Hundreds of Brandermill residents along with their families and friends turned out for the annual Fourth of July holiday festivities sponsored by the BCA. For the first time in three years a full parade took place in the morning. The "Road to Recycling" theme was evident among many of the groups participating in the parade. Free flags, balloons and food coupons were distributed along the parade route which stretched from Swift Creek Middle School along Brandermill Parkway and Millridge Parkway ending at Sunday Park.

The grand marshal was Pam Barrar who was an early proponent of recycling in the area. Marching in the parade were the Army 80th Division Band, The Chesterfield County Sheriff's Office Precision Marching Unit, members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 2163, Cub Scouts and Indian Princesses. Various

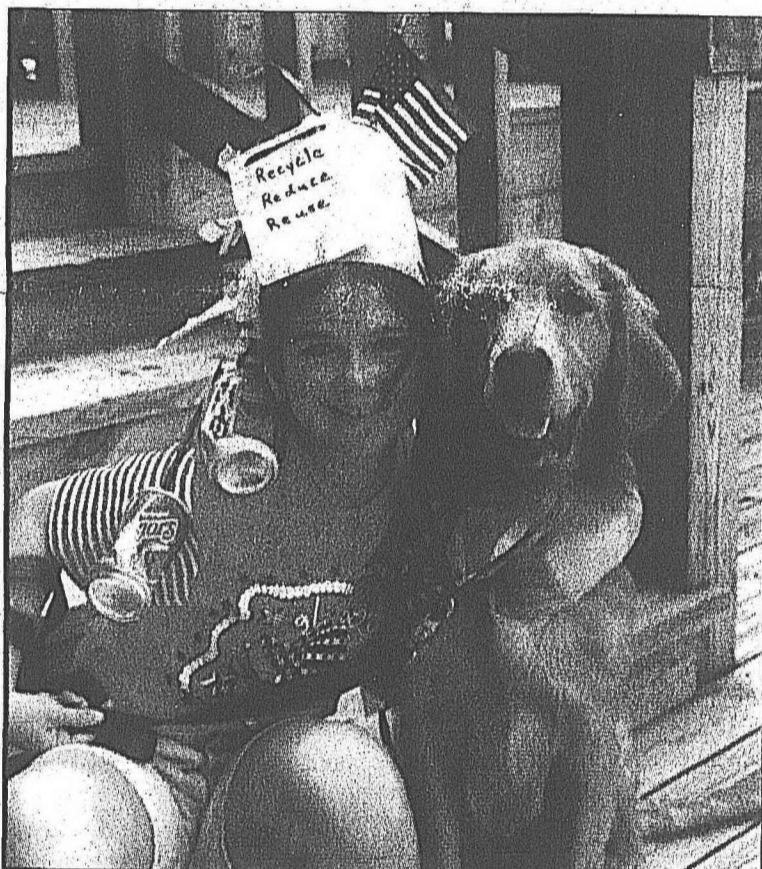

Later in the evening, the band, Stampede, entertained the huge crowd at Sunday Park that was on hand for the fireworks extravaganza. The aerial display was seen by an appreciative audience around and on the lake.

Residents gear up for curbside recycling program

The long-awaited curbside recycling program in Brandermill will get underway later this month. Pick-ups will be made every other week beginning the week of July 24 at each house where a bin is placed at the curb. It will be the responsibility of the homeowner to put the bin out on the appropriate day and then remove it after the recyclables are collected.

Howard Heltman, director of operations for Central Virginia Waste Management Authority, said the bins will be dropped off in Brandermill during the week of July 17. He added that it will take several days to drop off all the bins and residents should not become concerned if another neighborhood receives bins and they have not. The bins will be placed near the end of the driveway or yard.

All of the information needed for the recycling program will be included on printed information delivered with the bins. This includes the pick-up day for each neighborhood, a list of what materials can be recycled, a calendar and phone numbers to call for further information.

Most household recyclables will be accepted including glass bottles and jars, metal cans and foil products, plastic narrow-neck bottles marked with a number one or two, juice boxes

and milk cartons, newspapers and mixed paper including catalogs, magazines, computer paper and junk mail. Residents are asked to separate the paper materials from the other recyclables and everything else can be placed together in the bin.

The use of brown grocery bags is recommended to keep the paper separate. Paper labels on jars and cans do not need to be removed; all caps and lids should be removed and discarded; bottles and jars should be rinsed; plastic bottles and cans should be flattened.

The recycling bins belong to the county. If a bin is damaged by the contractor a new one will be issued. If it is lost or damaged through misuse, a new one may be purchased for \$5. Any resident who wants an additional bin may purchase one from the BCA or the county. Homeowners who move should leave the recycling bin behind for the new resident.

After legal consultation and input from the recycling committee, the BCA has issued several rules governing the use of the recycling bins.

- Only green bins issued by the Central Virginia Waste Management Authority may be placed at the curbside.

- The container may be placed at

Brandermill will "adopt" a family devastated by flooding

Three years ago, hundreds of Brandermill residents pooled their resources and "adopted" a Florida family devastated by Hurricane Andrew. Two years ago, Brandermill residents came to the aid of an entire community—Hannibal, Missouri—and sent emergency supplies to flood victims. This time, disaster has struck close to home and the network is already in place to help the Virginia neighbors who are suffering from recent flooding.

Brandermill residents will begin collecting new household items for a family who has lost everything in the flood. The family, to be designated by members of the Buena Vista community, will most likely have been uninsured and thus, most in need.

Those who would like to join in the Brandermill Adopt a Family program may bring household items to the former Simply Said store in Genito Station Mondays through Thursdays from 4 to 8 p.m. The store, manned by volunteers, will also be open Satur-

day mornings from 9 a.m. until noon. The collection will begin from July 15 through July 29. A list of needed items will be distributed by flyer to residents. For questions about donations, please call Pat Johnson at 744-8528 or the BCA at 744-1035.

Community volunteers will coordinate the collection and the BCA will accept checks payable to Brandermill Adopt a Family.

Rich Johnson, owner of Genito Station, has provided the store space which will serve as the convenient drop-off site for donated goods. Richard Haskell of Haskell Chemical Company will donate a truck and driver to deliver the goods to Buena Vista. If a residence is not available for the family, the household items will be stored at Mundet-Hermetite Co. in Buena Vista.

Brandermill residents are again asked to open their hearts as well as their purses to help get a family in need back on its feet. Long Shadow resident Geri Wilson exemplifies the Brandermill spirit by saying, "Just give me an assignment and I'm ready to pitch in."

BCA helps teen center kick off 11-week summer program

David Stitt, chairman of the teen center committee, has announced the schedule for the summer teen program in Brandermill. The program is sponsored by Brandermill Community Association, Office on Youth, Chesterfield County Parks and Recreation Department and Schools Department. Brandermill Community

Association provided the seed money, \$15,000, to initiate the program.

The 11-week program offers activities such as dancing, basketball, volleyball, games and socializing to area teenagers. All events are scheduled at Swift Creek Middle School. For the first week only, teens met at the temporary site, Swift Creek Elementary School, and approximately 50 young residents attended an opening dance there on June 24.

The scheduled hours for the activities

are Monday through Thursday from 12:30 to 4:30 p.m. and Friday and Saturday evenings.

Middle school students are asked to come at 6:30 p.m. and leave at 9:30 p.m. while high school students will come at 7:30 p.m. and leave at the designated time of 10:30 p.m.

During the first week of the program's operation, Carl Calberth of the Chesterfield Mental Health Department spoke to the teenagers about peer leadership, team building and

communication. He will train the teenagers how to instill the spirit of teamwork in their peers so that late joiners will quickly feel they belong.

All participants will be expected to join a response team that will involve one hour a month. All participants are also asked to volunteer one hour of their time a week, to collect fees, act as greeters, sell snacks and organize equipment. Tredegar pushes for development of 200 acres at Waterford

Editor's note: this article is the first in a series on large undeveloped commercial properties in Brandermill.

The Waterford development is a scenic focal point for travelers coming in and out of Brandermill. Situated on the northeast quadrant of Genito and Coalfield Roads, a 40,000-square-foot Class A office building overlooks the 15-acre lake and waterfall. Adjacent to the Waterford Village shopping center lies the Pavilion apartment complex. But beyond these highly visible properties, are approximately 200 acres of undeveloped land owned by Tredegar Industries.

A marketing plan identifies a

Jim Banks, assistant director of Chesterfield County Department of Transportation, spoke to a group of Brandermill Woods residents on June 27 concerning the status of the roadways in the area.

Construction has begun on the relocation of Coalfield Road between Centerpointe and Midlothian Turnpike. Coalfield Road will be moved west and will tie in with the present Charter Colony Parkway near Midlothian High School.

Construction on the west side of Coalfield Road near the Midlothian Library has been completed. The new road is known as Woolridge Road Extended and provides access to the area in back of Midlothian High School and the future campus of John Tyler Community College.

Existing Coalfield Road will, in the future, no longer carry traffic to Midlothian Turnpike but will provide access to the library and J.B. Watkins Elementary School.

Woolridge Road Extended will eventually carry traffic further east and intersect with Midlothian Turnpike near Old Buckingham Road.

BCA Board Minutes

The regularly scheduled meeting of the BCA Board of Directors was held on June 19 at Oscar's. Present were Directors Jim Trent, Jim Bolton, Laurie Newill, Kevin Healy, Charles Macfarlane and Jo Owens as well as Community Manager Greg Ailsworth and Administrative Assistant Bobbi Glenn. Director Phil Perkins was absent.

The following is a summary of the minutes. Complete, official minutes are available at the BCA office. The board has not yet acted on the minutes. They will be approved at the next regular meeting.

Member Voice

Kathy Carbone of Five Springs requested that two windows on the side of the house on lot 35 as well as three windows on the rear of the house be louvered.

Richard Kury of Cove Ridge would like to have 12-foot trees planted at BCA expense between his property and lot 29 creating screening and privacy between the two lots.

Treasurer's Report

Income for the year to date is \$18,090 over budget. Expenses are \$52,459 under budget. It was noted that the association is entering the high maintenance season and expenses will increase. The balance in the reserve fund is \$359,329.

President's Report

A motion was made and carried to accept the resolution honoring Pam Barrar for her community efforts in the area of recycling and acknowledging her as the Grand Marshal of the 1995 Fourth of July Parade.

A motion was made and carried to adopt a resolution requesting upgrades to Old Hundred Road from U.S. Route 360 to Genito Road.

Community Manager's Report

Community Manager Ailsworth highlighted the following items from the written report.

A meeting will be held on July 13 with John Cogbill and the developers of the Homart property with the BCA Board of Directors to discuss the proposed shopping center at Routes 288 and 360 on Commonwealth Center Parkway.

A total of \$283 has been collected in the boat rental program over the past three weekends.

A Community Manager's Quarterly Town Meeting is scheduled for June 28 at 7:30 p.m. at The Brandermill Church.

President Trent said that the group representing the commercial members does not wish to become a sanctioned committee of the BCA at this time.

A meeting was scheduled for June 20 to discuss Woodlake's position on the lake bottom ownership issue.

Committee Reports

NRC

John Hughes urged the board to consider naming the Business Council (commercial members) a standing committee of the BCA. The 1995-1996 NRC officers were elected at the June 4 picnic meeting. August is the next scheduled NRC meeting.

Fourth of July

John Hughes reported that everything is running according to schedule and the committee is requesting board participation in the parade.

Finance Committee

There is one committee seat to be filled before the first meeting in July. President Trent asked board members to submit their recommendations for consideration.

Signage

Arrangements have been made to move the Spinnaker Cove neighborhood sign to the median opposite Spinnaker Cove and a new neighborhood sign will be installed at Harbour Pointe Parkway and Harbour Hill Road indicating the neighborhoods of Spinnaker Cove/Harbour Hill. Courtside will be submitting its sign design at the July 6 CARB meeting. The country club sign has been ordered along with three pool signs. No action has been taken on the Sunday Park sign.

Public Relations

A motion was made and carried stipulating that any and all flyers distributed on behalf of the BCA and its committees have the official approval of the BCA with the BCA logo printed on the flyer.

Recycling

Regulations on placement of recycling bins were discussed and a motion was made and carried to accept the regulations on an interim basis.

Election

The committee was unsure what the board meant regarding positive

campaigns and asked for clarification. It also requested election comparison data for the past three elections.

Teen Center

A kick-off dance was scheduled for June 24 at Swift Creek Middle School with daily activities to begin July 7. Donations have been received from the Supervisor Art Warren, Woodlake Women's Club, NRC, and Michael and Diane Hollander.

Unfinished Business

Teen Center Funding

A motion was made and carried to accept the goals and expectations as set forth.

A motion was made and carried to amend the working capital recommendation to read that \$15,000 will be given directly to Chesterfield County Parks and Recreation for disbursement as needed for the Teen Center Program.

A motion was made and carried deleting the usage of funds in the original Teen Center agreement.

A motion was made and carried to accept the main motion to approve the Teen Center financial agreement as amended.

Ad-Hoc Committees

A motion was made and carried to accept staff recommendations involving charge and time frame for ad-hoc committees.

Properties Committee

A motion was made and carried stipulating that President Trent, Treasurer Healy and Director Macfarlane constitute the properties committee.

Conflict of Interest Disclosure

A motion was made and carried to adopt the conflict of interest resolution.

Board Work Session

A motion was made and carried stating that effective July 10, 1995, the BCA Board of Directors' work sessions will be held on the second Monday of each month and will begin at 8 a.m.

The Village Mill

A motion was made and carried to rescind the motion of June 6, 1994 denying publication of articles or letters to the editor dealing with the issue of the exit audit or the 1994 election, this does not include the board minutes; and further that the same policies which are currently being applied to other issues be utilized with respect to the special audit, the 1994 election and the pending lawsuit.

A motion was made and carried to rescind the prohibition of publication of letters to the editor.

Review Committee Report

A motion was made and carried expressing gratitude and thanks to The Village Mill committee for a job well done and noting that the board has taken this report under advisement and will review it with the staff and will implement appropriate recommendations. An amended motion was made and carried to have the community manager report back to the board during the August work session with specific recommendations regarding the report.

New Business

A motion was made and carried to accept rules one through six of the standing rules for board meetings.

An amended motion was made and carried accepting rules one through six and striking rules seven and eight.

Viewing Association

Books & Record Policy

A motion was made and carried to accept changing the days of request to Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

Community Manager Objectives

A motion was made and carried to accept the community manager objectives as presented.

Standing Rules For

Member Voice

A motion was made and carried to adopt the Member Voice resolution dated December 16, 1991.

An amended motion was made and carried stating that individuals wishing to speak during Member Voice should notify the BCA office by the Wednesday before the regular monthly board meeting.

Watershed Committee

A motion was made and carried appointing Michael Hollander as BCA Board representative to the Chesterfield County Watershed Committee.

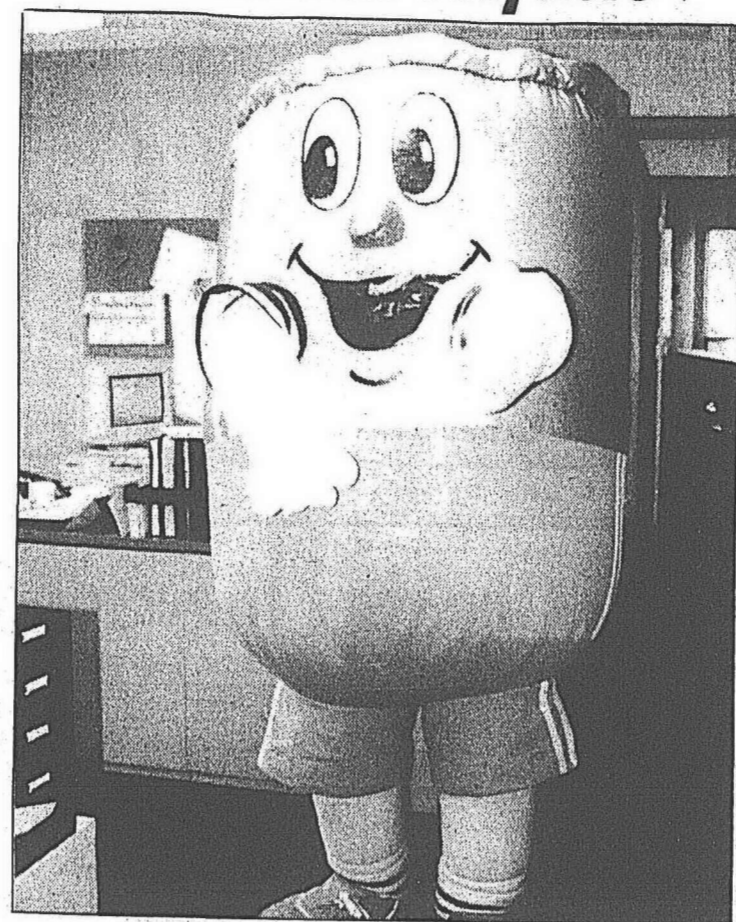

Community Standards

Covenant Enforcement

Many residents call and say, "That property has been like this for two years. Why haven't you done something about it before now?" I then ask them if they have called previously. Their answer is usually "no." I reply by saying, "Now we are aware of the problem and we can go forward with our enforcement procedure."

What some residents do not realize is that in covenant enforcement, Brandermill takes the position of being reactive as opposed to proactive. Being reactive means we react to all residents' complaints. Every complaint received by this office is investigated. Callers do not have to identify themselves, but if they do, their identity is protected by The Property Owners' Association Act, section 55-510 of the Code of Virginia.

When investigating a complaint, I visit the property in question and I

determine whether or not a violation exists. If the condition is a violation (either covenant or architectural), the property owner is notified and given a time period in which to bring the property into compliance. Property owners are also asked to call me with any questions. Open lines of communication create better understanding between parties.

If there is no communication between the property owner and the BCA, a reinspection of the property will take place at the end of the time period given. Should the violation remain, the property owners are then given notice that their case is to go to the Community Standards Hearing Panel. The panel will then examine the facts and has the authority to levy a fine. Fines can range up to \$50 for a one-time offense or up to \$10 per day for violations of a continuing nature. Remember, the association is interested in compliance with the covenants and improving Brandermill.

All NRC and committee flyers must display the official BCA logo and a statement of endorsement.



BCA Rental Facilities

Sunday Park Pavilion, Harbour Pointe Pavilion, and Waterside Park at Cove Ridge can be rented to only Brandermill residents in four-hour increments for \$10. A contract must be signed.

The Community Center can be rented to only Brandermill residents for \$11 per hour. A contract must be signed and there is a \$50 refundable security deposit.

From the Manager's Desk

Future Development

Over the past couple of months, the BCA has received information on three major real estate development projects which will have an impact on the residents of Brandermill. Your governmental officials, especially Supervisor Art Warren and Planning Commissioner Russ Gulley, have made sure the BCA has been apprised of the proposed developments in order for us to share the proposals with you. Below is a brief description of each of the three projects.

360 Capital Partnership

A 214-acre project which has been re-zoned to allow for over 600,000 square feet of commercial development and 450 apartment units. The early proposal anticipates a couple of major free-standing retailers along with traditional retailers. This project will be located at the southeast quadrant of the intersection of U.S. Route 360 and State Route 288.

Homart Community Center

A 132-acre commercial project with an anticipated 600,000 square feet of retail space and 400,000 square feet of office space. Two major retail anchors should highlight the project. The project will be located off Commonwealth Center Parkway at the southwest quadrant of U.S. Route 360 and State Route 288.

Greenspring

Plans are currently being developed by a group of three entities to

develop a 540 acre tract primarily for residential use on a tract of land just west of Brandermill. Currently, the property can be accessed from Genito Road and also from Old Hundred Road. The project is scheduled to be heard by the Chesterfield County Planning Commission at its August 15 meeting.

All three projects will have an impact on the Brandermill community, certainly from a transportation standpoint. Some of you may be in favor of one or all of the developments while others may either not be concerned or do not support any of the projects. If you wish to have your concerns known, you may want to do so through the BCA.

Members of the BCA Board of Directors have been elected to represent you and if you have an opinion on any of the developments, I am sure they would like to know. Only by contacting them will they be able to forward your concerns to the county officials. You will find the names of the board of directors listed on the lower portion of this page. Let them hear from you.

Special Thanks

I want to congratulate and thank John Hughes for his untiring efforts in leading the Fourth of July celebration. With his army of capable volunteers, John was able to organize a wonderful parade and festive evening, capped off with a fantastic fireworks display. On behalf of the residents of Brandermill, thank you John.

ARB procedures

The BCA Architectural Review Board is now requiring all contractors for new home construction to follow a two-step process.

The first step is to submit house and site plans and to notify all surrounding property owners of the proposed construction.

The second step is the approval or

disapproval process by the ARB.

The primary purpose of the new policy is to allow property owners the ability to know what is coming prior to construction. The BCA will notify all surrounding property owners through the mail. If notified, residents are encouraged to let the BCA know their opinions.

Tornado Precautions

It may seem as though Virginia is experiencing more tornadoes than usual. In August 1993, a tornado in southeast Virginia caused four deaths, over 200 injuries and heavy damage, most notably in the Petersburg area. Then in 1994 a destructive tornado touched down in the Martinsville area in the middle of the night causing significant damage.

These two tornadoes shatter the myths that tornadoes only occur in the spring. Historical records show that tornadoes have struck Virginia in all regions of the state and at all times of the year and day. In fact, tornado statistics for Virginia reveal that the state has two tornado peak seasons, one in the spring and another in the late summer and early fall.

The message to all Virginians is clear—tornadoes can happen anytime and anywhere.

To alert the public of tornadoes, the national Weather Service issues tornado watches and warnings. A tornado watch means that weather conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. If a tornado watch is broadcast, stay tuned for further advisories and be prepared to take cover.

If a tornado warning is issued, it means a tornado has actually been

sighted. Warnings are issued for individual counties and include the tornado's location and its direction and speed. If you are in or near its path, take cover immediately.

- The best shelter from a tornado is a basement. If there is no basement, go to an inside room without windows on the lowest level of the house (a closet, bathroom or interior hall). Protect your body with a heavy blanket or sleeping bag.

- Avoid windows. Most tornado injuries and deaths are caused by flying debris.

- If you are caught in an open building like a shopping mall, get into the restroom. Restrooms are usually made of concrete block and will offer more protection.

- If there is no time to go anywhere else, try to get up against something that will support or deflect falling debris.

- If you are outside when a tornado strikes, try to find shelter immediately in the nearest substantial building. If no buildings are close, take cover by lying flat in a ditch.

- If you are in your car, get out of your vehicle and try to find shelter. An underpass of a bridge or a ditch can provide shelter.

Options make it easy to spruce up mailboxes

Realtors and members of the BCA Curb Appeal committee, a subcommittee of the public relations committee, are stressing the importance of curb appeal in the community. Chairman Mark Smith says repainting an old faded mailbox is one way of greatly improving a neighborhood's attractiveness.

Residents can learn safe lawn care practices

Residents who are dissatisfied with their lawns and concerned about the amount of chemicals often applied to lawns and gardens can get help from the Chesterfield Extension EASY program (Environmental Answers to a Sound Yard.) Participants will learn how to have an attractive lawn using environmentally sound management practices.

Trained Chesterfield County master gardener volunteers will visit and evaluate yards. They will give advice

on how to successfully start, renovate and maintain lawns without using excess fertilizers and pesticides. The visits will begin in late summer and master gardener volunteers will make additional visits and phone calls through April and May.

To participate, homeowners are required to take an initial soil sample for testing, make time for and follow the recommendations of the master gardeners, and make a one-year commitment to stick with the program. There

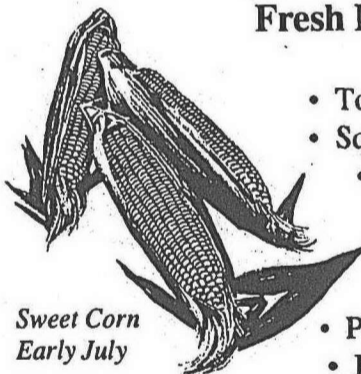
is a \$10 registration fee for this program which will cover the cost of the required pre- and post- program soil testing.

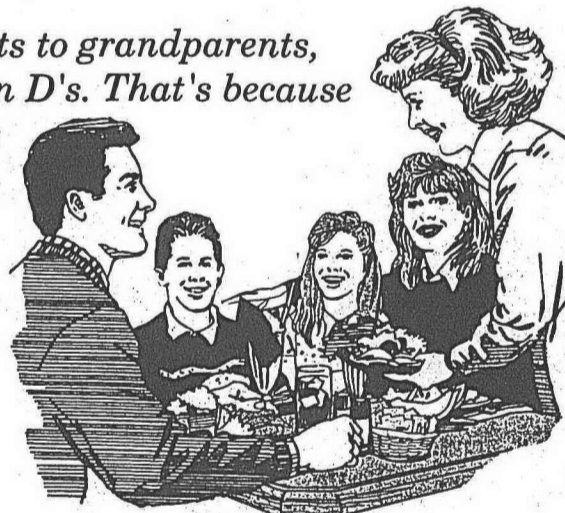

the curbside no earlier than 7 p.m. the day prior to pick-up and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day.

- The container must be removed from the curbside no later than 8 p.m. on the day of pick-up.

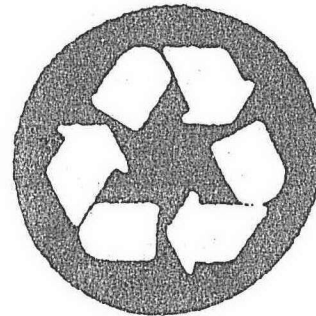
- Any container left at the curbside after 8 p.m. on collection day will be considered a covenant violation and will be handled through the hearing panel process.

- The hearing panel process stipulates that on the first offense, the resident will be notified by mail regarding the regulations pertaining to the recycling bins. For the second offense, a letter will be written to the property owner/tenant advising them that they must appear before the hearing panel. After the third offense in one year, the hearing panel will have the authority to levy a fine of up to \$50 for each occurrence. The resident will also be given a chance to participate in a hearing panel meeting. For subsequent violations of the rules the covenant enforcement manager will recommend that the resident be charged \$50 for each appearance before the panel.

Safe Garage

Chesterfield County began a Safe Garage program in April. The free recycling program provides year-round drop-off points for many hazardous household wastes. It is illegal to take household chemicals, automotive oils and lawn products to the dump or pour them into the ground. The nearest drop-off point is at the Northern Area Transfer Station at 3200 Warbro Rd. Cleaning liquids, paints, stains, thinners and anti-freeze are accepted.

The county also sponsors periodic Household Hazardous Waste Days. Residents may make an appointment to drop off pesticides, oil-based paints, latex paints, stains, thinners, photo and pool chemicals and other hazardous materials. For more information on either program call 748-1297.

Bin Materials



Glass Bottles and Jars

- Clear, green, light blue and brown bottles or jars from food or beverages. No need to remove labels.
- No mirrors, broken glass, auto or window glass, ceramic ovenware or other glass products, please. Throw away lids and bottle caps.

Metal Cans and Foil Products

- Aluminum and bi-metal beverage cans, "tin" or steel food cans and aluminum foil or foil products. No need to remove labels. Rinse off all food waste. Crush cans and foil to save room in your bin.
- No other types of metal, or spray or aerosol cans, please.

"Narrow Neck" plastic bottles OR

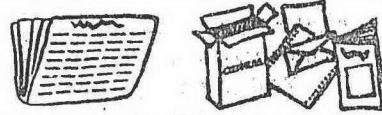
- Plastic soda bottles, milk and juice jugs, shampoo and detergent bottles, and other "narrow neck" plastic bottles with the PETE-1 or HDPE-2 symbol on the bottom. Look for the proper symbols. To save room in your bin, flatten bottles and jugs.

- No "wide mouth" plastic containers (such as tubs or cups). No other types of plastic, please. Throw away lids and bottle caps.

Aseptic containers and poly-coated cartons (juice boxes and milk cartons)

- "Foil box" drink packages and poly-coated containers such as milk and juice cartons. Crush boxes and cartons to save room in your bin.
- No other types of foil packaging or coated paper products, please.

Bag Materials



Newspapers

- Put newspapers in paper grocery sacks. Glossy inserts that come with the paper are okay.
- No plastic bags or string. Keep other paper, phone books, catalogs, magazines, etc. separate.

Mixed paper

- Put mixed paper (including phone books, catalogs, magazines, corrugated boxes, computer paper, "junk" mail, empty cereal and dry food boxes) in paper grocery sacks. Stack sacks of paper next to bin.
- No newspapers, plastic bags, foil backed paper, wax or plastic coated paper, food contaminated paper, carbon paper, please.

Set your recyclables at the curb by 7 a.m. on your collection day.

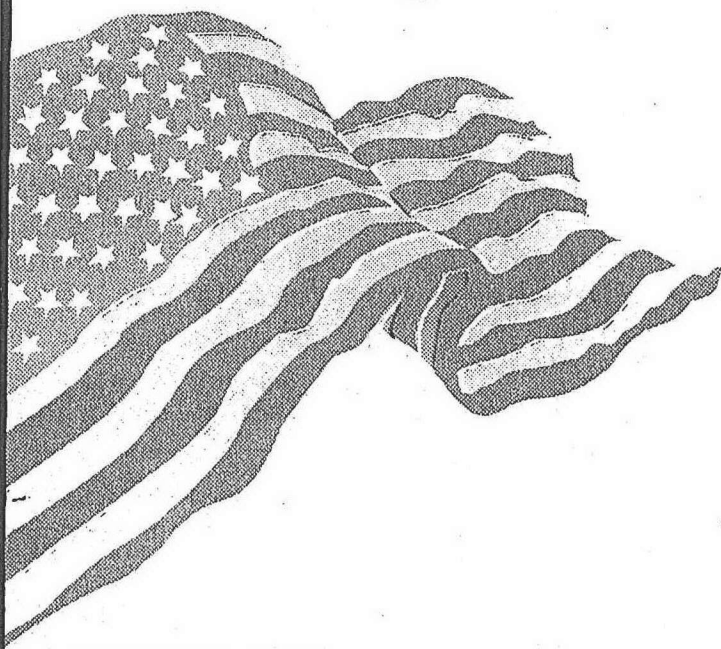

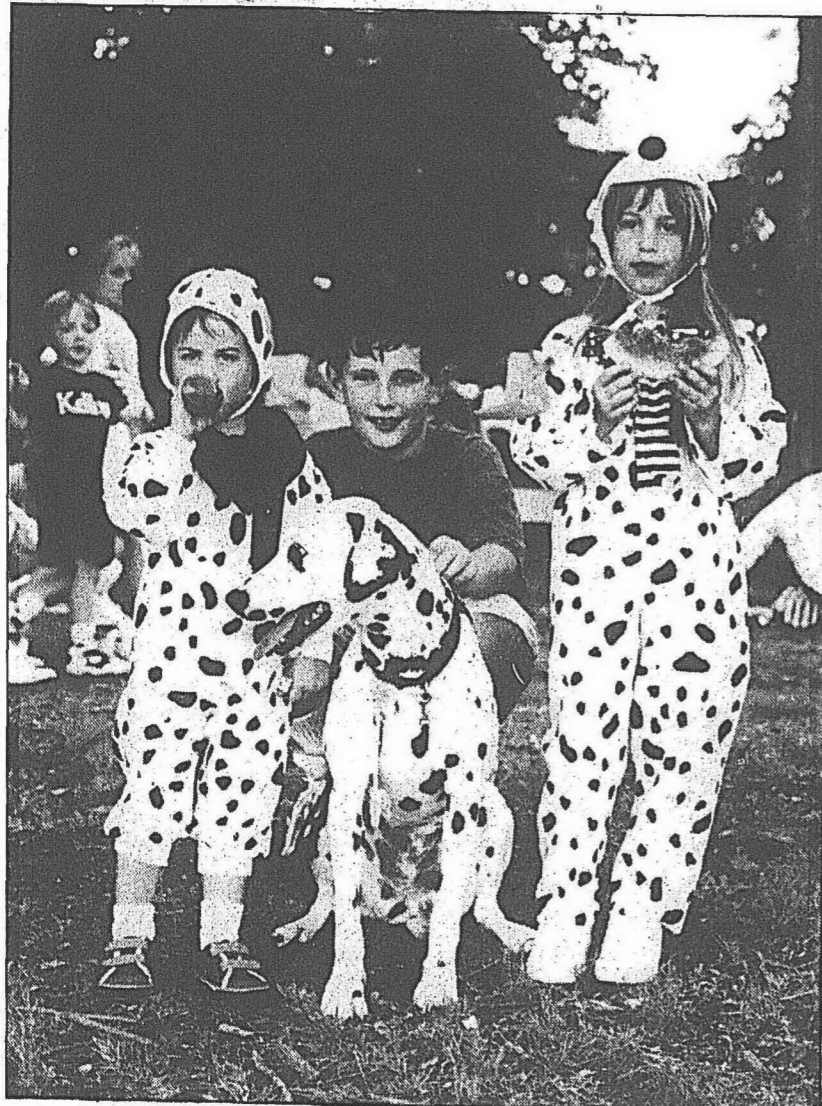

Cameron Wallace is a member of the National Honor Society and the French National Honor Society. He was secretary of the Key Club in 1994-1995 and will serve as vice presi-

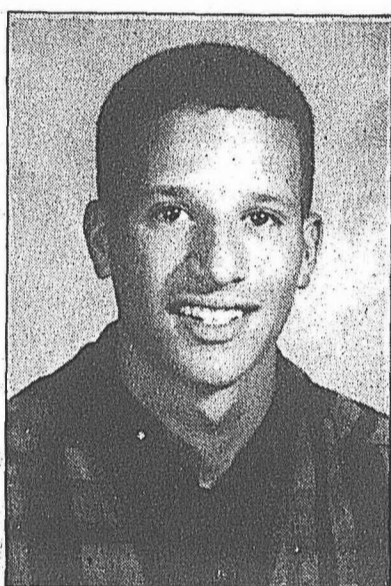
