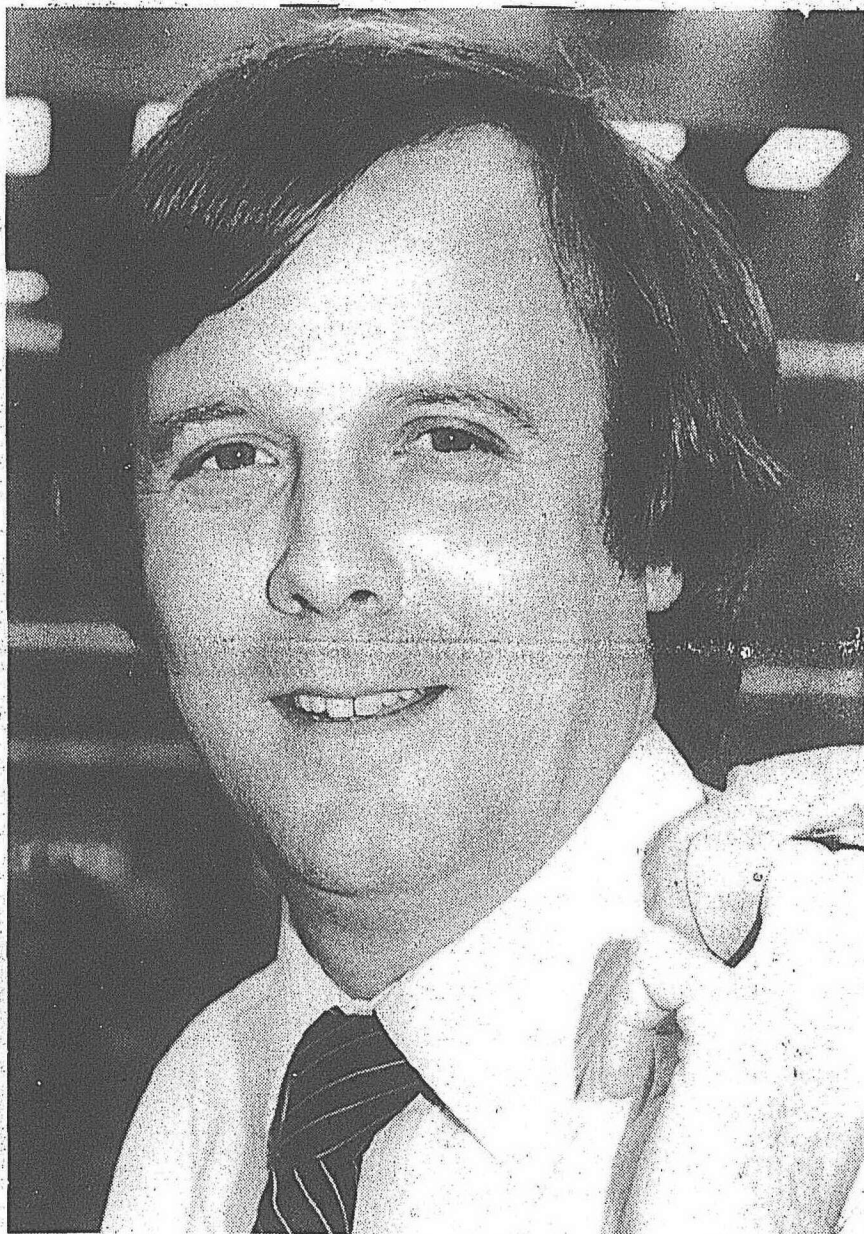
John Watkins, 65th Legislative District Delegate, met on November 13 with Brandermill residents to discuss the work of the upcoming session of the Virginia General Assembly.

In spite of very poor attendance at the meeting, Watkins remained for better than an hour to discuss issues before the Assembly. He sits on three committees—Election, Counties/Cities/Towns, and Agricultural—and is active in subcommittee work addressing the waste to energy problem and the variables surrounding the construction of manufactured housing. In addition, he is a member of the Coal and Energy Commission.

Here follows a summary of the issues reviewed at the November 13 meeting.

Uranium Mining

Considerable interest was generated during a discussion of Uranium Mining in Virginia. Watkins explained that while

there is much interest in a rich ore deposit discovered in Southside Virginia, the mining

of the ore does involve an open pit process. The ore presents no

Community Invited To "Holiday Happening"

At the Woman's Club combined day and evening group meeting, December 11, at the Country Club, Santa, (Frank Lumpkin, Brandermill Safeway Manger) will be present with favors for young children during the social hour, 7 to 7:30 p.m. Light refreshments will be served and there will be some taped music.

Steve Miles, Clover Hill High School Band Director will present the School's Brass Quintet, playing 17th to 20th century brass music. The two trumpet players are Steve Miles, Director, and Chris Brown; French horn, Randy Ankleton; trombone, Ricky Wright; tuba, David Stevens.

Also, on the program are The Whitechapel Handbell Carillon, under the direction of Dr. Melvin C. Burton, Jr. The group has performed annually during the Christmas season at The Virginia Museum of Fine Arts for the past ten years. They have also provided music for the Governor's Open House at the Executive Mansion for the past

two years and have given concerts at the Valentine Museum, Maymont Open House, and numerous others. A highlight for the Carillon was an appearance on the Good Morning Virginia Program during the Christmas Season of 1982.

This bell ringing group is one of the few whose handbells are imported from the Whitechapel Bell Foundry in London. Over 400 years of continuous manufacturing experience gives these bells a tonal quality unequaled the world over. The Whitechapel Foundry has cast most of the famous bells of the world, including the bells in Big Ben and America's own Liberty Bell. The present set of bells has a value of approximately \$6,000.

Included in the Carillon's repertoire are traditional Christmas carols and popular Christmas songs. Some of their selections are O Holy Night, Gesù Bambino, White Christmas, and Jingle Bells. A highlight of their Brandermill presentation will be a brief sing-along.

Other programs that the

Whitechapel Handbell Carillon will present this year are: two programs at the Virginia Museum on Sunday, December 9 at 2:30 and 3:55 p.m. at the Maymont Open House, Saturday, December 15 at 5:00 p.m. and The Valentine Museum on Sunday afternoon, December 16.

For those of you who did not know, the Clover Hill Volunteer Fire Department sells the Chesterfield stickers for your cars as part of their fund raising projects. We do encourage all of you to support this wonderful group in all of their upcoming projects and we wish to thank the volunteers who so warmly welcomed President Jo Owens at their meeting on Monday, November 19th where she presented the BWC's check for \$300.00 from funds raised from our Card Party in October.

Board Approves Rate Increase, Studies Proposed Change In Grounds Maintenance, Reviews Genito Station Development

Reports of BCA Board meetings which appear in the Village Mill are abstracted from meeting minutes as prepared for the record by community manager Fred Bott. A complete record of board actions is maintained in the BCA office. -Editor

Genito Station

Helen Fitch and Don Didrickson, Rep Council co-chairman, met with the BCA Board and reported that only 10 neighborhoods were

unrepresented. Board President John Maphis praised the program and assured the Rep Council that everything possible is being done to correct what many residents feel are problems at the Genito Station site; specifically, the paint color, bright lights, and signage. Board member Clem Carlise explained that, by comparison, Market Square is more subdued in design, but that Market Square merchants have found this to be a deterrent to a successful

business operation. (Accordingly, Market Square signage has been brightened.)

Helen and Don indicated that Genito Station looked much less like what residents had come to expect in Brandermill. John Maphis responded that both the developer and the builder, as well as the owners of Hop-In, have been cooperative in their response to community concerns.

Village Mill

The Board approved an advertising rate increase for the Village Mill as requested by the Editor. The increase will be approximately 10 percent and is the first increase in over 5 years. The rate increase was requested to cover escalating production costs.

A second recommendation by the Editor, to change the paper from its present size to a tabloid, was disapproved on the basis that the Village Mill in its present format is very popular with residents.

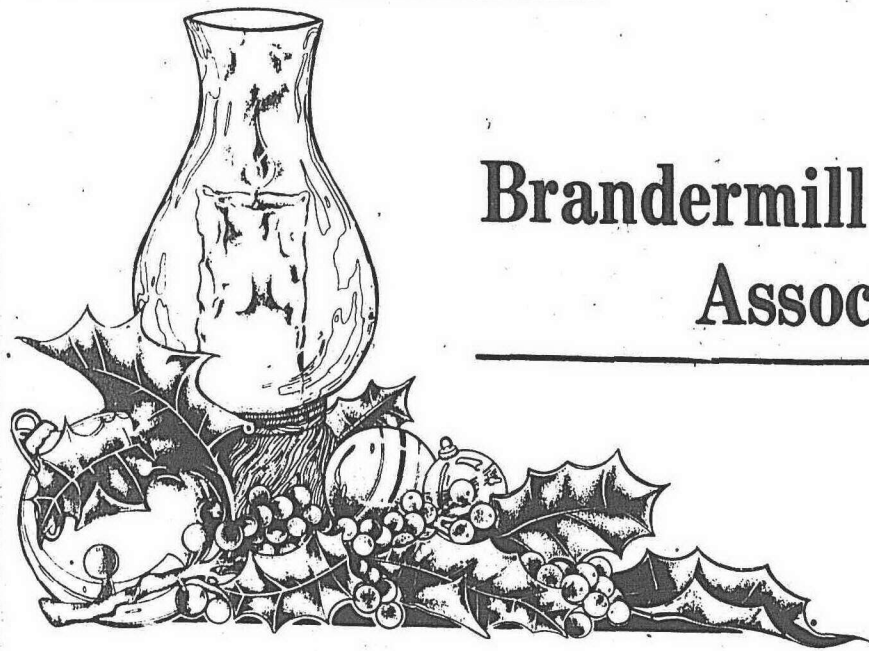

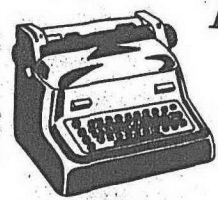

From the Editor's Desk

Memories

In a memorial service held on November 29 at the Brandermill Church, this community celebrated the life of J. Roy Martin. J. Roy died in an automobile accident; he was 41 years old.

In life, J. Roy was a Senior Vice President of the Brandermill Group, in charge of construction and development. His career history with Brandermill goes back to the early 70's and the days when skeptics questioned whether the dream of a planned community would ever really happen. J. Roy was a very big part of turning that dream into a reality.

Reverend Stephen Bray offered an uplifting celebration, in J. Roy's memory, to a church so full of family and friends and colleagues that even standing room was difficult to find. Rev. Bray reminded those gathered of the joy and peace that awaited those who pass from this life, and the promised comfort for those who mourn their passing.

Using the analogy of a physics concept whereby gold and silver ingots, placed side by

side, will transfer molecules, Pastor Bray likened this to the affection and shared experiences between friends and loved ones. He said that our memories would keep J. Roy a part of our lives. It was a comforting thought.

As I emerged from the Church into the crisp November afternoon, another thought struck me. The sun shone through the frost-colored leaves in Sunday Park and I stopped to marvel, once again, at the beauty and tranquility of that lakeside setting. It was then the thought came; "there is probably very little in Brandermill that has not been touched by J. Roy. He has left his mark, indelibly, on this community."

In many ways, like the silver and gold ingots, J. Roy Martin and Brandermill had become one. And in that merging, J. Roy touched the lives of all residents, even those who did not know him personally.

It is a legacy that challenges his colleagues to continue to build the dreams J. Roy so believed in. It is a legacy his family can be proud to claim.

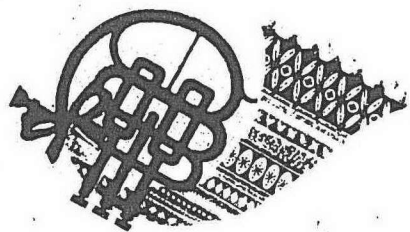

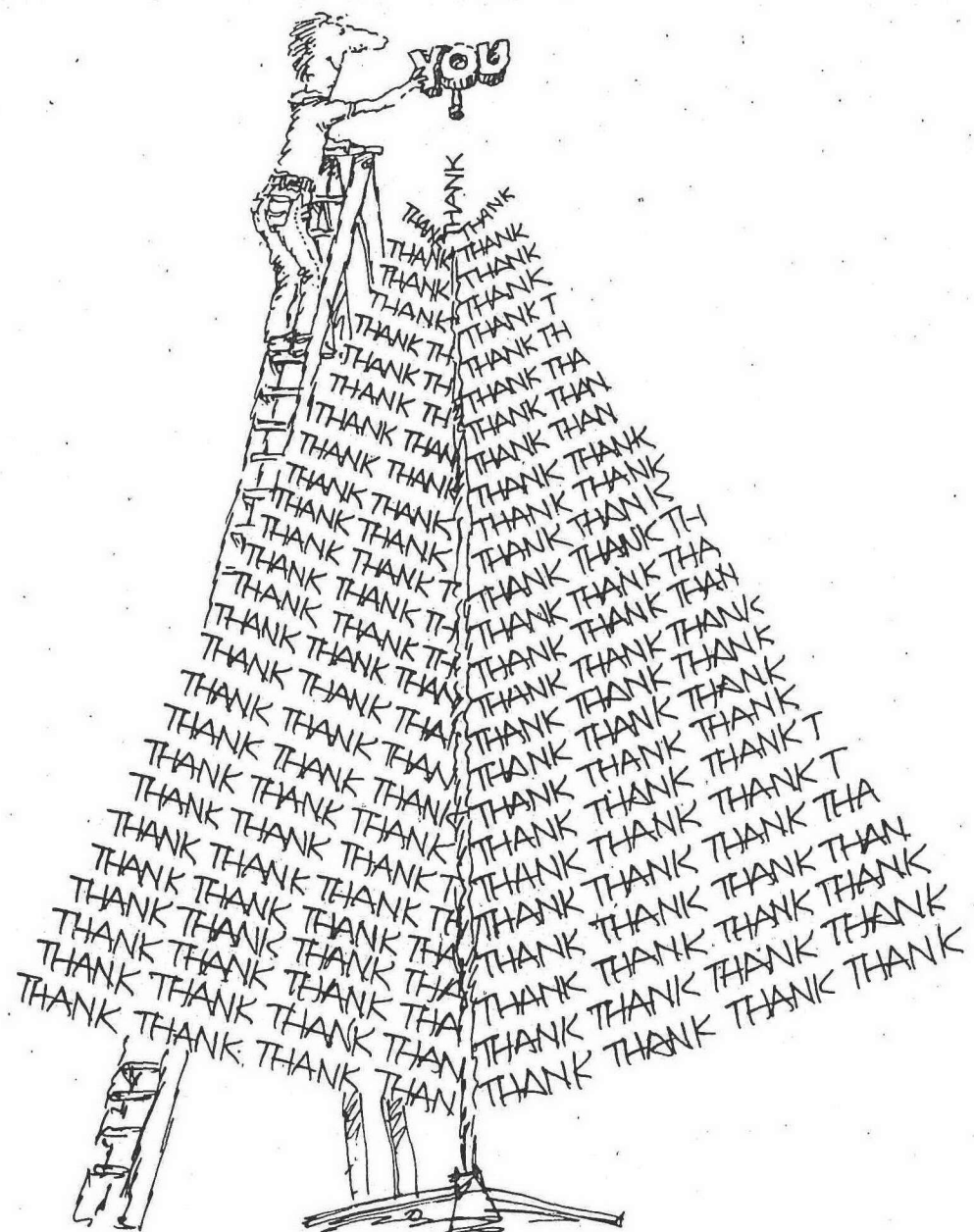

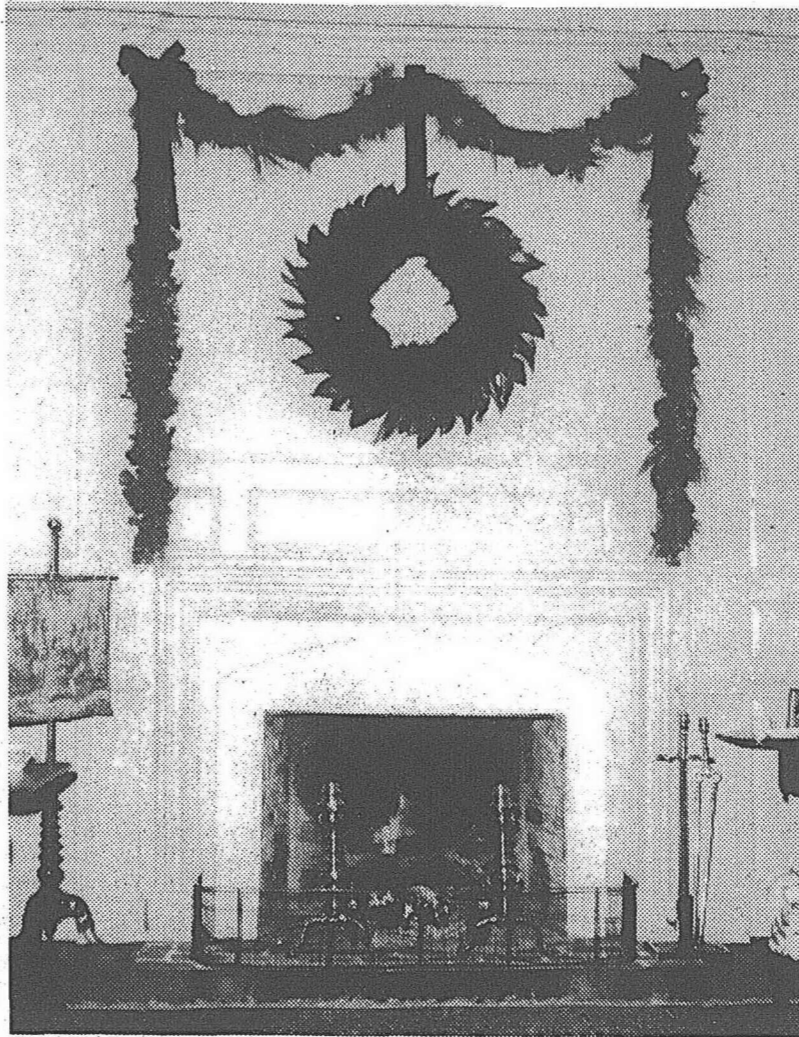
Christmas Opera to Be Presented At B'Mill Church

This mid-eighteenth century manor house was the home of Major Joseph Eggleston, second-in-command to Lighthorse Harry Lee in the American Revolution. Eggleston also served in the Virginia House of Delegates and in the Fifth and Sixth U.S. Congresses.

Egglestetton has been a working plantation since its establishment around 1750. In 1921, the farm was purchased by W.J. Morris. His son, Garland

T. Morris and his wife restored the structures between 1970 and 1974.

The house tour will be held from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. in the evening. Tickets for the tour will be sold during the day in the old restored outdoor kitchen on the east lawn. The Candlelight Reception, which will include refreshments and entertainment, will be held from 8 until 11 p.m. Tickets for the evening are \$10.00 per person in advance. Tickets for the daylight tour are \$3.00 per person.

What's Cooking

Cookies, cakes, pies, fruit-cakes, preserves being prepared at this time of the year fill a housefull of aromas that will be remembered a life time. The simplest of things done for our loved ones cause the holiday to be bright and delightful. Cookie baking at our house is one of the children's favorite times. From our youngest to our oldest, they get excited about Christmas baking. It takes some planning to find jobs that are helpful and keep the progress of baking going. I have included a recipe that is perfect if you have little ones wanting to make a contribution of the array of Christmas goodies. All of the cookies are great for gifts and look great in a clear jar tied with a colorful ribbon to add that extra touch.

With all of the hecticness of gift buying, cooking, baking, entertaining, visiting, and decorating, let us not forget this season should bring thoughts of the miraculous birth of Christ. May the miracle of Christmas fill your life with joy! Merry Christmas.

(Children love to make these)

Red and Green Stripes

3/4 cup butter
3/4 cup sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1 egg
2 1/4 cups flour
3/4 teaspoon baking powder
Red and Green food coloring
Cream butter and sugar together in a bowl. Add vanilla and beat until fluffy. Beat in the egg. Gradually mix in the flour and baking powder. Divide the dough into three bowls. Add red coloring to one, green to another, and leave the third plain.

Line a deep 7 1/2 by 3 1/4 inch loaf pan with plastic wrap long enough to extend over sides. Pat the red dough on the bottom, then the plain dough, and the green on top to make 3 layers. cover with plastic wrap and chill in the refrigerator overnight or longer.

When ready to bake, lift dough out of the pan using the edges of plastic wrap as handles. Cut into slices about 1/4 inch thick and cut each slice in half to make two small squares. Bake on cookie

sheets lined with aluminum foil in a preheated 375° oven about 6 minutes until the cookies just begin to color. Makes about 48 cookies.

Glaze Peels, Fruits and Nuts

2 cups sugar
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 cup water
pinch of salt
fruits and nuts

Combine sugar, corn syrup, water and salt in a small heavy saucepan. Place over moderate heat and stir constantly until mixture begins to boil. Cook without stirring to 280° on a candy thermometer, reduce heat and cook to 300°. As crystals collect on side of pan, wipe them away with a slightly wet pastry brush. Place pan in a larger saucepan of boiling water to keep from hardening as you work.

Drop fruit pieces or nuts one at a time into the syrup; lift out with a fork and hold over the saucepan, allowing any excess syrup to drain off. Insert fork over an oiled baking pan. Placing each coated piece on the oiled surface. Allow to cool and harden in a dry spot. If desired, dip cooled glaze fruits or nuts into warm melted semisweet chocolate; place on waxed paper to cool and harden.

Makes about 2 dozen candies. Note: Try parboiled strips of orange peel, any dried fruits fresh orange slices with peel, pineapple slices, whole cranberries, walnuts, pecans. Do not be afraid to experiment!

Pecan Crunch

2 cups of all-purpose flour
1 cup packed light brown sugar
1 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
1 egg
1 6 ounce package semisweet chocolate pieces
1 1/2 cups pecans, toasted and finely chopped

About 2 hours before serving or up to 1 week ahead:

In large bowl, measure first 5 ingredients. With hand, knead ingredients until blended and mixture holds together. Preheat oven to 350°. Pat dough evenly into 15 1/2 by 10 1/2 jelly-roll pan.

Bake 25 minutes or until golden. Meanwhile, in heavy small saucepan over low heat, melt chocolate pieces, stirring frequently. Set aside. Remove jelly rollpan from oven; pour chocolate over baked layer in pan. With metal spatula, evenly spread chocolate over baked oven layer; sprinkle with pecans. Cool in pan on wire rack. When cool, cut length wise into 6 strips, then cut each strip crosswise into 12 pieces to make 72 bars in all. Store cookies in tightly covered container to use up within 1 week. Makes 6 dozen bars.

German Chocolate Tarts

1 4 ounce package sweet cooking chocolate
1 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons butter
4 teaspoons vanilla
1/4 cup butter
1 13 oz. can (1 1/2 cups) evaporated milk
3 beaten eggs
1 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/8 teaspoon salt
3/4 cup flaked coconut, toasted
1/2 cup chopped walnuts

Grate about one-fourth of the chocolate into mixing bowl. Stir in flour, brown sugar, and the 1/4 teaspoon salt. Cut in the 6 tablespoons butter or margarine till mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Combine the water and the first teaspoon vanilla; add to the flour mixture, stirring till dough forms into a ball. Divide into 18 portions. Press each portion into bottom and up sides of 2 1/2 inch muffin pans. Bake in 375° oven for 12 minutes.

Meanwhile, in small, heavy saucepan, melt the remaining chocolate and the 1/4 cup butter over low heat, stirring constantly. Remove from heat blend in evaporated milk. Stir into eggs. Add granulated sugar, the remaining vanilla, and salt. Mix well. Pour into prebaked tart shells. Bake in 375° oven about 9 minutes or till top is nearly set. Sprinkle coconut and walnuts atop. Bake 6 minutes more or till top is set. Cool in pans 10 to 15 minutes. Remove to wire rack to cool completely. Makes 18 tarts.

overall record of 13-11-3, that's fantastic! We were proud of all the boys and look forward to another great year next season."

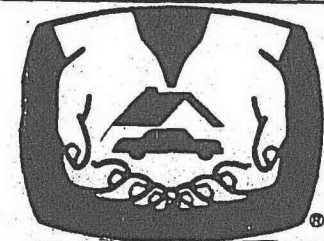

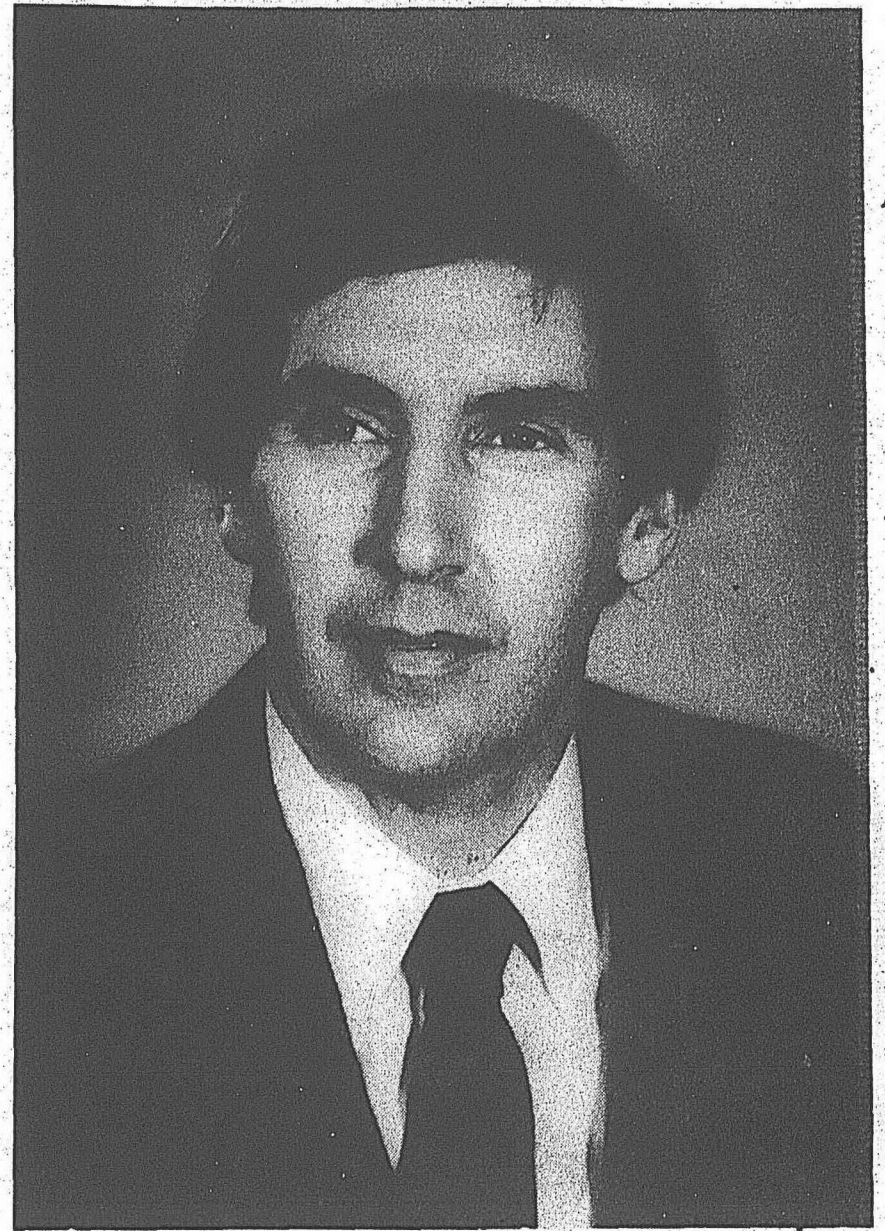
"J. Roy had so many friends here and has done so much for this community - we are going to miss him tremendously", said Gardner.





health hazard in its natural state, but processing created "tailings" in a concentration that must be monitored closely. Furthermore, the anticipated economic benefits to the region where the mining is currently being considered must be weighed against potential mining in more heavily populated areas. This will require careful working in legislation written to address the uranium mining issue. When asked if the State of Virginia has the capacity to adequately monitor both mining and clean-up operations, Watkins responded, "yes, I believe we do. The Uranium Task Force will propose favorable legislation."

Manufactured Housing

Delegate Watkins reviewed sub-committee discussions that have addressed manufactured housing. "Manufactured housing" is primarily mobile home construction, and there are many legalities involved with regard to their placement (zoning) in Virginia communities. At the same time Watkins believes we must, realistically, look at this alternative form of housing seriously because, in many cases, it is the only housing available to young couples and others on a fixed income.

Education

While the State government is not responsible for providing school buildings, it does contribute state funds to local governments for education. The subject of educating our children is a highly-charged issue and this meeting with Watkins proved no exception. The Virginia Education Association backs a one-percent increase in sales tax to channel additional monies into the state's public school system. Watkins believes in 100 percent funding of educational requirements and is convinced that the money is already available (within the state budget), without increasing the sales tax. He is also an advocate of Merit Pay, with the qualification that a legal system

be in place to protect local governments from possible court costs.

School Boards

Virginia is the only state in the United States that does not elect school boards. Rather, Board members are appointed by either school selection committees (as in Chesterfield County) or by the local government body (Board of Supervisors). School selection committees are appointed by Judges of the Circuit Court.

Many public hearings have been held on the subject of school boards. A 1981 referendum failed in its attempt to have the Chesterfield Board of Supervisors appoint the school board.

In order to have an elected school board, the General Assembly would have to vote in two, separate sessions, for this change in the State Constitution, and a public referendum would have to concur with the Assembly vote.

The subject of elected school boards is certain to receive a full measure of attention in the '85 Assembly session.

Roads

Many Brandermill residents have asked, "When will the road (Powhite Extension) be completed?" According to Watkins, the land acquisition should be completed within the next 12 months; "the appraisers are currently at work". Then, construction bids will go out in October of 1985 and awarded in December of '85. "If" says Watkins, "If the bids and appraisals stay on schedule, the recertification of the bonds will take place in January of 1986 and we should begin construction in March of '86. Completion of the Extension is targeted for Spring of 1988".

Meetings Open

Watkins concluded the meeting by reminding residents that meetings of the General Assembly are open to the public. Anyone may attend committee meetings, hearings, etc., and are encouraged to do so.

Board Action

Woodlake/BCA

The BCA Board continues to review facilities-use exchange agreements with Woodlake. Dan Stevens, BCA legal advisor, has offered a word of caution with regard to the authority of this Board to enter into such an agreement.

1985 Budget

A community-wide meeting is scheduled for Monday, December 3, 7:30 p.m. at the Brandermill Church for the purpose of responding to budget-related questions. The Board will be prepared to respond to a comparative analysis between the 1984 and '85 budgets.

Architectural Advisory Board

Clem Carlise suggested that the BCA Board review procedures for appointing members to the AAB, as well as review operating procedures. Specific recommendations to this effect will be forthcoming from Clem and Fred Bott, with input from AAB Chairman Jim Furr.

Long-Range Planning

Arthur Haake, chairman of the LRPC, presented that committee's report to the Board. This 1984 document updates the work of the 1981 LRPC and should prove a useful resource in future Board action. Board chairman John Maphis praised the work of the Haake committee.

Maintenance

In keeping with a Board directive (10/29/84) President John Maphis met with Fred Bott to discuss the conduct of a study to determine whether in-house or contractual maintenance was more economically and operationally sound for the Brandermill community. Based on an initial review of current plus pro-

jected (contractual) costs as presented to him, Maphis concluded that it appeared an in-house (BCA) grounds maintenance system would offer sizeable savings. Furthermore, it was determined that a lengthy study should be deferred, inasmuch as it could not provide data needed to make a decision prior to the 1985 contractual year. It was therefore recommended to the Board by Mr. Maphis that our present contractual agreement with Atlantic Grounds Management Company be terminated effective January 1, 1985. Atlantic would be given a 60-day "phase-out" option to provide services through January 31.

After considerable review, the Board tabled the recommendation, pending additional facts which will be presented by Fred Bott at a December 3 (5:30 p.m.) meeting, prior to the community-wide budget hearing. If the Board agrees to the in-house maintenance recommendation, that service would be covered by a rearrangement of costs-by-account.



Concert Ballet Of Virginia

Brandermill Community Theatre To Present "The Nutcracker"

The Brandermill Community Theatre will sponsor three performances of Tchaikovsky's well-loved Christmas ballet, "The Nutcracker" at 8:30 p.m. on Friday, December 14th and at 2:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 15th at Clover Hill High School. Featuring a cast of 80 with over 100 costumes, the ballet will be performed by the Concert Ballet of Virginia, now in its ninth season under the direction of Robert Watkins.

"The Nutcracker" is based on Alexander Dumas' version of E.T. A. Hoffman's tale, **The Nutcracker and the King of the Mice.** At a Christmas party a young girl receives a pair of dancing slippers, while her brother receives a stick horse and a mechanical rat. At the height of the evening, a mysterious friend of her parents arrives and brings with him enchanted entertainment in the form of a Harlequin doll, a Columbine doll and two mechanical soldiers, who dance for the guests. He then presents Clara with a Nutcracker, in the form of a soldier prince. When all the guests are gone, Clara returns to see the tree and the gifts. Suddenly her parents' mysterious friend is back and summons the Nutcracker, now lifesize, to be Clara's cavalier. The Nutcracker causes the Christmas tree to grow to an enormous size and introduces Clara to his friends. At this point mice appear and the Nutcracker summons his soldiers to fight the mice. At the height of the battle, the fearsome Rat King appears and fights the Nutcracker.

As the Rat King is about to run through the Nutcracker with his sword, Clara throws her shoe and kills the Rat King. Clara falls to the floor in a faint and the Nutcracker, now a handsome prince, awakens her. He waves away the room and they are in a magic snow forest, where Clara meets the Snow Queen and dances with the living snowflakes before beginning her journey to the Kingdom of the Sugar Plum Fairy. Once there, she is greeted by the Cooks, who have prepared endless delicacies for the celebration. The Sugar Plum summons dancers of many realms to entertain her and finally she and the Prince dance for Clara. When it is time to say goodbye to loveliness and fantasy, all of us remember when, like Clara, we said goodbye to Childhood.

The 1984 production is being staged by Scott Boyer, assisted by Nan Blackwell and Carolyn Pillow Mayhew. The sets for the Brandermill Community Theatre's production of "The Nutcracker" were designed by former Richmonder, Carl Michel, now a New York set and costume designer. Michel has just recently designed the costumes for the 1985 production of "The Nutcracker" to be performed by the Washington Ballet. He also did the costumes and sets for the Dance Theatre of Harlem's recent European tour.

Prior to the Brandermill performances, "The Nutcracker" will be presented in eight performances at the Empire Theatre in downtown Richmond. A guest appearance with the Richmond Pops Band is set December 6th

in the Virginia Room of the John Marshall Hotel and appearances are also planned during the Fan Christmas House Tour on Sunday, December 16th. Lee Pemberton, President of the Brandermill Community Theatre, points out that the December 14th and 15th performances are the only ones scheduled outside of the downtown Richmond area and that his group is interested in making this an annual holiday treat for the Brandermill community if ticket sales warrant it. The holiday trees of 13 countries will be decorated with traditional ornaments and displayed in several areas throughout the Museum. The Moravian community's "Putz," Advent wreath

and star will also be featured.

In addition to holiday trees and decorations, each country will be featured for a day with demonstrations of special foods, festive music and carols, and other presentations of unique holiday customs.

The Science Museum is at 2500 West Broad Street, Richmond. Admission to the exhibit areas only is \$2 for adults, \$5.00

for senior citizens and those six through 17, while Museum members and children under six who are part of a family group are admitted without charge. Parking is free.

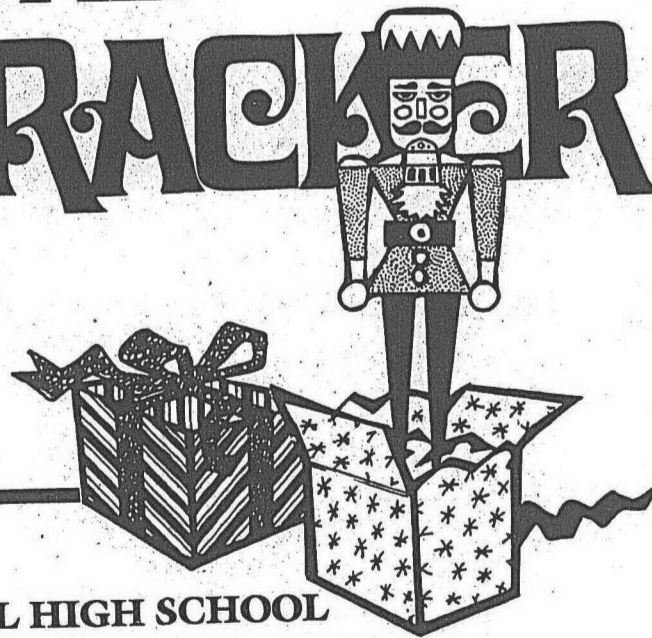

Public Notice Zoning Amendment

Brandermill has filed with the County a request for an amendment to the original zoning in order to convert retail and residential uses in the Harbour Pointe Executive Center to primarily office uses. The original uses (275 apartments and 150,000 square feet of non-residential uses) have evolved in Market Square and elsewhere in Brandermill as a result of market forces and phasing of the community. Consequently, there is little need for additional retail in the Harbour Pointe area and the Company's current plans call for the development of prestige offices on this site. With minor retail (primarily of a business service nature within the office buildings to be built) the square footage of office requested is a total of 350,000 square feet. Rather than an R-7 district with retail uses permitted, the new district will be Office with a conditional use permit for planned development which will add additional restrictions.

The Company plans to implement covenants, restrictions, and design criteria which exceed those applied elsewhere in Brandermill and Harbour Pointe. These restrictions will include specifications for landscaping, building materials, signage, etc. to complement the character of the existing community as well as the adjacent inn and conference center in the Harbour Pointe area.

A second part of the amendment requests the deletion of a reserved elementary school site at the request of the School Administration. Their plans call for a new elementary school further west of Route 360, making this site unnecessary in their long-range plans.

The Planning Commission public hearing on this matter will be held on the 18th of December, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. and the Board of Supervisors public hearing will be held on the 23rd of January, 1985 at 2:00 p.m., both meetings occurring in the County Board of Supervisors hearing room. The public is invited to attend. Mr. J.B. Campbell of The Brandermill Group, who is managing this project, is available to answer any questions, or interested residents may also inquire at the County Planning office.
